Working to keep everyone safe

Local leaders respond to Indiana's public health emergency

The Hamilton County Commissioners have ordered the county to operate under a Level Three Operations in response to Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb's stay at home order to prevent the spread of the COVID-19. All county government offices will be closed to in-person public activity until at least April 7.

"One of the most difficult decisions we have had to make as Commissioners was to close down County Government for the safety of the public and our employees. We are only open for essential reasons," said Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger. I hope and pray that everyone will do their part over the next two weeks to make the Governor's plan to slow this virus. I promise you that we in County Government will be doing everything in our power to keep everyone safe."

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard announced Carmel City Hall has closed to the public until further notice. Brainard also ordered the closure of a section of the

Monon Greenway and Midtown Plaza.

"It is unfortunate that we have to take these drastic measures to protect our residents, businesses and our city employees," Brainard said. "I do want to emphasize that only the building is closed, the business of the city continues."

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen announced the declaration of a local disaster emergency as part of a multi-faceted strategy to address the evolving COVID-19 pandemic.

"Issuing a local disaster emergency in Noblesville works in conjunction with Governor Holcomb's stay-at-home order and strengthens enforcement here in our city," Jensen said. "I ask you to only leave your home if you work at an essential business, are getting necessary supplies or must leave for health and safety purposes."

Westfield Mayor Andy Cook has ordered all Westfield city buildings closed to the public. All essential city services will continue uninterrupted, but within proper social distancing guidelines. Mayor Cook also issued an Executive Order in support

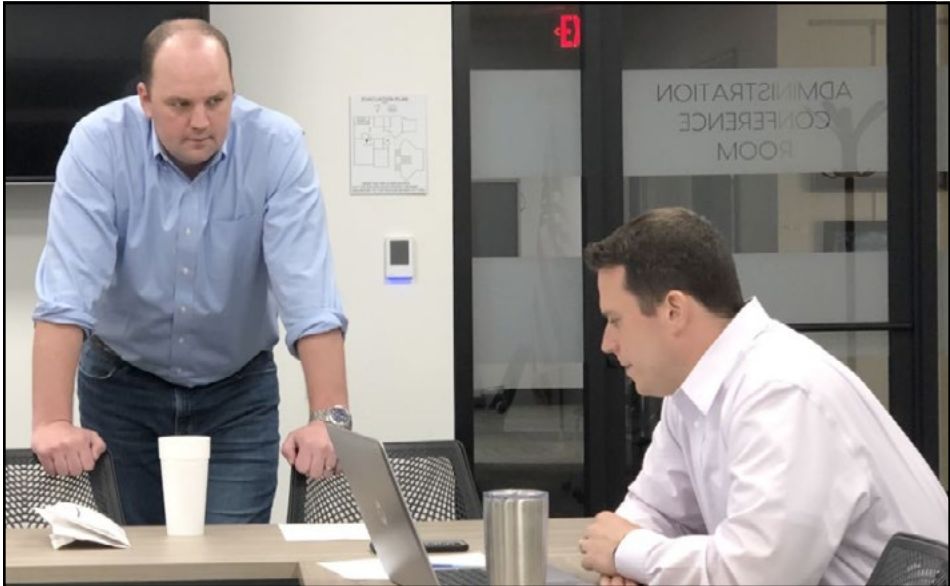

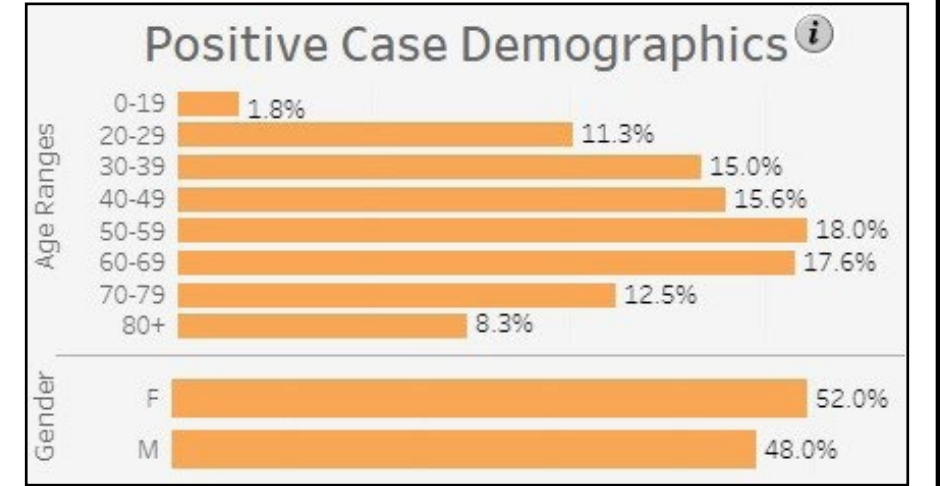
of Governor Eric Holcomb's declaration of a Public Health Emergency for all Indiana residents as it relates the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We know that social separation will be the only way we 'flatten the curve'," Cook said. "The governor's bold steps set the stage for the city to do its part. I have asked our law enforcement personnel to help in this effort, but more importantly I ask our citizens to do their part."

Fishers City Council members voted unanimously to approve two resolutions extending executive orders already issued by Mayor Scott Fadness. Under state law, such orders by a mayor may only last seven days. The City Council must vote in favor of extending the mayor's authority to issue orders.

The council resolutions continue for as long as Governor Eric Holcomb's orders remain in force.

County Council works to ensure transparency by setting up virtual meetings

In an effort to protect people's health, while upholding the commitment to open government, the Hamilton County Council is transitioning from in-person meetings to virtual meetings.

On March 23, Governor Holcomb issued executive order 20-09, which relates to the continuity of government operations. The governor's order modifies the manner of convening public meetings by authorizing governing bodies to meet virtually or remotely if a quorum is present. The executive order also man-

dates that the meeting be made available to the public and media for real-time observation.

The Hamilton County Council is partnering with Hamilton County TV to not only provide real-time observation of the April 1 council meeting, but to ensure that anyone who does

wish to comment during public hearing section of the meeting can do so.

The county currently uses Microsoft TEAMS software to conduct interdepartmental meetings with employees in various locations. Microsoft

Permanent art on the Noblesville Courthouse Square coming in April

Hipstoric Noblesville is about to get an infusion of art on the historic courthouse square. Noblesville Premium Properties recently purchased the former Key Bank Building at 9th and Logan streets, and have renamed it The Gordon Building. The building is getting a facelift with some façade updates and mural panels.

"We wanted to give artists with ties to Noblesville an opportunity to showcase their work and inject some creativity into the downtown cityscape," said Dar-

ren Ratcliffe, President of Noblesville Premium Properties. "When our family purchased the former Key Bank building, we envisioned murals surrounding the building that would contrast the old with the new."

Built in 1910, the limestone building has been a cornerstone on the Courthouse Square. In 1933 when famous bank robber John Dillinger was a threat to the Midwest, the bank received a tip that Dillinger's men had been casing the bank -

Get your absentee ballot sooner rather than later

The League of Women Voters of Hamilton County, being aware that all eligible voters in Indiana are being encouraged to use absentee ballots, provides the following information to help people understand the process.

Normally an individual must meet some criteria to use an absentee ballot, but that has been waived. The Hamilton County government offices are closed to the public so everything must be handled by mail, email, fax or phone. Beth Sheller, the Hamilton County Elections Administrator, asks that everyone get their absentee ballots this sooner rather than later.

Firstly, you must be registered to vote by May 4 and that can be done at indianavoters.in.gov. If you have an address or name change, you can update your voter registration. Another way to register or update your record, is to print out and mail the form found at hamilton-county.in.gov/385/Registrar-to-Vote. You may also call (317) 776-9632 to have a voter registration form mailed to you. Voter registration forms must be mailed and cannot be returned using email or fax.

Secondly, you must apply for an absentee ballot. Everything you need to know can be found at hamiltoncounty.in.gov/220/

How-To-Vote-Early-or-Absentee. You must submit an application by May 21. You can download it from the website or call (317) 776-8476 to request an application. Do so Monday through Friday between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., or you can leave a message with your name and address. The application can be returned to the Hamilton County Election Board in one of three ways:

1. By mail (address provided)
2. Scanned or a phone picture and emailed to elections@hamiltoncounty.in.gov
3. By fax to (317) 776-8218

If you do not receive

your absentee ballot within 10 days, call (317) 776-8476.

Thirdly, once received and filled out, you should return the absentee ballot to the Hamilton County Election Board by mail in the envelope provided. All ballots must be received by the Elections Board by noon on June 2. The absentee ballot cannot be faxed, emailed, or returned in person. Be sure that the ballot envelope is signed on the outside.

This new scam will likely inform you that you have missed a federal court date or an appointment for a handwriting analysis. These scammers are claiming to be calling on behalf of HC-SO's own Captain of Investigations Scott McKinney.

Captain McKinney has not authorized these calls and states that his name and position are being used for this scam. This scam is said to have originated from outside of the United States.

Study reports coronavirus has mutated into two different strains

On Thursday, the Hamilton County Reporter's news gathering partner WISH-TV reported a study has now indicated the coronavirus has mutated into two different strains.

Doctor Mary Gillis, D. Ed reported there are two strains of the coronavirus. "One had mutated into another strand. First, we had the S type. Then we

had the L type. The L type came from S type."

According to Gillis, type L is the more prevalent, powerful and aggressive of the two strains.

Gillis also indicated a mutation of a virus can also affect the kind of treatment and the development of a vaccine. "Luckily, the coronavirus mutates much more slowly than other viruses."

Suspect fires shots at police . . . Two people found dead in Fishers apartment

The Fishers Police Department is investigating the deaths of two adults at the Britton Woods Apartment Complex.

Around 2:30 p.m. on March 23, Fishers police officers were called to check the welfare of an individual in the 13900 block of Ashlake Lane (near 141st Street and State Road 37). As officers approached the apartment building, a suspect began shooting from a second-floor apartment. Officers immediately took cover and secured the area.

Emergency Response Teams and Negotiators responded. Attempts to establish communication with the suspect were unsuccessful. Emergency Response Team members made entry to the apartment. Once inside, officers located an adult female and an adult male both suffering injuries believed to be from a firearm. Both the male and female succumbed to their injuries at the scene.

Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin identified the deceased as Derrick Upshaw, 49, and Tiffany Plummer, 34.

Carmel's Flowing Well Park to close for improvements

On or after April 15, Flowing Well Park will close to undergo planned improvements, including Cool Creek bank stabilization, restroom construction, parking lot expansion and updated interpretive signage and trails. The Clay Township Impact Program funds these enhancements as part of Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation's Reimagining Parks initiative.

The park will reopen after construction is complete in December 2020.

"The updates will make Flowing Well Park more functional for the everyday visitor," said Michael Allen, CCPR Director of Parks & Natural Resources. "We are expanding not only access to trails, but recreational opportunities. To me, beyond being good stewards of quality habitat, the next most im-

portant thing is getting people to see it and value it."

Over the next three years, the Clay Township Impact Program will fund improvements to six parks in the community with a focus on parks and public safety. These improvements will provide benefits for all township residents, schools and businesses and make the community a better place to live, work and play.

Carmel Court adjustments

The REPORTER

In response to concerns about COVID-19, the Carmel City Court, working with local officials and monitoring the situation with guidance from health officials, will remain open but will immediately adjust the manner in which operations are conducted in order to protect the public health.

Administrative Rule 17 describes the Indiana Supreme Court's ability to oversee the local administration of trial courts in the event of any unanticipated work interruption.

Trial courts can utilize the rule by petitioning the Supreme Court for emergency relief, if needed, based on local circumstances such as a public health crisis. Judge Brian G. Poindexter has petitioned the Indiana Supreme Court for emergency relief in response to the pandemic that threatens our community.

The Indiana State Department of Health, which is Indiana's lead agency on COVID-19, has the latest information about the virus. The best approach is to use fundamental healthy practices, such as washing your hands, covering your mouth

with your arm or a tissue rather than your hand, and staying home when you are ill.

Maintaining required court operations is important so that the public is guaranteed due process and access to justice. The health and safety of court employees and the community are equally important.

Therefore, Carmel City Court will be working to develop a number of changes in daily operations, with additional details coming soon. The court has already continued a number of public hearings to aid in the reduction of transmission of the virus.

Court Employees

All staff of the Carmel City Court and City Clerk's Office will be in contact with the Judge, City Clerk or direct supervisor for instruction, employees will come to work if they have been designated as essential staff at the court, while others may be instructed to work remotely.

Litigants/Parties to a Case

Individuals who are scheduled to come to Carmel City Court for a hearing, for a criminal matter or

traffic infraction/ordinance, during the month of March and April should contact the court at (317) 571-2440. The court, on its own motion, has already continued a number of matters given the present public health concerns. You should contact the Clerk of Court to learn the new date.

If represented, litigants should be in contact with their attorney to receive the advice of counsel.

Attorneys

Lawyers who are scheduled to appear during the month of March and April should expect that the matter will be continued by the court to a new date. Lawyers with matters scheduled in the month of May should consider filing a motion to continue or check with the court on potential dates for rescheduling.

E-filing and Odyssey

Indiana's e-filing system is working. Cases and documents can continue to be filed through the statewide system.

The statewide case management system (Odyssey)

is working. Litigants, attorneys, press and the public can continue to view case information on [my-case.in.gov](#). Not all courts use Odyssey; see a listing of courts online.

Jail

The Hamilton County courts are working with the County Sheriff to ensure public safety. Anyone arrested or defendants already in jail will have their cases addressed quickly by a judge or magistrate. The courts have the ability to address matters involving incarcerated individuals both in person or electronically to assure due process and access to justice.

Probation and Court-ordered Services

Hamilton County court runs the Hamilton County probation department/court ordered services. All individuals on probation should continue to be in contact with their officer and are expected to continue to appear in person for drug screens and as otherwise directed by their probation officer.

Carmel, Noblesville suspend some waste pickup

To ensure the health and safety of the community the following temporary changes will be made to residential trash and recycling collection in Carmel. These changes will be in effect until April 7 and may be extended if warranted.

While basic trash and recyclables pick up will continue, the City of Carmel Utilities and Republic Services have temporarily suspended bulk item and bulky landscape waste pick up. Any previously arranged and paid for service will take place as scheduled.

Trash and recyclables collection will continue

through their respective carts. Trash is to be bagged and recyclables kept loose.

The basic service in Carmel also includes 20 extra bags of landscape waste per week during the months of April and May and Oct. 15 through Dec. 15. That aspect of the service will continue but may be subject to change. Extra bags of landscape waste may be picked up by a truck other than your regular trash truck. There also might be a delay in service for bagged landscape waste. Residents are requested to put bagged landscape waste in their trash cart whenever possible.

Republic Services is

taking every precaution necessary to limit the exposure to the virus for all of their employees. Bulk item pick up requires two staff members to travel together and work as a team to remove objects. This close proximity is not recommended by health experts.

In addition to the suspension of brush pickup, Republic Services has asked Noblesville to suspend selling overage bags until the COVID-19 crisis is over. Republic will also suspend picking up bulky items (which they do as an additional charge to the resident).

HSE Hockey's "A" team wins Class 4A state championship

Hamilton Southeastern hockey fans had two reasons to cheer on Saturday, March 7.

The HSE Hockey Club had two teams in the Indiana State High School Hockey Association state championship games that day. Southeastern qualified its "A" team into the Class 4A final, while HSE's "B" team made it to the 1A final.

The HSE "A" team won the championship of Class 4A, beating St. Joseph 1-0. The "B" team fell to Lake Central White 3-2, but it was, as Southeastern hockey coach Adrian Render said, a "huge accomplishment" to get there.

Winning the championship was a major accomplishment for the HSE "A" team as well, especially the way it won. Southeastern was one of eight teams in Class 4A that made the playdown round, which took place Feb. 28 to March 1 at the Ice Box Skating Rink in South Bend. Seeded sixth, HSE won all three games in the double-elimination tournament, beating Lakeshore-St. Joe 3-2, Penn 3-1 and Zionsville 3-1.

"Our boys came together and we just marched right through it. We were firing on cylinders," said Render.

That sent Southeastern to the championship game the following Saturday at the Midwest Training & Ice Center in Dyer. It was a hard-fought game, with neither team scoring until late in the third period. Andy Grasso scored HSE's winning goal from Cameron Theobald.

"The championship game was all the way down to the wire," said Render. "Both teams battled very hard."

Render said the St. Joseph team is "a good hockey club and we got our bounce at the right time with about 3:31 left in the third period. It was a back and forth game all the way through."

Southeastern goaltender Ethan Kreider saved 44 St. Joseph shots, which Render said was a "pretty high" number. Usually HSE gives up 20 to

25 shots in a game.

"Both teams were just buzzing around the net," said Render.

The coach said his team came together, and that teamwork resulted in the state title win.

"We had no real one guy that stood out," said Render. "It was a great team effort. Dane Baker, he scored two of our go-ahead goals in the playdown games. Everyone did their job and did their part to win this title."

Southeastern finished its season 27-23-4, playing a difficult schedule. The HSE "A" team takes on Indiana teams like Carmel and Culver Academies, in addition to squads from Missouri and the Chicago area. Southeastern also plays in the Hoosier League Championship, where it takes on schools such as Carmel Gold, Brebeuf and Zionsville.

In the 1A playdown games, the HSE "B" team beat South Stars White 5-0 in its first game, but lost to Lake Central White 3-1 in its second game. Southeastern took care of Penn JV 4-1 in order to clinch a spot in the championship game.

Render said the HSE "B" team is more of a development team, made up of younger players. The "A" team features players that have played at high levels and is mostly made up of underclassmen.

"We put a lot of emphasis on winning and teamwork and building," said Render. The "B" team is designed to develop the younger players "so they can step into the role of the 'A' team when we graduate our seniors," said the coach.

'Special' senior season at Valpo for John Kiser

John Kiser got to do something a few weeks ago that few of his fellow college basketball players also got to do: Play in a championship game.

Kiser finished his senior season at Valparaiso University by playing in the championship contest of the Missouri Valley Conference tournament. It was the former Noblesville star's final game of a remarkable career that saw him go from a walk-on as a freshman to a senior that earned awards, honors and the satisfaction of a solid career.

"It's been a fun and challenging journey," said Kiser. "Coming in I didn't really know what to expect but I decided that I was gonna make the most of everything."

While Kiser played sporadically during the first part of his freshman season, Kiser was a regular on the floor in the second half. In Valpo's next-to-last game of the season against Milwaukee, Kiser earned the first start of his career. He was part of a team that finished the season 24-9 and received a berth into the NIT.

Kiser earned a scholarship his sophomore year and became a solid contributor to the team over his next three seasons. After two 15-win seasons during his sophomore and junior years, this season's Crusaders team finished 19-16. Younger players stepped up for Valpo this year, including sophomore Javon Freeman-Liberty, far and away the Crusaders' leading scorer with a 19.0 points per game average.

"This season was extremely special to me because of the guys I got to play with," said Kiser. "Seeing my teammates grow throughout the year and the team grow together was something I didn't get the last two years. I really wanted the team to get back on track with where we were my freshman year and this year was a huge step. I look forward to seeing what these guys do in the upcoming years."

Valpo fans may have gotten a sneak preview

in how the Crusaders performed during the MVC tournament. Valparaiso entered as a No. 7 seed, winning its first-round game over the University of Evansville 58-55 on March 5. Kiser had six points and five rebounds in that game.

In the March 6 quarter-finals, the Crusaders upset the No. 2 seed, Loyola of Chicago, the first time Valpo had ever won against the Ramblers. The Crusaders got past Loyola 74-73 in overtime, with Kiser providing the assist on the game-winner, a layup by Eron Gordon. Kiser scored 12 points in that game, matching his career-high from earlier in the season (he also scored 12 points in Valparaiso's Jan. 18 game with Indiana State).

The Crusaders continued their run in the March 7 semi-finals, beating Missouri State 89-82. Kiser scored 17 points to set a new career-high mark. Valpo's run finally ended in the championship game on March 8, when it lost to Bradley 80-66 after playing four games in four days. Kiser scored eight points.

"The Missouri Valley Conference is a bottom to top hard conference to play in," said Kiser. "Anyone could win on any given night and that showed in the tournament. Winning games back to back to back and playing the fourth one on that fourth day is a very difficult thing to do physically and mentally. Not being able to sleep at night and hearing the crowd and band playing while you tried to sleep was exhausting. The championship game was heartbreaking but we had achieved so much to the point and just ran out of gas at the end. It was cool for this year that we were the only like Cinderella story to happen in March. It was very fortunate for us to even play our conference tournament and I will always be thankful for the experiences and memories that I made."

Kiser has been honored for his contributions to the Crusaders' team this season, starting with being named to the MVC All-Bench team, Schol-
