India-based medical-tech company selects Noblesville as American headquarters

Panacea, a medical-tech and life science company in India, announced plans Wednesday to build a North American headquarters in Noblesville to expand its operations in the United States for research and development, engineering and manufacturing modern radiotherapy machines to diagnose and treat cancer.

"We're so grateful Panacea has chosen to establish its first U.S. facility in Indiana and are excited Hoosiers will be working with this innovative, cancer-curing

equipment to improve the lives of patients right here and all across the world," said Governor Eric J. Holcomb. "I had the pleasure of connecting with Panacea at an event during our economic development trip to India in October and couldn't be happier to welcome them just four months later."

Panacea plans to build a new 20,000 square-foot facility along the Interstate 69 corridor at 141st Street and Olio Road in Noblesville, with a real property investment of \$6 million and a personal property in-

vestment of \$5.7 million. Panacea plans to employ 65 full-time employees in the new headquarters by 2023. The groundbreaking is set to begin in summer 2020.

"We are excited that Panacea chose Noblesville as its headquarters to expand into North America and grow the life science and medical technology industry in our city," said Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen. "This state-of-the-art facility creates high quality, high wage jobs for engineers and scientists. These are not just jobs, but mean-

ingful jobs. The work that will be done in Noblesville is going to make people healthier across the globe."

The City of Noblesville has offered a donation of eight acres of city-owned real estate, and 10-year declining tax phase-ins for real and personal property taxes. The incentives will be presented to the Common Council at a future meeting for approval.

The Indiana Economic Development Corporation offered Panacea Medical

Indiana bill will lessen government transparency

There is currently a bill in the Indiana General Assembly (HB 1003) that if passed, would result in school systems only being obligated to post a summary of their annual performance reports in local newspapers, rather than the full report. The full report would be published on a government website.

To some, this might not sound like that big of a deal, and might even seem as to be a way to move our state more into the digital age. I would caution Hoosiers who feel that way, however. The importance of government transparency in America has always been a high priority. After all, a well-informed populace was one of the goals of our Founding Fathers. It was Thomas Jefferson who said that "whenever the people are well-informed, they can be trusted with their own government."

HB 1003 would ultimately result in less transparency from our government and school systems. Moving an Annual Performance Report from a me-

dia source that still has millions of readers to a government-run website that is visited by a few thousand a year only has one outcome: Fewer eyes watching.

One argument that could be made by supporters of HB 1003 is the cost savings effort. School systems using money from their annual budgets to post a performance report might seem like unnecessary spending in 2020 when most people in America are walking around with full-blown computers in their pockets.

So, we are faced with a question. Is it still worth the monetary commitment to continue to post full reports in local newspapers? I say yes.

Depending on the school system prices may vary, but on average school systems in Hamilton County have paid \$602.56 to local newspapers to post their annual reports. The average annual budget for the same school systems is \$96,586,573.79.

Several lawmakers have jumped on board to sponsor or co-author the bill also.

Fishers Council gets first look at Iron Pointe

Under its new policy of reviewing development projects on first reading before the Plan Commission holds a public hearing, the Fishers City Council reviewed the proposed plans for Iron Pointe.

According to the de-

veloper, Pulte Homes, the residential project to be constructed south of 106th Street near Mollenkopf Road will be marketed to empty nesters.

When asked by Councilwoman Sam DeLong about the price of the units, the developer said it would be in the middle of the market in cost. In a filing with the city, Pulte says the price range is expected to be between \$350,000 and \$450,000.

During the community comment period near the end of the council session, Dr. Denise Rehffuss, a physician practicing in Anderson who recently made Fishers her home, was critical of the Iron Pointe proposal because of its cost and generally said that many people she knows in Anderson work in Fishers but cannot afford to live here.

"I have a lot of concerns about the Iron Pointe community," Rehffuss told

council members. "The proposed pricing for these single-family units is hardly affordable. I actually participate in an organization where I am involved with a lot of seniors ... none of them in that group would be able to afford the pricing for these homes."

The Iron Pointe development will have a public hearing before the Fishers Plan Commission, then will return to the city council for further action.

Among those lawmakers is Representative Tony Cook of District 32. His involvement with this bill is particularly troubling to me since there are still large parts of the district that don't have access to quality internet, according to statistics from the Purdue Center for Regional Development. Again, ensuring that the Indiana government is as transparent as possible should be a top priority, but HB 1003 seems to indicate otherwise from our lawmakers.

The worst part about HB 1003 is found in what the rest of the bill contains. Changes to our education system that need to happen are in this bill. However, some of our legislators have decided to package the very good aspects of the bill with this terrible provision. The public's access to school annual reports must not be limited, nor should it be.

By continuing to publish the reports in local newspapers, the public can continue to hold our legislators and school systems accountable. Indiana's education system in K-12 is doing incredible on a national scale, but that does not diminish the significance of being transparent.

The Indiana General Assembly has shown a commitment to improving our public school systems across the state. They should be commended for that. They also should be ridiculed when they make mistakes. HB 1003 would be a mistake.

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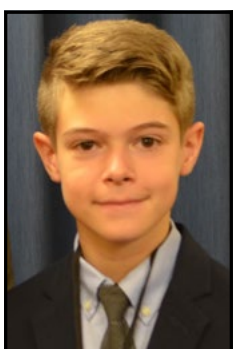




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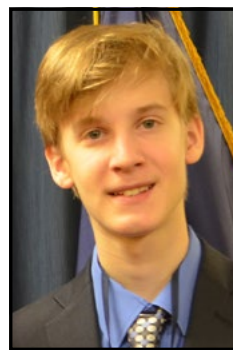
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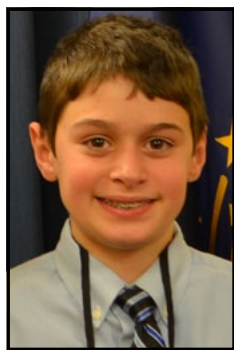

Shaffer questions taste, design of Hotel Carmichael

Dear Editor:

Hotel Carmichael is a luxury hotel, Carmel city hall elites claim.

Not being an expert, I contacted a good friend with decades of experience as a luxury hotel interior decorating consultant. Clients literally around the globe ask for insights when opulence is needed – from Dubai to Hong Kong and all points in between.

Here's what my friend's professional, practiced eye immediately found unusual: The exterior is a neo-classical and Second Empire hybrid that comes off both odd and banal. Inside, the lobby lounge appears clubby without the modern lifestyle features other upscale hotels offer routinely. Perhaps it is the renderings, but my friend found the lobby stiff. And that was the generous part of the observation.

Making things worse, the analysis came before the stone exterior changed to brick, the slate roof changed to shingles and the marble lobby flooring changed to ceramics.

More fitting for a midwestern, middle class suburb, my friend suggests, would have been a pure Federalist or a pure Americana, even a Mid-Century Modern look.

In architecture, as in life, it seems simple is classy and hybrid is banal.

"Too late for a course correction?" my friend asked.

Too late, indeed; \$58.5 million too late.

Why do Fishers Junior High School students join We The People? It's a class and a competition with other schools. It's all about civic knowledge.

The current and past members of the Junior High team told the Fishers City Council Monday night that working with others on a team – where you may have people with varying political views on that team – is a valuable learning experience.

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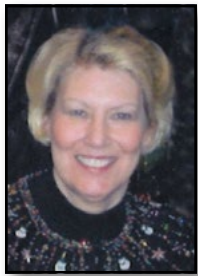
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Jean Ann Morris

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Gymnastics Millers win dual, prepare for sectional

NOBLESVILLE - If a sports team measures success by improvement throughout a season, then the Noblesville gymnastics team has definitely had a successful season.

The Millers finished up the regular season on Wednesday by hosting Crawfordsville in a dual meet at Noblesville East Middle School. The Millers won the meet 88.00-84.225, marking their second-highest score of the season. Noblesville had scored an 88.70 earlier in the year.

"Honestly, I was hoping we'd get into the 90s for today," said Millers coach Jody Ramey. "We're going to get there for sectionals."

And considering the fact that Noblesville scored a 79.05 in its first meet of the year, the team has come a long way.

"Looking at where we started this season and where we are ending, it's huge," said Ramey. "Especially with half of these girls being beginners, starting out."

Sophomore Hailey Knoll had the Millers' highest score of the night, with an 8.425 securing her a first-place finish in the vault. Ramey has been pleased with Knoll's consistency throughout the season.

"I know what's coming from her for every competition," said Ramey. "I'm very proud of her for all she's doing so far."

Freshman Kiera Harper was the top all-around athlete for Noblesville, taking second with a score of 31.375. Harper won the floor exercise with an 8.30 and the balance beam with a 7.90.

Harper just had her first competition last weekend, this after sitting out from competitive gymnastics for the past year. Ramey said Harper only had 11 practices before her first meet.

"That's tough, coming in after a whole year of being off," said Ramey. "She's kind of just at the beginning of the season, so to speak. She's got bigger things up her sleeve for sectionals, that we're going to save until sectionals."

Another high point was Grace Bastin, who returned from injury to deliver a strong performance in the floor exercise. She scored 7.15 for her Wednesday night routine.
