





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Noblesville High School holding Class of 2020 parade on June 1



Fishers road construction updates, week of May 25

State Road 37

126th Street west of SR 37 is currently closed and is anticipated to reopen in July. During this time, cross access and all left turns will be restricted, with only right in and right out until this phase ends. Traffic on southbound SR 37 will shift to the northbound lanes and two lanes will remain in each direction. Local access to businesses will remain open via Lantern Road. The official detour route will direct drivers to use 116th Street or 131st Street to Allisonville Road. Detour route markers and advance warning signs will be in place prior to the closure.

During the overnight hours there will be traffic control in place to help direct vehicles through the intersection.

The traffic signals at 116th Street and Lantern Road and Commercial Drive will be worked on starting at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 28. During the overnight hours there will be traffic control in place to help direct vehicles through the intersection.

96th Street

96th Street between Sargent Road and Cumberland Road is currently closed. During this time, the Sargent Road roundabout will be constructed, the bridge over Mud Creek will be replaced with a widened structure and additional travel lanes will be added. Local access will remain open from Lantern Road to the River Life Church. This week in Indiana's history ...

1844 - May Wright Sewall was born in Wisconsin. After moving to Indianapolis to teach at Shortridge High School, she became active in the feminist movement, established a girls' classical high school, and helped found the Propylaeum. Elected president of the National Council of Women in 1891, she later served as president of the International Council. In 1915, she accepted an invitation to travel on the Ford Peace Ship to Europe.

1861 – Major General George McClellan came to Indianapolis to review five regiments of soldiers in Military Park. He was joined by Indiana Governor Oliver P. Morton, Illinois Governor Richard Yates, and Ohio Governor William Denison. Newspapers reported that a huge crowd came to witness the event as General McClellan rode through the ranks on a large white horse. He was said the stalwart and soldierly through downtown streets.

1914 – Automobile pioneer Henry Ford attended the fourth running of the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race. That evening Ford was honored at a dinner in the Florentine Room at the Claypool Hotel. The day before, company officials had been treated to a luncheon where they were welcomed by Indianapolis Mayor Joseph Bell. After lunch, the 300 guests were seated in several hundred to be "well pleased with Ford cars which paraded Thom was born in Gosport,

1920 – Mrs. John ing in Bartholomew County when the horse became frightened and began running away. Nearby with their automobile were two young farmers, Charles Hiatt and David Marr. With Hiatt at the wheel of his car and Marr on the running board, they took off after the runaway. When they were side by side, moving at a high rate of speed, Marr leaped from the running board into the buggy, seized the lines, and stopped the horse. Newspapers reported that the animal was halted just as it was approaching a sharp turn in the road along the edge of a steep embankment.

1933 – James Alexander Ind. After graduating from the 1980s.

Butler University and serving in the Marine Corps, he began writing novels set in Colonial America and the Western United States. His books include Follow the River, Long Knife, From Sea to Shining Sea, Fire in the Water, and Panther in the Sky, which was named "Best Novel of the Year" by Western Writers of America. 1957 - The first restaurant in the new Burger Chef hamburger chain opened at 62nd and Keystone in Indianapolis. The original menu listed flame-broiled hamburgers for 19 cents, fries 14 cents, shakes 19 cents, and soft drinks 10 cents. The Burger Chef system, based in Indianapolis, became the nation's second largest hamburger operation, trailing only McDonald's. Their mascots Burger Chef and Jeff were popular in commercials. Purchased by General Foods in 1968 and later sold to a Canadian company, Burger Chef was taken over by Hardee's in

Duke Energy warning customer to guard against **COVID-19** scammers

The REPORTER

Duke Energy is warning its Indiana customers to be on guard against phone calls from scammers who are demanding that utility customers pay their electric bill immediately or risk having their electric service disconnected within the hour.

"Scammers often try and take advantage of people during a crisis," said Duke Energy Indiana President Stan Pinegar. "Because of the pandemic, we've temporarily suspended disconnections for nonpayment. We've had increased reports of scammers, though, threatening disconnections. The best way to defend yourself against these scammers is to recognize how the scam works and understand that Duke Energy never asks customers for prepaid debit cards."

Typically, the customer receives an unsolicited phone call – sometimes an automated call - from an individual who falsely claims to be a Duke Energy representative demanding immediate payment, usually in the form of a prepaid debit card. Scammers have even duplicated the Duke Energy upfront Interactive Voice Response system, so when customers call back phone numbers provided by the scammer, it sounds like a legitimate Duke Energy phone number. Some of these criminals also use caller-ID spoofing to replicate a utility's customer service number.

Red flags for scam activity

• The caller becomes angry and tells the customer his or her account is past due, and service will be webpage.

disconnected if a large payment isn't made – usually within the hour.

• The caller instructs the customer to purchase a pre-paid debit or credit card - widely available at retail stores - then call him or her back to supposedly make a payment to Duke Energy.

• The scammer asks the customer for the prepaid card's receipt number and PIN number, which grants instant access to the card's funds

• The customer has received no other notice from Duke Energy that an account is overdue.

How to protect yourself

• Duke Energy never asks or requires a customer with a delinquent account to purchase a prepaid debit card - or iTunes card - to avoid disconnection.

• Customers can make payments online, by phone, automatic bank draft, or mail.

· Customers with delinquent accounts receive advance disconnection notification with the regular monthly billing - never a single notification one hour before disconnection.

· Customers who suspect or experience fraud or feel threatened during contact with one of these thieves, should contact local law enforcement authorities and then the Duke Energy Indiana phone number listed on their bill (800-521-2232). Never dial the phone number the scammers provide.

Column: From forts to sports... Growing up in The Homesteads

Remember the kids who neighborhood?

I certainly do.

I had the good fortune to grow up in The Homesteads. Unless you grew up there, chances are you've never heard of The Homesteads.

The Homesteads is a suburb of Sheridan, a left or right turn off Lamong Road, depending on whether you're traveling north or south. It is located northeast of Curryville, another Sheridan suburb.

Yes. Even Sheridan has suburbs...Sort of.

If memory serves me correctly, The Homesteads was created by the late Schooley and Vicki Johnson in a wooded area just south of the Johnson's historic Sheridan home, The Kercheval Homestead. It is where President Benjamin Harrison would spend time when he was hunting in the area. That was a few years back. Even before Schooley and Vicki.

The Gail and Linda Godby family settled there when I was about seven years old. We were a family of six then moving in to a simple, one-story, three-bedroom brick ranch. It was a house that seemed much larger than it

It was Steve Barrick, the grew up with you in the same youngest of Bud and Mary Barrick's four boys, who taught my brothers Bob and Joe and me how to play in the woods. Steve taught us how to build things out of nature, like a lean-to and forts made out of tall grass, sticks and other stuff you find in the woods. I spent a lot of happy times there.

As the years passed, playing army with sticks for guns for hours in the woods was replaced by sports. The late Don Smith graciously allowed us to use his large, vacant lot in front of our house for a baseball diamond. The games attracted many kids from the city of Sheridan and suburb of Curryville, resulting in many competitive games. You had to make sure you avoided the boulder that stuck out of the ground in shallow right field, though.

Steve Barrick and my bib brother Bob were sometimes able to belt the ball on to Lamong Road. You had to make sure, though, you looked both ways when chasing it, as there were no speed limit signs on Lamong Road. Steve would give up baseball, but later play some outstanding high school football for the Blackhawks. The Miller boys, John, Paul and Phil, played many games on that diamond, along with Jeff and Steve Spencer, and Victor and Vance Hollingsworth. I'd like to think I taught my neighborhood pals an appreciation for my favorite music as I would often set the stereo speakers in the window - when Mom and Dad were at work, of course - and we'd listen to The Beatles while playing ball. Since my dad, who has never left The Homesteads, was a famous Sheridan summer league coach back in the day, we also had access to the best baseball equipment.

To create The Homesteads, a circle was carved into the woods. Half the road was gravel and half was grass. Through the years, houses would be constructed inside and outside that circle. A few years ago, the county took over the road, paved it and gave it a name: Homestead Drive.

I'm pretty sure we were about the fourth house in the addition.

In the beginning there were McVeys, Mitchells and Barricks. Soon after, there would be Spencers, Millers, Hollingsworths and more. Even my best friend Curt Agner and his family would build a home in the back corner lot next to Joe and Pat Gray, who bought the Mitchell home.

Other famous former residents in the Homesteads included popular Sheridan teacher, coach and athletic director Rex Bowman, his wife Nancy and their girls, former Sheridan High basketball coach Dan Dawson and family, and another former SHS basketball coach and athletic director, Brian Jones and

Naturally, Mr. Smith's big vard became a football field in the fall.

The month of May brought the neighborhood a kinda-500mile-race around the oval. It was tough going since half the track was mowed grass, but we made it work somehow. We did the qualifying and did things to our bikes thinking we were going to make them go faster.

Vince Hollingsworth, my classmate and the oldest of the three Hollingsworth brothers, had the ultimate Indianapolis 500 race flag set. I'm not sure we knew what each flag meant, but it was cool having them, and Vince, who did know the purpose of each flag, waved them like a pro.

No. We didn't go 500 miles. We had a set number of laps, but I don't think we ever finished before someone would inevitably crash – usually into nothing and that would end it.

There was also football in the backyard of our house where we usually went two-on-two throwing and defending passes. In the front yard, Victor and Vance Hollingsworth would come down and play two-onand me. Vance was a little guy,

the youngest of the three boys, but give him a football and he could scoot.

Finally, some of the greatest games played in The Homesteads were Wiffle ball games also played in the backyard of the house. The diamond was set up so the back of the house was the left field wall. Right field went on forever and ever.
