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Spartz protects transparency

State Senator ensuring you know about school performance

A bill, co-authored by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero), seeking to remove publication of school districts' Annual Performance Reports from newspapers has been amended to protect your right to government transparency, thanks to State Sen. Victoria Spartz (R-Noblesville).

House Bill 1003 (HB 1003) was originally written so school districts would only be required to publish a summary of the performance report with an explanation on how the report can be found on the Department of Education's website. This week the bill was amended in the State Senate to remove the portion that would push school performance reports onto state websites exclusively.

"We amended the bill and took out the language that would eliminate the notice requirements and use just a summary," Spartz told The Reporter.

Spartz said the definition of the summary in the original bill was "convoluted"

and it would not be transparent enough. She said it effectively eliminated the requirement for informing the public.

Spartz said there are several reasons this amendment was necessary.

"Some of the areas [of the state] don't even have broadband internet, so they do not even have access to the state website," Spartz said. "Second of all, everything is so buried on this website that you can't even find it. We can never have enough transparency with taxpayers, and I think it should be available by every means, not just by one means. The more transparency we have the better off we are."

Spartz credits State Sen. Jim Raatz (R-Richmond) with helping push this amendment through the committee. At Spartz's behest, Raatz added the amendment himself. Because Raatz is a sponsor of bill and the Chairman of the Senate Education and Career Development Committee, Spartz told The Reporter she believes

this amended version will pass in the House.

Now that the amended version of HB 1003 has passed through committee, it will go before the entire Senate for a vote. Assuming it passes the Senate as Spartz predicts, it will then go back to the House of Representatives, where members can either accept or reject the amended version.

Spartz told The Reporter she is confident this new version of HB 1003 will ultimately become law.

Spartz sees this amendment as an aspect of government transparency.

"It is always important to have oversight and transparency," Spartz said. "We need to have more transparency and simplicity in the government."

Editor's note: While State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) co-authored the original version of the bill, it was supported by State Representatives Goodrich, Schaibley, Huston and Torr; all of whom represent portions of Hamilton County.

Medical-tech company to build new HQ in Noblesville

Panacea, a medical-tech and life science company in India, announced plans last Wednesday to build a North American headquarters in Noblesville to expand its operations in the United States for research and development, engineering and manufacturing modern radiotherapy machines to diagnose and treat cancer.

Panacea plans to build a new 20,000 square-foot facility along the Interstate 69 corridor at 141st Street and Olivo Road in Noblesville, with a real property investment of \$6 million and a personal property investment of \$5.7 million. Panacea plans to employ 65 full-time employees in the new headquarters by 2023. The groundbreaking is set to begin in summer 2020.

"We are excited that Panacea chose Noblesville as its headquarters to expand

Six HHMS robotics teams qualify for state championship

Six robotics teams from Hamilton Heights Middle School (HHMS) will head to the 2020 Indiana VEX Robotics State Championship after qualifying at various competitions held earlier this season. This is the third year that HHMS has sent multiple teams to the state competition.

The Indiana VEX Robotics State Championship is the largest state robotics competition in the nation, with 385 teams competing. Teams

are eligible to compete by winning a state-qualifying award at a local competition. HHMS teams qualified at the regular season tournaments earlier in the school year.

"Last year, we had four teams qualify for state, so having six teams in attendance is going to be a very awesome experience for us," said Lacy Bowyer, HHMS Robotics Teacher and Robotics Coach. "Our students have taken robotics to the next level. We have some of the best

builders, drivers, programmers and engineering notebooks in the state. Many of our team members are in their first year, but it hasn't stopped them for stepping up and competing with the best of the best."

First year member Ian Wilson said robotics has taught him how to learn from mistakes and never give up.

When asked what his favorite part of robotics was, seventh grader Enzo Christy said, "I really enjoy programming and getting to

hang out with friends. Programming has taught me how to get creative because I have to plan which route my robot will take in order to score the most points."

Fishers City Council has first party-line vote

In last year's city elections, two Democrats were elected to the council, for the first time in anyone's memory. At last Monday's meeting, council members split a vote along party lines for the first time.

Councilwoman Jocelyn Vare, a Democrat, proposed an amendment to a measure restoring a past policy of having the council review planning and zoning items before sending the proposal to the Plan Commission. Vare's amendment originally proposed inserting a phrase in the council procedures to utilize Roberts Rules of Order, citing a suggestion by AIM, the statewide association of cities and towns.

Councilman Brad DeReamer cautioned against the idea, saying it caused problems when he was mayor of Greenfield, due to the technicalities in Roberts' rules. Vare changed her

amendment simply to state that the council, once a motion is made and is seconded, will allow council comments before a vote is taken.

Vare's amendment was seconded by her fellow Democrat on the council, Sam DeLong. Republican councilors objected, saying council presidents always allow for council comments before calling a vote.

Vare made it clear that while she has no objections to the way Council President Cecilia Coble has been running the meetings, she argued the rules should be in the procedures so it is written down as a council rule for the future.

Vare's amendment was voted down 7-2, with Democrats Vare and DeLong the only yes votes. All Republicans on the council voted against Vare's amendment.

The measure on first readings being presented to council members before going to the Plan Commission for a public hearing passed the council last Monday.

Commissioners may rethink roundabout at 141st Street/State Road 37 in Fishers

Budget concerns for the State Road 37 project in Fishers could result in the scuttling of plans to provide an east-west roundabout on 141st Street and State Road 37, but nothing has been decided officially. The rising cost of construction is cited as the reason for possibly rethinking the project.

Minutes from a Jan. 31 Hamilton County Commissioners meeting question whether the roundabout at 141st Street and State Road 37 in Fishers will be constructed as originally planned, possibly in favor of a right-in/right-out design. According to those minutes, Commissioner Christine Altman said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness recently asked her whether county officials are "committed on 141st Street or not."

"Altman's impression was we were going to jettison 141st Street in terms of major improvements to avoid costs if we had to," according to the minutes published on the Hamilton County website.

"The City of Fishers had a conversation with the Commissioner due to the projected cost increases to discuss

Michelle Furgason and Susan Sherer-Vincent partnered with the Sheriff’s Office to establish the new

Wellness Unit. Furgason is a Licensed Mental Health Counselor Associate and a National Certified Counselor. Sherer-Vincent’s resumé includes: Licensed Clinical Social Worker, Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, and Certified Alcoholism Counselor.

contingencies related to the project if we are faced with overruns,” the city said when asked for comment.

What would 141st Street and State Road 37 look like if the roundabout is scuttled? Once again, according to the meeting minutes, Hamilton County Highway Director Bradley Davis told commissioners “there is the option to go

to right-in, right-out at that location. That has not been 100 percent decided if that is a good thing to do from a logistic/traffic standpoint.”

Davis added that the 146th Street and 131st Street interchanges were designed with the assumption that there would be a single-lane roundabout overpass at State Road 37 at 141st Street, and added traffic to the other two

adjacent routes would be impacted if the 141st Street connection to State Road 37 ended up as a right-in/right-out intersection.

“We are currently analyzing for traffic impacts and cost savings,” the city said on the possibility of switching 141st at State Road 37 to a right-in/right-out. “Work continues to move forward to acquire

right-of-way and finalize designs for the planned interchange. If construction costs (labor, right-of-way land values, utility, etc.) continue to rise at the rate we’ve seen since 2015 when this was originally estimated, there is a possibility that we construct a RIRO (right-in/right-out).”

Hamilton Southeastern Schools is poised to sign contracts with the City of Fishers, Hub & Spoke, Purdue University and Purdue Polytechnic that will provide new and innovative educational experiences for local high school students.

During a work session last Tuesday, board members were briefed on the status of negotiations.

Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) are in the works with both the city and Hub & Spoke to provide space for students to become involved in the building trades. The Hub & Spoke building is envisioned as a center for the building trades, including training opportunities for adults and high school students.

Matt Kegley, Executive Director of Secondary Education for HSE Schools, briefed

the board on the status of negotiations with the City of Fishers, Hub & Spoke, Purdue University and Purdue Polytechnic. An agreement with Purdue is needed to deal with licensing and trademark issues dealing with the use of Purdue’s name.

Based on Kegley’s briefing, most or all the contracts may be ready for approval at the next regular school board meeting, scheduled for March 11.

Understand this, part 2

Editor's Note: The Sheridan Student Column is brought to readers by Sheridan High School's 10th grade English class, taught by Abby Williams.

Hey fellow readers! It's Sidney here, back with Part 2! Enjoy!

I'm about to explain breeding, so if goat sex bothers you, skip this paragraph. Bucks STINK. Goats have breeding seasons. For the boys, it's called being in rut and for the girls it's called being in heat. Girls in heat are needier; they cry constantly and hump each other. It can last for a few hours to a few days. For bucks, being in rut lasts months.

If you've ever smelled skunk, it's like perfume compared to my buck, Angus. He pees on his beard and into his mouth. The stink follows me wherever I go. It doesn't matter how many times I shower a day; I still smell like nasty buck. The first time I smelled him, I legit about vomited. I have to schedule when I let him in with my girls to line up when they will give birth, which is during my spring break. I have to watch him to make sure he impregnates the girls.

The gestation period for goats is about five months. During those months, I'm watching the girls' bellies to see growth patterns. I have to make sure they're gaining weight and keeping it on. Goats have fat pads under their tails and I feel that to



see if the girls are at a good weight. Sometimes, I have to keep weight off of my goats. If they're too fat, they can miscarry. I also make sure their udder is bagging up nicely. If the sides are uneven, it could mean infection in the udder and the kids can't drink the milk.

Once spring hits, my stress level goes up to the top. I'm out in the barn constantly, checking under the goats' tails to see if they're about to go (give birth). If they're about to go, their tail "dislocates" itself to make room for the kid coming out.

The birthing experience is beautiful, but it's also dangerous. The best way for a kid to come out is front feet and head first. I've had to stick my hand in my goat to reposition the kid. The kid was so big that I had to help my doe pull her out. Because of this, her uterus tore. I put a solution in there daily for a week or so to clean it out and help it heal.

Once the babies are born, I bring them in the house. It's pretty cold when the girls give birth and kids come out pretty wet and bloody. I dry the babies off and make sure they're warm. I also cut their umbilical cord until there's about three inches left and then I dip it in iodine to sterilize it and to also let it shrivel up and eventually fall off. I then run back outside to milk my doe for her colostrum. Colostrum is a

rich, golden-colored milk packed with nutrients for babies. It's made for the babies' first drink. I strain the milk to make sure no hair or skin falls into the pan. I then have to teach the babies how to take a bottle.

Yes! I take the babies away from the mamas. Doing this makes it easier to make sure the babies are drinking enough milk daily. It also makes it easier to measure the amount of milk my does are producing and to not ruin the udder for showing. It also lowers the risk of infection in the udder and ensures no cuts are on the teats from baby teeth.

The babies stay in the house for the remainder of my spring break. They are fed four to five times a day. Once school starts up again, they are fed three times a day. My mom and dad help with this, and for that I am so thankful. My mom gets up early for work anyway so she warms up the milk in the morning to let me sleep in for an extra 20 minutes. As soon as I get home from school, I warm up the milk and go feed them, and at night I go out and feed the babies as late as possible as they had eaten not too long ago.

After about a month and a half to two months, I switch to feeding them two times a day. I get cuts on my fingers from slippery, milky-faced babies. I do this all during school and the whole summer.

The School Corporation's current debt service levy is \$31,083,228 and the current rate is \$0.9108. After the School Corporation enters into the proposed Lease and the bonds are issued, the debt service levy will increase by a maximum of \$3,000,000 and the debt service rate will increase by a maximum of \$0.0895. However, as existing obligations mature, it is anticipated there will not be an increase to the Debt Service Fund tax rate.

Carmel, HSE win team championships

The Carmel boys swimming team rolled to another sectional championship last Saturday afternoon at its home pool.

The Greyhounds scored 558 points to claim their 13th consecutive sectional title and 33rd overall. In addition, Carmel won 11 of the 12 events and qualified 23 swims to next weekend's IHSAA state finals.

Other winners for HSE were DJ Rogers in the 50 free, AJ Ricafort in diving, Keegan Streett in the 100 free and Marcus Eden in the backstroke. All of the swimmers advance to the Friday state preliminaries, while Ricafort heads to Fort Wayne on Tuesday for the diving regional.

Ricafort will be joined in the diving regional by teammates Jack Bisesi and Gabe Ruiz, who placed fifth and seventh respectively to earn qualifying spots. Southeastern also had three state cut swim times: Streett in the 200 free, Rogers in the 100

then held off a Franklin Central comeback in the fourth.



The Shamrocks finished HCC play 4-3 and are 15-6 overall. They return to The Rock on Tuesday to host Frankfort for their regular-season finale.



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
