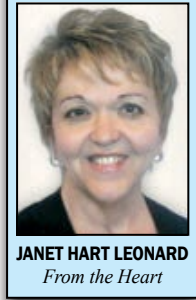

Fishers holds virtual job fair to help displaced workers, desperate businesses

The city of Fishers is trying to get more people hired as unemployment rises across the nation.

Fishers is compiling a list of businesses around the city in need of workers in the hopes that those displaced by the virus can continue to get an income and stimulate the local economy.

Jobs in Fishers are shrinking, along with those in the rest of the country, but the virus gave the city a bit of a shock after having seen its economy on the rise.

"We've had unbelievably low unemployment rates in the city of Fishers, but obviously, we now have industries that are devastated currently," Mayor Scott Fadness said. "Whether it's the restaurant or hospitality industry, a lot of those service workers are currently out of jobs and we want to

Multiple county organizations partner to create new job board

The Hamilton County Economic Development Corporation has partnered with Hamilton County Tourism and OneZone, Noblesville and Westfield Chambers of Commerce to provide immediate job opening information to assist workers who have been displaced during the impact of COVID-19.

Although many businesses have had to make tough decisions to lay off or furlough their staffs, other businesses have seen an increase in demand or are still in need of filling vital positions in their companies during this difficult time.

"There are many workers across the county - particularly in the service and hospitality industry - who cannot work right now and we felt it was important as a county to provide a place to find those

companies who are hiring both temporary and permanent positions in Hamilton County. This is also a way to provide a place for those businesses who are hiring to list their current job openings," said Carol Sergi, Director of Workforce Strategy for Hamilton County Economic

Carmel nurse fighting for her life on ventilator

A Carmel nurse is on a ventilator, fighting for her life after contracting COVID-19.

Lesley Vogel, 60, is at Ascension St. Vincent Carmel. Her daughters, Carolina and Meredith, told News 8 they can't even visit their mother because of strict visiting restrictions due to the new virus.

"It's been pretty scary. I live with her, so I've been with her through the whole process of her being sick," said Meredith Vogel.

Vogel is a nurse for St. Vincent's call transfer center. She has been working there for about a year.

Her daughters told News 8 she had mentioned being glad to be working the phones and not necessarily on the front lines in order to avoid exposure. But now she's fighting for

her life at Ascension St. Vincent Carmel.

"Those were her main symptoms. The mild cough, shortness of breath, temperature. She just didn't feel great. She was saying she felt poorly," said Carolina Vogel.

Carolina says it all started a little more than a week ago. Her mom complained about not feeling well. So she went to get a COVID-19 test through Eli Lilly's drive-up testing.

Last Saturday, Vogel, still not feeling well, went to a neighborhood hospital. Doctors saw signs of pneumonia and admitted her to Ascension St. Vincent Carmel that night.

Less than 24 hours later, Vogel's condition had rapidly deteriorated. She was intubated, sedated, and put on a ventilator.

"Now, I can't even talk to her. So it's really scary and it's really worrisome," said Meredith Vogel.

Even more terrifying, the COVID-19 test didn't come back positive until Monday, 48 hours after she had been admitted.

"So, by that time, she didn't even know she is COVID positive for sure. Because they came in after she was intubated," said Carolina Vogel.

Now, the girls hope by sharing their story more people will take social distancing to heart.

"I didn't think that it would happen to us. But now that it has, I know that it could happen to truly anybody. So I think it's just important for everyone to be smart and stay home," said Meredith Vogel.

The girls say doctors give them updates over the phone once a day and they hope to have their mom off the ventilator in two weeks. That's an amount of time they hope will be enough for their mother's lungs to heal.

Stay home and go to the library

While the library locations are closed, Carmel Clay Public Library cardholders still have a wide selection of digital titles that they can check out from home.

According to Carmel Clay Public Library Communications Manager Christy Walker, while the physical books are lonely and the library is closed for the COVID-19 pandemic, there are still an abundance of options for current cardholders and there are now options to sign up for a card online.

"OverDrive and Hoopla Digital are two great sources for ebooks and audiobooks, and each has apps available," Walker said. "Hoopla Digital also has streaming movies and TV shows, as does another digital service called Kanopy. Both of these work well on Roku, Apple TV, and other streaming services. RBdigital offers hundreds of digital magazines. All of those services carry titles for kids, too. Three services that are geared especially for kids

are Tumblebooks, Bookflix, and Trueflix. Look for them on our website."

Carmel residents who don't yet have a library card can sign up for a temporary library card number online at carmel.lib.in.us.

"This card number will give them access to these digital resources, and when the library reopens, they can stop by to exchange it for regular library card with full access to the library's physical collection," Walker told The Reporter.

Walker also recommends looking at Tutor.com and [Pronunciator](http://Pronunciator.com) as online resources.

"Tutor.com is best known as a source of homework help, and it's perfect for parents who may be struggling

to help their kids with virtual learning," Walker said. "Our cardholders can log in at tutor.com from 3 to 11 p.m. to connect with an online tutor. Tutor.com also offers adult learners and job seekers assistance with things like resume and cover letter writing as well as interview preparation. Pronunciator is a fantastic online language-learning tool. It's great for people who may find themselves with unexpected downtime and a thwarted desire to travel. Visit our website to get started."

Due to licensing agreements with these services, access is limited to Carmel Clay Public Library resident cardholders.

Other public libraries in Hamilton County offer similar services, so you should look at your home library's website to find out what's available to you.

Candidates in a quandary . . .

Upcoming election by mail only?

We are now within two months of the postponed primary election, set for June 2. It is certain to be the strangest election of our time.

Generally, election campaigning is underway by this time of year. But, with most of the electorate housebound, there is little sign of an approaching election.

The election itself could even be conducted by mail only if Indiana Secretary of

State Connie Lawson determines that is the best course of action. She will make that decision by April 22.

For candidates, the whole situation presents a real quandary. They cannot go door-to-door and they cannot attend various political and community meetings usually held in advance of an election.

TV, newspaper and mailed material are about the only ways to reach large numbers of voters, and these methods are expensive.

So far a scattering of candidates for Congress

and State Senate have run advertising. That includes congressional hopefuls Beth Henderson and Victoria Spartz, and Scott Baldwin and John Gaynor running for the Senate.

But, Spartz and Henderson are only two among a field of 15 candidates in the Republican primary for Congress.

On the local ballot there are also contests for county commissioner between Steve Dillinger and Charlie McMillan, for county

make sure we can tie them to other employment that's available."

Fishers plans to do that through an online spreadsheet they're calling a "virtual job fair." Places in need of workers can specify what type of business they are, how to contact them, and what exactly they're looking for. This way, everything job seekers need is all in one place.

"We know that there are a lot of people being displaced during this difficult time from their employment, but at the same time, there are industries that are in dire need of employees to meet the needs," Fadness said. "So we wanted to connect those two and we have a great relationship with our local business community, so we reached out to them and said 'Who of you are looking to hire?' and 'Hopefully we can tie you to

some people who are in need of jobs.'"

Out of the 17 places on the virtual job fair today, the majority of them are designated as food service, retail and grocery – the places you'd expect to still be open. But Mayor Fadness says there's no limit to what jobs can go on there, especially as restrictions lift or tighten.

"During these difficult times, we've got to be innovative, we've got to be creative," Fadness said. "We've got to adapt. We've got to move people around, move businesses around, and really try to meet the needs of a very changing, very fluid dynamic, so that's what we're doing right now."

reassured that attending organized blood drives is safe. Coronavirus is currently not known to infect patients through blood transfusions.

All donor-facing staff will have their temperature taken prior to beginning their workday. Donors' temperatures will be taken at registration to ensure they are not elevated prior to entering donation areas. Donors will be asked if they are currently experiencing coughing or shortness of breath or have recently traveled to high-risk countries as defined by the CDC. If any of the above is true, donors will be asked to self-defer.

Versiti is asking donors who have travelled to China, Iran, South Korea or Italy to self-defer from donation for 28 days after their date of return.

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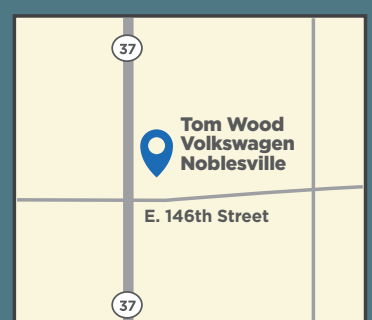
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Fishers Music Academy goes virtual

Beware of fake COVID-19 tests

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill is warning Hoosiers of scammers taking advantage of the scarcity of COVID-19 tests by falsely claiming to be able to provide testing.

There are currently no tests that can be self-administered at home to find out whether someone has COVID-19.

The only tests currently available in Indiana require a doctor's order and specimen collection done by a medical professional. At this time, there is no FDA-approved blood test to determine whether someone has COVID-19.

Because conditions are constantly changing regarding the availability of testing and decisions about who qualifies, Hoosiers should keep up with the latest information by consulting credible sources.

The Indiana State Department of Health's COVID-19 Call Center can be reached 24/7 at 877-826-0011, and the agency regularly updates the coronavirus.in.gov website.

The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention maintains online information about testing, and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration also provides in-depth information related to these topics.

As always, if you encounter suspected scams, you may report them online to the Consumer Protection Division of the Office of the Indiana Attorney General. If you need additional information regarding the Office's Consumer Protection Division, please call 1-800-382-5516.

AG Hill receives dozens of price-gouging complaints

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill said Thursday that consumers have submitted dozens of price-gouging complaints to his office since Gov. Eric

Holcomb declared a public health emergency amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

Consumers have submitted complaints regarding high prices at superstores, home improvement stores,

grocery stores, e-commerce websites and more, Hill said. Consumers say these sellers are charging excessive amounts for toilet paper, food, cleaning products and other items.

“Hoosier consumers should never have to pay exorbitant prices for essential products, especially amid the coronavirus pandemic, which is causing thousands to suffer financial hardships,” Hill said.

Attorneys from the office's Consumer Protection Division review all price-gouging complaints and contact the consumers who submit the complaints.

If it is determined that a seller committed an unfair or unconscionable business practice, the office then considers issuing a cease and desist letter to that seller.

While specific price-gouging authority in Indiana law refers to fuel prices during a state of emergency, the office has the authority to enforce the Deceptive Consumer Sales Act, which permits appropriate enforcement of any unfair, abusive, deceptive or unconscionable conduct. Since 2017, the Consumer Protection Division has processed **34,000 complaints** related to identity theft, licensing

and consumer issues.

Hill encourages consumers who believe they have been subjected to excessive prices for consumer goods during this ongoing public health emergency to file complaints with the Consumer Protection Division. To file a complaint online, [click here](#). Pictures of the prices and product, as well as copies of receipts, are very beneficial in expediting the complaint through the review process.

In addition to price gouging, Hill encourages Hoosiers to file complaints with the Consumer Protection Division if they are sub-

jected to other scams. These scams can include robocalls, phishing attempts, fraudulent products and sham work-from-home opportunities.

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Fishers road construction updates

State Road 37

126th Street west of SR 37 is currently closed and is anticipated to reopen in July. During this time, cross access and all left turns will be restricted, with only right in and right out until this phase ends. Traffic on southbound SR 37 will shift to the northbound lanes and two lanes will remain in each direction. Local access to businesses will remain open via Lantern Road. The official detour route will direct drivers to use 116th Street or 131st Street to Allisonville Road. Detour route markers and advance warning signs will be in place prior to the closure.

Stay-At-Home Order

Governor Holcomb has issued a Stay-At-Home Order effective now through Monday, April 20. The Stay-At-Home Order applies to the entire state of Indiana and states where unless you work at an essential business or are doing an essential activity, you must stay at home. Residents are not restricted from walking, jogging, biking, or outdoor activities, including driving to local parks. The City of Fishers encourages you to get outdoors and enjoy the fresh air.

96th Street

96th Street between Sargent Road and Cumberland Road is currently closed. During this time, the Sargent Road roundabout will be constructed, the bridge over Mud Creek will be replaced with a widened structure and additional travel lanes will be added. Local access will remain open from Lantern Road to the River Life Church. The Sargent Road roundabout is anticipated to reopen in mid-June. 96th Street east of Sargent Road to Cumberland Road will remain closed and is anticipated to reopen in early November. The official detour route will direct drivers to use Lantern Road or Cumberland Road to 106th Street. View the detour map [here](#).

116th Street

The northernmost west-bound lane of 116th Street between Lantern Road and Municipal Drive is currently restricted day and night for approximately 45 days. Access remains open to local businesses along the route.

Currently, westbound 116th Street between Municipal Drive and Post Office Road has lane restrictions in place for water main relocation.

136th Street

On Tuesday, April 7, 136th Street will be closed between Southeastern Parkway and Prairie Baptist Road and is anticipated to reopen on Friday, April 10.

Spyglass Falls Subdivision

ADA ramp reconstruction and road resurfacing is currently taking place and is anticipated to be completed by the end of June.

Municipal Drive

Currently, there lane restrictions on Municipal Drive behind the library in order to construct on-street parking and is anticipated to be completed by the end of June.

North Street

This week in Indiana's history ...

April 10, 1865 – This headline in the *Evansville Daily Journal* announced the surrender of Confederate General Robert E. Lee a day earlier at Appomattox Courthouse in Virginia. Hoosiers celebrated the end of the Civil War, which had cost the state over 24,000 lives.

1900 – The Western Union Telegraph Company announced that Indianapolis had become a central hub for the entire nation. Wires had been installed in the local office which could carry messages to and from Chicago, St. Louis, Louisville, Cincinnati,



Columbus, Cleveland, Toledo and other large cities. The 50 Indianapolis operators were handling over 200,000 messages each month.

1925 – The national convention of the American Association of University Women was held at the Claypool Hotel in Indianapolis. Delegates from across the nation met to discuss topics related to

women in higher education. The four-day seminar ended with a motorbus trip to the campus of Indiana University, where members met with IU President William Lowe Bryan and visited the studio of artist T. C. Steele.

1952 – Spokesmen for Indiana Bell Telephone Company announced an increase in the charge for the use of a pay phone. The

new cost would be a dime or two nickels. The old fee of five cents had been the rate for nearly 50 years.

1968 – A natural gas leak caused an explosion in downtown Richmond, killing 41 people and injuring more than 150. Twenty buildings were condemned as a direct result of the devastation.

1990 – Over 45,000 attended the Farm Aid Concert at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Willie Nelson headlined a program, which included Bonnie Raitt, Garth Brooks, Don Henley and Elton John, who dedicated "Candle in the Wind" to Ryan White. White died the next day at Riley Hospital.

Women's PGA Cup victory part of 'truly special' 2019 season for Kelly

Last October, Brittany Kelly got the chance to experience something that was a reminder of her high school and college golf days.

Kelly played for the United States team in the inaugural Women's PGA Cup, which took place at Omni Barton Creek Resort & Spa in Austin, Texas. The Americans won that first-ever cup, beating out the Canada team 671-675, with Kelly a major factor in the team's victory.

Being part of the Women's PGA Cup team was the culmination of a splendid year for Kelly. The former Hamilton Southeastern and Ball State University star also won two Indiana PGA tournaments, competed in her first LPGA major and was the runner-up at the National PGA Women's Stroke Play Championship.

For all these achievements, Kelly was named the Indiana PGA Women's Player of the Year for 2019. Kelly is the assistant professional at Woodland Country Club in Carmel.

"The 2019 golf season was truly special to me. It wouldn't have been possible without the support I received from my family, Patrick White, Tim Diedrich and Callaway Golf, and the members and staff at Woodland Country Club," said Kelly. "I'm so fortunate to continue to play the game I love and compete at a high level. I've always tried to have higher expectations for myself than anyone else has for me. This has allowed me to set my goals high and continue to work towards them every single day."

Kelly's first big tournament of the year was the National PGA Women's Stroke Play Championship, which took place in February at Wanamaker & Ryder in Port St. Lucie, Fla. Kelly finished as the runner-up in that event, making a final-day run in the third round of the event before placing second by one stroke.

In June, Kelly traveled to Hazeltine National Golf Club in Chaska, Minn. For the KPMG Women's PGA Championship to play in her first major tournament. Back in Indiana, she won two big events in the span of a few days: Kelly dominated the Indiana PGA Women's Open at Purdue's Ackerman-Allen Course, winning by 10 strokes. After that, Kelly headed to Purgatory to place first in the Indiana PGA Assistant's Championship. The only woman in the field, she won by five strokes.

All the while, Kelly was focused on making the Women's PGA Cup team, saying she had her sights set on playing the event as soon as it was announced.

"I adjusted my schedule to compete in the events needed to earn enough points to gain a spot on the team," said Kelly. "It came down to the last event, which I barely made it on the team by less than 20 points. On paper, I was the fifth player on a team of five. I felt like I needed to make the most of the opportunity and contribute to the team."

Kelly did just that. In the first day of the three-day competition, she carded a three under par 69, helping the team to move past Canada by two strokes after the first round. Kelly again led the team

on a tough, windy Day 2 by posting a 75, then helped clinch the cup with a third-day score of 74.

"It's incredible to look back on the event and know that my score counted every day for the team," said Kelly. "We made history for women in the game of golf and PGA professionals across the world. It was truly an honor to be on the Inaugural Women's PGA Cup Team and win the event. I've made friendships that will last a lifetime and memories that I will never forget."

With the competition being close between the U.S. and Canadian teams, there were some pressure situations. But Kelly knew that she had the support of her

teammates.

"The unique thing about being in pressure situations at the Women's PGA Cup was that you could rely on your teammates to help you out," said Kelly. "It reminded me of playing high school and college golf having the support and encouragement from my teammates and Captain Suzy Whaley. Those pressure situations are something I have enjoyed throughout my competitive career in every sport I competed in."

Kelly, in fact, played with Whaley last year in the National PGA Senior Junior Team Championship. She also made some new friends during her memorable and historic week.

"The friendships I created that week with my teammates will last a lifetime," said Kelly. "We had some great conversations, fun practice rounds, and amazing dinners. I will never forget finishing out the last putt and having the team spray me with water on the 18th green after we won."

Kelly took part in two more big tournaments during the year, finishing tied for 12th at the LPGA Teaching and Club Professionals National Championship. She also returned to Wanamaker in Port St. Lucie, Fla. in mid-November to play in the National PGA Assistant Professional Championship, where she placed 15th.
