Commissioners temporarily rescind appointment of Veteran Service Officer

Search postponed while state lawmakers review Indiana Code

The Hamilton County Commissioners have temporarily rescinded the appointment of Lisa Charles as the County Veteran Service Officer (CVSO). Previously a three-member interview committee had unanimously recommended her appointment, with the understanding that residency requirements for the position could be waived.

Indiana code IC 10-17-1-5 states that a county veteran service officer must be a resident of Indiana for at least five years immediately preceding their appointment. Charles moved to Indiana in 2018.

The City of Fishers has accepted a bid from Harding Group to repave city streets during 2020 following a vote last Monday by Works and Safety.







Their love never wavered, and now there are new generations of Grimseys and others fulfilling God's mandate to share the good news of Jesus's love and salvation for all who would accept Him, because of Carolyn and Wayne's faithfulness and love for Him.

An avid conversationalist and storyteller, artistic and creative, Carolyn always had a twinkle in her eye and a zest for life in her words as she recounted many tales to both her children, grandchildren, the four-year-olds in her wonderful Sunday school class at College Church in Wheaton, and anyone who had time to listen.

With her disposition, her mother being a nurse, and having a quick and intelligent mind, becoming an RN seemed a natural career choice for Carolyn. It led her from very challenging and exhausting training to the hope of a career as an Air Force nurse who would travel the world. Just last year she shared this story with her friends and family as they were honoring her for her military service:

We were the 363rd Tactical Hospital unit stationed at Shaw Air Force Base, Sumter, South Carolina. Shaw Air Force Base was the reconnaissance headquarters during the Vietnam War. Recon jets flew low over enemy territory in Vietnam and they were photographing sites for air, helicopter, and ground strikes. Those photos were sent back to the Pentagon, placed on a map (one of these top secret cartographers was my Uncle George), and proved essential for war logistics. Of course, all of this was before computer technology, amazingly!!

'The hospital was a mobile hospital which did imply that the hospital could be packed up and rushed to an emergency site within hours. In fact, on my third day there, after reporting to work, I discovered that most of the nurses were gone with the mobile unit to address the Alaskan earthquake emergency. That left about three of us nurses to attend to both a large men's internal medicine ward and a large pediatric ward, thus caring for the airmen, the officers, their families, and 29 other nurses. I served 2 years there: 1964-1966; I came in just as the official declaration of war came about.

Before I met him, my future husband Wayne had hoped to be an Air Force pilot, and was bitterly disappointed to discover after joining that he was too color blind to pursue that career. While his plans were dashed, yet his new administrative duties brought him face to face with the picture you might see on the Riverwalk Commons (now Five Star Residences) wall near the entrance. The blessings continued with the Lord leading us to our wonderful son through our time there.

'Medically, as a nurse, I considered it one of the finest, most professional nursing situations I ever experienced. It was an honor to serve.'

After three years in the service, Carolyn began her life as a wife and mother, becoming a Roommother with a capital R, and throwing herself into being a mom and a truly committed Sunday school teacher. She and Wayne were so proud of each of their children, and encouraged them to pursue the paths that combined both their interests and talents.

Carolyn wanted every child she taught in Sunday School to know that Jesus and she thoroughly loved them, and every child was greeted with a big smile and hug as they walked in the door, and also received a hand-delivered birthday gift at their homes. Not surprisingly, there were parents that confided to Carolyn that their children had determined that College Church was for their family based on their Sunday School experience in her class, and those families undoubtedly felt and experienced both her and Jesus' love through those actions.

There are people who go to work and people who genuinely love others; Rhynika and Kisha are the latter.

Carolyn leaves behind her sister, Janet Hockman; brother, Steve Jones; and her very thankful children and their families, Tom and Heidi with Ben, Emmaline, Kimberlee and Isaiah Grimsey; and Karen and Eric with Evangeline Reiss.

ATLANTA, INDIANA UTILITY BILLING PROCEDURE
UNIFORM MUNICIPAL UTILITY BILLING PROCEDURE
WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the Town Council that a policy for standardizing the municipal utility billing procedures is necessary;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Council of the Town of Atlanta, meeting in regular session, hereby adopts the following: ATLANTA MUNICIPAL UTILITY BILLING PROCEDURE

For purposes of this internal policy, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning as defined by this section:

- a. *Bill* means the statement of account for municipal utility services rendered by the Town to a customer, and due and payable to the Town by the customer. b. *Town* means the municipal corporation known as the Town of Atlanta, and any municipal subdivision or department of the Town, or any designated agent authorized to the Town.
- o act on behalf of the Town c: Customer means the deeded owner of the property receiving utility service for sewage and stormwater services, and the resident of record for water, trash, and othe
- d. Delinquent customer means any person, firm, corporation, or entity who fails to pay any current charges or portion thereof for any municipal utility by the due date
- e. Municipal utility means the water, sewage, storm water, and trash collection departments or systems of the Town of Atlanta. f. Past due amount means any current charges or portion thereof for any municipal utility which remain unpaid past the due date of the bill on which such current
- g. <u>Disconnect</u> means the utility services shall not be made available to any person, firm, corporation, or entity due to non-payment.

 h. <u>Promissory agreement</u> means a contract between customer and the Town, allowing the customer to make payments to the Town to pay any current or past due
- charges or portion thereof for any municipal utility by a determined date.

 i. <u>Utility Billing Clerk</u> means the designee of the Town Council responsible for billing customers, and receiving payments. The Town Council have appointed the Clerk Treasurer to this role. The terms Clerk Treasurer and Billing Clerk may be used interchangeably in this document.

Section 2. Utility billing policies and procedures.

The following policies and procedures shall govern the provision of municipal utilities of the Town of Atlanta. Section 3. Utility billing.

There is hereby created a utility billing section within such department as may be designated by the Town Council. The billing section shall be responsible for the calculation and rendering of all municipal utility bills. The utility billing section shall maintain account records for each customer that includes the customer's name, pilling address, service address, current charges, and account history including past due charges, penalties and fees. Section 4. Rate ordinances.

The Town shall establish, maintain and periodically revise a Water, Sewage, Trash, and Storm Water Rate Ordinance. Said ordinances shall contain all the various fees, rates, and charges that the Municipal Utility will charge to its customers. All municipal utility charges shall be calculated in accordance with the current Rate Ordinances applicable to each municipal utility or utility service rendered to a customer. Section 5. Municipal utility service application.

Any person, firm or corporation desiring to establish any municipal utility service or combination thereof shall make application for said service. The application shall be on such form(s) as may now or hereinafter be prescribed by the Town. The application shall include the applicant's name, spouse name, service address, mailing address, telephone number, and personal identification number (e.g., social security number, drivers license number and date of birth), or federal identification number (businesses), and signature of the party responsible for payment. Additionally, the deeded property owner's name, mailing address, and phone number is to be provided, if different than the applicant. Persons applying on behalf of others or acting as an agent for others may provide the required information, provided such agent agrees to assume responsibility for the person, firm, or corporation upon whose behalf they are applying. Each service location shall be considered a separate account. The Town may request to make a converted the Applicant's drivers license or other covernment issued identification in order to confirm identity. nay request to make a copy of the Applicant's drivers license or other government issued identification in order to confirm identity. Section 6. Monthly utility bill.

The utility billing section of the Town shall provide each municipal utility customer with a monthly water, a monthly sewage, a monthly trash, and a monthly storm water bill which shall include the charge incurred by the customer for each monthly utility service charge. These bills may be combined into one billing statement and/or mailing. The customer is responsible for paying each monthly bill on or before the bill due date. Bills for municipal utility services shall be rendered and paid

The monthly utility bill shall be sent to the billing address of record. In most cases, this will be the address of the property. If the customer requests in writing to change the billing address to another location, the billing clerk will send all future bills to that designated location.

As defined in Section Ic, a customer is the deeded owner of the property, and is by default the defined customer for sewer and storm service. The monthly bill is the responsibility of the Customer. The utility will accept payment for the monthly bill from renters, tenants, family members, and other persons seeking to pay the monthly bill - but all town utility bills, current or delinquent, are the responsibility of the Customer. In cases of delinquency the Town will seek collection of all delinquent bills and related charges from the Customer.

Section 6a. The monthly utility billing rate is determined by the customer's use characteristics.

The Town's Water, Sewage, Trash, and Storm Water Rate Ordinances contain the provision for both monthly flat rates and monthly metered rates.

All residential use customers will be billed a monthly rate for water service, sanitary sewage service, trash service, and storm water service in accordance with the Water, Sewage, Trash, and Storm Water Rate Ordinances. The water and sewage rate charges will be determined by the water use characteristics of the customer, except n cases where no water connection is present (ie well water), in which case flat rate billing applies.

All non-residential use customers will be billed a monthly rate for water service, sanitary sewage service, trash service, and storm water service in accordance with th

Water, Sewage, Trash, and Storm Water Rate Ordinances. The water and sewage rate charges will be determined by the water use characteristics of the non-residential customer, except in cases where no water connection is present (ie well water), in which case flat rate billing applies.

The Town and it's agents have the power, right, and ability to investigate the water and sewage use characteristic of any customer at any time, and modify the ustomer's bill amount based on that investigation, in accordance with the Water, Sewage, Trash, and Storm Water Rate Ordinances.

Section 6b. Bill payments received for less than the full amount of the monthly utility billing.

The Town may bill out various utility services on one monthly unified bill, and customers may pay for the various utility services in one payment. Any customer payments that are received for less than the full amount of the billing due for any individual month shall be applied first to the current billing, and second to any delinquent or outstanding charges. Partial payments will be applied in the following manner:

a. First, to the current water portion of the monthly bill, with any remainder being applied;

b. Second, to the current trash portion of the monthly bill, with any remainder being applied;

c. Third, to the current sewage portion of the monthly bill, with any remainder being applied;
d. Fourth, to the current storm water portion of the monthly bill, with any remainder being applied;
e. Fifth, to any delinquent or outstanding or otherwise non-current portion of the monthly billing (in the same utility order as described above).

Section 7. Extra service bills.

Billings for any extra services, installation charges, penalties, collection fees, or other special charges shall be rendered in accordance with the applicable utility or ervice rate resolution, and shall be sent as a separate bill.

Section 8, Billing cycle.

a. <u>Usage Period</u>. The usage period is the month or any part of the month during which utility service is provided or is available to be provided to a customer of the utility, or the month or part of the month that a customer's property is physically connected to the Town's water, sanitary sewage, or storm water systems, and the part of the month in which trash service is provided.

b. <u>Bill date</u> The Bill Date shall be the first day of the month following the month that service is provided or available to be provided. c. <u>Billing period</u>. The Billing Period is the time between the Bill Date and the Delinquent Date. Billings will be distributed by the Town to each customer of the Town on a monthly basis through the issuance of a monthly bill. Each monthly bill will state the date that the bill is due, and the date after which the bill is considered delinquent and delinquent fees will be added. The total bill shall be due and payable by the close of business no later than the fifteenth (15th) day of the month after the

billing date. The fifteenth day (15th) of the month following the billing date shall be known as the due date. If the due date falls on a holiday, Saturday, or Sunday, the due date shall be on the first business day following the holiday or weekend. d. Delinquent date. If a bill is not paid on or before the close of business of the due date, a late charge equal to ten percent (10%) of the current utility bill amount shall be added to the charges. The first (1st) business day following the due date shall be known as the delinquent date. If the delinquent date falls on a holiday,

Saturday, or Sunday, the bill shall then become delinquent at 8:00 a.m. on the first business day following the holiday or weekend.

e. *Lien notification date*. If a bill is not paid on or before the close of business on the sixtieth (60th) business day following the due date, the Town will send an "Intention to File Lien" letter to the property address. In cases of a non-owner occupied property, a copy of the "Intention to File Lien" letter will also be sent to the deeded owner's mailing address. If the lien notification date falls on a holiday, Saturday, or Sunday, the "Intention to File Lien" letter shall then be distributed on the

first business day following the holiday or weekend.

f. <u>Lien File Date</u>. If a bill is not paid on or before ten (10) business days following the Lien Notification Date, the Town or the Town's attorney shall file a lien on the property at their earliest convenience. The date ten (10) business days following the Lien Notification Date shall be known as the Lien File Date. If the Lien File Date falls on a holiday, Saturday, or Sunday, then the first date that liens will be filed shall then occur on the first business day following the holiday or the weekend. g. Water Service Disconnection Date. If a water bill is not paid on or before the close of business on the twenty-fifth (25th) of the month, the water service of the omer is subject to disconnection without additional notice. All water bills subject to disconnected by the Town utility personnel on the same

day, in an order determined to be most practical and efficient by Town Utility personnel, without discrimination or prejudice.

h. Clerk Treasurer as Hearing Officer on Application for Service Extension. A person owing an unpaid utility bill may appeal in writing to the Clerk Treasurer for a fifteen (15) day extension of the date when utility service would be subject to discontinuation, setting forth in detail the extraordinary hardship or other unavoidable circumstances whereby the delinquent bill cannot be paid within the allowed period. The Clerk Treasurer, acting as the Hearing Officer for the extension request

may grant or deny such request, in whole or in part. The Hearing Officer may require partial payment of the delinquent bill in return for granting an extension. If the extension is granted and payment is not made within the extension period, the account will be subject to immediate disconnection. i. <u>Appeal of Hearing Officers Denial of Disconnection Extension</u>. A person owing an unpaid utility bill may appeal the determination of the Clerk Treasurer cting as Hearing Officer in Section 7h. The appeal will be in writing to the Town Council, which shall act on the appeal in its capacity as the Governing Board of the Municipal Corporation. The written appeal request shall set forth in detail the (1) extraordinary hardship or other unavoidable circumstances whereby the delinquent bill cannot be fully paid within the allowed period, (2) the specific • relief requested, and (3) the reason(s) that the person owing an unpaid bill believes that the adverse determination of the Clerk Treasurer acting as Hearing Officer was arbitrary or capricious. The Town Council shall consider such appeal at its next scheduled Town Council meeting. Any contemplated discontinuation of utility service shall be deferred pending the determination of the appeal by the Town Council. The Town Council

in its appeal determination may (1) deny the appeal, or (2) grant the appeal in whole or in part, and/or (3) may require partial payment of the delinquent bill in return for ranting the extension. Upon denial of the appeal the delinquent user shall be given 48 hours notice of the appeal denial prior to the discontinuation of service. Section 9. Delinquent customers. Any customer whose bill remains unpaid at 5:00 p.m. on the fifteenth (15th) day of the month after the billing date shall be considered delinquent. Any customer who s delinquent may be contacted by the Town in an attempt to collect payment for the delinquent bill.

After the twenty-fifth (25th) day of the month, the Town may refer any delinquent customers to a collection agency or attorney for collection. Delinquent accounts are

also subject to the filing of liens in accordance with the Town's billing procedure.

Delinquent accounts that have been filed as liens can no longer be paid in the normal manner, but must be paid to the County in the manner prescribed by the County for lien payments. Lien filings will include reasonable collection and attorney fees.

In the case of a non-owner occupied property, the deeded owner will be notified of any utility bills related to their property that remain outstanding beyond the twenty fifth (25th) day of the month that the bill is due. The Town Council hereby grants authority to the Clerk Treasurer to offer to delinquent customers one bill workout plan not more often than once each twelve

(12) month period (beginning on a month that the customer is current on all of its town utility bills). This bill workout procedure will be that the customer must pay monthly a payment consisting of two parts. The first part is the entire balance of the current monthly bill after the workout plan begins. The second part is one-third of the amount that was due before the bill workout plan began. This workout procedure is intended to allow the delinquent customer to become current within a three (3) month period. No additional late fees will accrue to the delinquent portion of the bill starting with the date the workout is approved and continuing during the three (3) month period of the workout. If the delinquent customer defaults on this agreement by paying less than the calculated amount due, the bill workout agreement terminates immediately, and without further notice, and the Town's normal and customary bill collection procedures begin. This would include water se disconnection, sewage and storm water lien filing, and other bill collection procedures.

After a bill workout plan terminates, the Clerk Treasurer cannot offer another bill workout plan to that customer for twelve months from the last current payment.

The above described bill workout procedure in no way limits the powers or the authority of the Town Council to modify or adjust a bill, or offer a different or dditional workout procedure for delinquent customers. Section 10. Disputed utility bills.

A customer may request a face-to-face conference regarding any dispute over a disputed utility bill or other service matter before the Town Council, or its designee, to ear such matters.

Only the Town Council has the ability to modify, change, adjust, mitigate, or otherwise alter a utility bill.

Section 11. Promissory Agreement.

Any customer may request a face-to-face conference before the Town Council, to consider entering into a payment plan or promissory agreement that identifies certain erms and conditions of a payment plan that would cause a utility account to be made current. If a customer fails to make good on any term and/or condition contained vithin the promissory agreement, other collection procedures may be implemented immediately.

Section 12. Service charges.

The following additional fees shall be charged for services provided by the municipal utility. a. Returned check fees:

i. \$25.00 for all checks that are returned (per Town Rate Ordinances).

ii. Returned checks, the customer shall pay, by cash or money order, the amount of the returned check(s), plus the corresponding returned check fee. iii. After two returned checks in any 12-month period, the customer shall pay all current and future payments by cash or money order.

iv. In its pursuit of collection for return checks the Town will follow Indiana Code (IC 26-2-7 and/or IC 34-24-3) which in certain cases allow the collection of reble damages. b. Reconnection fee:

i. Once water service is disconnected, a service fee of \$35.00 will be charged to the customer for the reconnection of water service (per Town Rate Section 13. Leak Adjustment Procedure.

A Customer may request a bill adjustment following the discovery of a leak. This request must be in writing, and be submitted within 60 days of the excessive use period of note. The request shall contain the following information: a. The date the Customer became aware of leak. b. A brief description of the cause and location of the leak

c. The date the leak was repaired.d. Copies of pictures of the leak (if available).

e. Copies of pictures of the leak repair (if available). f. Copies of repair invoices or receipts.

g. Verification from Atlanta Utility Department that the leak has been repaired

High water usage resulting from the following shall not be eligible for any Sewage adjustment: a. Leaking toilets and faucets

Drinking water systems

d. Allowing faucets to drip during freezing conditions.

The Town Council will review each request at the next regular Town Council Meeting to determine if an adjustment is appropriate. Section 14, Pool Fill and Summer Watering Credits.

Utility customers may purchase a hose bib meter from Atlanta Utilities in order to meter outside water consumption. This meter will be read annually, allowing for a once yearly sewage adjustment. The Utility Department may also provide pool fill service from town fire hydrants, in accordance with the Town's Pool Fill Policy

If the customer requesting the pool fill has any outstanding delinquent unpaid accounts with the Town, the customer will not be eligible for pool fill service from the

In addition to acting as Utility Billing Clerk, as well as Hearing Officer, the Town Council shall require the Clerk Treasurer to provide a Utility Billing Report to the Town Council at the second regular Town Council Meeting each month. This report shall contain the following: a. A list of any new utility customers since the previous report

b. An Aged Accounts Receivable Report

c. A list of Utility Service disconnections since the previous report

d. A list of granted 3-month workout plans since the previous report (if applicable)

e. A list of Leins filed since the previous report (if applicable) f. A list of accounts that have been submitted to a collection agency since the previous report (if applicable)

g. Any other information the Clerk Treasurer deems appropriate
