



Hamilton County prepares for coronavirus

Local governments announce plans following first case in state

Health officials announced the state's first case of coronavirus last Friday.

A Marion County resident was hospitalized at Community North Hospital, just south of Fishers, after testing positive for the virus.

Immediately following the announcement, the Fishers Crisis Response Team assembled to implement a response plan in the event Fishers would need to respond to a case of coronavirus. The cities of Noblesville and Carmel, along with Hamilton County government officials, have followed suit, announcing preparation steps in their communities.

The Hamilton County Commissioners, along with the Ham-

ilton County Health Department and Emergency Management Agency (EMA), are preparing citizens and employees for the possibility of a COVID-19 outbreak.

"We are monitoring and managing the situation," said County Commissioner Christine Altman. "We are reviewing our pandemic flu and infectious disease plans and are ready to implement them if needed."

The Health Department and Emergency Management team are working directly with local hospitals, health care providers, and local cities and towns to ensure everyone is kept in the loop.

"The biggest thing is getting ahead of it," said Shane Booker, executive director of Hamil-

ton County's EMA. "We went through a very similar situation in 2010 with the H1N1 virus. There were a lot of the same concerns then that there are now. The good news is the H1N1 virus taught us a lot that helps us prepare now."

Currently there are no known cases of COVID-19 in Hamilton County or the State of Indiana. Much is still unknown about how the virus spreads. In the mean-

time, the Hamilton County Health Department encourages anyone with symptoms of acute respiratory illness to stay home.

"The primary symptoms are fever, cough and shortness of breath," said Chris Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the Hamilton County Health Department. "To prevent the spread of COVID-19, citizens should wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or clean them often with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer of at least 60 percent alcohol. Also consider routine cleaning of frequently touched surfaces, especially in the workplace."

Last Wednesday, Carmel police responded to a weapons complaint in the 10200 block of Westfield Boulevard. The suspect fled the scene prior to officers' arrival. Officers determined a single shot was fired during an altercation but did not strike anyone. A victim on the scene did suffer minor injuries as a result of the altercation.

The suspect, Richard N. Atwell, 38, Fishers, was later apprehended with the assistance of the Morgan County Sheriff's Department. Atwell was booked into the Morgan County Jail under the following Hamilton County charges:

- Burglary with a deadly weapon – Level 2 Felony
- Armed Robbery – Taking property by force while armed (attempted) – Level 3 Felony
- Armed Robbery – Taking property putting someone in fear while armed with deadly weapon (attempted) – Level 3 Felony

- Criminal Confinement while armed with a deadly weapon – Level 3 Felony
- Intimidation with a deadly weapon – Level 5 Felony
- Domestic Battery by means of a deadly weapon – Level 5 Felony
- Criminal recklessness – shooting a firearm into a building – Level 5 Felony
- Pointing a firearm at another – Level 6 Felony
- Criminal Recklessness committed with a deadly weapon – Level 6 Felony
- Domestic Battery – A Misdemeanor

The Carmel Police Department was assisted by the Fishers Police Department and the Morgan County Sheriff's Department. The investigation is ongoing.

New tax statements, same info

State-mandated changes coming to your property tax bill

The Hamilton County Treasurer's Office wants you to know that this year your property tax bill will look a bit different, but it will contain all the same information from previous years. The reason for this is a state-mandated change to standardize tax billing across the state.

According to Indiana Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF) Communications Director Jenny Banks, the "coupon" portion of the tax bill has been different in each of Indiana's 92

counties. The coupon is the portion of the tax bill you detach and return with your payment.

"This change is for the taxpayers if they have property in different counties," Banks told The Reporter. "For example, if you own two properties where one is in Marion County and one is in Hamilton County, now you will have the same consistent tax bill across all counties."

According to informa-

tion from the DLGF, the revisions are all technical in nature with the exception of the remittance coupon. There are no new fields or data points.

The new guidelines include specific details on the paper size, font type and size, and the limited options for color that may not be used. According to Hamilton County Treasurer Jennifer Templeton, Hamilton County forms will be printed entirely in black ink.

"After receiving the mandated information from the DLGF in November 2019, we have been working diligently with our software vendor and printers to build our system documents to make sure that the new statements meet the requirements," Templeton said. "I feel that the new format will be easy to read, and my goal is to make sure that the taxpayers are informed of these changes to make the transition for all easier."

Geist Conservancy District bill heading to governor, COIT deal still in legislature

The Geist Conservancy District legislation has cleared the last hurdle with lawmakers at the Indiana Statehouse. State Representative and Speaker-elect Todd Huston tells LarryInFishers.com that the measure creating the conservancy district has now passed the House and Senate and is on the way to Governor Holcomb's desk where he is expected to sign the bill.

A conservancy district would have the legal authority to tax property owners and impose fees in the area of Geist Lake in order to do required maintenance on the reservoir.

Westfield student named GeoBee state semifinalist

The results are in! The National Geographic Society has named Mallory Bontrager, an eighth grader at Westfield Middle School, as one of the semifinalists eligible to compete in the 2020 National Geographic GeoBee State Competition. The contest will be held at IUPUI on Friday, March 27.

This is the second level of the National Geographic GeoBee competition, which is now in its 32nd year. To determine each school champion, GeoBee competitions were held in schools throughout the state with students in the

fourth through eighth grades. This year, an estimated 2.4 million students competed in the GeoBee, with 8,661 students becoming school champions. School champions also took an online qualifying test, which they submitted to the National Geographic Society. Up to 100 of the top-scoring students in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Department of Defense Dependents Schools and U.S. territories were invited to compete in the State GeoBees.

State champions will receive a medal, \$1,000 in cash, and other prizes, as well as a trip to Washington, D.C., to represent their state in the National Championship where they will compete for additional cash, awards and college scholarships. The second- and third-place State GeoBee winners will receive cash awards of \$300 and \$100, respectively.

The 2020 National Championship will take place May 18-21, 2020, at National Geographic headquarters. The National Champion will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship, \$1,000 in cash, a lifetime membership in the National Geographic Society and an all-expenses-paid Lindblad expedition to the Galápagos Islands aboard the National Geographic Endeavour II.

The second-place finisher will receive a \$10,000 college scholarship and \$1,000 in cash; the student finishing in third place will receive a \$5,000 college scholarship and \$1,000 in cash; and seven runners-up will each receive \$1,000 in cash.

Don't let coronavirus infect your investment strategy

As you know, the coronavirus has become a major health concern, not just in China, but in other parts of the world, too – and it's also shaken up the financial markets. As an individual investor, how concerned should you be?

The impact of the coronavirus on the markets isn't surprising. China is the world's second-largest economy, and when it experiences factory closures, supply chain disruptions and city lockdowns, the ripple effect on the world's other economies is considerable. Plus, the financial markets simply don't like uncertainty – and there's a lot of that associated with this outbreak and the efforts to contain it.

Nonetheless, instead of worrying over events you can't control, try to focus on what you can do in this investment climate. Here are a few suggestions:

Don't panic

The coronavirus may well cause continued market volatility over the next several weeks, or even months. But it's important for investors to take a long-term view.

Market corrections – typically defined as a drop in investment prices of 10 percent or more – are a fairly common occurrence, and we may have been overdue for one even before the coronavirus scare.

In any case, it's generally a good idea not to radically revamp your investment strategy unless you experience a major change in your personal life – a significant career move, medical condition, change in family situation, etc.

Be aware of history

The coronavirus is certainly serious, but it's not the only viral outbreak we've seen in recent decades. During these earlier pandemics, the financial markets also took a hit, but they bounced back.

For example, from late April 2003, in the midst of SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome) until late April 2004, the S&P 500 rose about 21 percent.* And other large gains were recorded following the outbreak and decline of the Ebola and Zika viruses.

Of course, the past performance of the markets in pandemic situations can't necessarily predict future market developments; every situation is different, and over the next year, returns might be modest, as prices have already soared in the 11 years since they bottomed out during the financial crisis of 2008-09.

Don't try to time the market

We may well see coronavirus-based volatility in the near future – but volatility implies "ups" as well as "downs." If you try to time the market by guessing at highs and lows, and then "buying high and selling low," you might get lucky once in a while, but you could just as easily miss the mark.

Keep a diversified portfolio

In addition to avoiding efforts to time the market,

you should also stay away from trying to pick "winners" and "losers" among individual investments in the marketplace of viruses. Instead, try to build and maintain a diversified portfolio, consisting of an array of different asset classes, with the allocation of these assets based on your risk tolerance and time horizon. Diversification doesn't prevent losses or guarantee profits in a declining market, but it may help reduce the impact of volatility on your portfolio.

You may not be able to totally quarantine your portfolio from this serious virus in the short term, but by following a consistent, long-term investment strategy that's appropriate for your individual needs, you'll be doing what you can to help yourself move toward your financial goals.

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Why we should get rid of standardized testing

We should get rid of standardized testing for many reasons. The definition of a standardized test, according to Google, is, "... a test that is administered and scored in a consistent, or 'standard', manner."

Many people are against these tests, and I am going to tell you why I think they should be no more.

Standardized tests can be very stressful for some students. I know that I can sometimes worry about whether or not I will pass. According to nysut.org, "Last year's testing season was marked by widespread reports by teachers and parents of students getting physically sick and emotionally distraught over

the standardized tests. It prompted many parents to exercise the option of refusing to let their children take tests." I think this can speak for many parents and students on how stress is caused by these tests. I think the fear of not passing can sometimes get to people and this can cause them to not do their best.

Online standardized tests, especially ISTEP, can be especially stressful for the reason that they are online. For example, in a math section, it is very hard to show your work when you have to type it into a text box. It isn't as easy to show what steps you took to solve a problem. On a sheet of paper, it is easier to show your work because you can write it wherever you want and don't need to use words instead of symbols.

It isn't all that better on the English side either.

Some kids can write with a pencil faster than they can type. Also, reading the passages on a screen can be more difficult than on paper. It can also be tiring on our eyes. I would much rather read a passage on a piece of paper than a screen.

Planning is also more difficult online. If the people making the tests are trying to save paper by making it online, it is just minimizing the amount of paper because they still give you multiple pieces of paper for you to write your work out on.

Time is something that makes standardized testing difficult to complete because some people work at different speeds. I find myself rushing through some problems that I could easily take a few more minutes on further explaining my answer, but time just doesn't allow it. Also, there are some questions that take more time to solve and explain, causing them to take a decent chunk of your al-

lowed time. Some students struggle to finish the test and this can affect whether or not they did well because they didn't finish.

Teachers also don't like standardized tests. They don't like them because they feel like all their students don't learn in the same way, and they feel that it is an unfair judgment on their teaching because not all students pick up the material the same. Some students may struggle and others may succeed, and that isn't necessarily the teachers' fault.

For these reasons I believe we should get rid of standardized testing. Overall, they are not liked by students and teachers and can be very stressful. The time restrictions can make it hard for some students to finish because we all work at different speeds. This can make it unfair to judge the students' scores without them being able to finish. They also have changed to online which have made tests more difficult.

Some tidbits you may not read elsewhere

The Hamilton County Highway Department, along with city engineering departments in Noblesville, Carmel and Fishers, are consulting with one another to determine the best location for another White River bridge.

County Commissioner Christine Altman says there is increasing need for improving the county's east/west traffic flow. No specific site has yet been established.

Steve Key, director of the Hoosier State Press Association and former Noblesville resident and writer for the Noblesville Ledger, says it appears there will not be state legislation this year that would end schools' requirement to publish an annual performance report. A bill in the legislature had earlier included elimination of that requirement. State Sen. Victoria Spartz (R-Noblesville) had opposed elimination of the requirement while **State Rep. Tony Cook** (R-Cicero), favored it.

Probably the fastest growing revenue source for Hamilton County government is the Innkeepers Tax. The treasurer's office reports nearly \$5.5 million in collections last year. That figure is expected to grow significantly this year with its 5 percent tax on each hotel and motel room rented. The revenue can only be used for advancing the county tourism, convention and visitor

industry. *** There is preliminary work in progress planning for Hamilton County's bicentennial in 2023. **County Historian David Heighway** says a group will be formally organized to make certain anniversary is properly marked. The county, named for Alexander Hamilton, was established by state legislation in 1823 when the population was around 1,000. Dave would probably like to hear from folks interested in assisting the efforts. ***

Finkam calls for Carmichael caution

Thank you to the Carmel City Council for supporting the resolution that calls for a thorough review of the Carmel Redevelopment Commission (CRC) actions as they relate to the Hotel Carmichael.

With this resolution, I am proposing that the Carmel Finance Committee take on the responsibility for thoroughly reviewing the expanded cost of the new Carmichael Hotel.

As heard, various members of the public have asked for an external, independent authority perform a comprehensive audit of the CRC. The good news is that this happens annually.

The Carmel Redevelopment Commission, Redevelopment Authority and City of Carmel are all part of this independent, professional audit. During this, all aspects of the CRCs financials and records are subject to audit. This includes cash, receipts, disbursements, bonds, capital assets, minutes, resolutions, ordinances, appropriate approvals and reports prepared for City Council. There is no area regarding the CRC that would not be included. We go a step further in preparing the CAFR, which is the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. The Carmel City Council authorized paying a few hundred thousand extra dollars to prepare our accounting and financial records, such as asset inventory, to ensure that our departments can go

under a more rigorous audit. The audit will begin the first week of April.

The CRC is audited annually by the independent body called the Indiana State Board of Accounts. For 2019, the SBOA will be the auditor of the Redevelopment Authority and the CRC. Their mission statement is to provide "the citizens of the State of Indiana with complete confidence in the integrity and financial accountability of state and local government."

In whole, the City pays approximately \$75,000 each year for the SBOA audit.

To further strengthen the review of the hotel project, this resolution proposes that the Carmel Finance Committee undertake an additional review of actions taken by the CRC which resulted in the hotel coming in at \$18.5 million higher than originally estimated.

The finance committee's purpose is to review ordinances, resolutions and projects involving finance and governance. Given the main questions the public has are around project finances and the supporting statutory authority, this seems like a best, first step.

By having the review done with the finance committee, the entire review is done publicly, differing from the private process used by consultants. In fact, during the hotel review process done by this committee in 2017, 40 to 50 members of the public participated by

attending. We spent hours of review, in public, which included project consultants and CRC members.

I am suggesting this review start March 18, and continue on March 25 and April 1. It is also my hope that these meetings can be held in chambers and recorded for members of the public to view online or at home if they desire.

The review would focus on the actions taken by the CRC since receiving approval in September 2017, the statutory authority that allows them to do each step and the impact on the budget resulting from each decision. It is my intent to have the finance committee joined by an outside attorney, hence the dollars included in the resolution. I will also ask the CRC to make its consultants available to the council at CRC expense. I expect to have included the CRC attorney, the City controller, the bond consultant, the hotel consultant engaged throughout the process, the construction partner and, if needed, Marriott Hotels.

The review will end by the Clerk's office compil-

ing a summary report for finance committee to approved, and to be released publicly. Should there be items of concern or dispute, we can vote to have those items looked at more carefully by consultants at the conclusion of this review.

Regardless of the outcome of this review, I believe that it's in the best interest of the CRC and City Council to determine a better way in which to collaborate regarding communication, financial management and project leadership. Following the conclusion of this review, I will work with legal council to draft a proposed interlocal agreement for a better working relationship between the CRC and the Council. To this end, together, we can create a mechanism for better insight into CRC actions by all council members and the public.

In summary, I am confident the finance committee can do a comprehensive, public review of this project, that will complement the State Board of Account's annual comprehensive audit. I move we approve this resolution.

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On the deal reached between Fishers and Carmel officials over the County Option Income Tax (COIT) distribution, Huston says that measure is still moving through the legislative process and he is not anticipating any changes, but cautions that the process is not yet officially done.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness said the deal reached with Carmel calls for a revised COIT distribution formula that will add \$15 million to \$18 million in additional COIT funds to Fishers over three years, but that increase

is tied to a rise in COIT tax collections of 2.5 percent each year. In other words, presuming a strong economy continues locally, Fishers will receive the extra funds.

According to Fadness, after that initial three-year period, Fishers would receive \$4 million to \$6 million in additional money per year from COIT, but that would once again rely on continued COIT tax collection growth in the coming years.

The 2020 short session of the General Assembly is scheduled to end in a few days.

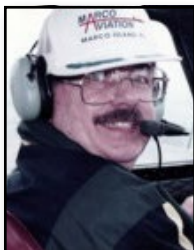

some of the sewers in the older part of the City transport both storm and sanitary
wastewater to the treatment plant. During rain events, the capacity of the lines
transporting this liquid to the treatment plant may be exceeded. Overflow points
exist to allow the system to relieve the excess flow to a receiving stream. This
discharge into a receiving stream is a combination of the storm and sanitary flow.
The Utility has placed signs at each of the eight (8) outfall structures where the
combined waste flow is discharged to a receiving stream. It is important that when
you see water coming out of these structures, you stay out of the water. There is a
risk of becoming sick if you come into contact with this water.
The probability of the combined sewer system having an overflow from one of
our eight (8) outfall structures is high during a 0.25 inch rainfall within a 15 minute
period. It is advisable that you do not wade in the streams during these times. If

Eagles buzzer-beater stuns Tigers, Greyhounds pull away from Royals

NOBLESVILLE - Anyone who has ever had an investment in an Indiana basketball sectional knows one thing: Anything can happen.

That was the case in the first game of Class 4A Sectional 8 at Noblesville last Tuesday. Fishers and Zionsville were locked in a defensive slugfest, and the Eagles came out on top after a last-second shot, sending the Tigers to a 23-21 loss.

In the second game, Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern played each other for the second time in 18 days. The Royals won the earlier game by one point, and Tuesday's contest was just as close until the Greyhounds pulled away late for a 50-43 victory.

DIFFERENT RE-MATCH

The Fishers-Zionsville game was a re-match as well – in fact, the first time the two teams played was on Feb. 21, the regular-season finale for the Eagles. The Tigers won 58-39 at the Zionsville gym.

“I think it was kind of fool’s gold when we beat them at their place,” said Fishers coach Matt Moore. The Tigers made shots ear-

ly in that game and got out to a big lead.

“Now you’re playing with a lead and that changes how they have to play,” said Moore. “When they take a minute off the clock in each possession, when they try to stretch, shorten a game, every shot matters.”

Any lead was a big lead in the sectional re-match. The Tigers held a 7-4 lead at the end of the first quarter, after Isaac Farah made a 3-pointer and Jeffrey Simmons added a layin.

The Eagles led 10-9 late in the second period, but Lucas Prewitt nailed a 3 for Fishers, sending it into the locker room with a 12-10 halftime advantage. The Tigers’ Alex Szilagyi scored the first basket of the second half: Another 3, giving Fishers a 15-10 lead.

Zionsville clawed its back to within one point, 18-17 by the end of the third quarter, with Szilagyi making a traditional three-point play as the Tigers’ only other points of the period. A free throw by Gunnar Vannatta tied the game, then Anthony Scales made a layin to put the Eagles ahead 20-18.

Dominic Castellani gave Fish-

ers back the lead, with his triple getting the Tigers up 21-20. Scales tied the game by making a free throw with 36.5 seconds left. Zionsville got the ball back, and Vannatta passed it to Jackson Hughes, who made a floater as time ran out.

Szilagyi’s six points led Fishers, who finished the season 18-7, but not before setting a record for most wins in a season.

“It just continues to show the direction we’re trending,” said Moore. “I think Year 1 to Year 2 to Year 3, the progress that we’ve made across the board has been nothing but positive. That’s what you build off of.”

ANOTHER CLOSE GAME

The second game was close as well. After some initial back and forth, Carmel used a 6-0 run (back-to-back 3-pointers by Brian Waddell and Connor Gioia) to jump out to a 10-5 lead in the first quarter. The Greyhounds never trailed again, but the Royals stayed in contention for the entire game.

“We’ve got some guys that can shoot it,” said Carmel coach Ryan Osborn. “We’re far from a one or two-man show. Guys give it everything they’ve got. They like each
