County plans Facebook Live event to discuss COVID-19

The Hamilton County Commissioners, along with the Hamilton County Health Department and Hamilton County Emergency Management, are planning to hold a Facebook Live event to help educate citizens and employees about COVID-19. The event will take place on all three agencies' Facebook pages at 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 18.

"We felt that a public meeting is contrary to current public health guidance and that this type of communication is one of the safest ways to educate our citizens," said County Commissioner Christine Altman. Noblesville Schools parent, children to self-quarantine

A Noblesville Schools parent has been directed to self-quarantine, according to the Noblesville Schools.

The school system said the parent attended an out-of-state event last week where someone else had tested positive for COVID-19. Noblesville Schools said the parent is complying with the directive and is also quarantining their children.

While both will be quarantining themselves, the school system says that neither has tested positive for or shown symp-

toms of COVID-19. However, the school system also said the family did attend a baseball event over the weekend at Noblesville High School before they knew of their need to self-quarantine.

Fishers moves forward on 5G with limited legal authority

The City of Fishers will move forward with permit requests for 5G towers in residential neighborhoods using all the legal levers at its disposal, but the mayor and city attorney caution local

residents that the state and federal governments have usurped most of the authority to regulate 5G technology.

Mayor Scott Fadness was at the forefront of lobbying the Indiana General Assembly to allow local governments more legal authority over 5G tower regulations, but state lawmakers chose to limit cities' and towns' ability to evaluate requests from wireless providers for tower permits.

City Attorney Chris Greisl told the Board of Public Works and Safety on Monday that Fishers can look at where towers are located within a neighborhood, but cannot ban or deny all requests for 5G small cell towers based on state and federal law.

Fadness also said the federal government does not allow local municipalities to take any possible health risks into account when evaluating small cell tower permits.

Fadness did say the city will notify homeowners associations (HOAs) when tower permits are under consideration, and

Hamilton County Tourism wins two statewide awards

The creativity of Hamilton County Tourism was recently recognized at the Indiana Tourism Association conference when the group was honored with two awards: "Best Leisure Travel Marketing Campaign" and "Best Specialty Item."

These awards were based on promotional efforts in 2019 for the marketing team's spring and fall leisure campaigns in Chicago and the sales team's Rest Easy campaign across the Midwest to draw meetings and groups to Hamilton County. The leisure marketing campaign generated \$122 million in visitor spending in Hamilton County.

"This is our second year to take home an award, and

I am so proud of my team and our partners," said Ashley Ledford, director of marketing for Hamilton County Tourism.

Hamilton County Tourism's marketing team is made up of seven people and works with Three-Sixty Group of Indianapolis. Last year, they solely targeted Chicago with a multi-layered campaign on leisure travel in TV, radio and print ads. This resulted in \$353 of visitor spending in Hamilton County for every \$1 spent on advertising.

The sales team also targeted clients across the Midwest to bring their meetings and groups to Hamilton County through the Rest Easy campaign. Organizers were made aware through mailings and small gifts that they

can "rest easy" if they bring their event to Hamilton County because Hamilton County Tourism's sales and visitor experience teams will assist to make any event successful.

"We have an array of unique event spaces here locally and we want prospective clients to know that," said Laura Kelner, director of sales. "We also want them to understand that our sales team can help with support."

Two hundred tourism leaders from around the state went to the [Indiana Tourism Conference](#) for networking and educational sessions in Elizabeth, Ind. Awards were presented to honor tourism organizations for their creativity, innovation and maximization of dollars invested.

Auditor's office takes steps to prevent homestead fraud

Homestead fraud is a growing concern among state and local officials, as well as residents, because it affects everyone.

"Homestead fraud is a growing trend that has the potential for significant penalties and is causing higher tax bills for everyone in Hamilton County," said Hamilton County Auditor Robin Mills. "Individuals and married couples are limited to one homestead deduction, per the State Homestead Law."

Fraudulent deductions steal from public safety, schools and other services. In addition, it can lower the quality of life in Hamilton County. Ultimately, honest taxpayers are left with making up the difference that homestead fraud creates.

Homestead deductions are intended to give tax relief for a homeowner's primary residence. Homestead fraud can occur a variety of ways. One of the most com-

mon occurrences

is when an individual or married couple apply for and are approved for a homestead and subsequently, it is determined that they are not a permanent resident of Hamilton County. It is also illegal for a person or married couple to claim more than one "residency-based deduction" within the United States. Other ways fraud can occur is when the status of the property or of the individual(s) benefiting from the homestead exemption changes and the property owner(s) fails to inform the Auditor's Real Property Department.

"Homestead deductions are not automatically removed when a taxpayer files a deduction on another property. It is the homeowner's responsibility to provide a written, certified statement to the county au-

ditor within 60 days of the date of change," explained Sadie Eldridge, Lead Real Property Deductions Deputy. "Our county is always generating new ways to eliminate

homestead fraud, including contracting with Tax Management Associates which will scour databases for evidence of fraud."

Tax Management Associates will not charge anything upfront to research whether homestead deductions are legitimate. The firm will make its money by getting a percentage from any liens paid by property owners caught using homestead deductions they aren't entitled to have.

"Tax Management Associates will be mailing letters to Hamilton County residents whose eligibility

will also notify all residents within 200 feet of the proposed pole. This will be city policy beyond state or federal requirements, Fadness said. Those living in the area of any proposed tower will be given the opportunity to provide their views before any tower permit is decided by the Board of Works.

Verizon Wireless has 40 5G tower permits pending with the city, with 500 total expected in the coming year-and-a-half. There are

now 115 towers deployed locally, mostly along Fishers thoroughfares.

Based on Greisl's presentation to the board, the city's jurisdiction is limited to where small cell towers are specifically located within in a given neighborhood. Verizon has been cooperating with city staff in efforts to locate such towers in common areas of neighborhoods, away from homes as much as possible, according to Greisl. The city may also consider the

aesthetics within a neighborhood when evaluating permit requests.

City Attorney Greisl talked about the health and safety issues connected with 5G technology. "The FCC (Federal Communications Commission) has spoken pretty clearly about our prohibition in regulating this (5G technology) use," Greisl said. He referred to a resolution passed by the Carmel City Council asking the state to slow down 5G implementation, but Greisl

added that Carmel also has 40 small cell tower permit requests filed and Carmel is processing those requests under the same laws as Fishers.

The first permit requests are being proposed in the north central area of Fishers.

5G towers have a shorter range than the current 4G wireless system, with 5G towers needed every 500 to 1,000 feet.

Greisl told the board there are time deadlines for the board to act. Failure to act within the prescribed time periods in the law will lead to an automatic approval of the tower permit. The city staff has 10 days to review a permit once submitted, then the Board of Works has 45 days to consider approval or denial of that submission.

The Board of Works is expected to consider the first small tower permit request in April.

Wilson to speak on 100 years of suffrage at Westfield Library

The Westfield Washington Public Library, in partnership with the League of Women Voters of Hamilton County, will soon host a speaker on the Indiana Women’s Suffrage Movement Centennial, a program of Indiana Humanities. Funding was provided by the Lilly Endowment, Inc. and Hillenbrand, Inc.

The event will take place at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, March 25 in the Community Room of the Westfield Washington Public Library, 333 W. Hoover St., Westfield. Laura Merrifield Wilson will present “Have We Come a Long Way, Baby? How successful have women been in elected politics post-suffrage? What barriers remain?”

Women comprise a majority of the population yet remain underrepresented within American government. In fact, Indiana trails most national numbers and remains one of five states in the country to never have elected a female governor or senator. One hundred years post-suffrage, this lack of representation presses the question of “why?” Wilson’s talk addresses this question by bridging historical narratives with cur-

rent statistics. By sharing her key research findings, exploring larger national trends and analyzing influential factors, she hopes that a better understanding of the past will enable citizens to work toward encouraging and electing more women in politics today.

Laura Merrifield Wilson is an Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of Indianapolis, where she specializes in gender politics, campaigns and elections, and state government. She earned her Bachelors in Theatre (2008) and Masters in Political Science (2010) from Ohio University and her Masters in Women’s Studies (2014), Masters in Public Administration (2012), and PhD in American Politics (2014) from the University of Alabama. Wilson is a regular panelist on CBS 4’s/Fox 59’s “IN Focus” and is the producer and host of WICR 88.7’s “Positively Politics.”

Local Elks partner to help veterans in need

The Noblesville Elks Lodge #576 is sponsoring a resident appreciation event for Veterans who live in Lincoln Apartments Community in Indianapolis. The Indianapolis Lodge #13 merged with Noblesville’s #576 Lodge years back.

This housing community is funded in part by the Department of Housing and Urban Development qualifi-

Traffic Safety Partnership will conduct sobriety checkpoint this weekend

A sobriety checkpoint will be conducted on the night of Saturday, March 14.

Impaired driving is one of the nation's most frequently committed violent crimes. Just in Indiana in 2017, alcohol-related traffic crashes killed 99 people and injured another 1,788 people. Twenty-five percent of all drivers involved in fatal collisions in Indiana were legally impaired.

In Hamilton County in 2018, the State filed 989 cases involving impaired driving. Of these, 170 drivers had prior convictions for operating while intoxicated within the last five years.

To combat this crime, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will set up sobriety checkpoints around Hamilton County to aggressively deter, detect and arrest those drivers who make the decision to drive impaired. Sobriety checkpoints have proven successful in both raising awareness of impaired driving and reducing the likelihood of a person driving after they have been drinking.

In order to raise awareness of the prevalence of impaired driving in our community and the efforts of the Partnership to combat the crime, the Partnership maintains a webpage at hamiltoncounty.in.gov/503.

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along the roadway, often depending upon the support of local property owners for the use of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data and a consideration of officer safety.

Vehicles are stopped in a specific sequence, such as every other vehicle, every third vehicle, every fourth vehicle or by stopping three, four, or five cars in succession and allowing other traffic to proceed while checking the stopped vehicles. The planned sequence in which vehicles are stopped depends on the number of officers available to staff the checkpoint, traffic congestion, and other safety concerns.

Upon making contact with the driver, the officer advises them that they've been stopped at an HCTSP sobriety checkpoint and asks for the driver's license and the vehicle's registration. If, in the course of the contact, the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and that the driver may be impaired or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. Further investigation may involve the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs).

On the other hand, if all looks right during the initial contact, the driver is often on his or her way in less than two minutes.

Officers staffing the sobriety checkpoints work on an overtime basis paid by grant funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration through the Indiana Governor's Council on Impaired and Dangerous Driving.

Sobriety checkpoints are conducted in 37 states, including Indiana, and the District of Columbia. In 1990, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that, if conducted properly, sobriety checkpoints do not constitute an illegal search and seizure. In the 2002 case of *State v. Gerschoffer*, the Indiana Supreme Court found that sobriety checkpoints are constitutional when conducted properly. Members of the Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office work with the Partnership to ensure that each checkpoint meets constitutional requirements.

About the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership (HCTSP) is a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County working to increase the usage of seatbelts, to combat aggressive driving, and to decrease impaired driving with the overall goal of creating a safer Hamilton County. The HCTSP is comprised of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, Fishers Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Noblesville Police Department, Westfield Police Department and Cicero Police Department, with the assistance of the Indiana State Police.

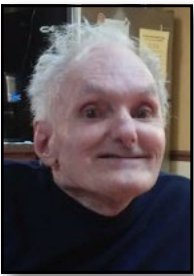

Pacers rally falls just short against Boston

Victor Oladipo and the Pacers mounted a furious rally on Tuesday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, improbably battling back from a 16-point deficit to take the lead in less than five minutes of game action in the fourth quarter on Tuesday night against the Boston Celtics.

But ultimately, Indiana (39-26) ran out of gas, falling to Boston (43-21), 114-111.

Oladipo scored 12 points in the fourth quarter and finished with a season-high 27, going 5-for-7 from 3-point range and tallying seven rebounds and four assists. He was sensational for most of the fourth quarter, but was critical of his shot selection late in the game.

"The past couple weeks, there's been little spurts that I feel like myself or close to myself," Oladipo said. "Yeah, I played well tonight. I should have played better down the stretch. 27 points doesn't matter, I'd rather win the game. I'll probably beat myself up a little over that."

Domantas Sabonis added 28 points, nine rebounds, and eight assists, but it wasn't enough as the Pacers dropped their first game back home after a five-game road trip.

Indiana trailed 102-86 with seven minutes to play before mounting a memorable charge. T.J. Warren scored five straight points and then Oladipo hit a runner with 5:09 remaining to pull the home team within single digits.

After a Celtics offensive foul, Oladipo came off the pick-and-roll and pulled up from the top of the arc, swishing home the 3-pointer despite contact to make it a

six-point game.

On the other end, Jayson Tatum's dunk snapped a three-minute scoring drought for the Celtics, but Oladipo took the ball right back down the court and scored. Then after Marcus Smart missed a layup, Oladipo came down and pulled up again from the top of the arc, swishing another three to trim Boston's lead to 104-101 with 3:30 to play and force a timeout from Celtics head coach Brad Stevens.

Out of the timeout, Gordon Hayward missed a three. The Pacers put the ball in Oladipo's hands once again, but this time he lost control as the ball was batted up into the air. Sabonis was there to corral it, however, and kicked to Warren in the corner for the game-tying 3-pointer.

Indiana's defense forced a shot clock violation on the other end and Sabonis converted a three-point play to give Indiana an improbable lead with 2:14 remaining.

The Pacers then had a fast break after a Tatum miss, but Oladipo missed a quick three in transition. That led to a broken defense on the other end, and Daniel Theis' 3-pointer tied the game at 107 with 1:43 to play.

"He was feeling it," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said of Oladipo's shot. "He really got us back in the game, knocking down shots. I think the emotions of the game really took over."

Oladipo drew a foul and hit both free throws 14 seconds later, but Tatum's driving dunk tied the game once again and this time Turner missed an open three in the right corner. Smart took the ball into the heart of the defense on the other end and converted a tough bucket to put the

Celtics up with 49.9 seconds left.

Indiana struggled to get a good look on its next possession and Oladipo was forced to throw up a contested three as the shot clock expired. It missed and Boston corralled the rebound, forcing the Pacers to foul.

Kemba Walker gave the Pacers new life, however, hitting just one of two free throws with 17.4 seconds remaining. Out of a timeout, Oladipo drove along the right baseline and missed, but Sabonis was there to clean up his miss and cut the deficit to one with 7.8 seconds to play.

This time the Pacers fouled Smart, who hit both free throws with seven seconds left. Indiana couldn't get a clean look to tie, however, as Justin Holiday missed a contested 3-pointer before time expired.

Tatum led all scorers with 30 points on Tuesday, while Hayward added 27 points, 10 rebounds, and five assists. With the victory, the Celtics officially clinched a playoff berth.

Turner got off to a strong start for Indiana on Tuesday, scoring seven of the Pacers' first 11 points. But on the other end, Hayward was even better, starting the night 4-for-4 from the field and 4-for-4 from the free throw line, tallying 13 points as Boston jumped out to a 30-17 lead.

The Blue & Gold closed the first quarter with five unanswered points, but still trailed 30-22 after the opening frame.

Tatum took over at the start of the second quarter. The reigning Eastern Conference Player of the Month scored 16 of Boston's first 18 points in the frame as the Celtics stretched their lead as high as 15

points.

The Pacers clawed back with a 15-4 run — capped by Oladipo knocking down 3-pointers on back-to-back possessions — to cut the deficit to 52-48 with 1:47 remaining in the first half.

But Boston scored the next five points to push its lead back to 10. Oladipo drilled his third three of the half with 7.9 seconds remaining, but the Celtics raced to the other end and got a quick basket for Theis just before the halftime buzzer to take a 59-50 lead into the break.

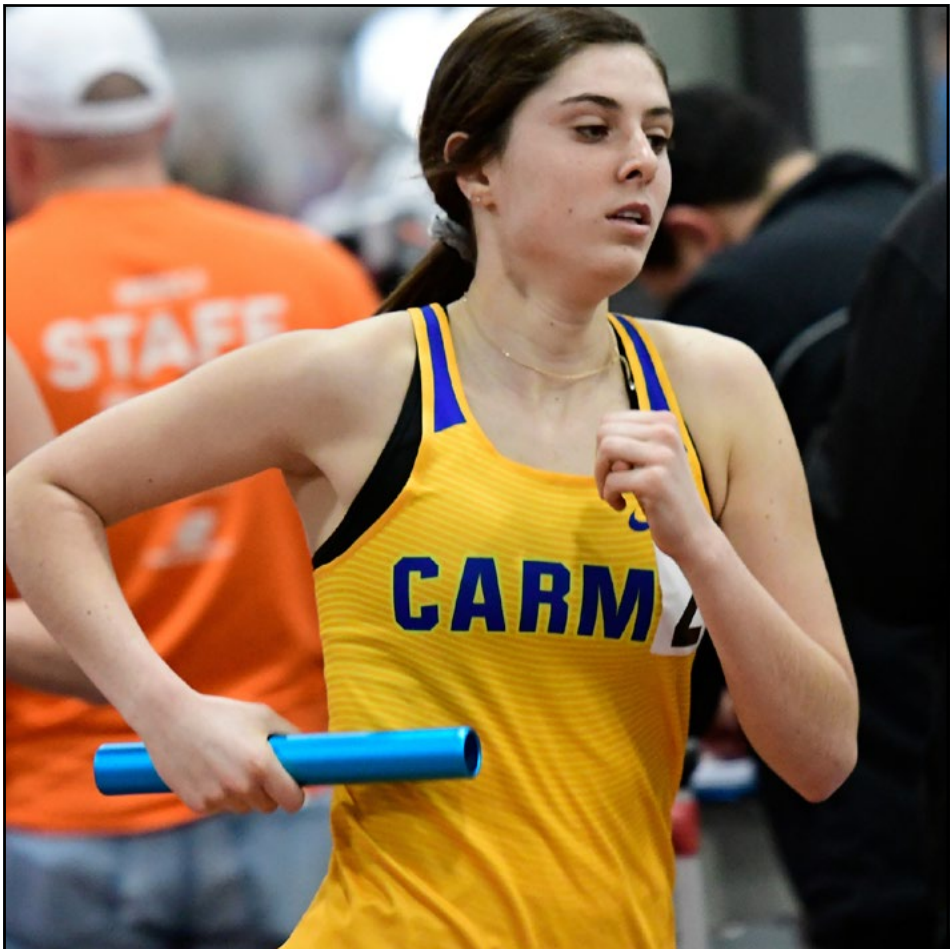
It was Hayward's turn to carry the scoring load at the start of the third quarter. The former Butler star hit two 3-pointers and racked up 10 points in the first 4:18 of the second half as Boston opened the session with a 14-6 run to push its lead to 17.

Back-to-back 3-pointers from Walker and Theis stretched the visitors' lead to 85-66 with 3:47 left in the third quarter. The Pacers were able to chip five points off their deficit by the end of the quarter, but still entered the fourth trailing, 94-80.

Warren finished with 22 points for Indiana. Turner added 16 points, eight rebounds, and four blocks. No other Pacers reached double figures.

Theis finished with 20 points, six rebounds, and three assists. Smart added 16 points, five boards, and five assists, while Walker finished with 11 points.

The Pacers don't play again until Saturday night, when they travel to Philadelphia for a showdown with the 76ers that has major playoff implications. That is Indiana's only game over the next eight days.
