



Commissioners temporarily rescind appointment of Veteran Service Officer

Search postponed while state lawmakers review Indiana Code

The Hamilton County Commissioners have temporarily rescinded the appointment of Lisa Charles as the County Veteran Service Officer (CVSO). Previously a three-member interview committee had unanimously recommended her appointment, with the understanding that residency requirements for the position could be waived.

"We believe the interview process produced the most qualified candidate to help our county veterans," Christine Altman, president of the County Commissioners,

stated. "Unfortunately, we have learned the residency requirements cannot be waived under current law."

Indiana code IC 10-17-1-5 states that a county veteran service officer must be a resident of Indiana for at least five years immediately preceding their appointment. Charles moved to Indiana in 2018.

"We need to be in compliance with the code, while also ensuring we are doing everything we can to service our veterans,"

Altman said. "Regardless of the outcome of this appointment, we will continue to work to improve staffing, our training, and workflow process to meet the needs of our veterans."

To that end, the commissioners have asked Charles to continue working full-time servicing and filing claims for veterans while they sort out the details. Efforts are currently underway at the Statehouse that could change the residency requirements.

"We understand there is legislation going on downtown that could change the residency requirements that value county residency over skill and ability," Altman says. "We will reserve the appointment of an official CVSO until we see what shakes out in the legislature this year."

The Veterans Service Office has a full-time CVSO and two part-time positions. A military veteran and Carmel resident, Charles is certified at both the state and federal levels and worked in Hamilton County Veteran Service Office prior to her appointment.

Sampson honored for Westfield work

The 160-seat theater facility, set to be complete this year, will be within two to three blocks of the future Grand Junction Plaza, making it another amenity residents and visitors can enjoy while in downtown Westfield.

Supt. Bourff to offer HSE school start time recommendation at Feb. 12 board meeting

Hamilton Southeastern Schools Superintendent Allen Bourff says he will have a recommendation on school start times at the school board meeting set for Wednesday, Feb. 12.

Administrators will have options for board consideration, including implementing a version of the three-tier bus transportation system in the 2020-21 school year.

"We will be presenting (the board) with ... an option to flip our start times as early as next fall," Bourff said. "But if you chose not to do that, we would present you with another alternative to introduce you to a new transportation system that could be a three-tier system."

Answering a question

from board member Sylvia Shepler, Bourff said there is no "drop-dead date" on making a start time decision for the 2020-21 school year.

"Once you get beyond February and March, it's hard to make those decisions," Bourff said. "So, we would like to try to make that decision in February."

One complicating factor is this: There is only one regular board meeting scheduled in February, and that is on the 12th.

Board President Michelle Fullhart clarified that, at minimum, there would most likely be a school start time change as a result of moving from a two-tier to a three-tier bus transportation system. She described the possibility of flipping start times between elementary and high school students as "another possibility."

Chief Deputy Treasurer Good files defamation suit

Hamilton County Chief Deputy Treasurer Kim Good has filed a defamation lawsuit against former Treasurer's Office employee Susan Byer.

A statement issued by Good's attorney said, "Good was accused by Byer of engaging in criminal conduct when she waived statutory fees on late tax payments on behalf of her family and friends."

At the request of the Hamilton County Commissioners, the Indiana State Police and Special Prosecutor Brad Eaton conducted an investigation into Byer's allegations.

Eaton ruled there was insufficient evidence to prove improper conduct.

"Making false statements which suggest a public official engaged in criminal conduct, with malice towards that official, is defamation," said Good's attorney Mario Massillamany.

Byer, in 2018, filed her own lawsuit alleging she was unjustly terminated from her position in the Treasurer's Office.

Byer's suit, filed in Hamilton County Superior Court 1 is scheduled for jury trial in October.

Good's suit filed in Hamilton County Superior Court 4 has not yet been set for trial.

Byer and Good have both filed on the Republican ballot for the county's Treasurer spot in the upcoming Primary Election.

Fishers awards \$2.66 million bid for street resurfacing

The City of Fishers has accepted a bid from Harding Group to repave city streets during 2020 following a vote last Monday by the Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety.

The \$2.66 million funding will mostly come from

the Wheel Tax, although Mayor Scott Fadness emphasized that two parking lot paving projects in the area in commercial areas near City Hall will not be funded by Wheel Tax money.

The bid includes some sidewalk and curb work in the neighborhoods. Subdivisions that will see this work include Auburn Springs,

Pleasant View/Sweet Briar, Sandstone, Spyglass Falls and Spyglass Hill.

The board also approved purchasing 15 new police patrol vehicles, all Ford Explorer hybrids, for a total of \$538,155. This only covers buying the vehicles, not the cost of outfitting each one with equipment for police use.

The nightmare we call “school”

Editor's Note: The Sheridan Student Column is brought to readers by Sheridan High School's 10th grade English class, taught by Abby Williams.

For roughly half of the year, students are legally required to attend school. As most Americans belong to the middle class, they cannot afford to send their children to a private school. Instead, they go to a public school.

Don't be fooled: Hollywood's representation of an average public high school in America is laughably inaccurate. Trying to balance homework, a social life, sports, homework and outside-of-school activities is something Hollywood glosses over for a more picturesque portrayal of high school.

One thing that both schools and Hollywood do not realize is that each individual student is just that, an individual. No two students are the same, but the convenience of a one-size-fits-all system does not require much effort to maintain. Adapting the system to best suit the students' needs, on the other hand, requires effort on behalf of the students themselves, the

teachers and the administration.

Another subject that the U.S. falls under scrutiny for is the topic of mental health in schools. One problem that prohibits a sustainable support system for students with mental health disorders is the lack of resources. Namely, the two main shortages of resources are money and the availability of school counselors and other mental health professionals. According to nea.org, "The American School Counselor Association calls for a 250-to-1 ratio of students-to-counselor, but only three states – New Hampshire, Vermont, and Wyoming – meet it."

The awareness and erasing of stigma surrounding mental health is not commonplace in American public schools. Out of the 50 states, only three of them meet this recommended guideline. To be more specific, the national average happens to be one counselor per 482 students.

Most teachers are not equipped to help students who suffer from mental health disorders. In fact, the school system seems to discourage students who need help from asking for

it. Students are too busy drowning in the homework they get assigned every day to ask to go to the counselor. All that matters is how well each student does in school, as it determines the outcome of their future, so everything else gets put on the backburner. The education system does not value its students: The main concern is the grades they get. Students who cannot keep up with the fast-paced curriculum are deemed lazy and failures. However, the only failure here is the system itself.

Teachers are also neglected by the school system. There is a shortage of people willing to educate the youth. Looking at their annual salary, it is no surprise that they are discouraged from entering the field of education. According to nea.org, the national average of a new teacher's salary as of the 2017-18 school year is \$39,249. Living on a salary less than \$40,000 a year can cause financial distress on teachers. Some teachers must work more than one job at a time in order to make ends meet.

Here in Indiana, the average salary of a teacher just starting their job, as of 2017-18, is \$35,943. That number is \$3,306 below the national average. Dividing \$35,943 by 180 days results

in an approximate pay of \$200 each day.

Teachers arrive at work before school starts and leave after school ends. A school day for students consists of seven hours. Teachers work anywhere from seven to 10 hours each school day. Some teachers also work unpaid on the weekends. On top of everything else, teachers must deal with personal problems without letting those issues interfere from educating their students.

There are many things that need to be fixed in the American public-school education system. These problems cannot be solved easily, as several groups of people must come together to find a solution.

The government must increase public school funding for the accessibility of mental health resources to be available. The Board of Education must change the curriculum to be best suited to all students. School officials must come to an agreement for a reasonable and fair salary. The availability of resources and accommodation of more mental health professionals need to be increased.

The well-being of students across the United States will deteriorate continually if these changes are not made.

The interest is in three County Council seats

Less than one week remains during which candidates may file for the May 5 primary election. Thus far few contests have developed for the county offices at stake in this year's election.

The major exception is the competition for three at-large seats on the Hamilton County Council. Thus far eight candidates have formally filed.

Why so much interest in the council? At least part of the reason is the factional split on some issues between the seven incumbent councilors.

All members like to consider themselves fiscal conservatives, but some are more conservative than others. This splint probably leads to the number of candidates interested in the three seats.

Those filed thus far are: Brad Beaver, Lyneen Burrow, Jeff Hern, Sue Maki, Rick McKinney, Steve Nation, and former Noblesville mayor John Ditslear – all Republicans. One

Democrat, Gardiner P. Bink III, has filed.

In the meantime, no contests have developed for county commissioner where Mark Heirbrandt and Steve Dillinger are running for re-election.

Similarly, County Auditor Robin Mills is thus far unopposed.

Former County Treasurer Kim Good now has an opponent for the Treasurer's position. Susan Byer filed her candidacy last Tuesday.

Incumbent Surveyor Kent Ward is alone running for another term.

Dozens of candidates for precinct committeeman and state convention delegate have filed in both political party primaries.

The parties will hold reorganizational meetings this year, and both parties have state conventions with the GOP gathering shaping up to be the most interesting. Attorney General Curtis Hill will be opposed by Adam Krupp and John Westercamp.

Needler's Grocery

As many of you might have heard, Needler's Fresh Market is looking to fill the vacancy left by the O'Malia's supermarket at 126th Street and Gray Road. The developer is seek-

ing assistance to help with the remodel, which would be funded by creating a TIF (tax increment financing) district.

The TIF design was discussed by the Carmel Redevelopment Commission's architectural review committee on Monday. The approval of the TIF will be sent to fill the CRC on Feb. 19 and then would go to the Carmel City Council. City Councilor Jeff Worrell, a CRC commissioner, is a member of the review committee.

The renovation of the Brookshire shopping center, where Needler's would be located, was discussed

by the Carmel Plan Commission Commercial Committee at its meeting on Tuesday.

Here's the description from the plan commission documents:

"The applicant seeks site plan and design approval for the renovation of the existing buildings on site. There is 73,686 sq. ft. of existing retail space, at 1 story high – 24' tall. Site plan modifications include closing an entrance and replacing with 4 new parking spaces and adding sidewalk connections. The site is 7.26 acres in size and is located at 4726 East 126th Street. It is zoned B-3 and is not located within any overlay zone. Filed by Brent Bengé of KennMar."

Fishers debuts three-year Age-Friendly Action Plan

The City of Fishers has finalized its Age-Friendly Fishers Action Plan, a three-year plan outlining the City's strategies to improve the quality of life for residents of all ages and abilities.

In 2018, Fishers was the first community in Indiana to join AARP Network of Age-Friendly Communities, an affiliate of the WHO Global Network of Age-Friendly Cities and Communities. As part of this designation, the City was tasked with creat-

ing a three-year action plan.

"The Age-Friendly Fishers Action Plan is the next step in creating a vibrant community where all ages and abilities can thrive," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. "This project showcases how our community can come together to share ideas and work collectively to improve our city."

The Age-Friendly Committee was established to guide the creation of this Action Plan. To create the plan, the committee gathered

feedback from the community through public input sessions, community events, and a digital feedback form on the city's website.

"One of the great strategies about this plan is that we did not create it in a vacuum," said Tish Biggs, a member of the Age-Friendly Fishers Committee and a volunteer with AARP. "It was created with the input of lots of folks around the City. We went to the Fishers Farmers' Market and solicited input, we went over to

Del Webb to meet with folks over there, we had a meeting at City Hall where we invited people to come in, and we just used those as listening sessions to hear what the community wanted."

The Action Plan, which primarily focuses on 2020-22, prioritizes strategies that expand upon Fishers' 2040 goals and objectives and will continue to identify best practices, community needs, and opportunities

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Richard "Dick" Overholser June 9, 1927 – January 26, 2020

On Sunday, January 26, 2020, Richard "Dick" Overholser, loving husband and father of three, passed away at the age of 92.

Dick was born in Red Oak, Iowa, on June 9, 1927 to Alice (Sprague) and Ralph Overholser. He graduated from Red Oak High School where he ably competed in football, basketball, golf and track. Dick honorably served for 14 months in the U.S. Navy. He was dubbed "Squanchy" by his fellow sailors. When the war ended, Dick was on the USS Mormac Dove in route from the Philippines to the USA. Dick graduated from the University of Iowa in 1950. He married Joan Fraseur on September 5, 1949. They raised two sons, Richard and Robert, and one daughter, Sara (Tharp).

At the age of 8, Dick and his sister Joan created the "world famous" Club of Good Cheer with Joan as President and Dick as Vice-President. (Dick lost a very close run-off vote for President in 1935. We think his sister stuffed the ballot box). They were good buddies and only they knew the workings of the Club of Good Cheer.

Dick and Joan, his wife of 70 years, raised their family in Charles City, Iowa, and South Bend, Ind. Dick was very active within the Charles City community and served as President of the Iowa Area Council of Management Clubs, Chairman of the Floyd County Draft Board, member of the Charles City School Board, President of the Oliver Management Club, Worshipful Master of the Masonic Lodge, Chairman of the Floyd County University of Iowa Alumni Club and President of the Charles City Country Club.

Dick spent most of his work life as a purchasing manager for Oliver/White Farm Equipment, Cabot Corporation and PT Components. He worked diligently and developed lasting relationships with suppliers and fellow employees.

Dick loved sports and the competition that sports provide. He was an avid golfer, bowler and tennis player. He grew up playing table tennis round robins with his family and neighborhood friends. This competition served him well as he won the University of Iowa table tennis singles title from 1948 to 1950. In addition, he was an ardent Hawkeye fan and followed his team through the good and bad times.

Dick was preceded in death by his father, Ralph; his mother, Alice; and one great-grandchild, Joey Tharp.

Dick is survived by his wife, Joan; his sister, Joan Houghton; his sons, Richard and Robert (Laura); his daughter, Sara (Bart) Tharp; along with nine grandchildren; 13 great-grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

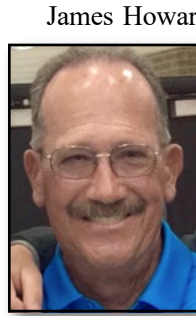

Carolyn Ann Grimsey, 78, passed away surrounded by her loving family on Monday, January 27, 2020. Born on December 19, 1941, she was the beautiful daughter of Roberta and Earl Jones of Vincennes, Ind., had a love for Jesus, family and children that would be difficult to overstate.

From homecoming queen to dedicated nurse and caregiver for both her own parents and many others, Carolyn was at her happiest when serving others. Independent, determined, stubborn, and of course very charming, she would doggedly pursue whatever course seemed right to her.

Daughter, Karen, and son, Tom, both benefitted from these attributes, as Carolyn immediately pursued what she was sure was God's special way for her and her beloved Wayne to have a family, and their adoptions became a reality through much prayer and commitment. Their love never wavered, and now there are new generations of Grimseys and others fulfilling God's mandate to share the good news of Jesus's love and salvation for all who would accept Him, because of Carolyn and Wayne's faithfulness and love for Him.

An avid conversationalist and storyteller, artistic and creative, Carolyn always had a twinkle in her eye and a zest for life in her words as she recounted many tales to both her children, grandchildren, the four-year-olds in her wonderful Sunday school class at College Church in Wheaton, and anyone who had time to listen.

With her disposition, her mother being a nurse, and having a quick and intelligent mind, becoming an RN seemed a natural career choice for Carolyn. It led her from very challenging and exhausting training to the hope of a career as an Air Force nurse who would travel the world. Just last year she shared this story with her friends and family as they were honoring her for her military service:

"We were the 363rd Tactical Hospital unit stationed at Shaw Air Force Base, Sumter, South Carolina. Shaw Air Force Base was the reconnaissance headquarters during the Vietnam War. Recon jets flew low over enemy territory in Vietnam and they were photographing sites for air, helicopter, and ground strikes. Those photos were sent back to the Pentagon, placed on a map (one of these top secret cartographers was my Uncle George), and proved essential for war logistics. Of course, all of this was before computer technology, amazingly!!

"The hospital was a mobile hospital which did imply that the hospital could be packed up and rushed to an emergency site within hours. In fact, on my third day there, after reporting to work, I discovered that most of the nurses were gone with the mobile unit to address the Alaskan earthquake emergency. That left about three of us nurses to attend to both a large men's internal medicine ward and a large pediatric ward, thus caring for the airmen, the officers, their families, and 29 other nurses. I served 2 years there: 1964-1966; I came in just as the official declaration of war came about.

"Before I met him, my future husband Wayne had hoped to be an Air Force pilot, and was bitterly disappointed to discover after joining that he was too color blind to pursue that career. However, with 30,000 people stationed there, and only 30 nurses, one might think the odds were not in his favor, but God smiled on us both! While his plans were dashed, yet his new administrative duties brought him face to face with the picture you might see on the Riverwalk Commons (now Five Star Residences) will near the entrance. The blessings continued with the Lord leading us to our wonderful son through our time there.

"Medically, as a nurse, I considered it one of the finest, most professional nursing situations I ever experienced. It was an honor to serve."

After three years in the service, Carolyn began her life as a wife and mother, becoming a Roommother with a capital R, and throwing herself into being a mom and a truly committed Sunday school teacher. She and Wayne were so proud of each of their children, and encouraged them to pursue the paths that combined both their interests and talents.

Carolyn wanted every child she taught in Sunday School to know that Jesus and she thoroughly loved them, and every child was greeted with a big smile and hug as they walked in the door, and also received a hand-delivered birthday gift at their homes. House approves additional county court magistrate

The Indiana House of Representatives has approved allowing Hamilton County to hire an additional magistrate.

State Rep. Donna Schai-bley (R-Carmel) said the new magistrate would preside over minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings for more serious crimes. Schai-bley said Hamilton County is one of the fastest-growing counties in the state, which makes it more difficult for staff to keep up with the workload. "Our judicial officers are in serious need of an extra set of hands to help speed

up the trial process," Schai-bley said. "It is encouraging to see the swift action in the General Assembly to help provide Hamilton County with this much-needed resource."

The most up to date data from the Weighted Caseload Measure shows Hamilton County has just one judicial officer for about 29,500 people. Schai-bley said Hamilton County superior and circuit court judges, commissioners, council and prosecuting attorney support adding this position.

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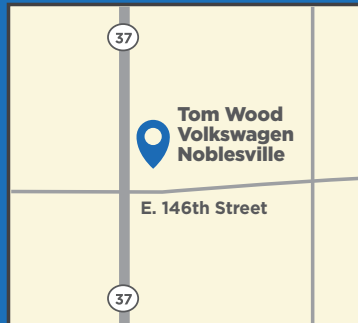
