

Fishers mayor declares local disaster emergency

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness issued an executive order Monday declaring a local disaster emergency in the city. The order went into effect Tuesday.

“As more information comes available, it’s important that we continue to further reinforce the recommendations I’ve shared before,” Fadness said in a city news release. “By declaring a local disaster emergency, I’m able to implement a travel advisory watch for the city of Fishers for the next seven days, the maximum limit allowed by law. I’m asking that all residents eliminate any unnecessary travel. Additionally, while I do not have specific legal authority to close the following establishments at this time, I am urging the following establishments to close until the end of the month: Entertainment venues and centers; fitness facilities and gyms; and places of worship. I firmly believe it is our civic responsibility for all of us to make the right choices and make sacrifices to ensure the long-term safety and sustainability of our community.”

Fadness does not have the legal authority as mayor to order closures, but he urges entertainment venues, fitness facilities and places of worship in the city to close.

His executive order began at 8 a.m. on Tuesday. As of that time, travel in the city of Fishers is only permitted for the following reasons:

- Travel related to medical reasons
- Travel required to provide care to another for whom you’re the primary caregiver
- Travel for mandatory work activities
- Travel for food, groceries, medication, essential household goods, and hygiene products

Food delivery or the resupply of retail stores, pharmacies, and food pantries are allowed under the mayor’s edict.

The mayor is emphasizing that the Fishers Police Department and Fishers Fire and Emergency Services will be enforcing Governor Holcomb’s executive order for restaurants and bars to operate on a carry-out or delivery only basis. As an extension of this, all Fishers Parks and Recreation facilities and playgrounds will be closed.

Noblesville City Hall remains open, some employees now work remotely

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced Monday that Noblesville City Hall and other city buildings will remain open with some employees working remotely to reduce the risk of COVID-19 in the community. As of Monday, there are no known cases of COVID-19 in Noblesville.

Starting Tuesday, March 17, employees who can feasibly work from home began doing so. Jensen has consistently relied on public health officials’ guidance and requirements to make decisions and protocol adjustments as the situation involving COVID-19 has evolved and will continue to do so.

“We have the health and safety of not only our employees but our community as a whole in mind as we move forward with adjusted work protocols at City Hall,” said Jensen. “By practicing social distancing in Noblesville, we hope to flatten the curve of the virus progression and reduce the burden on our community.”

Public meetings like Common Council, Board of Works, and Board of Zoning Appeals will continue as scheduled. The city will be using enhanced technology options where available, in association with social distancing and other precautionary measures recommended by public health officials.

County Clerk encourages citizens to vote absentee

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams is asking those who are eligible to file for an absentee ballot to do so – especially those who are sick or older than 65 years of age.

“Older adults and people with serious chronic health conditions are at a higher risk of contracting COVID-19,” Williams says. “We’d like to limit their exposure to the virus by encouraging them to vote from the comfort of their home.”

Registered voters can vote absentee by mail for a number of reasons, among them:

- If they are confined to their residence, hospital or nursing home due to illness
- If they are caring for someone who is confined
- If they are 65 years of age or older

Those wishing to vote by mail must submit an

application by midnight on Thursday, April 23. [Click here](#) to download the application. You can also call (317) 776-8476 and make a request for an application over the phone.

Once you have voted, you can submit your application by fax, by mail or by email. All mailed-in ballots must be received by the Election Office on or before noon on Election Day.

“We highly discourage those voting absentee to return their ballots in person,” said Williams. “Just like any business, Hamilton County is working to help reduce transmission among staff and maintain business operations. We encourage citizens to do as much of their county business online, over the phone or by mail as possible.”

County Dem Chair calls for all absentee voting

Dear Editor:

I requested that the Hamilton County Election Board request permission from the State Election Board to conduct the May Primary as a 100 percent vote by mail effort to protect the lives of all poll workers and voters in view of the coronavirus.

As the county Democratic Chairman, I strongly feel this action by the county would ensure we do have a safe primary and that in fact we have a primary. We need to just look at how Ohio today delayed its primary until June.

Both the Democratic and Republican state parties have asked the State Board to relax absentee ballots.

By asking and starting this process now the county can prevent massive possible disruptions in the May primary.

Things to consider:

1. The ban on group meetings is being expanded by the federal government until later in the summer and beyond the May primary date. It is also possible that the group limit could be as low as 10 people. That would impact many polling stations.
2. Many poll workers are over 65 and as a result of medical concern could pull out of working the polls, leaving many poll places without adequate staff.
3. Some polling locations may all of sudden close and no longer be available at the last minute.
4. If the state relaxes the absentee rules, individual requests could overload the Election Office system.

Actions:

1. By mailing absentee ballots to all voters in the county the Election Office does not need to mail out polling station change notices to many effected voters.
2. The Election Office will not have to check each absentee request to confirm they are registered and then to mail them a ballot on an individual basis.
3. These actions would ensure the May primary can be undertaken with the least amount of disruption.

During the closure, CCPR will continue to pay full- and part-time staff.

Center for Performing Arts extends cancellations through May 11

In response to new COVID-19 guidelines issued Monday by state and federal officials, the Center for the Performing Arts is extending its previously announced suspension of all performances and other events on its campus through May 11.

The affected venues include the Palladium, the Tarkington and the Studio Theater. The cancellations include performances by Actors Theatre of Indiana, Carmel Symphony Orchestra, Central Indiana Dance Ensemble, Civic Theatre, Gregory Hancock Dance Theatre and Indiana Wind Symphony, as well as education events, rental events and *Center Presents* performances.

"We regret the circumstances that brought us to this point, but clearly there

is no other responsible decision to make for the welfare of our patrons, employees and the community," said Jeffrey C. McDermott, President/CEO of the Center for the Performing Arts and the Great American Songbook Foundation.

All ticketholders will be contacted and provided refunds or the option to donate the purchase amount to the presenting organization to help defray costs associated with the cancellations. The Center will work to reschedule the canceled events as feasible.

The extension adds four weeks to the one-month suspension the Center announced Friday. Today, Gov. Eric Holcomb announced that the state is following new CDC guidelines recommending no gatherings of more than 50 people for the next eight

weeks. President Donald Trump announced today a federal guideline that limits gatherings to no more than 10 people.

The Center will continue to follow the guidance of public safety officials and will reassess the suspension as needed.

The Center's offices will remain in operation during standard business hours. The Box Office and the Great American Songbook Exhibit Gallery at the Palladium will be closed to the public through May 11, but ticket sales for events not affected by the suspension will continue online at TheCenterPresents.org or by phone at (317) 843-3800.

Huskies' Hudson Hochstedler named to IBCA Academic All-State team

Hamilton Heights' Hudson Hochstedler is among the 71 Indiana high school seniors -- 39 boys and 32 girls -- have been chosen as first-team Academic All-State by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association, it was announced Tuesday.

In addition, 188 more boys and 189 more girls were recognized as honorable mention Academic All-State for 2020, IBCA executive director Steve Witty said.

The IBCA Academic All-State team is a program where academic prowess and athletic prowess both are considered in the selections. Items such as grade-point average, college board scores and academic class rank are considered along with athletic performance in areas such as points per game, rebounds per game and assists per game.

"The quality of these student-athletes shows that success in academics and success in athletics are not separate entities," Witty said. "Rather, in many cases, a player's success in the classroom directly contributes to his or her success on the floor."

IBCA-member head coaches from schools across the state may nominate their seniors who meet criteria that include a 3.5 GPA or higher on a 4.0 scale, a class rank in the upper 25 percent of one's class, an SAT score of 1,100 (on the reading and math sections) or an ACT composite score of 24.

Once nominations are received, an IBCA committee reviews the information and determines awards for first team and honorable mention.

Those selected will receive certificates from the IBCA for their honor. Those certificates will be distributed to coaches at the annual IBCA Clinic on April 24-25 at Lawrence North High

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Carmel Marathon postponed to June 14

This year's edition of the Carmel Marathon has been postponed by two months, to June 14.
