Neighbors helping neighbors

Westfield church offers free home repair this summer

Rev. Dr. Eric Lohe is lead pastor for CrossRoads Church in Westfield. A few years ago, his church decided to shift their focus from mission trips outside the country to helping their neighbors in Hamilton County. As one way to be a good neighbor, CrossRoads is bringing hundreds of young people to Westfield this summer to provide free home repair for those in need.

This program is being offered in partnership with Group Mission Trips, an organization based in Colorado with which Lohe has a long history.

"Group Mission Trips goes to 25 to 35 communities in the United States and do a week-long youth mission home repair camp," Lohe explained. "I have been attending those camps since 2005 working as staff and a volunteer. Our church has sent a number of students and adults to these

Good news, tax rates down slightly for 2020

Here is some good news for most Hamilton County property taxpayers. The county auditor's office has released tax rates that are slightly lower this year than last.

Despite increased budgets in most taxing units, rates are down a little thanks to the expanding tax base that includes vast amounts of new construction and a trending upwards in assessments of some existing properties.

"Trending" is a term used by assessors which is designed to reflect increased value of existing properties. This process can cause an individual taxpayer to get a slightly higher tax bill even if his or her taxing unit has a

slightly lower tax rate.

But, overall in 14 of the county's 17 municipalities and unincorporated township areas, taxes are going down, slightly as they may be. The largest decrease in rates are found in Washington Township outside Westfield, down 8.65 percent. The smallest decrease is found in Delaware Township at 0.89 of a percent.

In only three taxing units are rates up. In Arcadia the rate is up 1.28 percent due largely to a shrinking tax base. In Carmel the rate is up just short of 1 percent largely due to an approved school referendum. And, in Fishers there is a tiny 0.13 of 1 per-

cent increase.

So, after the increases and decreases, Sheridan residents will pay the county's highest tax rate at \$3.19 per hundred dollars of assessed value. That is more than 1 percent lower than last year. Unincorporated White River Township will pay the lowest rate at \$1.50 per hundred, down nearly 2 percent.

Deputy Auditor Lee Graham prepared the information showing increases and decreases in rates this year. She also created a full matrix of this year's rates showing the tax rates for corporate, school, township, library and county rates, which together creates the total tax rate.

This breakdown appears in a legal notice in this week's print edition of the Hamilton County Reporter.

Schaibley's bill to require health care pricing info passes House committee

The House Public Health Committee on Wednesday voted in favor of a bill authored by State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) providing Hoosiers with timely, health care pricing information.

According to Schaibley, the legislation would require hospitals and facilities focused on providing outpatient services to disclose estimated costs of treatment.

"Patients deserve to have an idea of how much they will owe for a procedure before it happens to avoid getting hit with unexpected and costly bills later," Schaibley said. "Our hope is that a more transparent system will provide Hoosiers with the information they need to make informed decisions regarding their health care expenses."

Schaibley said her bill would also make sure patients get pricing information in a more timely manner. Health care providers and insurance companies would have to let patients know how much money they would owe well in advance of a procedure.

"When Hoosiers seek medical treatment, time is of the essence," Schaibley said. "Consumers need this

information as soon as possible in order to determine the best course of action to take care of their health."

The bill would also create a statewide All-Payer Claims Database managed by an independent third party. House Bill 1005 now heads to the full House for further consideration. To learn more, visit iga.in.gov.

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we’d all tell stories that would be somewhat sad at times, which did happen. What I didn’t expect was the laughter. There truly are moments on this journey where you just have to shake your head, look up at God with a baffled expression, and chuckle.

I shared one recent story with my new friends. On the Saturday before Christmas, I noticed Mom needed more toilet paper. I ran to Dollar General and brought her eight DOUBLE rolls, thinking that would easily tide her over until her next grocery order.

Imagine my surprise two days later when she called me while we were visiting my father-in-law in Illinois and said, “I’m out of toilet paper.”

Furrowing my brow, I replied, “Mom, I brought you eight rolls just two days ago. They’re under your bathroom sink.”

A couple of minutes later Mom returned to the phone and said “No, they’re not there.” Completely puzzled, I told her to ask the facility for a roll and I would investigate when I came to pick her up Christmas Day.

Sure enough, on the holiday, I walked into her apartment and went right to the bathroom. I saw zero toilet paper other than what the facility gave her.

“Mom,” I said, “This is bizarre. We don’t even go through eight double rolls in my OWN household in a week.” (There are four of us).

To this day, the Disappearing Toilet Paper Mystery has not been solved.

After we all had a good laugh over that story, I looked at my phone and realized that it was time to go back to work. I told the ladies that I may not be there every week, but they’d see me soon.

Was my work affected? Well, yes. I had taken an hour away from it ... to discover it made me even more productive. My mind and heart were lighter and I could focus better on applications.

So, if you’re on this journey, please remember to take time out for your own form of therapy, whether that’s sitting across from a professional, journaling, or just meeting up with new friends over breakfast. You’ll be much better for it!



I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault – it wasn’t something I saw, or even heard about. Applications are available both as an [online form](#) and in [downloadable PDF](#) format and are due by the end of February.

“The qualification is very simple,” Lohe told The Reporter. “If you are in need of housing repair to be able to live in your house. We are not checking your bank statements or any of that. Once you submit an application, we have some folks from our congregation and the community who will go assess the need and determine if that is a fit. Most of that is really about if we believe the skills of our students can meet the need the homeowner is asking.”

According to the application, the program can provide porch repair or construction, wheelchair ramp repair or construction, step repair, exterior or interior painting, weatherization, mobile home skirting and minor roofing that does not involve tear-offs or full replacements.

Free home repair is only one of many ways CrossRoads is helping the local community. They have four initiatives they are working on to specifically care for their neighbors in the community.

Adopting a local school

“We adopted Washington Woods Elementary School,” Lohe said. “They are receiving a number of things from this community, which is great, but we wanted to find out what extra needs they have that we could meet.”

Over the last three years CrossRoads has provided school supplies, provided athletic shoes for any of the kids who need them, and provided assistance for food-insecure students.

“We have been helping 9 to 12 families on school breaks who do not have enough food,” Lohe said. “We most recently provid-

ed two weeks of food to 12 different families of those who attend Washington Woods School.”

Providing free, fun families events

“We have three of those,” Lohe said. “We have a big fall festival. We have a summer event, which last year was a luau. It is held up at our church land. The biggest of the three, which has grown the most, is what we call ‘Pizza and Punchline.’ It is a free comedy event. This year it is on Feb. 22 at Westfield High School. We bring in three nationally-known comedians for a night of fun and pizza.”

Finding people struggling with particular needs

“We have been working on three needs we did not feel were addressed in the community,” Lohe said. “For one we provide free Zumba twice a week for folks to get exercise. Once a month for people who have pets we provide free pet food so hopefully some of the resources they are using paying for their pets they can use for themselves and their families. Third, we started a Celebrate Recovery program every Thursday night.”

Identifying people who have fallen through the gaps

The current focus toward this goal is the free home repair program coming to Westfield, Noblesville and northern Hamilton County this summer.

“Since folks in our church are in Westfield, Noblesville and Sheridan, we decided for this round of doing this camp we were going to focus in those three communities, though we have gotten applications

from Cicero and Arcadia that we will be pursuing,” Lohe said. “We are really open at this point,” Lohe said. “This is called, ‘For Our Neighbor.’ We are just trying to meet the needs of our local neighbors.”

CrossRoads wants to both be good neighbors and also involve others in helping community neighbors.

“In addition to seeking work group sites, we are also open to businesses or service organizations to be a part of this,” Lohe said. “If a Rotary Club asks, ‘What can we do?’ I’d say, ‘The kids come back really hungry in the afternoons. Could you cook up some hot dogs and have them available when the kids come back from camp?’ A business could take out popsicles to a group or to a couple work sites during the week to say, ‘Thank you. We’re glad you are here and thanks for what you are doing.’ It is not just about us as a church trying to do something for our neighbor, it’s also about helping people be the best neighbors we can be.”

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Goodrich's bill to exempt students' internship pay from SNAP, TANF eligibility passes House, on to Senate

The Indiana House of Representatives on Thursday approved State Rep. Chuck Goodrich's (R-Noblesville) bill that would break down barriers to career opportunities for students from low-income families.

Goodrich's proposed legislation would exempt students' income earned during a paid internship, apprenticeship and work-based programs from their families' eligibility for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Goodrich said some students turn down these experiences because they could put their family in jeopardy of losing certain benefits.

"It has become increasingly more difficult to get a job without prior experience in the field," Goodrich said. "Internships and work-based learning programs are valuable and designed to help students develop their skills to se-

cure a full-time job. Every student should be able to take advantage of opportunities to learn without worrying about their family's financial situation."

House Speaker-elect Todd Huston (R-Fishers), who co-authored the bill, said the legislation is timely as the state needs to grow

and strengthen its workforce to meet employer demands.

"Indiana has made a substantial effort in making our state a place where job creators want to settle and expand," Huston said. "With an unemployment rate sitting below the national average, we have more jobs available than

qualified candidates to fill them. This legislation will help young Hoosiers connect to opportunities that will help them build on their skills and open doors to possible careers."

House Bill 1009 now moves to the Senate for further discussion. For more information, visit iga.in.gov.

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Two major honors for HSE girls basketball...

Sydney Parrish selected to play in McDonald's all American Game

Hamilton Southeastern's Sydney Parrish was selected to the prestigious 2020 McDonald's All American Game on Thursday.

Parrish, a 6-foot-1 senior guard, was named alongside 23 other top girls high school players from across the United States. She is set to attend the University of Oregon next season. Parrish is one of five Oregon commits to receive McDonald's All American honors.

Parrish has been a force on the Royals team since her very first game as a freshman. She helped Southeastern to its first-ever girls basketball state championship last season as a junior, scoring 30 points in the Class 4A state championship game. She is currently the second-leading all-time Hamilton County girls scorer with 1,812 points, behind Noblesville's Courtney Cox, who holds the record of 1,869 points. This season, Parrish is averaging 25.3 points per game, and has a career average of 19.5 points per contest.

Parrish is the third Hamilton Southeastern player to be named as a McDonald's All American. She follows Taya Reimer in 2013 and Gary Harris in 2012. Parrish is also the fourth Hamilton County player to receive this honor; Carmel's Josh McRoberts was the first in 2005. Parrish is the only Indiana player among either the girls or boys rosters.

A number of notable basketball players have also donned the McDonald's All American jersey. The list includes Magic Johnson, Michael Jordan, Kobe Bryant, LeBron James, Kevin Durant, Carmelo Anthony, Chris Paul, James Harden, Candace Parker, Maya Moore, Elena Delle Donne, Skylar Diggins and Breanna Stewart.

The McDonald's All American Games will take place Wednesday, April 1 from Houston's Toyota Center. The 19th annual girls game tips off at 5 p.m. and will be broadcast live on ESPN2. The 43rd annual boys game follows at 7 p.m. and will be broadcast live on ESPN. Tickets are now available through the [Toyota Center box office](#).

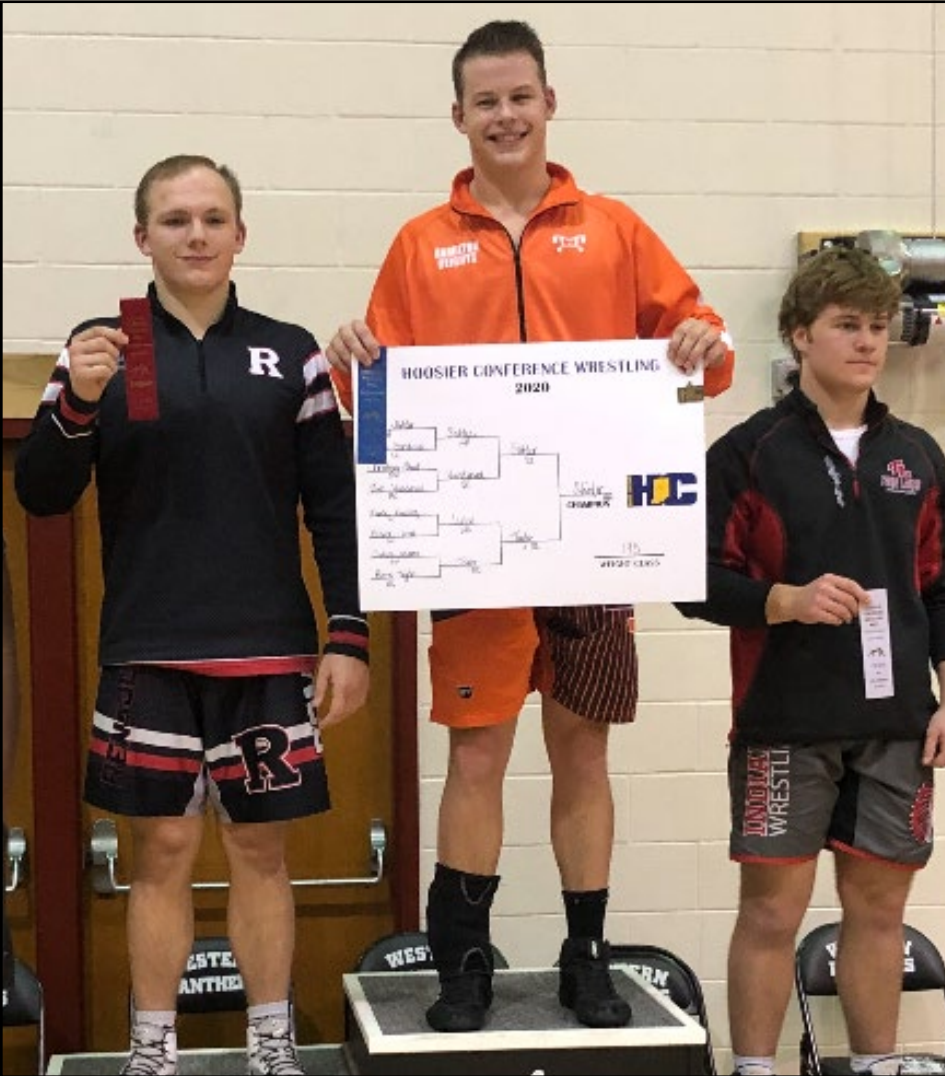
