Spartz protects transparency

State Senator ensuring you know about school performance

A bill, co-authored by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero), seeking to remove publication of school districts' Annual Performance Reports from newspapers has been amended to protect your right to government transparency, thanks to State Sen. Victoria Spartz (R-Noblesville).
House Bill 1003 (HB 1003) was originally written so school districts would only be required to publish a summary of the performance report with an explanation on

how the report can be found on the Department of Education's website. This week the bill was amended in the State Senate to remove the portion that would push school performance reports onto state websites exclusively.
"We amended the bill and took out the language that would eliminate the notice requirements and use just a summary," Spartz told The Reporter.
Spartz said the definition of the summary in the original bill was "convoluted"

and it would not be transparent enough. She said it effectively eliminated the requirement for informing the public.
Spartz said there are several reasons this amendment was necessary.
"Some of the areas [of the state] don't even have broadband internet, so they do not even have access to the state website," Spartz said. "Second of all, everything is so buried on this website that you can't even find it. We can never have enough transpar-

ency with taxpayers, and I think it should be available by every means, not just by one means. The more transparency we have the better off we are."
According to Reporter Publisher Jeff Jellison, "The Annual School Performance Report is arguably the most important report produced by school districts. The report includes information such as student enrollment, number of certified teachers, teacher salary ranges, attendance rates, A-F ratings, percentages of students passing standardized

Fishers City Council approves new open space real estate rules for commercial properties

The Fishers City Council gave final approval to new open space standards at its most recent meeting. The vote to approve was 8-1, with Councilman Todd Zimmerman voting no.
Zimmerman said he could not determine the impact this action will have on small businesses and entrepreneurs, and that resulted in his no vote.

The Fishers Plan Commission held a public hearing on the proposal, sparking a spirited discussion, particularly among three city council members on the Plan Commission: Brad DeReamer, Pete Peterson and Zimmerman.
The Monday vote establishes a fee schedule for open spaces, but business owners can avoid the fee by displaying public art in the open space.
City Planning and Zoning Director Tony Bagato said his staff will review the first two years of this action, then consider recommending further changes if needed.

Hamilton County Tourism among best places to work in Indiana

Hamilton County Tourism was recently selected as one of the Best Places to Work in Indiana. This is the third year the non-profit has been recognized by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce and Best Companies Group.
The Best Places to Work statewide survey and awards program honors participating employers with leading workplace cultures. The list names 125 companies with Hamilton County Tourism being one of them in the small employer category.
"We are aware of the importance of talent attraction and retention and want

to keep our amazing team engaged," said Tina Rodgers, director of resources for Hamilton County Tourism. "We provide opportunities for people to be challenged and make an impact while also taking time to recognize and celebrate their accomplishments."
To be considered for participation, companies had to fulfill these eligibility requirements:
• Be a for-profit, not-for-profit business or government entity;
• Be a publicly or privately held business;
• Have a facility in Indiana;

• Have at least 15 employees working in Indiana; and
• Be in business a minimum of one year.
Companies then entered a two-part survey process. The first part consisted of evaluating each nominated company's workplace policies, practices, philosophy, systems and demographics. The second part was an employee survey to measure the employee experience. Best Companies Group managed the overall registration and survey process, analyzed the data and determined the final rankings.
Specific company rankings will be

unveiled April 30 at an awards dinner at the Indiana Convention Center in downtown Indianapolis, sponsored by Ivy Tech Community College.

tests, and school suspensions including suspensions and expulsions for weapons, drugs and alcohol.”

Spartz credits State Sen. Jim Raatz (R-Richmond) with helping push this amendment through the committee. At Spartz’s behest, Raatz added the amendment himself. Because Raatz is a sponsor of bill and the Chairman

of the Senate Education and Career Development Committee, Spartz told The Reporter she believes this amended version will pass in the House.

Now that the amended version of HB 1003 has passed through committee, it will go before the entire Senate for a vote. Assuming it passes the Senate as Spartz predicts, it will then go back

to the House of Representatives, where members can either accept or reject the amended version.

Spartz told The Reporter she is confident this new version of HB 1003 will ultimately become law.

Daniel Bragg, a Republican candidate for Indiana House District 32, which is currently represented by Rep. Tony Cook, recently

wrote a column in The Reporter about how the original language of HB 1003 was a mistake.

When Bragg learned HB 1003 had been amended to protect public notices, he told The Reporter, “This is a victory for government transparency in Indiana. Our government should not be seeking out ways to limit the public’s ability to see im-

portant information. Being able to see the performance of their local school systems should be important to people of the communities, and by amending HB 1003, the General Assembly is protecting that right.”

Spartz sees this amendment as an aspect of government transparency.

“It is always important to have oversight and transpar-

ency,” Spartz said. “We need to have more transparency and simplicity in the government.”

Editor’s note: While State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) co-authored the original version of the bill, it was supported by State Representatives Goodrich, Schai-bley, Huston and Torr; all of whom represent portions of Hamilton County.

trip to Washington, D.C. for the national competition. This year it is scheduled for April 24-26. The competition is open to any high school in Indiana.

As the top scoring team in the Indiana competition this year, the Eman School – Fishers, Team 2, will be among 50 other high schools across the nation who will be competing for the top score and an educational mission trip to Doha, Qatar.

In recent years, the Eman School has come within a few points of winning, and this year they achieved the top score.

Mia Sankari, Academic WorldQuest 2020 Team Leader and Assistant Principal of the Eman School -

Fishers, remarked, "We are SO EXCITED! We are having our kids revamp and up their low score sections so hopefully at Nationals we will be even better prepared for the competition."

Mia Sankari said, "Our students have a strong background in world affairs because they hail from about 40 different countries and many of the problems that they are learning about they know firsthand from their families or relatives still living in these countries."

Carmel High School teams, Teams 3 and 4, tied for second place in the competition. John Carter, Academic Coach for Carmel High School teams that marked top scores for

the last three years, has been named Indiana Distinguished Teacher by the Indiana Council for the Social Studies at its Annual Conference last November for his leadership with Academic WorldQuest.

At the competition last Saturday, Carter remarked that Academic WorldQuest was a positive experience for his high school students. He said, "We started preparing early in the school year for this competition. Each year, we have more and more students who want to be part of the program."

In welcoming remarks, Carmel resident and Indiana Council on World Affairs President Larry Cimino said, "We have

been presenting educational programs about world affairs for more than 50 years. What goes on around the world really does affect us."

The Indiana Council on World Affairs offers educational programs on matters of global significance. One of its programs, the Great Decisions series, has been held at Carmel High School for several recent years and is now held at the Indiana Interchurch Center. Great Decisions is free for high students.

An additional program, Distinguished Speakers, features presentations by diplomats, journalists, universities and business leaders who address international matters.

Suspect in multiple bank robberies arrested after Carmel bank heist

Police in Carmel have arrested two suspects in connection to a Thursday afternoon bank robbery, police say.

According to Carmel Police Department, officers were called to Lake City Bank located at 9640 N. Michigan Rd just before 1 p.m. on reports of the bank being robbed.

Officers confirmed a male suspect fled the bank with an undetermined amount of cash. Shortly after the robbery, police say two suspects were arrested.

"There is no danger to the public at this time and the investigation is ongoing," the Carmel Police Department said in a Facebook post Thursday afternoon.

An FBI spokesperson confirmed to News 8 that one of the suspects arrested was James Taylor of Indianapolis. Taylor was previously being sought in connection to multiple bank robberies in Marion County.

The identity of the other suspect in Thursday's robbery has not yet been released.

Over the course of my 91 years, I have overcome some of life's most difficult circumstances and challenges. From conquering polio as a child to surviving as a prisoner of war in Korea, I know what it takes to have faith, persevere and ultimately tackle whatever life throws at me.

Throughout my life's journey I have discovered that any challenge, no matter how significant it may seem, cannot be overcome alone. As Americans, we have a strong sense of personal duty, but we must never forget how important it is to trust in and lean on our fellow men and women. Without that trust, we risk losing our place as the greatest country in the world.

Last year, I was reading our local newspaper and noticed an article about a nurse, farmer and businesswoman – Beth Henderson – who was running for Indiana's 5th Congressional District. Beth's unique background and skillset piqued my interest so much that my wife, Jaci, and I went to Beth's website. There we saw a video of Beth riding her horses and saying she was running for Congress to "rein" in the socialists in Washington.

As a lifelong animal lover, spending part of my life as a sta-

Boys swimming sectionals

County swimmers advance to finals

The boys swimming post-season began on Thursday with the sectional preliminaries, the first step on the road to the state finals.

Carmel hosted one of the sectionals this season, and the Greyhounds had a very successful evening, qualifying all 27 of their swimmers into the championship heat of Saturday's sectional finals. Carmel earned the top seed in each event. Jake Mitchell earned the first seed in the 200 and 500 freestyles, while Wyatt Davis is top seeded in the individual medley and the backstroke.

Other Greyhounds top seeds are William Kok in the 50 free, Gus Rothrock in the butterfly, Griffin Hadley in the 100 free, Ryan Malicki in the breaststroke, the medley relay team of Davis, Malicki, Hadley and Andrew Robertson, the 200 free relay team of Christopher Holmes, Robertson, Kok and Rothrock, and the 400 free relay team of Kayden Lancaster, Ethan Johns, Brandon Edwards and Mitchell.

"I thought the team performed pretty well tonight," said Carmel coach Chris Plumb. "Got all top eight swimmers coming back on Saturday." The coach said that it "always feels good to emerge from the first part of this meet knowing you have all the opportunities you need" to be successful in the Saturday finals.

Westfield sent 25 swimmers into the Saturday finals, qualifying 19 for the championship heat and six more to the consolation heat. The Shamrocks' 400 free relay team of Cooper Tinsley, Evan Lake, Evan Lesniewski and Jack Finnegan earned the third seed in that event, with Cameron Clayton getting the third seed in the butterfly.

Westfield coach Darrick Thomas said his team swam "really, really well. The athletes that needed to step up to make it through in the right spots did that."

"It was a great night for us as a team," said Thomas.

Noblesville qualified 24 swimmers for the finals, 12 each in the championship and consolation heat. The Millers' medley relay

led the way, with Cameron Kramer, Aidan Biddle, Eduard Buna and Nicholas Beeson earning the second seed in that event.

"Those that needed to go faster did," said Noblesville coach Rich Wolfred. "We had some kids that were outside the top 16 that got in, like a lot of kids that had never been in this meet before, so that was cool to see."

Guerin Catholic had two swimmers qualify for the championship heat and five advance to the consolations. Quinn Sweeney got the seventh seed in the 200 free, and joined Johannes Hoffman, Dane Leonard and Grant Bricking to earn the eighth seed in the 200 free relay.

Over at the Fishers sectional, Hamilton Southeastern qualified all 27 of its swimmers into the championship heat. That includes four top seeds for the Royals: DJ Rogers in the 50 free, Keegan Streett in the 100 free, Zack Bostock in the breaststroke and the 200 free relay team of Logan Hess, Connor Harrison, Thomas Reising and Evan Sellers.

The Tigers also advanced all 27 swimmers to the finals, placing 25 in the championship heat and two in the consolations. Fishers had five top seeds, with Aaron Frollo placing first in the 200 and 500 freestyles. Kyle Ponsler took the top seed in the IM. The Tigers also have two top-seeded relays: Logan Ayres, Alejandro Garcia, Israel Harding and Keaton Chop in the medley relay and Frollo, Ponsler, Jackson Carlile and Daniel Bennett in the 400 free relay.

Hamilton Heights had 11 swimmers advance to the finals, sending three to the championship heat and eight to the consolations. The Huskies 400 free relay team of Joe Ringer, Grant Forrer, Josh Snay and Eli VanHaaren earned the fifth seed.

At the North Central sectional, University sent 10 swimmers into the Saturday finals, with four making the championship heat and six advancing to the consolations. Keegan Priest earned the top seed in the backstroke.

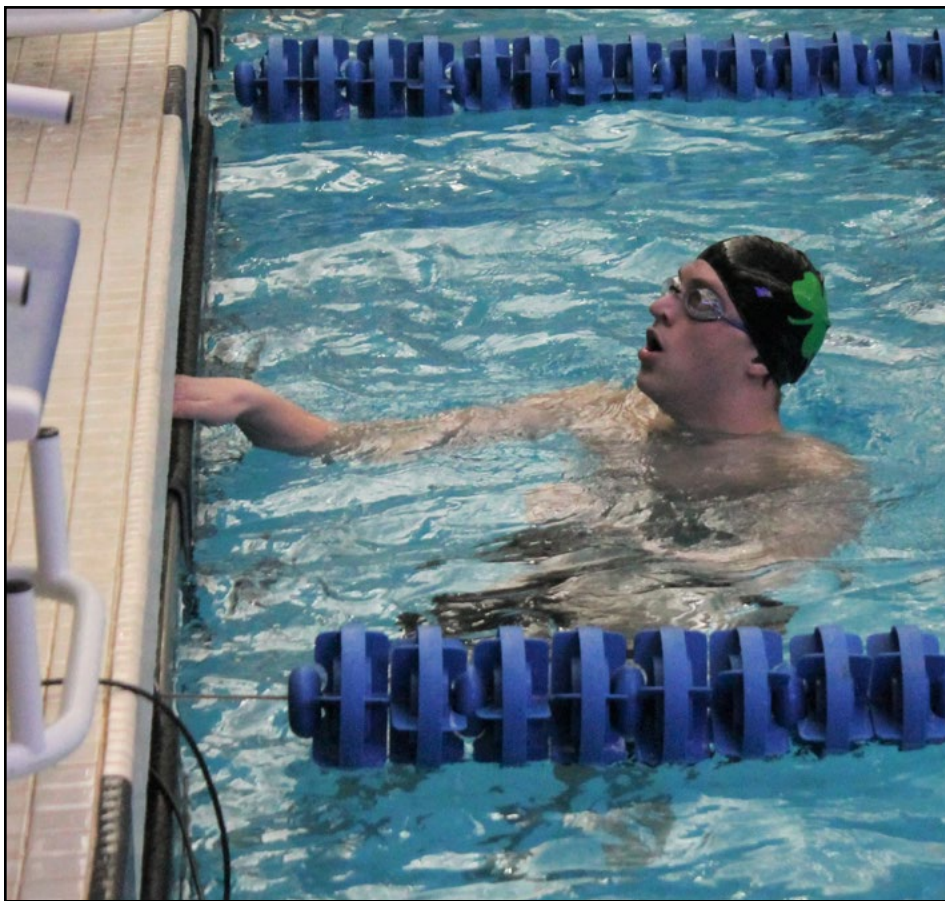
