
County Auditor explains how property taxes are calculated

Every year, thousands of Hamilton County homeowners pay property tax. As part of her office's stated mission to provide transparency and excellent customer service, Hamilton County Auditor Robin Mills thinks it is important to help people

understand not only the necessity and value of property taxes, but also the calculation behind how property

a major source of income for counties, libraries, townships, cities and towns. The

different boards, councils and legislatures meet to decide the appropriate tax rate. Each hold budget hearings to determine how much money needs to be allocated for providing various services required by the local community, including education, police and fire, libraries, local infrastructure like highways, roads and streets, parks and operations including salaries of the local units of government.

According to the Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF), property taxes represent a property owner's portion of the local government's budgeted spending for the current year. Increases and decreases depend upon a local government's fiscal management, the assessed valuation of a property and/or local tax rates, which are based on the budget proposals and revenues received and submitted by local government taxing entities that provide services to each community. Local spending is the reason for property tax rate increases and decreases, depending on local fiscal management.

"The County Assessor is responsible for an annual assessment of every property in Hamilton County. This includes both land and the buildings on it," said Mills.

"The assessor calculates the value of a approved budget amounts by the assessed property based on general property attributes like its size and the year of construction, as well as the prices of recent sales in the area, in order to determine the property's market value, also known as the gross assessed value."

The County Assessor then transfers the data on each property's value to the County Auditor. The auditor then applies deductions, exemptions and other valuation adjustments and sends these "Certified Net Assessed Values" to the DLGF. The DLGF reviews the values sent by the auditor and converts the values to property tax rates, by dividing each local unit's

'The DLGF sends their rates back to the county, then the treasurer and I work together to calculate, generate and mail tax bills out to each taxpayer in the county," said Mills. "Property taxes are calculated on the net assessed value of your property. We take the gross assessed value provided by the assessor and apply deductions. The most common deduction is the Homestead Standard Deduction, which is equal to 60 percent of the gross assessed value up to a maximum of \$45,000. It is available for

CCS is working on three plans:

Plan A

If the social distancing order is lifted, regular graduation will be held at the State Fairgrounds at 2 p.m. on Sunday, May 31.

Plan B

If social distancing continues and large gatherings are still a health risk to families, CCS will work on creative ways to hold a ceremony compliant with the rules in place at that time. This plan may include holding a ceremony as late as July.

Plan C

If it remains unsafe to gather for a graduation ceremony, or if students/families are unable to attend, CCS is planning a "virtual graduation" video that will be completed and posted on Sunday, May 31.

Beresford concluded, "I appreciate the Greyhound administrative team and staff's response to the challenge of making graduation special for the students and families of the Class of 2020 in this environment. A regular graduation ceremony is a huge undertaking and they are planning for multiple scenarios with many unknowns. I'm proud of

> On March 19, 2020, Governor Holcomb issued Indiana Executive Order 20-05, which waives penalties for latepaid property taxes. Property taxes remain due on May 11, 2020; however, counties are to waive penalties on payments made after May 11, 2020, for a period of 60 days, until July 10, 2020. This waiver does not apply to tax payments which have been escrowed by financial institutions on behalf of property taxpayers.

> Understanding property taxes can be confusing, but you can be assured that the county's offices are there to answer any of your questions or concerns.



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



INDOT reminds Hoosiers to keep campaign signs out of rights-of-way

The Indiana Department of Transportation would like to remind Hoosiers to keep campaign signs out of the state highway rightsof-way. Campaign signs in state highway rights-of-way parallel to highways, inare prohibited by Indiana Code 9-21-4-6. Campaign signs are not permitted in state rights-of-way any time of the year, whether it is a primary or general election cycle. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the

primary election date in Indiana has moved to June 2.

Areas that should remain sign-free include:

- Intersections
- Interchanges







History of the Hamilton County Basketball Tournament, Part 3...

Crowds continued to increase as tourney moved through the mid '20s

gymnasium hosted the 1923 Hamilton County Boys' Basketball Tournament. However, the change of scenery failed to snuff out the Arcadia Dragons' fire.

Arcadia and Fishers were pre-tourney favorites and they showed up for the championship game with Arcadia prevailing, 48-25.

Carmel's new basketball facility featured a hardwood floor and upper and lower galleries. More than 1,000 fans were able to see the championship game.

Fishers' Paul Butz won the mental attitude award.

Noblesville did not compete in the tournament, as the team had disbanded prior to the start of the tourney.

The tourney came back in Carmel in 1924, and once again Coach Fred Anderson guided another Arcadia squad to the county championship. This time the Dragons won their fifth straight by besting host Carmel in the finale, 36-20.

John Noble of Arcadia won the mental attitude award, but not before suffering a broken collarbone in the championship game when he collided with a Carmel

a gold basketball watch charm.

Ves Noblesville was back together in '24, losing to Arcadia in the semi-finals.

The tourney moved from Carmel to Cicero's new gymnasium in 1925. A thousand tickets were divided among the 10 competing schools and it was announced the county champion would be awarded a pennant, game ball and silver loving cup that was sponsored by the Cicero Commercial Club.

Defending champ Arcadia eliminated Boxley and Atlanta before finally being knocked out by Carmel, 34-18.

With an estimated crowd of 1,000 to Carmel High School's brand-new 1,200 people on hand, Carmel and Noblesville engaged in the closest county championship game yet. Ralph Cotton's game-winning bucket lifted Carmel to a 28-26 triumph over Noblesville.

Sheridan's Cyrus Gunn won the mental attitude award.

It was also reported that Sheridan's girls defeated Noblesville's girls, 18-15, to win the girls' county championship.

The 1926 tournament went back to Noblesville, Noblesville, Cicero, Sheridan and Westfield all weighted in as favorites to bring home the championship silk banner.

Arcadia was considered the weakest team in the field, but the Dragons fought their way back to the title game where they lost to Cicero, 26-14. It was the Red Devils' first championship and Arcadia's seventh appearance in the final game where it had won six of the first nine.

Fishers' Keith Emery won the mental attitude award.

Two interesting facts were mentioned from the '26 tournament:

Cicero's players, coached by C.E. Gaskins, were not allowed to watch any other tourney games. After the Red Dev-The winning team's players received ils played they returned to Cicero for a meal of eggs and toast and a nap.

Before the championship 4-year-old Charles Floyd "Buddy" Hunter of Walnut Grove was on the playing floor putting on a show of athletic stunts for the fans. Someone in the stands tossed a dime at the younger, starting a flurry of coin tossing that resulted in \$1.46 for Buddy to put in his bank.

The Hamilton County Tourney, in its original form, would come to an end after the 1965 tournament. It came back later for a short time. Stay tuned for a tourney
