Property taxes are due for residents in the State of Indiana on Monday, May 11.

However, an executive order issued by Governor Eric Holcomb gives those who need extra time in making those payments an extra 60 days without penalty.

"We realize that there are some who are out of work and struggling financially right now," said Hamilton

County Treasurer Jennifer Templeton. taxes are distributed to our police and "If you find yourself in this situation, fire departments, schools, and trustees you have a grace period that will allow you to pay your bill up to and by July

10 without penalty."

The executive order issued on March 19 asks counties to waive penalties for delinquent non-escrow prop-

erty taxes – both real and personal – paid for up to 60 days. However, "taxpayers are encouraged to make timely payments in order to ensure orderly operations of government."

Property taxes are more critical now more than ever," Templeton emphasized. "These

COVID-19 testing for all Fishers residents age 18 and older is now available for free through the Fishers Health Department.

In partnership with Mid-America Clinical Laboratories, the Fishers Health Department will conduct COVID-19 nasal swab testing from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday at the City Services Building, located at 3 Municipal

Residents MUST complete an online assessment and reserve an appointment for testing. NO WALK-UP TESTING WILL BE AVAILABLE.

Testing Process

- 1. Complete the assessment form at tinyurl.com/ FishersCOVIDTest.
- 2. If you choose to proceed with testing, schedule an appointment.
- 3. Receive appointment confirmation.
- 4. Arrive at drive-thru testing at the scheduled time.
- 5. Test processing by Mid-America Clinical Laboratories within 72 hours.
- 6. Receive follow up support information about caring for yourself at home.
- 7. Test results uploaded to results portal and Fishers Health Department aggregate database.



Notice of **Assessment** forms sent

The Hamilton County Assessor's Office began mailing the Notice of Assessment Form 11 this week. The assessed value on

the Form 11 is the starting point for calculating annual property tax payments.

"Land values have been reviewed and updated where needed throughout the County," said County Assessor Robin Ward. "The total value of land and structures should



reflect a typical market value for your area or neighborhood."

A taxpayer has the right to file an appeal with the county assessor, should they disagree with the assessment. The deadline to appeal is June 15 (45 days from the date of notice). Information on the appeals process may be found at in.gov/dlgf/2508.htm.

calculation behind how property taxes are determined.

Property taxes are a major source of income for counties, libraries, townships, cities and towns. The different boards, councils and legislatures meet to decide the appropriate tax rate. Each hold budget hearings to determine how much money needs to be allocated for providing various services required by the local community, including education, police and fire, libraries, local infrastructure like highways, roads and streets, parks and operations including salaries of the local units of government.

According to the Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF), property taxes represent a property owner's portion of the local government's budgeted spending for the current year. Local spending is the reason for property tax rate increases and decreases, depending on local fiscal management.

\$1,000,000,000, the tax rates will be 0.01 percent. That's \$1,000,000 divided by \$1,000,000,000. The 0.01 percent is the nominal rate, which is apply to the net assessed value.

A very useful tool for understanding your tax bill is the TS-1 Comparison Statement that accompanies every tax bill. This statement compares assessed values, taxes, deductions and rates taxes from the prior year to the current year.

Real Estate owners in the state of Indiana must pay taxes on their property each year. Taxes are divided into two annual installments (for 2020, May 11 and Nov. 10).

On March 19, 2020, sued Indiana Executive Order 20-05, which period of 60 days, until **July 10, 2020. This waiver** does not apply to tax payments which have been escrowed by financial institutions on behalf of property taxpayers.

Understanding property taxes can be confusing, but you can be assured that the county's offices are there to answer any of your questions or concerns.

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History of the Hamilton County Basketball Tourney

By CHUCK GODBY

The Indiana High School Athletic Association crowned its first boys' basketball state champion in 1911, creating a statewide tournament that would become renowned throughout the country. Six years after that inaugural tournament, representatives of eight of the 10 Hamilton County schools in existence at that time decided they wanted to crown a county champion, so the local county tournament was born.

The first eight county participants were Arcadia, Atlanta, Boxley, Carmel, Cicero, Sheridan, Walnut Grove and Westfield. Initially, Noblesville and Fishers declined to participate.

CICERO FIRST HOST

Cicero agreed to host the initial tournament and the winning school, it was announced, would receive a silver loving cup, presented by the Star Theatre of Cicero.

In an era when a jump ball followed each basket made, Cicero exploded for a 46-18 win over Sheridan in the very first Hamilton County Tourney game. Boxley followed with a 38-24 win over Walnut Grove, Carmel beat Westfield, 36-10, and Arcadia edged Atlanta, 21-15, to complete the first round.

Cicero topped Boxley, 21-15, in the first semifinal round game, and Arcadia needed overtime to get past Carmel, 28-24. Arcadia took home the loving cup, beating the host school in the inaugural championship clash, 30-21, played on Saturday, Feb. 17, 1917.

It was reported that 900 tickets were sold and gate receipts totaled \$550. It was also noted by The Noblesville Daily Ledger that an all-tournament team was selected by an unnamed individual who watched all seven games. The five were Carey of Carmel, Eilard of Arcadia, Haworth of Cicero, Glunt of Boxley, and McGuire of Westfield. Sorry, but no first names were published.

The county tourney added two more schools a year later when Fishers and Noblesville decided to join the fray, but defending champ Arcadia was absent. The games were moved to Castor Hall, located in Downtown Noblesville, which could accommodate more fans than Cicero.

Fans were treated to two sessions of basketball on the first day and the admission price was 50 cents for both sessions. The opener was a nail biter with Boxley edging Atlanta, 14-13. The second game never happened.

Noblesville was declared the winner over Carmel by forfeit after the Carmel team failed to show. Carmel, it seems, after two players were suspended for the mid-1930's. Ouch! tobacco use.

Westfield and Boxley would steamchampionship game, where Westfield topped Boxley, 24-18. The 1919 tourney remained in No-

blesville's Castor Hall, and for the second vear in a row. Arcadia was absent. Host Noblesville powered through the



Cicero before topping Atlanta, 25-13, in the championship.

In case you are wondering, Castor Hall still stands today, located inside the Castor Block building at the northwestern corner of Tenth and Logan streets. According to Hamilton County Historian David Heighway, the basketball court was likely located on the second floor of building, which today would be directly above the popular restaurant Grindstone Public House. If you are as big a fan of Mr. Heighway's historical work as I am, you probably figure, like I do, that he's

ARCADIA DOMINATES

The 1921 Hamilton County boys' roll through the field and wind up in the basketball tournament was on the move again. This time Sheridan's Opera House played host.

I'm not exactly sure where the Opera House was located 99 years ago, but my late grandpa, Harold E. Godby, used to tell me about basketball games being field, beating Fishers, Walnut Grove and played on the top floor of the building

I've always known as the O.T. Kercheval building, which still stands on the corner of Second and Main streets. So I'm going with that until someone tells me differently.

By now, the now-defunct Hamilton County Athletic Association administered the tourney. The Executive Committee consisted of Earl Hinshaw, Carmel; Frank Hartley, Arcadia; Lee Harshman, Westfield; and Prof. A.E. Harben, Noblesville. Admission prices were set at 75

cents for the whole day, 35 cents for the first half and 50 cents for the championship game. It was hoped that 50 cents for the championship would keep the crowd more manageable. An estimated 1,000 fans were expected to attend the tourney.

It was also announced the winning school would receive a pennant and the game ball. Also, a mental attitude award winner would be announced at the end of the tourney.

Power-packed Arcadia returned the field after two years away and the Dragons steamrolled the field. They opened with a 35-10 win over Noblesville; embarrassed the host school, Sheridan, 60-6 (There was still a jump ball after every basket); eliminated Fishers, 45-17; and defeated Westfield in the championship, 48-24.

Vallie Etchison, of Arcadia, was named the mental attitude winner.

500 people were turned away from the championship game.

The county tourney returned to Sheridan in 1922.

Boxley was considered the favorite and its fans showed their support by purchasing 170 advance season tickets.

Fishers was considered another favorite since Arcadia, the defending champion, had lost several key players because of low grades.

Some highlights from the '22 tournament included Ernest Carter of Noblesville making a three-quarter court shot against Westfield; William Rayle of Carmel making nine of 11 free throws; and Westfield's girls beating Sheridan's girls, 8-6, in a preliminary game played prior to the championship.

Once again it was Arcadia, despite losing key players, playing in and winning the championship game, 27-19, over Westfield. Arcadia also beat Cicero, 23-7, and Boxley, 29-11, on its way to a second felt banner and game ball.

Robert Dawson, from the winning Arcadia team, won the mental attitude award

CROWDS INCREASE

Carmel High School's brand-new gymnasium hosted the 1923 Hamilton County Boys' Basketball Tournament. However, the change of scenery failed to snuff out the Arcadia Dragons' fire.

Arcadia and Fishers were pre-tourney favorites and they showed up for the championship game with Arcadia prevailing, 48-25.

Carmel's new basketball facility featured a hardwood floor and upper and lower galleries. More than 1,000 fans were able to see the championship game. Fishers' Paul Butz won the mental

attitude award. Noblesville did not compete in the tournament, as the team had disbanded

prior to the start of the tourney. The tourney came back in Carmel in 1924, and once again Coach Fred Anderson guided another Arcadia squad to the county championship. This time the Dragons won their fifth straight by

besting host Carmel in the finale, 36-20. John Noble of Arcadia won the mental attitude award, but not before suffering a broken collarbone in the championship game when he collided with a Carmel player.

The winning team's players received a gold basketball watch charm.

Defending champ Arcadia eliminated Boxley and Atlanta before finally being knocked out by Carmel, 34-18.

With an estimated crowd of 1,000 to 1,200 people on hand, Carmel and No-

It was reported that more than blesville engaged in the closest county championship game yet. Ralph Cotton's game-winning bucket lifted Carmel to a 28-26 triumph over Noblesville.

Sheridan's Cyrus Gunn won the mental attitude award.

It was also reported that Sheridan's girls defeated Noblesville's girls, 18-15, to win the girls' county championship.

The 1926 tournament went back to

Noblesville, Noblesville, Cicero, Sheridan and Westfield all weighted in as favorites to bring home the championship silk banner. Arcadia was considered the weakest

team in the field, but the Dragons fought their way back to the title game where they lost to Cicero, 26-14. It was the Red Devils' first championship and Arcadia's seventh appearance in the final game where it had won six of the first nine.

Fishers' Keith Emery won the mental attitude award.

Two interesting facts were mentioned from the '26 tournament:

Cicero's players, coached by C.E. Gaskins, were not allowed to watch any other tourney games. After the Red Devils played they returned to Cicero for a meal of eggs and toast and a nap.

Before the championship game, 4-year-old Charles Floyd "Buddy" Hunter of Walnut Grove was on the playing floor putting on a show of athletic stunts for the fans. Someone in the stands tossed a dime at the younger, starting a flurry of coin tossing that resulted in \$1.46 for Buddy to put in his bank.

NEVER MISSED A BEAT

A funny thing happened soon after I decided to turn pages of notes into a series on the very early years of the Hamilton County Boys' Basketball Tournament and offer it to The Reporter: My uncle Jim Godby handed me a magazine-type book he's had for years titled The Way It Was ... Hamilton County Basketball Tourney. Until last summer I never knew such a publication existed.

It was written by the late, great Don Jellison prior to the return of the county tourney during the 2003-04 campaign. Jellison, of course, covered Hamilton County sports for decades as the sports editor of the Noblesville Daily Ledger and was instrumental in the creation of The Reporter. After I left The Ledger in 1990, I

spent countless hours in the local library, hoping to compile a Hamilton County basketball history. When that goal became simply too daunting, I decided to focus on the county tourney alone. The tourney moved from Carmel I made it through the 1920s before life

about the creation of the Hamilton County Boys' Basketball Tourney and its very early years from notes I recorded in a spiral notebook more than 30 years ago. Now I'm going to speed you through to the last tourney in 1965, before the attempted comeback almost 40

am able to say goodbye.

I knew that I wasn't alone in what I was feeling. So I decided that I wasn't going to let myself or other athletes be drowned out. I wanted to make sure that we were heard. Uniquely, I had a platform with the Lantern to do something

about it, so here we are. I created a Google form and sent it to as many people as I could. First, the Westfield cross country, distance track, and swim teams. Then, friends in other Westfield sports. Then, friends from Guerin and Noblesville. Finally, on my Instagram and Snap

Soon enough, 77 people filled out my form, all aching to be heard, at least by someone who cared enough to hear. Some completely lost their seasons. Others didn't know what the future holds, whether that be practice or future competitions. Many shared feelings of disappointment, sad-

Most of my results came from Westfield. But I was able to get nine responses from Guerin Catholic and two from Noblesville. I made sure to showcase the responses from Guerin and Noblesville, but I had to randomly select the responses from Westfield because I wanted to give everyone an equal shot at being heard.

While I was unable to include every response, I read through every response and I felt every

Cailyn Henderson receives Division II All-America honors

It didn't take the college golf world long to figure out something the Indiana high school golf world has known for years: Cailyn Henderson is an exceptional player.

Henderson, a 2018 Westfield graduate who led the Shamrocks to two state runner-up finishes, earned her first national honor after completing her sophomore season at the University of Indianapolis. She was named to the 2020 Division II All-America Second Team by the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA).

"I'm just very appreciative and it feels good to be recognized," said Henderson. "I feel like there's a lot more work to be done, so I'm just going to keep on practicing until I get to where I want to be. But it's a great honor,

The Greyhounds have built a championship legacy in the recent past, winning Division II national championships in 2015 and 2018. Coming into a program like this as a freshman would have been daunting for anyone, but UIndv coach Brent Nicoson said that Henderson had no trouble fitting in. The coach praised Henderson's work ethic and said she is an "unbelievable teammate."

"She's always positive," said Nicoson. "She's played in every tournament since she's been here and I don't see that changing. I get to see first hand how hard she works at it. She wants me to help

her literally every day if I could."

Henderson took to the college level quickly. In only her second tournament as a freshman, she placed third out of 87 golfers at the Cardinal Classic, which took place at The Players Club in Yorktown. At the very next tournament, Henderson tied for fourth at the Gilda's Club Laker Fall Invitational at The Meadows Golf Course in Allendale, Mich.

team title in both tournaments as well: the Cardinal Classic victory came against several Division I teams. It also exposed Henderson to the high level of college golf right away.

"It was very different, because remember my freshman year, you have to get into a different mindset," said Henderson. "And it was great to compete against these great golfers. It was a whole different competitive vibe. And you have to learn how to compete and how to score with these great golfers as well."

Henderson finished the year strong, placing second at the Great Lakes Valley Conference - another event the Greyhounds won handily, by a record 53 strokes. That boosted UIndy into the post-season, where it was the runner-up at the NCAA D-II East regional in Owensboro, Ky., then reached the semi-finals of the D-II national championships in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.

Henderson played in both post-season events, saying that the

experience reminded her of the idea what I wanted to do, so I took state tournament in high school. She admitted to some nerves on the first tee, but played well at nationals. She was named the GLVC Freshman of the Year.

"I normally always get firsttee jitters, and then after the first hole's done, they're normally completely gone," said Hender-

"She's contributed a great The Greyhounds won the amount," said Nicoson. "She is absolutely relentless in her pursuit to get better."

The coach noted that Henderson is "never satisfied" and believes that is what makes her a great competitor, calling it her "pursuit of perfection. She's going to work her butt off until she gets there," said Nicoson.

Henderson had a strong fall season, winning two of the five events that UIndy played. Both those victories came in October: She finished first at the William Beall Fall Classic in Findlay, Ohio; then won the Music City Invitational at Murfreesboro, Tenn.

Henderson placed third in what would be the Greyhounds' only event of the spring, the Augustana Spring Fling at Palm Desert, Calif. March 12-13. Shortly thereafter, all college sports were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

So, Henderson is finishing up her sophomore year, with online classes. She has decided to major

'My freshman year I had no

a bunch of the general courses," said Henderson. "And so now I'm focusing on the courses that apply to my major."

Henderson's No. 1 goal is to go professional, but she has decided on a backup plan: She's considering going to cosmetology school after college, then combine that with her business degree to open up her own salon one day.

But after two great seasons at UIndy, it's easy to see Henderson's professional goals become reality. Nicoson said that her putting has gotten better and she's more consistent with her ball striking because of her hard work.

"She realizes what it takes," said Nicoson, who noted that some people are the opposite. The coach said that when he called Henderson to congratulate her on becoming a Second Team All-American, she said "next year I'm being a First Team All-American.'

"Our goals just align perfectsaid Nicoson.

Henderson was three UIndy players to receive All-America honors. Echeverria was named to the All-America First Team, while Anna Kramer earned All-America Honorable Mention, giving UIndy three honorees.

Henderson is enjoying her teammates as well.

"They've become my best friends and I go to them for everything," she said. "I truly love my team and they're great people."

Actually, I'm taking you through the years courtesy of Mr. Jellison, who gathered all the facts. I'm sure he'd be happy for me to share them. Nobody told the history of sports in Hamilton County better than Don.

Through the Great Depression and two World Wars, the county tourney never missed a beat from 1917 to 1965. The schools that competed were Arcadia, Atlanta, Boxley, Carmel, Cicero, Fishers, Jackson Central, Noblesville, Sheridan, Walnut Grove and Westfield.

Eight of the 11 schools won at least one county championship. Only Atlanta, Boxley and Walnut Grove failed to capture a crown, although all three at least made it to a title game.

Sheridan, which dominated the 1950s, won the most championships with 13. The Blackhawks won eight straight from 1951 through 1958 under the guidance of legendary Hall of Fame coach Larry Hobbs.

Hobbs' son Joe, whom Jellison said was the only player to compete on four county-winning teams, returned to coach his alma mater - after his father retired to the 1960 championship.

The Joe Hobbs reference made me wonder what set of brothers won the most county championships. Although we might never know for sure, I'm going to guess the sons of my grandparents, Harold and Mary Alice Godby, might be a good

My dad, Gail, was a regular on the 1954 and 1955 winners. Uncle Neal was a regular on the 1956 and 1957 champions, and Uncle Jim, you know him – the furniture guy – was a regular on the 1958 and 1960 champions.

Neal Godby was the only one of the trio to be named to an All-County tourney team.

Larry Hobbs coached the most county tourney champions eight. Edgar Cotton won five titles at Carmel and Fred Anderson won five – all in succession coaching Arcadia.

Only Maurice "Mo" Kennedy coached different schools to championship-game victories. He led Noblesville in 1933 and 1935, and directed Westfield in

Speaking of Noblesville, the Millers participated in the county tourney only 16 times, winning the title four times. They left after winning the 1935 county championship and never

According to Jellison, the reason Noblesville left was nev-

If you are a modern-day high school basketball fan from Hamilton Heights, you are still likely to find Roger Bryant on the top row of the bottom section of the Husky Dome watching the Huskies compete. Bryant holds the record for the most points in a single game with 32. Standing 6-foot-4, Bryant, from Walnut Grove, set the mark against Carmel in 1960.

Carmel, with Coach Bill Shepherd at the helm, won the last tourney championship in '65, beating Westfield, 73-60, in the finale. Future Mr. Basketball Billy Shepherd was a freshman and he scored 19 points in the game. Dave Shepherd scored 24 for the Greyhounds.

David Shepherd never got to play in a county tourney game. But Carmel's other future Mr. Basketball's insurance agency did sponsor the county tourney's comeback, which was spearheaded by Mr. Jellison.

"I know Dave enjoyed hosting the event," said former coach Pete Smith, who once guided county schools Noblesville, Carmel and Guerin Catholic, where he coached a couple state champions. "Thanks to Dave's sponsorship it didn't cost the schools anything to compete except gas

Smith mentioned several

the county tourney – this time including the ladies - failed to ignite long term, lasting only four years.

"For being held during the holiday season, the crowds weren't too bad," he noted. "Few tournaments draw well during the holidays, but this tourney did

"One of the biggest reasons coaches did not like the tourney was the possibility of playing a school three times during a season. Four county schools were members of the HCC. The third time teams might play each other was in the sectional. Don and I fought that idea noting that college teams face that same possibility. The truth is, many coaches hate to face an opponent twice, let alone three times.

Sheridan refused to join the tournament at all during its fouryear run, while University competed once.

"Some athletic directors felt reasons a four-year revival of mismatches between schools

were not in the best interest of the athletes," Smith noted. "That thought was validated by Sheridan and University not competing, which also shot down the lure of a 'true' county tourney."

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Finally, some schools felt the tourney handcuffed them from other options available.

"Some coaches preferred the option of playing outside the area during winter break. They said it benefitted the athletes with additional exposure and experiencing other parts of the

"Times are different nowadays," Coach Smith added. "I can't see a true Hamilton County Tournament ever happening again. Being an old-school basketball fan I love the idea of schools playing in their county tourney, no matter the size of the school. But I am also someone who enjoys reading about the history of high school basketball. Now my teams are becoming part of that 'old' history."
