Full STEAM ahead in Fishers, Duke educational partnership program

In education parlance, the acronym STEAM stands for science, technology, engineering, arts and math. Wednesday, Fishers High School students were involved in a STEAM competition sponsored by Duke Energy and POWER Engineers.

The project is funded by a \$5,900 grant from Duke Energy Foundation coupled with a \$6,695 grant from POWER. The program introduces high school students to STEAM concepts.

In one session, students were tasked with designing power transmission lines, thinking about all the factors involved in accomplishing such a task. Papers were strung around the room, representing power lines.

"They were told to take their crepe paper and connect point A to point B," said only restriction was they could not do it in a direct line. They had to creatively find ways around. 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
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Adam's annual Oscar picks

I've been folmovies and the Academy Awards for as long as I can remember, and for more than a decade I've made it a point to see all of the Best Picture nominees prior to the big

Best Film: Parasite

Best Supporting Actor: Brad Pitt (Once Upon a Time in Hollywood)

Again, another actor who's been sweeping the awards and he's been around for so long and has appeared in so many Best Picture nominees and his only Oscar win so far was as a producer for 12 Years A Slave. He'll finally win an acting Oscar, and it's fine by me since he gives a career-best performance and shines in a film that I really liked but I didn't love. Despite any of my issues with the movie he was in, Pitt was electric on screen and I applaud his win. I am disappointed though that

his win is nearly guaran- Willem Dafoe wasn't nominated for *The Lighthouse*, a small black-and-white indie film released by A24 this year. You're glued to the screen when he acts in this film and Dafoe is past due for an Oscar win (I was disappointed that he lost Best Actor to Gary Oldman two years ago. Dafoe was fantastic in The Florida Project that year).

Best Supporting Actress: Laura Dern (Marriage Story)

This might be the only win for this fantastic movie made by Noah Baumbach, husband of another Best Picture nominee director Greta Gerwig. Dern brings her character to life and shines in only a few scenes and she's also sweeping the awards leading up to the Oscars (notice a pattern?). I don't see her having much of a threat but Scarlett Johannson could upset. I'm happy that newcomer Florence Pugh received a nomination but she won't win. Don't play politics with your portfolio

You're probably aware this is an election year. During the next several months, candidates will discuss issues that should greatly interest you as a **COREY SYLVESTER** citizen. But as an Cicero Edward Jones investor, how con-

cerned should you be with the results of the presidential and congressional elections?

Maybe not as much as you might think. At different times, the financial markets have performed well and poorly under different administrations and when different parties have controlled Congress. And after all the votes are counted, outcomes in the investment markets can be unpredictable. For one thing, as you get closer to retirement, you may want to shift some – though certainly not all – of your investment dollars from more growth-oriented vehicles to more conservative ones. might want to retire earlier than originally thought, you may need to invest more aggressively, being aware of the increased risk involved.

· Following a long-term strate-

gy – In pretty much all walks of life, there are no shortcuts to success – and the same is true with investing. You need to follow a long-term strategy based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon, and you need the patience and perseverance to keep investing in all markets – up, down and sideways.

 Avoiding mistakes – Many people think of an investment mistake as failing to "get in on the ground floor" of some company that ultimately grew to huge proportions. But it's pretty hard to become an early investor in companies like these, many of which start out as privately held businesses without any stockholders. Furthermore, companies with shorter track records can be much more unpredictable investments. However, you do want to avoid some real mistakes, such as chasing "hot" stocks. By the time you hear about them, they may already be cooling off, and they might not even be appropriate for your needs. Another mistake: failing to diversify your portfolio. If you only own one type of asset, such as growth stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn. Spreading your dollars over a wide range of investments can help lower your risk exposure. (However, diversification by itself can't guarantee a profit or protect against all losses.)

After Election Day, regardless of the outcome, you can help keep your portfolio on track by not playing politics with it.

Shaffer wants more info on Carmichael costs

Carmel's Redevelopment Commission executive director recently informed the City Council the \$40 million Hotel Carmichael under construction would cost \$58.5 million due to rising material and labor costs. To cover the shortfall, he said, the Commission unilaterally is dipping into pots of money it has collected.

One of those pots holds the proceeds of a mortgage the Commission has taken out on a building it built and actually paid off.

He neglected to tell the Council how

the material and labor cost escalation was for luxury. affecting all the other projects in which the Commission is investing borrowed money, what the balances are in the pots of cash stashed here and there, what other buildings the Commission owns and can mortgage in the future at what price.

He did point to money-saving steps taken in what was to have been a luxury hotel including but not limited to replacing the marble lobby floor with a synthetic material and using common shingles instead of slate roofing. So much

The city's hired hotel management firm is now taking reservations beginning in September (the hotel might open in May) and a king-sized bedroom goes for \$119, or just about what other hotels in the area charge.

Recalling the Center for the Performing Arts was to have cost \$17 million but ran \$262 million (and counting), Carmel substituting brick for the stone exterior, taxpayers need to fasten their seat belts. Turbulence ahead

Raptors pull away from Pacers again

For the second time in three nights, the Pacers went toe-to-toe with the Toronto Raptors. But once again, Indiana faltered down the stretch, this time going scoreless over three and a half minutes to allow the Raptors (38-14) to pull away for a 115-106 win on Friday night following six straight points from Ibaka. Indiana anat Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

The loss was the fourth straight for Indiana (31-21) and came on the heels of giving up an 11-0 run to close the game in Wednesday's 119-118 loss in Toronto.

Domantas Sabonis had 19 points and 16 rebounds for Indiana and Victor Oladipo added a season-high 15 points on 5-of-11 shooting and four assists, but the Pacers couldn't string together enough stops to stave off the Raptors' offensive attack.

At times it felt like Indiana was playing tennis against a wall, as Toronto answered seemingly every big shot from the Blue & Gold.

Serge Ibaka led the Raptors with 22 points and 10 rebounds, while Fred VanVleet added 20 points and seven assists for the defending NBA champions, who have now won a franchise-record 13 consecutive contests.

"They played well today," Oladipo said. "Credit them. They're a scrappy team. They are scrappy, simple as that, and they play well together. They have a great chemistry. You can tell they've been playing together for

Starting for the first time at home this season, Oladipo got off to a promising start. The two-time All-Star entered Friday's contest shooting just 24.5 percent in four games since returning from a year-long absence due to a ruptured quad tendon, but he connected on his first three attempts against Toronto.

Oladipo opened the scoring by utilizing a pump fake before side-stepping away from his defender and swishfloater on the next Pacers possession, then blew by his and did not return, a significant blow for the visitors. At on the right track." man for a reverse layup a little over a minute later.

Indiana led 27-26 following Malcolm Brogdon's 16 points and 11 assists in 28 minutes. layup with 1:44 left in the first quarter, but the Raptors closed the opening frame with a 10-4 run that included their sixth and seventh 3-pointers of the quarter to take a 36-31 lead into the second.

Toronto led 52-43 with 6:21 left in the third quarter swered, however, with a 13-4 run to climb back within one. That surge was capped by a memorable sequence where Jeremy Lamb hit a 3-pointer and then T.J. McConnell stole Rondae Hollis-Jefferson's inbounds pass and dished to Oladipo, who raced in from midcourt and converted an acrobatic layup that brought the home crowd to its feet and forced a Raptors timeout.

The Raptors maintained a narrow lead for the remainder of the half, though the Pacers had three chances to take the lead on their final possession of the second quarter.

Myles Turner drove and rose up for what would have been the dunk of the year, but threw it off the back iron. Oladipo corralled the rebound and got the ball back in Turner's hands, but he missed a three. Justin Holiday came down with yet another offensive board and Oladipo had a good look at a mid-range jumper, but that also rimmed out as Indiana headed to halftime trailing, 64-

Lamb finally gave Indiana the lead on a layup 1:02 into the third quarter, but the lead would be short-lived, as OG Anunoby put Toronto back in front with a corner three 14 seconds later. The Blue & Gold tied the game on three occasions over the next few minutes before the Raptors surged back ahead with nine unanswered points.

Indiana scored the last five points of the third quarter, holding Toronto scoreless over the final 3:05, to trim the second night of a back-to-back. the deficit to 87-83 entering the fourth.

Raptors All-Star guard Kyle Lowry exited the game the time of his injury, Lowry had already accumulated

Nonetheless, the visitors kept Indiana at bay for much of the fourth quarter. Seemingly every time the Pacers strung a bucket or two together, the Raptors would immediately score on the next possession to thwart any thoughts of a rally.

"We didn't do a good job of keeping the ball in front," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said. "When we had breakdowns on the perimeter, they're penetrating and kicking and they have five guys out there that can shoot the three ball."

Eventually, Terence Davis hit a 3-pointer with 5:16 remaining, then added a putback dunk at 4:39 to extend the Raptors' lead to 109-99.

Oladipo hit one of two free throws with 3:15 left for Indiana's first point since the 6:47 mark, but Pascal Siakam answered with a layup on the other end.

An Oladipo 3-pointer made it 111-103 with 2:45 to play, but another dunk from Davis with 1:46 remaining essentially put the game away for the visitors.

Six Pacers finished the night in double figures. Brogdon tallied 18 points, six rebounds, and eight assists, while fellow starter Lamb added 11 points. McConnell (12 points, six rebounds, seven assists, and two steals) and Justin Holiday (12 points and four boards) also joined the club off the bench.

Davis finished with 17 points on 7-of-11 shooting and eight boards off the bench for Toronto. Anunoby added 16 points and Siakam chipped in 15 points and
