Noblesville promotes new leaders in city's Police, Fire Departments

Noblesville's public safety departments held a ceremony Friday to promote officers and firefighters to help lead their respected agencies. The ceremony took place in the council chambers at City Hall. In attendance for the event were family members, friends, members of the community, government officials and officers of the police and fire departments.

We have selected the best personnel to lead our police and fire departments as we work to transform our approach to public safety to ensure Noblesville is one of the safest cities in the country," said Mayor Chris Jensen. "I am extremely proud of the men and women in uniform who lead to protect our city."

Police Chief John Mann announced the new promotions of his department leaders, including the promotion of Brad Arnold from deputy chief to assistant police chief. Arnold began his NPD career in November 1993. Prior to becoming assistant police chief, Arnold oversaw the department's patrol division for 15 years before leading the support division the past three years. He has been a member of the department's dive team, Emergency Services Unit, bike team and an instructor for 25 years. Arnold also is a 2006 graduate of the FBI National Academy.

Biddle serves on the department's training group, hazardous materials team and the Local 4416 Peer Support Team.

Super Bowl-themed snacks and beverages. Support your designated drivers by tweeting their names to @NHTSAgov to add their name to the Wall of Fame and use the hashtag #DesignatedDriver. They are doing everyone a favor by keeping drunk drivers off the roads.

Ask your guests to designate their sober drivers in advance or help them coordinate with other partygoers' designated drivers.

Drunk driving isn't the only risk on the road: Drug-impaired driving is also an increasing problem, for men and for women alike. If drivers are impaired by any substance – alcohol or drugs – they should not get behind the wheel of a vehicle. It is illegal in all states to drive impaired by alcohol or drugs. Remember: Driving while impaired is illegal, period.

The bottom line is this: *If you feel different, you drive different. It's that simple.*

If you're heading out for a night of Super Bowl fun, make a game plan and follow these simple tips for a safe and happy evening:

• It is never OK to drive drunk. Designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation or a ride service to get home safely if you plan to drink.

• If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact the Hamilton County Public Safety Communications Center at (317) 773-1282 or 9-1-1 for an emergency.

• Have a friend who is about to drink and drive? Take the keys away and get your friend home safely.

Remember: If you drive drunk, you may lose money, your reputation, your car and even your life. Everyone should know by now that it is illegal to drive impaired. Even still, thousands die each year in drunk driving-related crashes. In 2018, there were 10,511 people killed in drunk-driving crashes. The costs can be financial, too: If you're caught drinking and driving, you can face jail time, lose your driver's license and your vehicle, and pay up to \$10,000 in attorney's fees, fines, car towing, higher insurance rates and lost wages.

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

Dear Editor:

John Andretti died yesterday at 56. Way too young. I followed his career, at first, because he was an Andretti, then after meeting him and chatting several times, because he was simply a nice guy and a heck of a racer.

By now you have seen his stats: 11 Indy 500s, hundreds of NASCAR races, and so on, but I most remember him from a few go-kart races when I had the chance to race him myself at the annual Indianapolis Motor Speedway in April Race 4 Riley charity event.

Two memories really stand out for me. I was in third place about halfway through the race, and a kart clobbers my rear bumper. Yep, that was John giving me a little love tap on his way to a win. I learned I was no Andretti!

The second memory was the next year in the special media race. Dave Calabro, from WTHR sports, Dave Furst,

from WRTV, and I had a huge battle going for the lead, dodging a bunch of media folks who had never driven a kart before. It was an epic kind of race, clean but very, very tough. I got a second. John came up after and said "Wow, that was a hell of a race, you guys put on a show." I cannot tell you how that made me feel, a slap on the back from one of my heroes!

I was at the press conference at the 2017 when John revealed he had stage four colon cancer. He admitted he had put off getting a colonoscopy; he said he did not like doctors. He became an advocate for getting that simple checkup when you turn 45 years old. He started the "Check It For Andretti" campaign.



Rita Ann Stuckey Mariani died peacefully in her sleep Wednesday, January 29,

Born during the Great Depression, Rita knew the value of hard work and the value of a dollar. She often told the story of her Dad hand-digging a basement under their family home. Later in life her "frugalness" was the basis of a legendary family story of returning a half-eaten, overly salted ham to the local butcher. Growing up on the near-northside of Indianapolis, Rita watched as her two older brothers and her brother-in-law Charlie went off to defend our country during World War II. Like many of her generation, she was an unwavering patriot.

She attended Holy Angels elementary school at 28th and Northwest Avenue (now Dr. MLK, Jr. Street), where she excelled at kickball, the only sport then available to girls. Later she attended St. John's Academy, adjacent to Union Station in downtown Indianapolis.

After high school she received a scholarship to attend nursing school in Normal, Ill. She graduated as the valedictorian of her class and became a registered nurse. She returned to Indianapolis in the mid-1950s and began a nursing career at the Indianapolis VA hospital. During the 1950s she lived with fellow nurses in the Meadows Apartments on East 38th Street, the only apartment complex at that time with a swimming pool.

Rita met the love of her life, Peter R. Mariani, on a train ride to a Notre Dame football game in the fall of 1958. They were married on February 16, 1963 at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church on Indianapolis' east side.

Nine months after being married, they welcomed son Peter (Stacy), followed soon thereafter by Nancy (Mark Ferrara), Paul (Laurie) and Thomas (Myra). In 1965, Pete and Rita moved to Noblesville when Pete became the administrator of Riverview Hospital. Rita took on the full-time job of wife and mother as they raised their family. She was very active in the Noblesville community, volunteering at Our Lady of Grace Catholic Church, the Riverview Hospital Auxiliary, PEO and as a founding member of the Noblesville Boys & Girls Club Ladies' Auxiliary. She made many lifetime friends in Noblesville and was always available for bridge, mahjong or a boat ride on Morse Reservoir.

Rita's four children and their spouses blessed her with 12 grandchildren: Hannah (Taylor) Mathews, SarahGrace Mariani and Julia Mariani; Emily (Luke) Wehner, Allison Ferrara and Maria Ferrara; Gianluca Mariani and Mia Francesca Mariani; Joseph Mariani, Thomas Mariani, Celeste Mariani and Marco Mariani. Nothing gave Rita more joy than being "Nana" to her grandchildren - baking Christmas cookies, attending dance performances, volleyball, basketball and baseball games, cross country meets, CYO kickball games and horse shows. Having made their home on Morse, Rita always welcomed her brood for lake time with a full table of food, and often the greatest peach pie that anyone had ever tasted.

The Mariani family would like to thank the community of caregivers who blessed Rita with their graciousness as she battled Alzheimer's disease in her final years. Father Dale Ehrman, the amazing Noblesville physician, Thomas Miller, M.D., Margarita Pantoja-Barnes, Todra Hart, and the many wonderful staff members at the Legacy of Prairie Lakes.

Solid defense sends Royals past Millers

NOBLESVILLE - Hamilton Southeastern extended its win streak to six games on Friday by beating Noblesville 53-39 in an all-county and Hoosier Crossroads Conference contest at The Mill.

The Millers got off to a blistering start in the first quarter, but the Royals soon took over, using a solid defensive second period to get control of the game. Southeastern then took care of business in the second half to earn its 10th win of the season.

"The thing I like about this week is, we had some sickness going around, didn't have everybody at practice at times," said Royals coach Brian Satterfield. "But we still had our guys together and focused on what we needed to do and get accomplished. It's a big win. Coming in here, they've been playing a lot better here late and for us to come in here and get a win is a big win for us."

Noblesville blitzed out to an 8-0 lead early in the first quarter. Alex Hunt made two 3-pointers, then E.J. Smith added a pair of free throws at the 5:51 mark.

The Royals soon regrouped, and went on a 13-2 run. Kole Hornbuckle took over the game at that point, scoring seven points in a row to get HSE within 8-7. Hunt ended the run with a putback, but the Royals scored the next six points, finishing with a dunk by Hornbuckle to put the Royals up 13-10.

The Millers ended the quarter up 16-15, thanks to 3-pointers from Brendon Fisher and Evan Wilson. The second quarter was all Southeastern, as it outscored Noblesville 16-3. With the score tied at 19-19, the Royals ran off 12 unanswered points; Hornbuckle added four more, Vinny Buccilla drained a 3, and Mabor Majak made back-to-back dunks.

"You know it's going to be a tough game with those guys," said Millers coach John Peckinpaugh. "They're pretty

good, pretty talented."

When the dust settled, HSE led 31-19. Satterfield his team "did a better job of getting to where we needed to be, finishing plays, and especially in the first half,

we took care of the basketball." He also terfield. credited the Royals' defense with creating some of the early offense.

"That got us back into the game and then we extended it from there," said Sat-



Southeastern kept its lead in double digits for most of the second half, although the Millers never allowed the Royals to get too far ahead. Noblesville did get within eight on two occasions; first in the third quarter when a 3 by Noah Harris and a Hunt dunk cut the HSE lead to 35-27.

Later, Harris made a putback to keep Noblesville within 38-29. But Southeastern went on a 7-0 run that extended

Majak totaled four dunks for the game.

"We want to take what the defense gives us," said Satterfield. "And if we can get the ball inside to him and let him play and do some things, we want to do that at the same time. If they're taking him away, we want other guys to step up and knock down shots."

A Hornbuckle jumper opened the fourth quarter, and put HSE up 45-29. Noblesville answered with its own 7-0 run; Harris made another 3, then Fisher and Jordan Gadis added baskets. The Millers were now within 45-36, but the Royals finished the game from the free throw line, making eight of 10 in the final two and a half minutes.

Hornbuckle finished the game with 19 points, and was 6-of-6 from the line. He also had five rebounds and four steals. Majak added 11 points and collected eight rebounds, while Buccilla scored 10 points.

Harris led Noblesville with 11 points, including three 3s, and collected four rebounds. Hunt added 10 points, while Gadis had four rebounds.

"It's a good group of kids," said Peckinpaugh. "They all work hard. They all want to be bought in and do what we're asking them to do. If we can keep that approach, take it one practice at a time, I think by sectional time we can be a different team."

Southeastern is 3-2 in conference play and 10-5 overall, and returns home tonight to play Mishawaka Marian. The Millers are 1-4 in the HCC and 9-9 overall, and are off until next Saturday, Feb. 8, when they play an afternoon game at Mount Vernon.


