

# County health officials refuse to release city-by-city COVID-19 data

## The REPORTER

The Hamilton County Health Department's Board of Directors has decided not to release city-by-city data of patients who test positive to the COVID-19 virus.

"We understand the public's desire to know how our cities and towns are faring in the war against this virus," says County Health Officer Dr. Charles Harris. "But we must adhere to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). If we don't, we could incur hefty fines for each and every infraction."

HIPAA provides data privacy and security provisions for safeguarding personal health information. After discussing patient privacy with the Indiana State Department of Health and the State's Office of Public Affairs, the Hamilton County Health Department's Board of Directors has decided to keep identifiable information to a minimum.

## County hides behind HIPAA

*Doesn't take a rocket scientist to see flaws in this logic*

On Monday, Hamilton County officials issued a statement saying city-by-city COVID-19 data would not be released to the public.

## Aspire switches to telehealth

As some behavioral health providers have been forced to scale back or even cease services during the COVID-19 pandemic, Aspire Indiana Health was able to quickly switch to virtual telehealth appointments to continue serving its clients, most of them through video meetings.

Assessment and behavioral health appointments can be conducted via video meeting, or by telephone if the patient doesn't have a video-capable device. Aspire has also been able to provide free phones to 25 at-risk patients who lacked them.

Aspire is the state-certified Community Mental Health Center (CMHC) provider in Boone, Hamilton, Madison and Marion counties. It also offers primary medical care and support services, accepts Medicare, Medicaid and most commercial insurance.

Five years ago, Aspire began converting to a more versatile cloud-based digital platform that left it well-positioned for this type of crisis. The Health Department does share a county-wide heat-map displaying positive COVID-19 cases with police, EMS, and firefighters from each of the cities and towns during a daily meeting with Emergency Management.

"The people who need to know this information, know this information," Harris said. "Please trust that those working the front lines of this battle are aware of the hotspots and are doing their very best to mitigate the risk to each and every citizen."

The Health Department's Board of Directors is made up of two physicians, a physician's assistant, a nurse, a veterinarian and two lay people. All positions are appointed.

Nile virus that anyone nearby with an obituary in the next day's paper died of West Nile?

Every year Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin tracks the number of overdose deaths in Hamilton County. Chalfin breaks the deaths down by city/town in which the overdose occurred. He makes those results available to the public.

Harris says he has a county-wide heat-map that is shared daily with emergency personnel.

Why can the county report West Nile virus hotspots but not coronavirus?

Why can the coroner report city-by-city data on fatal drug overdoses, but the county cites HIPAA in COVID-19 cases?

The Carmel Police Department announced two of its officers tested positive for COVID-19.

Mayor Chris Jensen announced a Noblesville fireman tested positive for COVID-19.

The Indiana State Police released information indicating three of the agency's employees have COVID-19.

IU Health released data indicating the number of COVID-19 tests completed at its facilities and the number of confirmed cases resulting from those tests.

Additionally, IU announced the number of employees that have tested positive.

IU Health is one of the largest healthcare providers in the state. I'm sure they have a team of legal advisors reviewing information being made available to the public, yet Hamilton County won't say how Jackson Township is being impacted.

The statement issued by the county on Monday quoted Harris: "The people who need to know this information, know this information."

I'm no "rocket scientist," but to me it seems the county's position is that the public doesn't need to know.

Harris said, "Please trust that those working the front lines of this battle are aware of the hotspots and are doing their very best to mitigate the risk to each and every citizen."

I agree, we should trust those on the front line; however, transparency goes a long way in earning that trust.

Is it HIPAA or does the county not want you to know? You decide.

# One suspect remains at-large in armed robbery

At approximately 4:20 p.m. on March 21, Noblesville police officers responded to the residence of 15361 Dusty Trail to a report of an alleged armed robbery.

Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and attempted to locate the suspects. After searching the immediate area and not locating anyone matching the descriptions, officers spoke with the juvenile victim and his mother. Investigators from the criminal investigations

division were contacted and it was discovered that the incident involved a drug transaction. An official investigation ensued.

On March 23, Noblesville Police Department investigators petitioned for and were subsequently granted arrest warrants for the two alleged suspects in the case.

On March 25, NPD investigators located and ar-

rested Zachary L. Day, 19, Fishers, at 7213 Twin Oaks Drive, Indianapolis. Day was arrested without incident and was transported to the Hamilton County Jail. He was booked on the preliminary charges of Robbery – Armed w/a Deadly Weapon (I.C. 35-42-5-1 [a]) Felony 3; and Intimidation (I.C. 35-45-2-1[b][2][A]) Felony 5. Bond was set at

\$25,000.

The second suspect remains at-large and is identified as Cameron Malachi Dillon, an 18-year-old black male from Indianapolis.

# Purdue University's new Fast Start program to offer giant leaps in opportunity, savings

## Innovating for Indiana

Fast Start will allow Hoosier students to take online courses and CLEP exams at no cost. Passing five CLEP exams – the equivalent of one semester – can save students and their parents the cost of an entire semester, and almost \$11,000. And passing 10 CLEPs – the equivalent of one full year – amounts to more than \$21,000 in savings when considering Purdue tuition and housing. Every individual CLEP passed is a big savings. Additionally, the Fast Start option can move students toward early graduation and early entry into the workforce.

Purdue Fast Start offers support to high school students enrolled in the program, helping guide them

through taking courses and tests, and navigating Purdue admittance. Students also can connect to Purdue alumni and friends for mentoring if desired. Once Fast Start students accept admission into Purdue, they will be known as Klinsky Scholars.

The program officially launches in Fall 2020, with inaugural students granted admission for the Fall 2021 semester. As Purdue Fast Start begins outreach to prospective students this spring, Purdue Extension, which has offices in every Indiana county, will be a vital resource in helping reach students and their families.

Fast Start is available to all Indiana residents, but it's especially beneficial to students in rural Indiana, in inner-city schools that often lack access to the full offering of Advanced Placement courses, or those for whom college education is less affordable. Purdue assures admission to students who pass a minimum of five CLEP exams through the program.

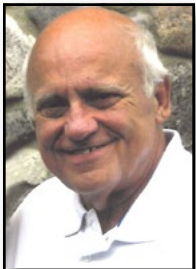

The head coach for the 2020 Boys All-Stars is Ryan Osborn of Carmel. His assistants are Mark Detweiler of Delta and Nate Hawkins of Heritage Hills.

The 2020 IndyStar Indiana Mr. Basketball will be announced from within the group of All-Stars listed above. The Mr. Basketball and Miss Basketball selections were to be announced on May 3 at the IndyStar Sports Awards. With that event postponed because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Mr. and Miss Basketball announcements are expected soon.
