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# Two men rescued from Arcadia trench collapse

Rescue workers in Hamilton County freed two workers who were stuck in a collapsed trench Thursday night. Jackson Township fire officials stated, the rescue quickly became a team effort with seven fire departments responding, including Noblesville, Westfield, Fishers and Carmel.

According to Jackson Township Fire Department Chief Jeff Muszar, two men became trapped in the trench sometime before 6 p.m. The men were working for a private contractor and digging for a sewer line which had become clogged.

Muszar said one worker was trapped from the waist down in the trench along Maple Street in a residential neighborhood in Arcadia.

Jackson Township Battalion Chief James Carter told WISH-TV, "Anytime you have a trench collapse there's obviously the potential for a secondary collapse because the ground is unstable and collapsed in the first place," said Battalion Chief James Carter with the Jackson Township Fire Department. "So, it takes them coming in, shoring to stabilize that trench to prevent a secondary collapse."

One man was able to self-rescue with assistance shortly after becoming trapped and refused medical assistance after evaluation. The second man was freed about 7:30 p.m. and airlifted to IU Health Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis and is in stable condition.

"Even if it's at their waist, you've got extremity injuries, pressure being put on their vital organs that can cause long-term damage," added Carter. "The longer they're in there, the more extreme that can be."

# Democratic Chair Weingarten questions Veteran Service Officer appointment

Hamilton County Democratic Chairman Joe Weingarten has questioned the appointment of Lisa Charles as the county's Veterans Service Officer by the Hamilton County Commissioners.

In a statement provided to the Reporter, Weingarten said, "As both a veteran and Chair of the Hamilton County Democratic Party I am dismayed but not surprised that the County Commissioners failed to follow law in the appointment of the County Veteran Service Officer."

According to Weingarten, Indiana law requires a Veteran Service Officer to reside in the state for five years.

"It appears that Ms. Charles has only lived in the state for a few years, having moved here from California in 2018, and state law requires anyone appointed to this position to have lived in the state for five years," said Weingarten. "This is the second violation in a row by the Commissioners in this type of appointment. The previous CVSO also did not meet legal requirements for the position."

The recommendation to appoint Charles came from a three-member committee, which included Mark Smith, District Service Officer for the Indiana Department for Veterans Affairs. Smith served as an independent person and assisted with the interviewing process that resulted in the recommendation to appoint Charles.

"As veterans, we swore an oath to uphold the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic," said Weingarten. "The commissioners also swore an oath to 'support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Indiana.'"

The Commissioners have said they are aware of the concerns and stated, "We want to ensure that we have the most qualified person to assist our veterans, and if the appointment was not correct, we will take corrective measures."

# Chiefs mark new era in Noblesville Public Safety

Thursday began a new era for Noblesville public safety as Mayor Chris Jensen swore in two new chiefs – Noblesville Fire Chief Matt Mitchell and Police Chief John Mann.

Mitchell is a 28-year veteran of the department; he served as the Fire Marshal for 11 years. During this time, Mitchell served on the City of Noblesville Technical Advisory Committee, the Local Planning Wellhead Protection Team, the NFD Pension Board and the NFD Strategic Planning Work Group.

While serving as the Fire Marshal, he was appointed by Governor Mitch Daniels to the Fire Prevention and Building Safety Commission in April 2010 and was re-appointed by Governor Mike Pence in 2013 to serve as the Commission Vice Chairman. As a Commission member, he served as liaison to the 2014 Indiana Fire Code Adoption Committee, the 2010 NFPA 13 and NFPA 13R Adoption Committees, and was appointed Chairman for the 2010 NFPA 72 Work Group. Mitchell chaired the 2014 Local Plan Review Task Force which proposed objective criteria for certifying the competency of a city, town or county to perform plan reviews in Indiana. He also represented

Kor was a resident of Terre Haute for 59 years prior to her death on July 4, 2019.

He holds a bachelor's degree in Business Administration from Marian University and a Graduate Certificate in Public Management from Indiana University. He is a graduate of the Indiana-American Water Collaborative 2014 Community Leadership Series and the 2012 Hamilton County Leadership Academy Class. He holds the titles of Fire Marshal from the Center for Public Safety Excellence and Certified Fire Marshal from the International Code Council. He has earned a total of 16 ICC certifications, and is an alumnus of the National Fire Academy.

Mann served as a Captain in the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police De-


partment, assigned to the Downtown District. He began his career with IMPD in 1992 as a patrol officer after graduating from Indiana State University with a business degree.

He worked his way up the ranks, earning the rank of Sergeant in 2005 and Lieutenant in 2010 before his promotion to Captain in 2016. During his career with IMPD he has served as Commander for the Southeast District as well as an Executive Officer for the Chief of Police.

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

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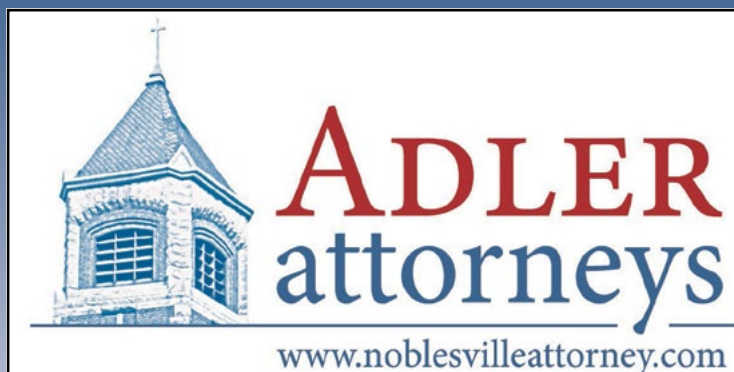
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# Knowing food sources critical for good health

*“The ocean’s dying! Plankton’s dying! It’s people – Soylent Green is made out of people! They’re making our food out of people! Next thing they’ll be breeding us like cattle for food! You’ve gotta tell them, you’ve gotta tell them!”*

– Charlton Heston as Det. Thorn in “Soylent Green” 1973

Ew – right?! If you have not seen the movie “Soylent Green” I highly recommend it as it is not only a sci-fi classic but unfortunately a glimpse into some aspects of our future, perhaps.

Not that I believe, at least I cannot fathom, that our human race would devolve into this type of behavior; however, our food sources and the components of those “foods” are sometimes purposely mysterious. I understand that there is often little that we can do about this, but awareness and knowledge can play an important role in our eating habits and overall health.

There is a myriad of information available pertaining to additives and toxins in our food sources, but today we are going to look at just a few\*:


Sugar – high in fructose and fructose intake has been linked to many serious conditions, including obesity, type 2 diabetes, metabolic syndrome and fatty liver disease. Excess sugar has also been linked to breast and colon cancer. One observational study of more than 35,000 women found that those with the highest sugar intakes had double the risk of developing colon cancer as those who consumed diets low in sugar.

Seafood consumption is the largest contributor to mercury accumulation in humans. Plants that grow in mercury-contaminated waters are consumed by small fish, which are then consumed by larger fish, working its way up the food chain to human consumption. Mercury is a neurotoxin, meaning it can damage the brain and nerves.

A 2014 analysis found that in several countries, mercury levels in the hair and blood of women and children were significantly higher than the World Health Organization recommends, particularly in coastal communities. Some fish, such as king mackerel and swordfish, are extremely high in mercury and should be avoided. Fortunately, low-mercury fish include salmon, herring, sardines and anchovies, which are high in omega-3 fats.

Other issues of which to be aware include foods with trans fats which lead to inflammation, having profoundly negative effects on heart health. Chronic inflammation is at the root of many other serious con-

ditions such as insulin resistance, type 2 diabetes and obesity.

Researchers have also reported that high intakes of PAHs from grilled meats increase the risk of kidney cancer. The stron-

gest association appears to be between grilled meats and cancers of the digestive tract. The connection to colon cancer has only been seen in red meats such as beef, pork, lamb and veal.

The bottom line is this: Know what you are eating!

The best food sources are single-food sources, the more packaged ingredients the more hidden items you may be consuming. Know where your food comes from. More and more of our grocery items are sourced from other countries. Our food is regulated; however, recently the number of USDA inspectors has been reduced per manufacturing facilities. If you consume animal products, find what foods, hormones or drugs these animals have ingested. You are worth it! We spend time researching which cars, stocks, and furniture to purchase, should we not give more time to what ends up in our bodies? I think so!

So, if you enjoy science fiction or are a fan of Charlton Heston, I encourage you to check out “Soylent Green” and if you wish to enjoy good health, check out your food sources!

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## Judge Steve Nation files to run for County Council

Judge Steve Nation has filed to run for Hamilton County Council At-Large. Nation has dedicated his life to protecting and serving his community for the last 41 years. He served as Prosecuting Attorney of Hamilton County for four terms and as Hamilton County Judge for four terms.

"It's always been my duty to do two things – protect people and help people reach their highest potential. I'll continue to do this by serving as a Hamilton County councilor," said Nation.

Nation's legacy and impact goes beyond the courtroom and extends far into the community. The conception of Hamilton County's Youth Assistance Programs started with Nation. Today, he still plays an integral role in the six local Youth Assistance Boards in Hamilton County.

Other special initiatives include working with the Department of Education to implement HB 1419 (Positive Behavioral Intervention and Support); being a member of the Pre-Trial Release Committee and Mental Health Subcommittee; serving as Special Judge in several counties of the State of Indiana; helping establish Victim Assistance in Hamilton County for victims of elderly, domestic, and child

abuse, and other violent crimes; and collaborating with Township Trustees to establish a procedure for Emergency Housing for Hamilton County.

Nation and his family settled in Noblesville 40 years ago, and he continues to make his mark on the county. In 2017, Nation was awarded "Person of the Year" from the International Association of Truancy and Dropout Prevention, and in 2018, was granted the prestigious Sagamore of the Wabash Award presented by Governor Eric Holcomb.

Nation lives in Noblesville with his wife of 36 years. He has a daughter, son-in-law, step son and grandson. Nation currently serves as Board President for Indiana Fallen Heroes Foundation. Along with administrative responsibilities of the Prosecutor's Office, Nation personally tried 57 jury trials and attained 57 convictions.

# Millers win wild game with Flashes

**NOBLESVILLE** - The Noblesville boys basketball team's first Hoosier Crossroads Conference win of the season might also be the Millers' most memorable game of the year.

Noblesville held off Franklin Central 53-52 Friday night at The Mill. It was a back and forth contest most of the way; the Millers took a big lead midway through the fourth quarter, then weathered the storm of a huge Flashes comeback to get the victory.

Noblesville led 50-39 at midway through the fourth quarter, going on a 14-2 run that started at the end of the third when E.J. Smith made a putback to get the Millers ahead 38-37. Noblesville never trailed after that.

The Millers rolled into the fourth period with baskets from Noah Harris and Alex Hunt, then scored eight unanswered points to take their 11-point lead. Smith made a layin, then Hunt immediately got fouled on a rebound basket attempt and hit two free throws. Seconds later, Hunt scored on a tipback, then two more foul shots.

Franklin Central finished the game on a 13-3 run, pouring in nine of those points in a span of two minutes. Hunt made two free throws to get the Noblesville up 53-48, then the Flashes' Sam Mettert scored to cut the lead to three.

Mettert scored again off a steal with 1:26 left in the game, but neither team got another point after that. Franklin Central got one last chance with 16 seconds left, but a shot didn't go just before the buzzer. After a whistle and some discussion, 1.2 seconds were put back on the clock, but the Flashes couldn't get a shot off.

"It was good," said Millers coach John Peckinpaugh. "We got that 10-point lead. What it took us to get there, we kind of went away from it late. They did some things different and turned up their pressure a little bit, got us out of what we were doing. But I'm really happy we got a stop there at the end of the game. It was

chaos and then we got another stop. So I'm proud of how our guys responded to the game."

The first quarter was close, with the biggest lead three points. The Millers went up three first when Smith drained a 3-pointer to get his team up 6-3. Franklin Central also had a 3-point advantage after Jacob Whitney's layin, getting FC up 10-7. But Brendon Fisher erased that with a triple. Whitney made a basket before the buzzer to put the Flashes up 12-10 at the end of the quarter.

Consecutive baskets from Javon Small put Franklin Central up 16-12 early in the second period, but Noblesville responded with a 9-0 run. Evan Wilson made two free throws to start the run and a 3-pointer to finish it, with Fisher making a driving layin and Hunt getting a basket in between. The Flashes used their own 7-0 run to take a 26-23 lead with seconds left, but Wilson got the last word of the first half, with a 3-pointer to tie the game at 26-26 at the break.

In the third period, it was more back and forth. Benny Ogayonne hit a 3 to put Franklin Central up 29-26, but the Millers took the lead back on layins by Harris and

## Pacers beat Warriors, secure winning record for road trip

It wasn't easy, but the Pacers secured a winning record on their five-game road trip on Friday night, withstanding a 3-point barrage from the Golden State Warriors on their way to a 129-118 win at the Chase Center.

The Splash Brothers were in street clothes, but the Warriors (10-37) still put on a 3-point shooting exhibition on Friday, hitting a season-high 19 shots from beyond the 3-point arc.

Luckily for Pacers fans, Indiana (30-16) was just as good from long distance, going 17-for-28 (60.7 percent) from 3-point range in the win.

T.J. Warren led the Blue & Gold with 33 points in the victory, while Doug McDermott added 24 on 9-of-10 shooting (6-of-7 from 3-point range) off the bench.

The Warriors raced out to an early lead on Friday night. The hosts opened the game with a 9-2 run and stayed hot, knocking down seven of their first eight shots, including 3-of-4 from 3-point range on their way to a 19-10 advantage.

But Indiana quickly rallied, tying the game at 22 on Justin Holiday's 3-pointer with 4:56 left in the first quarter and took its first lead of the night on Warren's layup 33 seconds later. Two Myles Turner free throws and another Holiday three capped what proved to be a 19-3 Pacers run.

The Blue & Gold remained in front for the rest of the opening frame, taking a 35-30 lead into the second

quarter.

Golden State guard D'Angelo Russell knocked down a pair of 3-pointers early in the second quarter to keep the home team within striking distance. But McDermott reeled off eight straight points as part of a 10-0 Pacers run to open up a double-digit lead.

Warren also went off in the second quarter, scoring 10 points in the frame to help the Blue & Gold push their lead as high as 19. The 6-8 forward led all scorers with 21 points in the first half, going 9-for-14 from the field and 2-for-3 from 3-point range, as Indiana took a 67-51 lead into the break.

Russell sparked a Golden State rally in the third quarter, hitting three 3-pointers on back-to-back-to-back possessions to cap a 14-2 run that trimmed the Warriors' deficit to 80-74 with 6:23 left in the third quarter.

Russell drilled another trey — his eighth of the night — at 4:04 to make it 85-81, but that would be as close as the hosts would get.

Aaron Holiday hit two 3-pointers of his own to push the Pacers' lead back to 10 before Warren picked Russell's pocket and raced to the other end for an easy slam.

The visitors led 98-86 after three quarters.

The Warriors mounted one last charge in the fourth quarter, as Jordan Poole knocked down back-to-back 3-pointers to make it 110-103 with just under eight minutes remaining. Poole later drew a foul on McDermott while attempting another three and made all of the subsequent foul shots to trim the deficit to 112-106 with

6:20 to play.

Indiana answered, however, reeling off a 9-2 run — capped by McDermott's sixth 3-pointer of the night — to push the lead back to 13.

Golden State scored seven unanswered to make it 121-115 before Aaron Holiday's three stopped the bleeding with 3:02 remaining and the Warriors never seriously threatened the rest of the way.

Domantas Sabonis quietly flirted with his second triple-double in less than a week on Friday, finishing with 16 points, 10 rebounds, and eight assists. Jeremy Lamb also added 16 points for Indiana.

With starting point guard Malcolm Brogdon out after sustaining a concussion in Wednesday's win in Phoenix, backups T.J. McConnell and Aaron Holiday stepped up on Friday. McConnell got the start and finished with 12 points and eight assists, while Holiday added 12 points and seven assists off the bench, knocking down 4-of-5 3-pointers.

Russell went 9-for-13 from beyond the 3-point arc and led all scorers with 37 points. Former Pacer Glenn Robinson III added 18 points and seven rebounds for Golden State, while Draymond Green finished with 10 points, six boards, and 11 assists.

Indiana concludes its five-game road trip on Sunday night in Portland before returning to Indianapolis to host the Chicago Bulls on Wednesday, when All-Star guard Victor Oladipo is expected to make his season debut.
