

### Statewide invasive species conference set for March 26

#### The REPORTER

The Indiana Invasives Initiative (III) will hold its first statewide conference on Thursday, March 26 at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds and Conference Center. The conference will run from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is packed with speakers and information. The event will provide technical training, the latest updates and research on invasive species, and an overview of Indiana's Terrestrial Plant Rule, which becomes enforceable in April.

Anyone with a personal or professional interest in invasive species management, CISMA representatives, park professionals, land managers, foresters, arborists, contractors, farmers, landscape professionals or watershed managers will want to come. The goal is to share information and build partnerships across the state. Registration is \$25 per person and can be done online. The conference is expected to draw 300 attendees and sponsorships are available at various levels. More information is available at **sicim.info**.

The agenda includes evaluating the future impacts of invasive species and the impact on forest health, soils and watersheds. There will be a session on management techniques, updates on some invasive threats and a session on the role of native plants in supporting biodiversity in soils, arthropods and birds. There will also be a rollout of a new native woody alternative app, a pocket guide update for the Terrestrial Plant Rule, and information on the status of the Indiana Invasive Initiative and Sen- ence, call (812) 653-5563.

### **Former Veterans Service Officer** speaks out against commissioners

#### Dear Editor.

In the Jan. 29 article in The Reporter, "Commissioners temporarily rescind appointment of Veteran Service Officer," what it failed to tell the readers and veterans of Hamilton County is that this has been an ongoing pattern of violating the law.

I was fired as the County Veteran Service Officer because I had fallen behind on filing claims. What was NOT reported in the Dec. 12 article, "Veteran Service officer relieved of duties," about my firing was that I had been and still was on FMLA because of a carpal tunnel surgery with major complications and ongoing dexterity issues and chronic pain.

Ms. Charles and State District Service Officer Mark Smith were able to use my two-year ongoing medical disability to get me removed. It was their plan so she could get my job because I had refused to bring her on full-time back in June 2019. There was no funding approved for a second full-time position in the office. She felt that since she had just completed her one-week accreditation training she was due a full-time position.

Charles is not eligible to replace full-time and will be going before me, but the Commissioners are do- the County Council on March 4 to

# Noblesville wins bowling state title

The Noblesville bowling team's march to a state championship in 2020 began at the state finals of 2019.

Last year's Noblesville team finished fourth in the state, but took away lessons from that day as it watched Ben Davis win the team title. Those lessons have been learned well, as Noblesville won the 2020 boys state championship, which took place Feb. 1 at Championship Lanes in Anderson.

"We watched Ben Davis take the championship that day and knew what we needed to improve on to become the 2020 State Champs," said Millers coach Jamie Elliott.

Noblesville qualified first during the team portion of the state finals, scoring a 2306. That gave the team a bye into the stepladder championship match, where it beat Terre Haute South 394-359 to win the championship.

"We worked on spare conversions all season long," said Elliott. "Much like a basketball team practices free throws I would expect. It paid off well."

Noblesville began its run to state by winning the White River Valley I sectional, which took place Jan. 10 and 11, also at Championship Lanes. The Millers also finished first in the team portion to earn a bye into the stepladder final, where they beat Elwood 457-435.

Noblesville hosted the regional at Bowl 32 on Jan. 18, where it finished third in the qualifying portion. The Millers lost in the first stepladder match to South Ripley 382-311, but still advanced to the next level.

That next level was the Kokomo semi-state, which took place Jan. 25 at Heritage Lanes. Noblesville finished fourth in the team standings, one of six teams to qualify for state and also earning another spot in the stepladder round. The Millers beat Centerville 357-301 and Terre Haute South 356-354 to advance to the championship, where they narrowly fell to Richmond 363-356.

In addition to the team success, several Noblesville individuals had good also won the 2020 Indiana Bakers Classeasons as well. Smith advanced to the stepladder, where she dropped a close 190-185 match to Alexandria's Genna Martin. Smith rebounded at the regional, where she won the individual girls championship. Taylor was first in the qualifying with a 661, earned a bye into the stepladder final, then beat Hamilton Heights' Kylee Trexler 177-173 for the title.
