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

Noblesville Schools announced last week that Noblesville High School (NHS) has been nationally recognized for the third year in a row as a Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Distinguished School for providing broad access to transformative Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) learning opportunities for students.

NHS is one of only three high schools in Indiana to receive the three-time recognition, putting it in an elite top 1 percent group nationally.


Jessica Lynch and her husband opened Birdies Miniature Golf course last summer. They had just reopened for this year as the weather improved and stay-at-home orders softened.

Last Wednesday afternoon, two people claiming to be Indiana Excise Police showed up and ordered the course closed. The police also said they were coming back Thursday, Lynch says, and the two were so aggressive that she asked the Westfield Police Department to come over.

"He said that state police should have

provided documentation and/or citation to show like how we were in violation," Lynch said.

According Lynch, the officers didn't leave any paperwork. She later was told that someone had filed a complaint. The manager of Birdies

with regard to state and local taxes, licenses and code compliance.

- Be locally-owned and not by an outof-state corporation.
- Be in good standing with the Indiana Secretary of State.
- · Have been established and operational in Hamilton County for at least the previous six months. Businesses that have expanded to a storefront from another business are eligible (e.g., an established caterer who opened a restaurant or an online retailer who opened a boutique).

Grants can be used for payroll (exclusive of owner compensation), utilities, rent, mortgage payments, insurance, or similar expenses, and products directly used in production of a product for sale. Preference will be given to businesses that have not received abatements or incentives from the federal government, State of Indiana, or any local government entity. Preference will also be given to businesses that made all reasonable efforts to keep employees employed during the pandemic.

Grant applications are due by the Cook says the decision to open and or close of business on Friday, May 22. Applications can be found online at hamiltoncounty.in.gov/1629.

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





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Rich Wolfred built a legacy of growth and success for Noblesville

Everything came full circle for Rich Wolfred as he finished up his final season of coaching swimming at Noblesville High School this school year.

When Wolfred came to Noblesville in 2004, he had already been a longtime coach for the Lawrence Swim Team, and would finish his first season for the Millers with a state champion under his watch. In 2020, Wolfred completed another long run as a coach, and supervised another state champion.

Indeed, what goes around comes around. And Wolfred had plenty of success to go around at both NHS and the Noblesville Swim Club.

Prior to coming to the Millers, Wolfred had spent 19 years as the head coach at Lawrence, in addition to coaching at Lawrence Central High School in the 1980s for "two or three years," he said.

When the Noblesville job became open, two things drew Wolfred up here: First, he said his sister-in-law Cindy "was pushing me to come up here." Then he got a look at the facilities, noticing that the NHS pool "was one of the better pools around." He also liked the outdoor pool at the Forest Park Aquatic Center, which hosts the annual Enchanted Forest meet.

Wolfred got the job at both the high school and the swim club, and it would be a full-time job as well, something else that was appealing.

"Before that, I always had other jobs," said Wolfred. "The coaching was more of a fulltime/part-time kind of thing. I worked during the day and coached at night. When I came

able to pay me enough so I didn't have to have a second job.' They were very good about coming up with the money."

Thus Wolfred began coaching the swim club, plus both the boys and girls high school teams. He proved his worth quickly, first when it came to increasing participation in the club. When Wolfred arrived, there were about 60 swimmers registered with the club.

"The first couple years, we were up to 120," said Wolfred. The boys teams were always nine, 10, 12 kids. We were able to get it up to 20, 25 kids. The girls were probably like 20, 25 girls and it got up to 50 girls at some point.

Another key point was to have the high school swimmers also swim in the club. Wolfred estimated that 50 percent of the high school swimmers were active in the Noblesville Swim Club, but that number increased to 80 to 90 percent.

"It's nice to coach kids yearround instead of just part of the season," said Wolfred.

When Wolfred arrived, the Millers were having success at sectionals, with the girls on a five-year championship winning streak and the boys having won in three titles in the past five years. Noblesville continued that success, with both boys and girls winning sectionals in 2005-

Also in 2005, a Millers sophomore named David Boudia won the diving state championship. If that name sounds familiar, it's because Boudia would go on to win an Olympic gold medal in

"He brought some notoriety to Noblesville," said Wolfred. "Having David at the high school, and then Michael Phelps and the explosion of swimming nationally helped tremendously."

Around the same time, Wolfred got a great assistant in Bret Richardson, who stayed with the team for 14 years. Wolfred said that every coach "needs a Bret Richardson," calling him "some-

"We always held our own," said Wolfred. While the Greyhounds have been sectional champions every year since moving in, the Millers girls have been a strong second, and the boys were also consistently runners-up until the past couple of years, when they were a strong third.

"There were some good meets," said Wolfred. "We were winning events.'

That included more diving state championships. Katie Bittner won state in diving in 2009, then Meghan Potee followed her with a state title in 2010. The Millers also had a number of state qualifiers every year as

On Feb. 15, 2020, Noblesville got one more state championship for Wolfred. Sammy Huff won the breaststroke event, coming from behind to emerge victorious in a close race. Afterwards, Huff said she wanted to win the race for Wolfred, since it was his last season.

"Obviously, she wanted to win," said Wolfred. "But she never expressed that to me prior." Wolfred said he tries to stay out of the limelight, noting that it's his swimmers in the water doing the job. But he did recognize that the occasion was special.

"I was nervous as heck before the race and the race was very close," said Wolfred, "I think four girls could've won that race, but she was determined

Wolfred also got to watch his three children, sons Alex and Jack and daughter Jordan, swim for Noblesville as well.

"I never really gave much thought to coaching my own kids," said Wolfred. "It was nothing I ever thought about until they became old enough to swim."

But it was rewarding for Wolfred to watch them be successful. Alex went on to swim at Xavier University and Jack is swimming at Ball State Uni-

In addition to his family, Wolfred made connections with the other swim families as well. As much as any other sport, multiple children from the same family usually wind up swimming.

"Most of these families, they become your kin," said Wolfred. He noted that with social media so prevalent, it's easy to become families with the other swimming families.

"I touch base with a lot of the alumni on a yearly basis to see how they're doing," said Wolfred.

As for the school and club, Wolfred has handed the reins to Aleks Fansler, the new coach of both. But Wolfred will still be around, saying that he will "probably" substitute coach for Fansler at times.

And, as he has been doing for decades, Wolfred will continue to introduce new swimmers to the pool.

'I'm still currently running the swim program, Noblesville Learn to Swim," said Wolfred. "Aleks wanted me to stick around and complete that."

Etchison made the announcement on his Twitter account in the form of a minute-long video. He began by thanking his family, coaches and teammates, then revealed that he had chosen Western Michigan.

"After a long talk with my family and God, I'd like to continue my father's legacy at Western Michigan University," said Etchison. "I'm honored to become a Bronco."

Etchison was Hamilton County's leading scorer in the 2019-20 season, averaging 24.9 points per game for his junior

year. He had solid numbers across the board, with 5.0 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 1.6 steals per contest. Etchison scored 41 points in the Huskies' season-opening game, an overtime win against Lebanon, then set a new Heights school record on Dec. 11 by scoring 56 points in the Huskies' game with Mount Vernon.

Western Michigan is located in Kalamazoo, and plays in the Mid-American Conference (MAC). The Broncos are coming off a 13-19 season with a relatively young team; only two seniors were on the roster this past season. Western Michigan will have a new coach this coming season: Clayton Bates was hired in March after several years as a Broncos assistant coach.

RedHawks' Sterling Weatherford gets national recognition, but keeps team his top priority

If a football player is good at what he does, recognition will eventually come to him.

Consider the collegiate football career of Sterling Weatherford. The Hamilton Heights graduate just completed his redshirt sophomore year at Miami of Ohio, a season where he started in all 14 games and helped the RedHawks to a Mid-American Conference (MAC) championship, plus an appearance in a

bowl game. Weatherford also had impressive statistics during the year as well. Since he's coming back for his redshirt junior season this fall, many tagged him as a player to watch. But even Weatherford was surprised when ESPN placed him on its list of top 10 returning safeties for the 2020 season.

"My initial reaction was shock, really," said Weatherford. "Just feeling blessed to even get my name out there. With that said, it is a pre-season ranking and what I'm concerned with is trying to win another championship with my team. However exciting that is individually, where I'm really focused at right now is trying to maintain a good future for our team."

ESPN placed Weatherford sixth on its list. The Miami Red-

Anthony Treash, who had this to say about Weatherford: "His success in coverage continued into 2019, when he was given a starting role, and he recorded an 85.2 coverage grade and forced more incompletions than first downs allowed. Wherever he lined up, Weatherford thrived in coverage. He posted coverage grades above 70.0 when he lined up in the box, in the lost and at

deep safety." Treash wrote roughly the same thing when he wrote an article on pff.com, a football analysis website, naming Weatherford the No. 4 overall player returning in the MAC for 2020. It's easy to see why if one looks at Weatherford's stats: He made 98 tackles for the RedHawks, 5.5 of them for a loss. Weatherford also had two sacks, one interception, 10 pass breakups and two forced fumbles. He reached the 10-tackle mark in Miami's

> that he had earned a starting spot, and he did. As the season progressed, he continued to get more comfortable in that start-

> "That was never my biggest concern, I was just mostly concerned about our game plan and being prepared," said Weatherford. He noted that it's easy for a player to "get caught up in a lot of extracurriculars," and then lose focus on what it takes to win a game.

> Weatherford redshirted during his freshman year (2017), but still contributed to the team. In fact, he was named the Defensive Scout Team Player of the Year.

"Physically I was ready, but mentally I had a lot more room to grow," said Weatherford.

In the 2018 season, Weatherford saw the field for the first time as a redshirt freshman. He played in all 12 of Miami's game, making one start. Weatherford totaled 27 tackles for the season, including nine against Army West Point. He also recorded his first interception during the RedHawks' win over Kent State.

Miami finished the 2018 season 6-6, and were 6-2 in MAC play, but did not qualify for the championship game that season. In 2019, the RedHawks were again 6-2 in the conference, but swept through the MAC's East Division with a 5-0 record to earn a spot in the conference championship game.

In the championship game, Miami beat Central Michigan 26-21. After a back and forth first half that finished with the Chippewas leading 14-10, the RedHawks scored 13 straight points on a touchdown and two field goals, and didn't allow Central Michigan any score until there was 1:24 left in the fourth quarter.

Weatherford had seven tackles and three pass breakups in that game. It was the RedHawks' first MAC title since 2010.

"That was an awesome experience, winning the conference," said Weatherford, "That's not something that is a given." Miami also qualified for a



Westfield Family Play scheduled to begin on May 26

The closing down of Indiana due to the COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in some unusual sights around the state this spring.

Probably the most unusual of all would be that of Grand Park in Westfield sitting empty. The facility normally has an event going on every day, whether it be small youth baseball and softball games to massive soccer tournaments with teams from across the country.

But there is a small step about to be taken. Grand Park and the City of Westfield have set up Westfield Family Play, which Grand Park Director William Knox said will be an opportunity "to give Westfield residents a chance to stretch their legs" and benefit from the campus.

The first Westfield Family Play is scheduled for Tuesday, May 26, and then will take place every Tuesday and Thursday for the next few weeks.

The Family Play times are from noon other families," said Knox. He said ernor Eric Holcomb's plan to re-open but again using the current guidelines to 7 p.m. Times and dates are always subject to change, so Westfield residents are encouraged to check often. Information is available at grandpark.org/family, and on the City of Westfield and Grand Park social media accounts.

FOLLOWING GUIDELINES

There will be limits to field access, and that will be on a first-come, first-serve basis. On-site registration is available and it will be hands-free. The Grand Park website said that families must check in at Lot C to allow the facility to track the number on on-site visitors and make sure that families are indeed practicing social

"They won't come in contact with that in accordance with Indiana Gov-

there will be designated areas in the park where families come in one wav and go out another way so they won't intermingle with other families.

Restrooms and concession stands will be closed, so families should bring their own water and snacks. They should also bring their own equipment as well, such as balls, Frisbees and kites.

"We will not have any actual equipment out for families," said Knox. "We want to be very cautious about them having touch points when they're on campus."

Also, equipment would have to be sanitized after each use, which is something the facility wants to avoid.

Westfield Family Play is part of a plan to re-open the campus "slowly and safely," said Vicki Duncan Gardner, Communications Director of the City of Westfield. Knox said

the state, Grand Park is looking at launching small activities and practices again on Sunday, May 24, with actual leagues beginning play on

dates when the state will move into Stage 3 of the Governor's five-stage plan to re-open Indiana. The state is currently in Stage 2, which limits social gatherings to 25 people or fewer. Phase 3 will move that number up to 100 people or fewer.

We're going to evaluate those as we get close to the date, because we want to maximize the opportunities for our families," said Knox. "We're going to do it smart." Again, families are advised to check the Grand Park website as those tentative re-opening dates get closer.

Once the calendar gets to June 14, Grand Park plans to start its leagues with modified tournaments, to-date information.

IGA develops tournaments for high school-age players **Weatherford**——

When Indiana high school spring sports were canceled for 2020, it meant quite a few unfortunate things for the student-athletes of their respective sports.

One of them was not getting a chance to participate in a post-season tournament. That included boys golf. But high school-age golfers will now have an opportunity to play one last round in June

The Indiana Golf Association has developed two tournaments: The Indiana Class of 2020 Senior Open and the Indiana 2020 Boys Team Championship.

The Senior Open is for high school players graduating this year, while the Team Championship allows for high school-age players to get the chance to play an organized

Westfield's head boys golf coach Josh Bryant is helping to organize the event, serving as a consultant with the IGA in supporting the organization of the event. Registration for the Team Championship began on May 8, and Bryant estimated close to 50 teams signed up after a few days.

The IGA feels that's a pretty good turnout initially," said Bryant. The registration window runs through May 29, so the number is likely to grow. (Registration is open through the IGA's website; visit tinyurl. com/IGA2020Tournament to access it.) Bryant said the lengthy registration window allows for golfers and their parents to make a decision on participating in the event based on where things stand with the pandemic.

The Team Championship begins on June 8 with a qualifying day at seven sites around the state. Those sites are: Brookwood Golf Club (Fort Wayne), Harrison Hills Golf and Country Club (Attica), The Players Club (Yorktown), Ulen Country Club (Lebanon), The Legends Golf Club (Franklin), Otter Creek Golf Course (Columbus) and Country Oaks Golf Club (Washington). The finals take place June 10 and 11 at the Ackerman

Course at Purdue University.

"Based upon the number of entries, each site will have "X" amount of teams that will go to the finals," said Bryant.

Each team will consist of five players, with the best four scores counting for the team total. This is similar to how team scoring works in high school golf. One difference, though, is that only teams will advance to the finals; there will be no individuals qualifying. Bryant said that since the IGA has many individual tournaments throughout the summer, "this was an attempt to have a specific team-oriented event only.

Another big difference is that teams may choose which site they want to play at. This is a big change from high school golf, where teams are assigned to a course.

"It's a fun little wrinkle that isn't always there," said Bryant.

So far, golfers from Westfield, Guerin Catholic and Noblesville have put together teams; in fact, there are three different teams that consist of golfers from Westfield. There will likely be more teams that feature golfers from other schools in Hamilton County as well. Outside of the county, golfers from Tipton, Zionsville and Cathedral have created teams.

INDIVIDUALS AT THE LEGENDS

Before the Team Tournament is set to tee off, the seniors will get their moment with the Class of 2020 Senior Open.

The Senior Open takes place June 3 and 4 at The Legends in Franklin. Registration for the event was given for free to the players through Ted Bishop, the PGA General Manager of The Legends, and Merchants Bank of Indiana. Bryant said he's thankful to The Legends and Merchants Bank for sponsoring the event at no cost to the players.

There will be 114 golfers at the event, with tee times only. All players will begin at the No. 1 tee in order to practice social distancing and stay within the federal guidelines. The first round, on June 3, will begin

at 8 a.m. with the first group, while Bryant estimated the last group of the day will start its round close to 3 p.m.

"Tee times will be spread out a little longer than you normally see in a junior event," said Bryant.

After the first round, a cut will be made. The top 40 and ties advance to the second round on June 4, and those golfers will play another round to determine the champion.

While the Senior Open won't replace these golfers' senior year, it is a chance to celebrate their contributions to golf. Bryant talked of giving those players a chance to make their last putt and be with their families.

"It'll be a good celebration for those

kids," said Bryant. As of press time, 12 golfers from Hamilton County were signed up for the event: Clay Stirsman, Luke Prall and Lukas Stitle from Carmel; Bryce Robertson, Nathaniel Acres, Dylan O'Daniel and Ryan Gausepohl from Fishers; Colin Hussey from Guerin Catholic; Adam Horner from Hamilton Southeastern and Lucas Snyder, Drake Biggs and Jacob Riddle from Westfield.

Spectators will be allowed at the event, unless new guidelines come out between now and the tournament.

"The policy will be following whatever the current CDC guidelines are," said Bryant. Golf carts may be limited."

"The IGA has been working with the Governor's office," said Bryant. "It's being very well-communicated with government officials."

Meanwhile, the IGA is accepting registration for junior events that are taking place after June 1. That includes the Girls-Indiana Junior PGA Championship, set for June 3 and 4 at Harbour Trees Golf Club in Noblesville.

Also on those same dates, the Indiana PGA Senior Open will take place at Purgatory Golf Club in Noblesville. That will open up a busy month of golf for the IGA and the Indiana PGA.

"That was my first time ever going to a bowl game, and it's definitely something that your team has a lot of pride in," said Weatherford, who made five tackles in the game. "We've sat through the off-season where we come back early and we're grinding because we didn't make it to a bowl game. It's awesome for that to pay off and for us to have those opportunities both in the same year.

The RedHawks finished the 2019 season 8-6, but that includes a difficult non-conference portion of the schedule. Miami played ranked opponents Iowa and Ohio State within the first from Page A9

four weeks of the season. Meanwhile, the 2020 season looks like it could be just as successful. The RedHawks are returning all but three starting positions, in addition to sonhomore quarterback Brett Gabbert, who the previous season was the MAC Freshman of the Year.

Miami also has many wide receivers returning as well as a young offensive line crew. Weatherford said "a lot of our leaders are all coming back, which is so exciting."

Off the field, Weatherford is majoring in mechanical engineering. He's following in the family footsteps, as his brother Austin and father Tim are both engineers, and the company his parents own is engineering-based.

"I feel like when you have a passion for something, it becomes a little bit easier," said Weatherford. He said he is on track to graduate in four years with a degree, then after that might focus on starting graduate school.

But before that, there's still more football to play. And while there will be likely be more big numbers and accolades for him, Weatherford said he just wants "to go out and play for my teammates and focus on the season and not my personal goals, because I'm a firm believer that if you invest in your team and you're doing your things right, you don't have to focus on yourself.'
