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Mayors act to protect public, employees from COVID-19

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness issued an executive order last Monday declaring a local disaster emergency in the city.

“By declaring a local disaster emergency, I’m able to implement a travel advisory watch for the city of Fishers,” said Fadness.

Travel in the city of Fishers is only permitted for the following reasons:

- Travel related to medical reasons
- Travel required to provide care to another for whom you’re the primary caregiver
- Travel for mandatory work activities
- Travel for food, groceries, medication, essential household goods, and hygiene products

Westfield Mayor Andy Cook announced the City of Westfield has closed to the public its adminis-

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard signed a new order last Wednesday declaring a local disaster emergency, prompted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Among the new orders are an end to unnecessary travel and the closure of all Carmel public playgrounds. Go to bit.ly/396GF7T to

watch Brainard’s address. Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced last Friday the issuance of an executive order as part of a multi-faceted strategy to address the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

“Issuing an executive order allows us to communicate clear parameters and enforce restrictions on door to door solicitations as well as close city buildings including public safety buildings except in the case of emergencies in an effort to mitigate person-to-person contact,” Jensen said.

Governor postpones Primary Election

Last Friday, Governor Eric Holcomb issued an order moving Indiana’s Primary Election from May 5 to June 2.

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams, whose responsibilities include overseeing all county elections, said, “Moving the Primary out was a very difficult decision made by the Governor but I truly believe it was the best decision. We have been preparing for the ‘what ifs’ all week and there are just not any good answers at this time. We had already started to have polling places canceling and poll work-

ers, who are the backbone of election day process, determining they wouldn’t be able to work.

“Implementing ‘social distancing’ would be very difficult at the polls and satellite voting. The time frame to mail out a ballot to every registered voter would have been impossible to do. There would not be enough supplies available statewide to get this done.”

“We know we are going to have to work through a lot of issues but I am very confident in my election and clerk staff that we will get the job done,” concluded Williams.

County courts declare emergency operations

In response to concerns about COVID-19, the Hamilton Circuit and Superior Courts have declared an emergency operations plan which will change the way in which the courts operate.

The courts are working with local emergency management and health departments to ensure necessary steps in response to the virus are taken.

The Courts will continue to be open and hold essential emergency hearings during this time. This includes and is not limited to the following:

- Initial hearing for in-custody defendants
- Bond reviews
- Initial hearings on CHINS and continued initial hearings

- Fact findings for CHINS that are time sensitive
- Protection order hearings
- Civil commitments
- Probate mental health hearings
- Detention hearings for CHINS and juvenile delinquencies
- Any other hearing at the discretion of the Judge.

With regards to Jury Duty, individuals who have received a jury summons for March 18, 2020 through May 4, 2020 should not report for jury service.

All attorneys/litigants/parties to a case who are scheduled to come to court for any hearing from March 18, 2020 through May 4, 2020 should consult mycase.in.gov or contact your attorney to receive the advice of counsel to verify your court date.

Security screenings in place at Judicial Center, Courthouse

In a Facebook live broadcast last week, Hamilton County Commissioner Christine Altman announced steps being taken at county facilities to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and reduce the potential risk of exposure to the county’s workforce and visitors, security staff at

the Hamilton County Government and Judicial Center and the Courthouse.

Historic Courthouse

The North, East, and South doors to the Historic Courthouse will be locked preventing entry from the outside. All traffic to the building will be directed to the West door. Signage has already been posted. A

security officer will be stationed inside the West door. Buildings and Grounds has set up a hand sanitizer station. The security officer will direct each person entering the building to sanitize their hands before proceeding further.

Judicial Center

At the security station inside the Judicial Center

East door (public entrance), Buildings and Grounds has set up a hand sanitizer station. Security staff will direct each person entering the screening area to sanitize their hands. Security staff will ask each member of the public four simple questions. The answers will help the officer determine if the person may proceed further.

Quakenbush announces COVID-19 safeguards at Sheriff’s Department

Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush announced changes his office is making due to coronavirus.

“All services to the public will continue,” Quakenbush said. “My number one goal for our community is to ensure confidence in the fact the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office will continue to operate and provide the duties and functions, while also making the necessary changes to allow us to carry out these functions in the safest possible way. The safety of our community, employees and inmates

is at the top of our priorities.”

The Sheriff said correction facilities will operate without interruption. “We have medical housing, quarantine facilities and a 24- hour medical staff to maintain a safe correction environment.”

Jail visits will be restricted to remote video visits. To register for a remote video jail visit, go to gettingout.com.

“If you are symptomatic, sick or have been in the last

72 hours, please do not come to the Sheriff Department campus unless you are court-ordered.” Quakenbush explained that if you must report to the Sheriff’s Department campus as a result of a court order, the Sheriff asks that you call (317) 773-1872 during business hours or (317) 776-2595 after hours before you come.

Critical sex offender registration will continue to occur at the Sheriff’s office. Fingerprint requests

will be processed inside the lobby. Necessary background checks, public record requests and many other inquiries should be requested by fax or email. Local background checks for gun permit applications will continue; however, the Sheriff asks that you call (317) 773-1872 in advance. Tax warrant payments in the form of money order or cashier’s check can be mailed to the Sheriff’s Department or paid online through indianataxwarrants.com.

Taxpayers: Please pay taxes online or by mail

Hamilton County Treasurer Jennifer Templeton is encouraging taxpayers to pay their property taxes online.

“In an effort to protect the community and our staff from the further spread of COVID-19, we’re asking taxpayers to avoid coming into our office at this time,” Templeton said. “We’re still available to answer any questions you might have. We just encourage you to contact us over the phone.”

Taxpayers have several options for making their payments including the following:

- Pay online at bit.ly/3ac3icj. Online payment fees do apply. e-Checks are \$1 and credit cards are 2.5 percent.
- Drop off payments at the antique drop box outside the east door of the Old Courthouse. If you’d like a receipt, please include a self-addressed, stamped envelope.
- Drop off payments at the following banks: BMO, Bussey, Citizens State, Community First, Farmers, Fifth Third, First Farmers, First Merchants, Horizon, Merchants Bank of Indiana, and Star Financial.

Property tax bills will be mailed no later than April 15. To help expedite the process, the Treasurer’s Office has made them available online for early viewing at bit.ly/39fmLHH.

Businesses needing signed Property Tax Clearance Forms are encouraged to send them by mail with a return envelope for processing. Innkeepers Tax payments should be mailed.

Mobile Home Title and Moving Permits must still be processed in person, but the Treasurer’s Office asks that citizens call (317) 776-9620 prior to arriving so they can provide taxpayers with a complete list of items in an effort to limit time in the office.

He studied the Civil War extensively, with particular interest in the Battle of Gettysburg, frequently attending seminars and private tutorials on specific aspects of the battleground and battles.

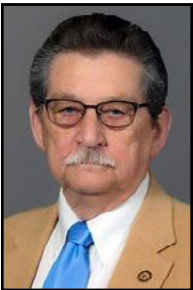
Coroner rules Fishers deaths as murder-suicide

Will retire at the end of the school year . . .

Tony Oilar reflects on 44-year career

Tony Oilar only had one job interview in his entire professional career.

It was back in the spring of 1976, when he interviewed for a social studies teacher position at Noblesville Junior High School. He was hired and that would be the beginning of a 44-year career in Noblesville Schools.

Oilar is retiring at the end of the school year. He came to Noblesville as a small-town kid from Frontier High School who had just graduated from Ball State University. Oilar spent his entire career as a Noblesville Miller, where he became a well-respected teacher, coach and administrator.

"I really don't know what I would have done if I had not been hired by Noblesville," said Oilar. He was friends with Noblesville High School graduate Dan Deirdorff, whom he asked how to get to Noblesville from Muncie. Once he got to Noblesville and checked it out, he thought it was "huge," since there was a Jim Dandy and McDonald's there.

"Considering where I came from, I had hit the big time," said Oilar.

Oilar was hired by then-Noblesville Junior High principal Jack Ford, who grew up about 10 miles from where Oilar grew up – "so that didn't hurt my chances," he said. At the time, Hall of Famer Dave Nicholson was the NHS varsity boys basketball coach.

"I played against his Benton Central teams as a junior and a senior so he was somewhat familiar with me," said Oilar. "That probably didn't hurt my

chances either."

Oilar taught social studies at Noblesville Junior High and Noblesville Middle School for 30 years, serving as the department chair the last 10 years he was there. He taught eighth-grade American History "and loved every second of it," he said.

Oilar made news in 1984 when he won second place in that year's Olin W. Davis Awards "for developing outstanding curriculum units on economics," according to a Noblesville Ledger article from Aug. 13, 1984. Oilar's project was "Economics and the Western Movement." The next year, he received a master's degree from IUPUI.

In addition to teaching, Oilar also began his coaching career in 1976, as the seventh-grade boys basketball assistant coach. It was the beginning of a 24-year coaching career, as he became the seventh-grade head coach, the freshman head coach, the junior varsity head coach and the eighth-grade head coach.

Oilar remembers the fun he and his teams had winning two Hamilton County boys basketball freshman tournaments, and six eighth-grade county boys basketball tournaments. "I also coached three undefeated teams," he said. "Those teams were loaded with talent. I had great kids who came from great families."

His best memory involves an eighth-grade team: His son Brian scored with six seconds left to give the Millers a two-point win over Fishers in the championship game of the county tournament. "What a moment," said Oilar.

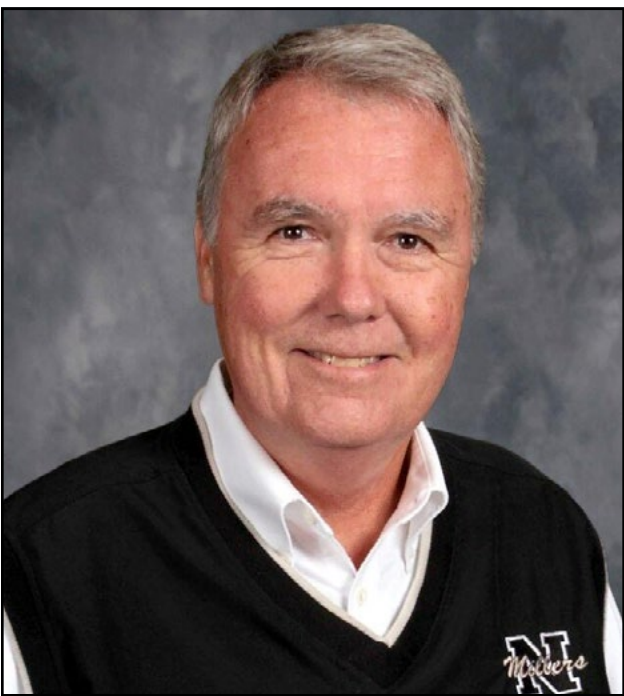

Oilar was part of Nicholson's staff during the 1980's, which he called one of his best memories.

"We had very talented players," said Oilar. "The atmosphere at the games in the 'old' high school gym was just unbelievable. When the pep band played 'Miller Time' prior to the opening tip it was the best atmosphere in the state. Being a small part of the 1984 undefeated boys basketball team was something I will never forget. We also had great teams after 1984."

"I coached many great bas-

ketball players such as Scott Haffner, Tom Coverdale, Larry Simmons, Scott Fleming, Chris Hartley, John Karaffa, Rob Cutter, Mark Roberts and many others," said Oilar. "I also coached a kid by the name of Kevin Pritchard. He was on my seventh-grade team in 1980-81. He moved after that year to Oklahoma and was the two-time Mr. Basketball in Oklahoma and won a National Championship playing for Larry Brown at Kansas. That is the same Kevin Pritchard who is the President of Basketball Operations for the Indiana Pacers today. I sure wish he had stayed a Miller. Dave Nicholson always said I was the one that ran him away."

Oilar also coached baseball, mentoring eight-grade and junior varsity teams, and also serving as the varsity assistant baseball coach. He has some great memories of Millers baseball as well, including one from 1985, when he was on the coaching staff. Noblesville upset what Oilar called "an outstanding Carmel team" in the sectional championship game. The Millers won 3-2 in a game delayed several times by lightning; the victory ended a seven-year sectional drought for Noblesville.

The 1985 season also included an unforgettable win by the Millers over Sheridan. The score was tied and the Blackhaws had the bases loaded in the bottom of the seventh inning. Oilar tells what happened next.

"There were a couple Sheridan fans starting to get all over Coach Ron Fleming because it looked like for sure the Millers would lose," said Oilar. "I was so upset I was looking for my keys in the dugout. We brought the outfield way in...there were no outs. I remember a fan yelling at Fleming asking if he was crazy."

"The Sheridan hitter hit a screaming, sinking line drive to center fielder Brian Purvis who was playing very shallow. Brian dove, somehow caught the ball for out No. 1, threw to second to double up the runner for out No. 2 and then Scott Fleming threw to third base for the third out. The runner at third was crossing home. Triple play! The Millers then won in extra innings. When

I see Ron Fleming today we still talk and laugh about that night at Sheridan."

In 2006, Oilar transitioned to administration when he became the athletic director at Noblesville Middle School for five years, then served as the assistant athletic director at NHS for 10 years. Having spent his entire career at Noblesville, Oilar got a front-row seat to the changes in Noblesville Schools and the city in general.

"The biggest change I have seen since I came to Noblesville in the fall of 1976 is the tremendous growth of the city," said Oilar. "Regarding education, I think the biggest change is the expectation of teachers. They certainly have a lot more on their plate than when I started in 1976. I am not saying that is wrong, I am just saying that is the way it is."

As for athletics, Oilar doesn't think much has changed.

"Kids still want to play and compete," said Oilar. "The only thing that bothers me a little is I think sometimes the goal of getting the scholarship gets in the way of being a great teammate. This certainly is not always the case, but sometimes. Parents haven't changed at all...they still want what is best for their children."

So did Oilar, and he proved it with his 44 years of outstanding service to Noblesville Schools.

"I am glad I stayed at Noblesville my entire career," said Oilar. "It was a great place to raise a family. As I step down, I would just like to say thank you to Miller Nation. You took a kid from Frontier High School and you made him a Miller for life."

IHSAA cancels boys

basketball tournament

The IHSAA announced last Thursday that the boys basketball tournament was officially canceled.

The tournament had been on hold for several days, when the regional rounds were indefinitely postponed. Sporting events across the country were being canceled due to the COVID-19 outbreak, but the IHSAA had been hopeful that the boys basketball tournament could be played.

But after Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb issued his directive last Thursday closing all schools across the state until May 1, it became clear that the tournament would not be finished.

"It is with great sadness and disappointment that we inform Hoosiers of the cancellation of the remaining games of the 2020 IHSAA boys basketball tournament series," said IHSAA Commissioner Bobby Cox. "While the Association maintained every hope of continuance, it is now evident those hopes are now unreachable." Cox also said that the health and safety "of our public remains paramount and our primary focus."

Carmel was to have played in the Logansport regional, but is

one of the 64 teams across the four classes that saw its season come to an end with the announcement. Greyhounds coach Ryan Osborn said he was disappointed for his team, including Jackson Jannsen, Carmel's only senior.

"From a big picture perspective, you get it," said Osborn. "From a basketball perspective, it hurts."

The IHSAA's boys basketball tournament was first played in 1911. The tournament had been contested every year since then through 2019 - even during the two World Wars, when many other sporting events were put on pause.

"That's crazy," said Osborn. "It tells you what we're dealing with right now. 'I thought Bobby Cox and his staff did an amazing job trying to hang in there. It just got to the point where it couldn't logistically work.'"

So, Carmel's season officially finishes with an 18-7 record. The Greyhounds won their sixth consecutive sectional championship before the tournament was postponed-then-canceled, with Osborn noting that his team was young and inexperienced at the start of the year.

"Our message all year was
