Once fully funded, the second phase will be the Observatory, but will have to come back for approval. A huge project for our community.



## HSE unveils start times for 2020-21 school year

The Hamilton Southeastern school board had a difficult time getting there, but finally has a decision – sort of – on school start times.

The option approved on a 4-3 vote last Wednesday sets out schedules for the 2020-21 school year. High school students will start their school day at 7:30 a.m., ending at 2:30 p.m. Grades 5 through 8 will start at 8 a.m. and leave school at 3 p.m. Elementary students will begin their classes at 9 a.m. and end the school day at 3:30 p.m.

The 4-3 vote approving this plan included support from Sylvia Shepler, Julie Chambers, Janet Pritchett and Michelle Fullhart. Voting no were Brad Boyer, Amanda Shera and Clint Wilson.

In the original Option 2 plan, Superintendent Allen Bourff suggested the “flipped” start time

## Fishers exploring how to improve 116<sup>th</sup> Street at Allisonville Road

Anyone navigating the intersection of Allisonville Road and 116th Street in Fishers, one can see how vehicles stack up in the left-turn lanes and can create dangerous traffic hazards during busy times of the day.

The City of Fishers took a step toward working on a solution last Monday, although which solution is not yet known.

The Fishers Board of Works and Public Safety approved a design contract with A&F Engineering for \$374,855 at its Monday meeting. That is the start of the process to determine how the intersection will be reconfigured.

The city will use funds from the Highway Safety Improvement Project to pay for the construction. The actual construction is expected to begin in 2024.

“We’re confident that we have a solution,” Engineering Director Jason Taylor told the board.

The city is reviewing possible options. One would change the configuration of the turn lanes, rather than adding an additional turn lane, in conjunction with timing the traffic signals.

Another option would be what Taylor described as a “Turbo Roundabout,” where motorists would choose their lane of direction before entering the roundabout.

## Arcadia applies for HGTV’s “Hometown Takeover”

In January, HGTV announced its latest and largest renovation show, “Hometown Takeover,” in which Ben and Erin Napier, the hosts of “Hometown,” will take over and restore an entire town. Arcadia has applied and is hoping to be the next town HGTV visits.

Arcadia’s Heather Souder told The Reporter that HGTV is having a competition to see which small town will be the next one to get their attention.

“We had heard through word of mouth from several people in town that HGTV was going to have this competition,” Souder said. “People thought it was a good idea and that we should do this.”

The requirement for restoration were threefold: The town must have fewer than 40,000 residents, have

homes and buildings that are architecturally interesting, and have a downtown area in need of restoration.

The submission deadline was Friday, Feb. 7, and in addition to the required photographs and essay, Arcadia had a video produced, which is at over 31,000 views in just four days. You can watch the video at [bit.ly/37s49Dy](http://bit.ly/37s49Dy).

“We are very happy and surprised about the exposure our video has already gotten on Facebook,” Souder told The Reporter.

According to Souder, Arcadia is going to be revitalized with or without HGTV’s help.

“We are still moving

forward,” Souder said. “If Arcadia does not get chosen, we are applying for grants to put in a splashpad at the park.”

Souder said the town does not qualify for the kind of façade grant Cicero recently received, but there are other grant and funding options available.

“We are going to be grant-heavy,” Souder said. “We are going to apply for anything that we can that will beautify Arcadia, get our building back in shape where they can harbor businesses. We don’t want to tear anything down. We just want love brought in here so we can build it back to its former glory.”

# Just a family reunion

It was last Friday and I was on my way to work but turned onto 146th Street instead of 126th. I needed to get to my mother ASAP.

Her voice was cracking as she whispered into the phone, “Janet, I think the good Lord is calling me home.”

I was not prepared to hear those words. I knew the broken rib, with all the pain and her not eating due to the nausea from the pain medication, had weakened her.

I know she is 93 ... but.

She looked so frail when I got to her bedside. The concern on the faces of the nurses told me a lot.

She whispered for me to call my daughter, Emily, who lives in Tampa. She took the phone from me and told her, “Emily, I think this is it. I need you to come home.”

Mom and I spent the next hour talking about my dad and all the memories we had over the 64 years I had shared with them. She said she would be giving him a big hug from me. She had missed him all these soon to be 14 years since he passed.

We had the opportunity to share our hearts. As sad as it was, it was a beautiful tender moment. We left no words unsaid. We left no feelings uncommunicated.

Emily had called my daughter-in-law, Angie. She brought my granddaughter, Abby, with her. Angie confirmed that Grandma was not doing well.

Emily would be on a plane in a few hours.

Within three hours of the call with my mother, we had a family reunion. My kids, grandkids, Mom’s sister, several cousins and friends who are like family ... all showed up.

Hospice was called. Conversations were had that I never wanted to have.

Mom had the opportunity to tell everyone how she felt.

At one point she asked everyone to gather around her bed. She looked around the room and said, “I want you all to know I love you and I have one thing to ask of all of you, to ‘be nice’ to one another.”

That was always something that Mom had told me, time and time again, no matter where I was going: “Janet, be nice.” It was her way of saying that I should always be kind and considerate and do right by others. It was her way of leaving a legacy ... a very endearing legacy.

For the time being, the good Lord seems to have hit the “Pause” button. It is quite the emotional rollercoaster.

Mom is gaining strength. She is smiling and is eating pork rinds. Her heart is clear. She has given us our marching orders to BE NICE.

This is a hard journey we are on. It’s like a long refrain of the old gospel song, “I will meet you in the morning, over there.” The moments are ever so precious.

Someday there will be calls that I don’t want to make, but until then, I will continue to enjoy my time with her ... and buy more pork rinds.

# Local Scouts will not be affected by bankruptcy

There is increasing speculation that Boy Scouts of America may soon file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy. NBC News has attempted to learn about such a move by the long-respected youth organization, but is not reporting when a filing might come.

The Scouts have been very active in Hamilton County for decades. Bankruptcy would not mean closing down the Scouting operation. Chapter 11 provides time for reorganization of debt, or in the case of Scouts, time to work out lawsuits pending against the organization.

County Scout leaders say programs and projects will go on as usual while at-

torneys fight out the complaints brought by 11 young men who claim a scoutmaster in Chicago molested them in the 1980s.

The Boy Scouts’ insurance company has balked at paying claims brought by the alleged victims of convicted former scoutmaster Thomas Hacker. He is now deceased. There is apparently a belief that more lawsuits may follow.

The 110-year old Boy Scouts of America currently has 2,200,000 boys enrolled in its programs. There are nearly one million adult volunteers working in scouting nationwide.

Officially, the organization has had no comment on the legal problems.

# Grant management system helps county stay in compliance

According to Hamilton County Auditor Robin Mills, the county’s new Electronic Grants Management System will help ensure the more than 330,000 Hamilton County residents continue to enjoy all the benefits associated with federal and state grants well into the future.

“Hamilton County manages up to 100 active grants at any given time, representing hundreds of millions of dollars,” explained Mills. “For decades the county relied on legal pads and Excel spreadsheets to organize, track and manage grants. The federal government is pushing to mandate transparency in all grants, and with our paper process, that mandate would be difficult. Grantees, like the county, run the risk of losing funding because of lost documents, inappropriate payments or reporting non-compliance – in other words, a lack of

transparency.”

The county will now use an end-to-end grants administration and management tool that supports all the functional areas of the entire grant lifecycle, ensuring the county provides the required transparency, management and is compliant.

“Since deploying the Grants Management System, the grant claims process has been reduced by as much as 40 percent,” said Mills. “Because of built-in alerts, reporting compliance is nearly 100 percent. Data analysis is in real time versus manually reviewing and searching through paper files and the State Board of Accounts (the agency charged with auditing the county) now has online access to grant files from their laptops for real time review. And if that wasn’t enough, the county’s Grant Management System was awarded Best of Indiana.”

# BGCN receives grant for \$15K from Crosser Family Foundation

The Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville (BGCN) recently received a \$15,000 grant from the Crosser Family Foundation, a fund of Hamilton County Community Foundation, in support of its Transportation Program for Spring 2020.

BGCN says the support of the Crosser Family Foundation will assist in providing after school transportation from six Noblesville elementary schools to the Club. Due to transportation changes within the Noblesville School District, BGCN is now managing transportation services from several additional schools. This additional transportation responsibility comes with a significant operation cost, approximately \$165,000 a year.

The Club’s leadership team continues to explore funding options with the goal of minimizing the im-

pact on families, including seeking grant funding to offset the expense. Hundreds of children and families depend on a safe, reliable ride to the Boys & Girls Club each day after school to access the affordable, high-quality after school programs designed to meet their needs and interests.

“By ensuring that more than 250 households will have access to a ride to the Club, our local youth will continue to have the chance to take part in positive programs that offer new perspectives and shape character,” said BGCN Director of Development Nathan Helm. “With the support of the Crosser Family Foundation, our transportation services will continue to give parents the peace of mind that their children are arriving safely to a consistent safe space with positive role models and a wide variety of engaging programs.

# Fishers City Council reviews major projects

Mayor Scott Fadness and top officials of his administration spent over three hours at Conner Prairie last Monday with members of the Fishers City Council reviewing the many projects underway throughout the city.

On streets and roads, the State Road 37 construction at 126th Street is scheduled to begin March 1 by closing off the west side of 126th until July. Then, the east side of the road will be under construction until October. The

north and south lanes of SR 37 are to be open to traffic, two lanes in each direction, during the construction. An overpass with a roundabout at 126th Street will be built during this period. 146th Street will be the next State Road 37 construction project next year.

City Director of Engineering Jason Taylor said a big project is coming this summer that will close 96th Street from just east of Lantern Road to Cumberland Road.

A tunnel will be constructed under 116th Street for the Nickel Plate Trail,

resulting in a road closure at the old railroad tracks on 116th beginning on May 26. This will impact the Spark!Fishers Festival, 5K running events and other summer events.

Council members received details on plans for the first phase of the Nickel Plate Trail. Fadness says the city will communicate to the public that the trail is a construction zone and people using it to walk, run, bike or walk a dog are trespassing until the trail opens, when the first phase is complete.

Fadness says the city is completing a review of

downtown parking rules and may establish a number of two-hour restrictions on many parking spaces.

Parks and Recreation Director Sarah Sandquist provided a detailed look at the plans for Geist Waterfront Park. Fadness said there would be no need for a tax rate increase to pay for the park.

The city is planning an extensive community survey soon. It will be measuring how city residents are doing in terms of their emotional, mental and financial well-being. Results of the survey are expected by May.

# Alleged rapist arrested in Arcadia

An Arcadia man was arrested late last Friday night by the Pendleton District All Crimes Policing Team on a Felony Warrant for Level 3 Felony Rape in Hamilton County.

The warrant was the result of an ongoing investigation by Indiana State Police Detective Wade Heiny from the Indianapolis District that began in late November 2019.

Dominick D. L. Conley, 18, was arrested at a residence on Martz Street in Arcadia by Pendleton District Trooper Trent Jones. Conley was lodged in the Hamilton County Jail.

The charge stems from an incident that occurred in Hamilton County in late November with an alleged victim that was under the age of 18 at the time of the incident.


## Jack H. Lockhart

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# Mayor Brainard offers more context in Hotel cost increases

**The REPORTER**  
*Editor's note: Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard released the following statement about the development of the Hotel Carmichael and what it means for the city of Carmel. It has been edited for brevity.*

When we began the public-private partnership hotel project in 2017, we used industry leaders to help us estimate a budget for a luxury hotel. There was no indication at the time that the construction market would see major increases. The Council members approved a portion of the funding with the understanding that no more funding would be provided by them.

As the project moved forward and it became ap-

parent that construction and labor costs were increasing across the market, the executive director of the Carmel Redevelopment Commission (CRC) and his staff continued to value engineer the project looking for cost cutting solutions that would not sacrifice the luxury brand we had promised the community.

In addition, I instructed them to look for alternative funding solutions that would not depend on new taxpayer dollars, including working with our non-profit community development corporation (CDC) partners.

In Indiana, the state legislature specifically set up redevelopment commissions as independent legal entities in order to help municipali-

ties redevelop underused areas of their cities and towns. Instead of being criticized, Henry Mestestky and the CRC should be applauded for finding innovative ways of funding these cost increases without any additional risk to taxpayers. Construction and labor costs are increasing across the industry. These increases are not due to any type of mismanagement or oversight, but market forces beyond our control.

While the private sector can get funding up front for a project, the public sector must first submit budget estimates and preliminary design ideas without the benefit of detailed architectural and engineering plans based on those conceptual designs.

It is after the public bidding process that the true costs can be evaluated.

When unanticipated market fluctuations occur, we must be ready to find ways to cover those costs and continue the project through to completion. As we completed the public bidding in 2019, we were able to get a clear picture of the actual costs for the hotel and, armed with solutions for funding, were able to update the project budget to reflect the new costs.

Carmel has been very successful in building many quality projects that have had a tremendously positive impact on our city's economic development and this hotel will have the same positive impact.

schedule – allowing high school students more sleep but starting elementary classes earlier – be implemented in school year 2021-22. The motion made by Board President Michelle Fullhart would create a study committee that would report back to the board in October 2020 with recommendations on how to handle the student scheduled start times for 2021-22.

Fullhart said she doesn't know how many people will serve on the study committee or when the group will begin meeting. She does envision a wide cross-section of people with ties to the school community serving on this panel, such as parents and teachers.

There were three tries to find a proposal with the support of the four board mem-

bers needed to enact any measure. A motion to enact Option 1, which would have implemented the "flipped" start times in the 2020-21 school year along with the redesigned "three-tier" bus scheduling system, went down in a 5-2 vote, with Amanda Shera and Brad Boyer the only two votes supporting that idea.

A vote on Option 2 as originally proposed failed in a 4-3 vote. A complex motion made by Clint Wilson died for lack of a second.

Four citizens signed up to speak before the board on the start time and bus schedule issue and had widely varying views, with roughly two speakers behind Option 1, and two supporting Option 2, but with lots of caveats and explanations.

gotten the girls. A little less than a year later, I got two more goats, Adaira and Masq. Adaira is black and white and her nose is all pink and it's so cute. Masq, before she died, was probably the

biggest dairy goat doe in the United States. At her best, she weighed 200 pounds. She had these cartoon eyes. One eyeball went up and the other down. Her face was so long that people often mistook her for a miniature horse. Her tongue was so long. She had knobbly knees that bent inwards. She had a teat that hung right in the center of her legs. When she cried, her "voice" was so off-key that she was probably the reason we had no problems with coyotes. Everyone called her the Nanny Goat because she loved all kids and would care for any baby.

The first year of kidding (2018), Masq miscarried three kids. She was extremely sick. Her body delivered them early so she could heal. I remember early mornings going to care for her. I gave her medicine every day and a "milkshake" so she would still have some nutrients. She was only taking in liquids so she had diarrhea. She did her business laying down and I cleaned her up. I worked tirelessly for two

months, staying out late at night in the barn and waking up in the middle of the night to check on her.

Masq was queen bee and let everyone know it as soon as she saw her friends again. Her frame was fragile but her heart wasn't. She lasted for a few months before she got sick again. I remember her telling me it was time to go. Her body wasn't strong enough to get better again. Masq loved being outside so I let her outside. She soaked up all the sun she could before the vet arrived. I remember holding her enormous head in my hands as she closed her eyes for the last time.

Tonks miscarried one baby because she was too fat. Adaira had triplets, two boys and a girl. The girl died because she gave birth during the night and I wasn't there. Val gave birth to two boys.

The gestation period for goats is five months. During those months, I'm watching the girls' bellies to see growth patterns. I have to make sure they're gaining weight and keeping it on. Goats have fat pads under their tails, and I feel that to see if the girls are at a good weight. I also make sure their udder is bagging up nicely. If the sides are uneven, it could mean infection in the udder.

I have so much more I want to say into this, so stay tuned next week for a part two!

Striving for the gold standard in heart health


"I want to live, I want to give. I've been a miner for a heart of gold." - Neil Young, 1972

Most of you are very aware that February is "National Heart Health Month" as well as the "Go Red for Women" month. Fortunately, there is much information available now about heart health, particularly as it relates to women.

Some people may be surprised that heart disease is the number one killer of both men and women, surpassing all types of cancer and other diseases.<sup>1</sup> The most recent estimated annual incidence of heart attacks annually in the U.S. is 720,000+ new attacks and at least 335,000 recurrent attacks.<sup>2</sup> Direct and indirect costs of heart disease total more than \$320.1 billion. That includes health expenditures and lost productivity.

While heart disease statistics have been available and research conducted for many years regarding heart disease and men, both research and information-gathering for women's heart issues are relatively recent. While only 1 in 5 American women believe that heart disease is her greatest health threat, heart disease causes 1 in 3 women's deaths each year, killing approximately one woman every minute. Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease. The symptoms of heart disease can be different in women and men, and are often misunderstood. Please talk with your physician to learn more about the symptoms.

Thankfully, the information noted above, and much

more, is readily available. I encourage everyone to talk frankly with their health provider about their risk factors, review their dietary habits, and make this a priority. My own viewpoint on the subject also incorporates getting adequate sleep, removing stress, "getting up from sofas and chairs" and making the necessary life changes which can alter those statistics.

Additionally, the effects of isolation and loneliness have been widely studied as it relates to heart disease. Interestingly, the "Rose-to" effect is one in which a close-knit community experiences a reduced rate of heart disease. A recent PBS special documentary revealed attributes of positive relationships which reflect on our heart health. Information is also available online for those who wish to search for more information. The effect is named for Roseto, Pa., and describes family and community interaction there and the healthy effect on the inhabitants.

My quote this week may seem a little odd, but I hope that as we close up the month of February you do take responsibility and become a "miner for a (healthy) heart of gold." Let's strive for the "gold standard" in heart health by consuming fewer trans fats, packaged foods high in sodium, refined carbs, fried foods and whole milk products. Working on establishing better family and working relationships in 2020, getting in those 10,000 steps each day, and adequate rest will do your heart good!

# Girls state swimming: Royals take 6<sup>th</sup>, Huff wins breaststroke Carmel wins 34<sup>th</sup> in a row, Fishers takes 2<sup>nd</sup>

**INDIANAPOLIS** - Even after 34 consecutive years of winning state championships, it isn't difficult for the Carmel girls swim team to keep its program fresh.

That's because it always seems like every year, new swimmers step up and make their presences known. They certainly did last Saturday at the IU Natatorium, where the Greyhounds continued their state title streak in their usual dominant fashion.

Carmel scored 426.5 points to win its 34th straight state title, extending its national record for most state championships in a row. That point total is the fourth largest in state meet history, something that likely exceeded the expectations of Carmel itself.

"I don't think a year ago looking at this team, you would've predicted as many scoring swims in our score as we did today," said Greyhounds coach Chris Plumb. "Kudos to them and how far they've come over the past year. Certainly was not what we would've predicted a year ago."

Two underclassmen led the way for Carmel, both of whom picked up an individual state title and also swam on two of the Greyhounds' three state-winning relays.

Sophomore Gretchen Lueking finished first in the 200 freestyle in the early part of the meet, then swimming on the 200 and 400 free relays in the latter stages. Freshman Berit Berglund opened the meet up by participating on the winning medley relay, then scored a victory in the backstroke before swimming on the 400 free relay.

"Those girls have worked hard," said Plumb. "I think our senior leadership helped create an atmosphere where great athletes can emerge and I feel really good about the group of people leaving as well as the ones we have coming in."

"It's so amazing," said Lueking. "All the girls and all of our teammates are just so close. It's like a big family, so it's just amazing to swim for everyone in the stands and everyone on deck. It's just such an amazing opportunity to be a part of."

Carmel's other relay participants were Maggie Love, Meredith Berglund and Colleen Duffy

in the medley relay; Duffy, Avery Williams and Madelyn Christman in the 200 free relay, and Madelyn Christman and Meghan Christman on the 400 free relay.

Overall, the Greyhounds had 22 medal winners at the state meet. Meghan Christman was second in the 50 free, with Lueking the runner-up in the 100 free. MacKenna Lieske placed second in the individual medley and third in the breaststroke. The Hounds had four fourth-place finishers: Berit Berglund in the 200 free, Madelyn Christman in the IM, Meghan Christman in the 100 free and Erin Cummins in the 500 free.

Meredith Berglund tied for fifth in the butterfly, with Madelyn Christman getting fifth in the 100 free and Love placing fifth in the breaststroke. Duffy finished fifth in the backstroke and sixth in the 50 free, while Love was also sixth in the IM. Seventh-place finishes went to Hayley Reed in the butterfly and Taylor Conley in the backstroke, with Morgan Croaning taking eighth in the 500 free.

**TIGERS TAKE SECOND, CASEY WINS DIVING**

Fishers had an outstanding state meet, placing second with 208 points. It's the second time the Tigers have received the runner-up trophy; the first time was in 2015.

Fishers earned eight state medals, including one with a blue ribbon: Morgan Casey won the diving event, scoring 508.90 points.

"This has been the best meet I've ever dove. I PRed by like, 40 points," said Casey. She became the second Fishers diver to win a state title, the first being Shelby Bartlett in 2012.

"I have never scored a 500-point meet before and it was just crazy and awesome," said Casey. "It was just amazing. I'm still in shock right now."

Casey had some nervous moments in the last dive, as she was battling with Plainfield's Daryn Wright, who scored 502.90 for her 11 dives. Casey's final dive score of 39.10 was enough to get her over the top.

"I was just hoping and praying for that last dive, because I knew that I needed it, and so I just went up and I did it," said Casey. "And that was it."

Over in the pool, freshman Jo Jo Ramey had a great day, win-

ning four medals. She finished as the runner-up in the 500 free, joined Lydia Reade, Alexandra Stein and Kalli Agapios to take fourth in the medley relay, placed fifth in the IM and teamed up with Ellen Fero, Kate Mouser and Hannah Pratt to finish in the fifth in the 400 free relay.

Reade took fourth in the breaststroke, while Fero, Agapios, Stein and Pratt placed fifth in the 200 free relay. Corinne Yorkman earned a seventh-place medal in the 500 free.

"They took care of the things they needed to do last night," said Fishers coach Joe Keller. "No doubt today, they fought through the entire meet to get the job done. What an awesome job by Morgan Casey, being a state champion, really cool."

**ROYALS FINISH IN SIXTH**

Hamilton Southeastern reached a landmark by finishing sixth at this year's state meet. This is the 20th year that the Royals have placed in the top 10. Southeastern got its first top 10 finish in 1998, so the Royals have achieved that status in 20 of the past 23 years.

"I was really proud of the girls," said Southeastern coach Andy Pedersen. "They fought hard

today and they capped off this really, really good season. Just super proud of them. They swam well."

Molly Pedersen finished the day with four medals. She placed sixth in the 200 free and seventh in the 100 free, later joined Kennedy Fisher, Bri Saple and Kayleigh Witt to take sixth in the 200 free relay, then finished the meet by teaming with Abigail Harter, Witt

and Grace Newton for a sixth-place finish in the 400 free relay.

Harter also took third in the backstroke, an event she won medals in all four years of her high school career. She will swim at Purdue next year. Witt is headed to Ball State.

"I was just so proud of her, she

# Fishers falls to Northwestern

The Fishers girls basketball team's historic season came to an end last Saturday, as the No. 3-ranked Tigers fell to No. 1 Northwestern 67-40 at the Class 4A Marion regional at the Bill Green Arena.

Fishers came out ready to play, as the Tigers used back-to-back 3-pointers from Katie Burton and Kaitlynn Feagan to take an early 6-2 lead. Another Burton basket put Fishers ahead 8-4 midway through the first quarter.

But Northwestern took over after that. Kendall Bostic, one of its two star players, made a three-point play to put Northwestern up 9-8, and it never trailed again, eventually running out the first quarter and taking a 20-12 lead.

Northwestern then cruised through the second period to lead 37-19 at halftime.

"Their length on defense just gave us a lot of trouble," said Tigers coach Lauren Votaw. "We turned the ball over way more times than we have and I'm going to credit a lot of that to Northwestern. They were solid defensively and like I said, their length really bothered us. We hit some shots early, I thought we might be okay. We couldn't find a way to get the ball in the middle, which is where we felt like it was open."

Fishers continued to fight in the third quarter. Burton added another four points, then Audra Emmerson made a 3-pointer. The Tigers' freshman twins,

Hailey and Olivia Smith, provided some good minutes in the third quarter, with Hailey making a lay-in, then Olivia scoring off a steal to keep Fishers within 48-34.

Northwestern's Klair Merrell made a lay-in to end the third period and put her team up 50-34. That began a 10-0 run for Northwestern, whose defense took over again and allowed the Tigers only six points in the fourth quarter.

Burton led Fishers with 15 points, both she and Hailey Smith collected four rebounds. Lydia Stullken blocked two shots.

The Tigers finished their season with a school record 23 wins against just two losses. Fishers will graduate three seniors, Stullken,

Feagan and Tamia Perryman, who left quite a legacy for the Tigers.

"They win 23 games, which is a school record," said Votaw. "They won a (Hoosier Crossroads) Conference title outright. They won a sectional title, which we haven't done since 2014. They got the chance to be a part of not one, but two buzzer-beaters. And I just told them in there, not many high school girls basketball players get to say any of that, let alone all of that."

As for the seniors' legacy, Votaw summed it up with this:

"Sometime in the fourth quarter, I'm watching the game and Lydia Stullken - I mean, we're down 20-plus, probably, at this point - and Lydia

Stullken is going around and finding her teammates and giving high fives, because she knows that talk and touches is what keeps a group together," said

Votaw. "That is the legacy that those seniors are going to leave. That's how we do things here. We compete to the end and we're great teammates."

Fishers' J.D. Farrell finished as runner-up at 195 pounds, qualifying for state. Farrell's performance gave the Tigers 22 team points, good for 15th place.

Cathedral dominated the team standings with 150 points, followed by Warren Central with 94.5 and Roncalli with 92.5.

The state meet begins Friday evening at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Fishers hires Curt Funk as head football coach

Whenever Curt Funk and his family drove down Interstate 69 to Indianapolis, he would see the facilities at Fishers High School in plain view of the highway – including, of course, the Tigers' football field.

Funk had been the coach at Mississinewa High School for 10 years and had developed a solid championship program there. But when the Fishers position became open after the retirement of Rick Wimmer, Funk knew he had to take a chance.

"You hear all these good things about the school system and high school," said Funk. "I felt like when it was open, I had to apply and give it my best shot to get the job."

Last Wednesday, Funk's best shot paid off, as he was hired as the Tigers' new head football coach. The announcement was made at the Hamilton Southeastern Schools board meeting, where Fishers principal Jason Urban gave Funk a warm welcome, and athletic directors Rob Seymour and Jim Brown were there by his side, along with Funk's wife Janette.

Urban noted that the interview process was a rigorous one, which drew some smiles and chuckles from those in attendance. But Funk welcomed the process, saying that he "would've expected nothing less."

"That way they found the best fit for them, because I think that's the important thing with any school when they're hiring a teacher and a coach is that they find the best fit for their school," said Funk. "And with them doing their homework, they have confidence in me that I'm the best fit for their school, and so that's why I'm excited to work here, with the administration."

Funk has a solid track record as a coach. During his 10 seasons at Mississinewa, the Indians have compiled a record of 77-36, and had winning campaigns for nine consecutive years. Mississinewa has had at least 10 wins over the last four seasons, sectional titles in 2017 and 2019, going 11-2 in the latter season.

Funk served as the defensive coordinator for the 2017 North All-Star team and has been the head wrestling coach for the Indians for the past four years. Prior to his years at Mississinewa, Funk was also an assistant coach at Mooresville (2006-10), Muncie Southside (2005-06) and Bluffton (2003-05).

"With a winning record over the past nine seasons, Coach Funk has proven himself as a successful football coach," said Seymour. "However, what really excites us about Coach Funk is his dynamic personality and his passion for the success of his student athletes."

Fishers has been a remarkable story in football since the school re-opened in 2006. With Wimmer leading the way from day one, the Tigers had winning records in 11 of their 14 seasons, three sectional championships and a state title in 2010. Funk said Wimmer has laid an "awesome foundation" at Fishers, calling him a top-notch coach.

"The challenge is to build on that success, for sure," said Funk, who will teach in the physical education department at Fishers High School. He graduated from Purdue in 2003 with a BS in Industrial Technology Education and holds a K-12 certification in physical education.

Funk said he will be meeting with the players today during their lunch periods. His official start date is Feb. 24, but he is ready to meet his new team.

"I've been watching them on film," said Funk. "I know them by their numbers and their names on the roster, but I'm excited to see their faces tomorrow."

Funk graduated from Bluffton High School in 1999, where he was on the football team. He was also a standout wrestler, qualifying for the state meet during his junior and senior years. Funk finished third in the state at 152 pounds in his junior year, and won sectional and regional titles both seasons, moving up to 160 his senior year. He was also a regional qualifier at 152 his freshman and sophomore seasons.

In fact, Curt and Janette Funk's oldest son Kyler, a senior at Mississinewa, has followed in his father's wrestling footsteps. Kyler is a four-time semi-state qualifier, and made it to the state meet during his sophomore year at 182, winning a sectional title as well.

This season, Kyler has swept sectional, regional and semi-state championships at 195, qualifying for the state meet. Curt and Janette have another son, sixth-grader Camden.

Senior Sarah Ballard finished sixth in the diving, the second time she earned a medal in that event, after placing fourth as a sophomore. She will dive for Iowa next year.

**MILLERS' HUFF WINS THE BREASTSTROKE**

Noblesville junior Sammy Huff made some history on Saturday, as she became the first Millers swimmer in 10 years to win a state championship at the meet.

Huff won the breaststroke, emerging on top of a close race where the top five were separated by 0.61 seconds. After trailing by .04 seconds halfway through the race, Huff turned it on in the final 50 yards and won in a time of 1:02.87.

"It's always exciting, and being able to see the people next to you makes it even more exciting and your competitive spirit comes out in races like that," said Huff.

This is the third medal Huff has won in the breaststroke, after placing fourth last year and eighth as a freshman. She is the first state champion at the swimming/diving meet since Meghan Potee won the diving in 2010.

Huff had extra incentive for winning state: She wanted to do it for coach Rich Wolfred, who is retiring at the end of the season.

"It's Rich's last year, and I really wanted to swim it for Rich and finish his coaching career off strong," said Huff.

The Millers placed 16th as a team with 34 points. Huff also got points with an 11th-place finish in the IM. Caitlin Marshall took 15th in the butterfly, and both swimmers joined Jordan Cooley and Abby Harvey to place 14th in the medley relay.

Shamrocks edge out Huskies

Westfield won a hard-fought game with county rival Hamilton Heights last Friday at The Rock, by the score of 57-56.

The Shamrocks clinched the game with 0.3 seconds left in the fourth quarter when Nic DePasquale made two free throws. That moved Westfield ahead by one and gave the 'Rocks a second consecutive win.

It was a back-and-forth contest. The Huskies led 18-13 after the first quarter, with Issiac Hickok pouring in 13 points for Heights, including three 3-pointers. Westfield came back to tie the game at 35-35 by halftime; Cam Haffner hit two 3s and Benji Welch also had six points. Camron Knott, meanwhile, threw in three triples for the Huskies.

Heights jumped ahead 50-45 after three periods, with Gus Etchison scoring eight points, including a pair of 3s. But the Shamrocks' defense held the Huskies to six points in the fourth. DePasquale scored eight points in that quarter, going 6-of-6 from the line, including those important final two free throws.

DePasquale finished with 18 points and was 8-of-8 from the line. Westfield, in fact, was 12-of-12 in free-throw shooting as a team, with Braden Smith and Welch both going 2-for-2. Smith finished with 13 points, while Haffner scored 10.

Smith collected eight rebounds, followed by DePasquale with seven and Haffner with five. Smith also handed out six assists.

Etchison led Heights with 19 points, while Hickok scored 15. Heights had 13 3-pointers as a team; Etchison made four triples, with Knott and Hickok both draining three. Hickok, Brent Pennington and Luke
