

Fishers Board of Public Works votes for emergency resolution

On Monday morning, the Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety held a virtual meeting. Mayor Fadness was at City Hall, and the other two board members, Jason Meyer and Jeff Lantz, were on a speaker phone for the session. City Attorney Chris Greisl was physically with the mayor at City Hall.

The board passed a resolution empowering the mayor to take certain actions that would normally require board approval. Examples would be city contracts in excess of \$50,000 or changing the hours of operation in city parks. That doesn't mean the mayor is planning either one of those actions now; the resolution simply gives Fadness the legal au-

Holcomb has ordered Hoosiers to stay at home except for work or permitted activities. Essential businesses are still permitted.

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced

tion of a local disaster emergency as part of a multi-faceted strategy to address the evolving COVID-19 pandemic. executive order will be effective starting today,



March 25. "Issuing a local disaster emergency in Noblesville works in conjunction with Governor Holcomb's stay-at-home order and strengthens enforcement here in our city," Jensen said. "I ask you only leave your home if you work at an essential business, are getting necessary supplies or must leave for health and safety purposes."

Jensen is asking nonessential businesses to close and for residents to stay home and avoid unnecessary travel. This preventative measure to suspend in-person contact is nec-COVID-19, particularly in relation to individuals in

higher-risk segments of the population.

Jensen has directed Noon Monday the declara- blesville police and fire de-

partments to take reasonable action to enforce this order with the understanding that this is an unprecedented time.

"We understand this is a difficult time where business owners have to make

sacrifices for the greater good, but the long-term health of our community far outweighs the shortterm prosperity of staying open for business," Jensen said.





AG Hill says travelers should know their rights amid COVID-19 pandemic

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill has said if you are unsure about following through with your travel plans or are wondering what to do if your flight is impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, it is important to know your rights.

Airlines have slashed hundreds of flights since this public health crisis emerged, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) says crowded travel settings such as airports may increase chances of getting the coronavirus.

"The coronavirus outbreak has upended every aspect of our lives and has understandably caused contravel plans," Hill said.

Hill said travelers should be aware of the following before making any changes to their plans:

- · If an airline has canceled a flight, a passenger is entitled to a refund from the airline regardless of whether they will be booking a new flight.
- · A passenger is entitled to a refund if an airline makes a significant schedule change and/or significantly delays a flight and the passenger chooses not to travel.
- A passenger is entitled to a refund if they paid a fee for an optional service but were unable to use the service due to a flight cancellation, delay, schedule change or situation where they were involuntarily denied boarding.
- When a flight is not canceled but a passenger chooses not to board, a pas-



HSE Hockey's "A" team wins Class 4A state championship

Hamilton Southeastern hockey fans had two reasons to cheer on Saturday, March 7.

The HSE Hockey Club had two teams in the Indiana State High School Hockey Association state championship games that day. Southeastern qualified its "A" team into the Class 4A final, while HSE's "B" team made it to the 1A final.

The HSE "A" team won the championship of Class 4A, beating St. Joseph 1-0. The "B" team fell to Lake Central White 3-2, but it was, as Southeastern hockey coach Adrian Render said, a "huge accomplishment" to get there.

"Our boys came together and we just marched right through it. We were firing on cylinders," said Render.

That sent Southeastern to the championship game the following Saturday at the Midwest Training & Ice Center in Dyer. It was a hard-fought game, with neither team scoring until late in the third period. Andy Grasso scored HSE's winning goal from Cameron Theobald.

Six Indiana high school boys basketball coaches have been chosen as 2020 Bob King Coaches of the Year by their peers in the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association, it was announced Tuesday.

David McCollough of Shenandoah, Marc Davidson of Fort Wayne Blackhawk Christian, Marc Urban of Chesterton, Al Gooden of Lawrence Central, Nate Hawkins of Heritage Hills and Kendall Wildey of South Decatur have been selected as honorees for the 2019-2020

Honors are awarded according to IH-SAA district boundaries, and two coaches from each district are recipients – Davidson and Urban in District 1; Gooden and McCollough in District 2; and Hawkins and Wildey in District 3.

McCollough is cited after directing Shenandoah to a 23-2 season that included championships of the Henry County Tournament, the Mid-Eastern Conference and the Hagerstown Sectional. McCollough is 111-17 in five seasons at Shenandoah, including four sectional titles and one regional crown. He is 576-250 in 36 seasons as a varsity coach with 12 sectional, two regional and 13 conference championships at three schools. McCollough's teams won 157 games and five sectionals in 11 seasons at North Judson (1983-94). His teams added 308 victories with three sectional titles and a regional crown in 20 seasons at Noblesville. McCollough, a Manchester and Indiana University graduate, has been an IBCA district Coach of the Year on three previous occasions (1997, 2007 and 2016). He also was head coach for the 2000 Indiana All-Star Team.

Davidson is cited after leading Fort Wayne Blackhawk Christian to a 23-3 season that included championships of the Noblesville Holiday Tournament and the Manchester Sectional. In seven seasons with the Braves, Davidson's teams have compiled a 146-47 record with six sectional titles, two regional crowns, one semi-state title and one state championship. In 14 seasons as a boys' varsity coach, he has a 231-117 ledger. Davidson previously coached three seasons at Macomb Christian (Mich.), two seasons at Trinity International University in Illinois, one season at Aurora Christian (Ill.), two seasons at Dominican Christian (Va.) and two seasons at Lakewood Park Christian. Davidson is a 1991 graduate of Aurora Christian, a 1995 graduate of Trinity International University and played professional basketball in Europe from 1995 through 2006.

Urban is honored after directing Chesterton to a 23-3 season and the Duneland Conference championship at 7-0. In four seasons at Chesterton, Urban's teams have compiled a 79-23 record and won a sectional championship in 2019. Urban is a 2001 graduate of Lake Central High School, where he played basketball and football. He matriculated to Indiana State, where he served as a men's basketball manager for Royce Waltman and graduated in 2006. Urban began coaching as a boys' assistant at Lake Central. He then became the Lake Central girls' coach, guiding the team to an 80-17 record over four seasons with two DAC titles (2015, 2016) and two sectional titles (2013, 2015). He was voted an IBCA 66-22 record with two conference titles,
