As part of the gradual Reconnecting Carmel effort, the City of Carmel reopened the Monon Greenway and Midtown Plaza last Friday and will keep it open as long as there is evidence that such measures are not triggering a resurgence in COVID-19 infections that can pose danger to life, health and well-being of residents and visitors to Carmel.

At the same time, the City is unveiled a series of signs to be placed along the Monon Greenway and in Midtown Plaza encouraging everyone to wear a facial covering or mask whenever they are entering a public space or encountering others. Such masks or face coverings, even those that are not rated as protective for medical personnel, can still serve as a preventive measure for the spread of a virus.

Fishers begins reopening park facilities

Fishers began opening its park facilities with a phased approach last Friday, coinciding with Governor Holcomb's Back on Track Indiana plan. Since the COVID-19 outbreak, parks and trails have remained open for outdoor recreation, but park amenities including athletic courts, shelters and restrooms have been closed.

Effective Friday, May 22, Fishers Parks and Department of Public Works undertook the following:

• All public restroom facilities in parks properties are to be de-winterized and open to the public. Restrooms will be cleaned daily, following CDC cleaning guidelines.

• All non-contact athletic courts and fields, including basketball, baseball, tennis and pickleball courts will reopen. Field rentals may resume for practice and conditioning activities only.

Schaibley said part of the reason why Yan was chosen for this award is because of her hard work and dedication to earn perfect marks on the math and science portions of the ACT, as well as in math, chemistry and physics on the SAT.

"Yan's success is a product of her focus and drive. and the educators and supporters surrounding her," Schaibley said. "It is encouraging to see students from our community reach these academic achievements as they set themselves up for success in their careers down the road."

Torr said Yan is a twotime honoree in the United States National Chemistry Olympiad Exam in 2018 and 2019, and obviously among the top 20 percent student chemists in the nation. She was also chosen to attend the MIT Research Science Institute in 2019.

"Indiana is home to students who encompass an abundance of talent, and Yan is among the best," Torr said. "Her achievements reach beyond her classroom work as she excels on the national level. She clearly has a bright future ahead of her."

Yan plans to attend Harvard University in the fall.



City officials have yet to decide whether to go ahead with the festival. But, the fireworks will definitely be displayed as usual at 9:45 on July 4, according to city spokesmen.


The big parade began as part of the national Bicentennial celebration in 1976. It grew in size and popularity, eventually involving hundreds of participants and thousands of observers.

Huskies star will be a Western Michigan Bronco . . . Father's influence carries Gus Etchison through junior year, to WMU commitment

There were many reasons why choosing to play basketball at Western Michigan University was an easy decision for Hamilton Heights star Gus Etchison.

It's a Division I school in the competitive Mid-American Conference. It's not too far away from home. The coaches offered Etchison immediate playing time. All of those are valid reasons, but they were overshadowed by the biggest one of all: It had the personal approval of Tony Etchison.

After the Etchison family visited Western Michigan, Tony told his son how much he liked it.

"I had his blessing to go there," said Gus. "That made a big difference."

In October, Tony Etchison lost his life in a farming accident. Tony may not be here physically anymore, but there is no doubt that he is still here. He continues to be an influence on Gus, not just in basketball, but off the court as well.

"I want to be like him and carry myself like he carried himself on and off the court,' said Gus Etchison.

Gus made the announcement that he had committed to Western Michigan Friday evening in a Twitter video. In that video, he said he wanted to continue his father's legacy. Tony also played Division I basketball, at Mercer University in Macon, Ga. The video featured a clip of Tony Etchison during one of his college games.

"They incorporated that into a tape of me, which was pretty cool," said Gus Etchison.

Western Michigan made it clear to Gus that he would be welcomed with open arms by the Broncos. The team told Etchison that he was "a No. 1 guy" and would be the point guard once he walked on to the floor.

TRANSITION PERIOD

Western Michigan is going through a transition period at the moment, as its longtime coach Steve Hawkins was recently let go. Hawkins had coached the Broncos for 17 seasons, including two appear-ances in the NCAA tournament.

Longtime assistant Clayton Bates is now the head coach for WMU. Etchison pointed out that Bates had been his main recruiter, and was still doing so even after moving into the head coaching position.

"He recruited me pretty much the whole time," said Etchison.

Hamilton Heights coach Chad Ballenger also went up to Western Michigan with Gus and his mother Toby during the season. Ballenger could also tell right away how much the

Broncos wanted to up there. "It was just a really good visit," said Ballenger. "They really showed how much they wanted Gus to be a part of them. With Tony getting to go up there and being high on his list, that meant a lot to Gus." Ballenger said that WMU's

style of play will suit Etchison well, since Bates is going to a four-guard offense.

He's going to an offense that's going to suit Gus," said Ballenger. "Gus is going to be a point guard in college. That was also appealing that he's going to go into a style that fits him, let Gus play to his strengths."

Pete Smith, the veteran basketball coach, has been a family friend of the Etchisons for many years. In fact, Etchison was the ball boy for the Guerin Catholic team that Smith coached to a state championship in 2012. He also attended the Golden Eagles' summer basketball camps from first through eighth grade, and his grandfather John Stretch was Smith's scorekeeper when Smith was a coach at GC; Smith said Stretch is a "dear friend" of his.

"He's been a family friend for 20 or 30 years," Etchi-son said of Smith. "I've been around him ever since I was born.

WHY WAIT?

Smith also fully encouraged Gus to accept Western Michigan's offer. He told the family, why wait to see if someone else needs a guard like Etchison when there's a school only three and a half hours away that already wants him.

"It's a great situation for Gus to grow as a young man,

make the NCAA tournament sometime in his career there," said Smith. "Now he can completely focus on doing whatever Coach Ballenger needs him to do to help their team win next season, knowing he's playing for the goals of his team, not trying to impress coaches to offer him a scholarship.'

Of course, if anyone wasn't impressed with Etchison's play in his junior season, they weren't paying attention. Etchison shined for the Huskies last year, even while dealing with

Lebanon in its season-opening game. But Etchison, with all eyes on him, channeled that into a remarkable performance by scoring 41 points. The Huskies won the game 71-69 in overtime on a Hudson Hochstedler putback.

"I know before the game I was really upset," said Etchi-son. "I just wanted to take over and play for him. I just wanted to win that game so badly.'

Ballenger said that he watched that season-opening game the other night. "Just from an emotional standpoint, man, it was really hard," he said.

"With Gus' situation, we were more worried about his emotional status and things like that," said Ballenger. "I wanted it for him so bad.

After Hochstedler made the winning shot and were jumping and down celebrating, Ballenger ran on to the court.

'It was this outpouring of emotion and I wanted it for the kids, wanted it for Gus," said Ballenger. He said it was the first time in their young lives that many of those players had lost someone close to them.

'Tony, he coached those kids in junior basketball and was around," said Ballenger.

Gus would go on to average 24.9 points per game during that season. That included a 56-point performance in the Huskies' Dec. 10 game with Mount Vernon, one of the toughest teams on Heights' schedule. Etchison isn't sure where that performance came from, but remembers a feeling of confidence as the game went on.

"Honestly, that game, I felt like my dad was there with me," said Etchison. "It was fun. We lost, which was tough, but Mount Vernon's a really good school and great team."

Heights finished last season

ments for Etchison this spring. The other was when he was left off of the Indiana Junior All-Stars team, a likely shock to anyone who had watched him play this season.

"I'm obviously disappointed I didn't make the team, but it gave me more motivation to come out and work harder," said Etchison, who also said he thinks he got more publicity after not making the team, rather than if he had made it.

'I know I have the abilities to do it," said Etchison.

LOOKING FORWARD

Etchison is also looking to lead the Huskies to another winning season. And there's a player Gus is looking forward to playing with next season: Younger brother Tillman Etchison, who will be a freshman for the Huskies.

Gus said his younger broth-er is 5-10, 5-11 – "I think he's getting my dad's height," he said – and is already a big kid. Gus continued his scouting report by saying Tillman can shoot and handle the ball really well.

"He plays pretty good defense, too," said Gus. "He should help out a lot next year."

Gus also said that there will be other young players coming on to the Huskies team, and that some players in his class will step up as well. "I think we're going to be

really good next year," said Etchison.

Then after that, Etchison will be heading up to Kalamazoo to play for the Broncos. Western Michigan is already a special place to Gus because of the presence of his father. And while they have to wait one more year to have Gus on their court, the Broncos have already made it clear that the Etchisons are part of the family.

Anyone who has watched Abby Haley play basketball for Noblesville is aware that she is generous sharing the ball.

It should come as no surprise that Haley is just as generous off the court. Haley has given back quite a bit for Noblesville High School, serving as class president, playing basketball and participating in fundraisers, including one for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society during her junior year.

Haley jumped right into student government and basketball once she entered NHS. She played basketball as a freshman, then was a varsity sophomore for the next three years. During her senior season, Haley averaged 2.8 assists per game for the Millers, leading the team in that category. Haley also played lacrosse for Noblesville as well.

While she was doing all that and keeping on top of her academics, Haley was getting elected as class president for the Class of 2020 her freshman, sophomore and junior year.

During her senior year, she was the student body president.

It was a lot to do, of course, but Haley said she was able to balance everything through her family and friends, "who helped me get through it all."

'It was a hard balance, especially being in such a demanding sport like basketball," said Haley. "I had a good support team with student government, everyone's been very helpful.'

Haley was involved in many different fundraisers through student government. That included canned food drives and a coat drive.

We've done a fundraiser for the women's shelter," said Haley. "I've done a few things throughout high school, but a lot of it was through the school."

Haley said she has been involved with fundraising since elementary school, and other people have taken notice of that over the years. During her junior year of high school, she was nominated for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Student of the Year fundraising challenge.

Haley said she was nominated by the Treinen family; Michael Treinen battled leukemia before passing away in 2008

Haley said that the Treinens "influenced me to be a part of making a difference" on her LLS page. She also mentioned Megan Broviak, a Noblesville middle school student who is also battling leukemia.

"It is because of all of these strong and impactful people I am here to ask for your help and support," Haley wrote on her LLS page

And help they did. Haley raised nearly \$80,000 for the society. It was an impressive sum, especially considering the short amount of time during which she raised the money. Haley had seven weeks, between Jan.

Haley began to plan for the fundraising challenge in December 2018. "I just drafted a bunch of ideas," she said.

One of the main things she did was publicize her LLS page, emailing out to friends and family. She also put together some fundraisers, such as a Purse Bingo night and a night a Buffalo Wild Wings, where a portion of sales went to the campaign.

"I did another fundraiser at one of the boys basketball games, where I had people donate the money and we had different sorts of food and prizes," said Haley. "We had a jersey that was signed by the boys team, we had a basketball that was signed." She also had cookies and desserts at the game as well, 'different desserts that we would give to people," said Haley.

When the fundraiser was over, Haley was shocked by the final total.

"It was so amazing," said Haley, who never though she would come close to \$80,000.

On her LLS page, Haley 24 and March 16, 2019, to raise "There were some people that I said that she decided to take on money." also had a connection with cancer and wanted to do what they could to help me out and everyone that's been affected by it."

'It just makes me feel good to help with others, especially things that my friends and family have gone through," said Haley.

Haley also got support from her basketball teammates as well. They attended the gala event at the end of the fundraiser, where it was revealed that Haley and her fellow Student of the Year nominees raised \$700,000 for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society.

'My team and my coaches were by my side through the entire thing and it was really great to have all those girls with me," said Haley.

In addition to her work for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, Haley also has worked with Peyton Manning Children's Hospital, once receiving an Outstanding Youth Achievement award from him.

Haley has done quite a bit for Noblesville High School and the community over the past four years. Now it's on to college, and she will be going to Ivy Tech for her first year, "then will possibly be looking to transfer out elsewhere," she said.

Haley plans to study construction management, and also is looking to get into coaching basketball.

Crist entered the transfer portal in March and was picked up by Binghamton fairly quickly. He said there were other schools talking to him, but things began to move once Bearcats coach Tommy Dempsey got in touch with David Maravilla, the coach of Don Bosco Prep (now Bosco Institute), the prep school where Crist played for a season after graduating from Heights in 2016.

Dempsey called up Crist, and the rest is history. "I know David talked to

Coach Dempsey about me a lot," said Crist. "It really didn't seem like there could be a better fit. The trust and confidence that Coach Dempsey had in me. even just seeing the minimal film that I had. It was just eye-opening."

Crist said he feels like he has

already had "some really benefi- still played the majority of the cial and successful conversations," not just with Dempsey, but also the entire coaching staff.

"I think we're already clicking and heading down the right path," said Crist.

The path for Crist began at Don Bosco Prep, which is locat-ed in Crown Point. Crist broke his wrist during his senior season at Heights, so he decided to go the prep school route.

Crist called it "definitely beneficial," both from the experience and skill standpoint. He averaged 15.1 points, 6.7 assists and 3.8 rebounds per game during his season at Bosco. It also helped academically, getting one year of college completed.

After that, Crist headed to Green Bay. He saw significant minutes right away, playing in all 33 games for the Phoenix, and in fact started the first three games of the season. Crist reached double-digit scoring in four contests, including 16 points against Wisconsin-Parkside.

'My freshman year, it was a transition phase," said Crist. "I thought it went well for me just get that first year under your belt. I feel like I actually got a chance. Coach (Linc) Darner had a little bit of trust in me to take control of the team. I feel like I did an OK job of doing that my first year.

games, but not as many. He was in 28 of the Phoenix's 38 games as a sophomore during the 2018-19 season, which saw Green Bay finish 21-17 and reach the championship game of the College-Inside.com Postseason Tournament (CIT)

In his junior year, Crist played in 31 of the 33 games. He averaged 2.0 points per game in both his sophomore and junior years, after averaging 3.9 points during his freshman season. In March, he entered the transfer portal.

"I don't know what exactly happened," said Crist. "Darner lost that trust. My numbers and minutes just depleted over time. I really wasn't able to be in a position for my success.'

But there were no hard feelings. Crist told the Green Bay Press Gazette that his last meeting with the Phoenix coaching staff "went well and let him leave the program on a positive note," according to a March 13 story in that newspaper. In that same story, Darner said that while the team was disappointed that Crist was leaving, "we wish him only the best in his basketball future.'

"We'll definitely still be pretty young," said Crist. He said that was one of the points that Dempsey was strong on: The coach wanted an experienced player to take over the leadership role.

'That's why he recruited me," said Crist.

So, Crist will be spending a year in Binghamton, earning a Masters degree and playing one more season. Crist said that once that season is finished, he is "probably going to try to play professionally afterwards, but then I'll have that education and the degree to fall back on." Crist said eventually he plans to go into "some type of sales," such as medical sales.

Claire Adams finishes a dominant career for the Texas Longhorns

Claire Adams finished up her scholastic swimming career this March when she completed her senior season at the University of Texas

And what a career it was for the Carmel graduate. Adams was a dominant force in the Big 12 conference and a multiple All-American swimmer at the NCAA tournament.

Local swim fans remember Adams as the first-ever 16-time state champion at the IHSAA swim meet. Adams won the maximum four events in all four years of participating at state, 2013-2016. That's a record that can never be broken, only equaled. She also won the Mental Attitude Award in 2016, at the end of her senior season.

After that, it was off to Austin, Texas to swim for the Longhorns. Adams had already achieved quite a bit of success by the time she got to college, so she didn't wander into the Texas pool naïve about competing on a national scale. As a member of the

Carmel Swim Club, Adams was used to national meets.

"I am very fortunate to have experienced national competitions from a young age as I was able to learn how to navigate those spaces early on," said Adams. "Having experiences swimming with world class athletes was humbling and eye-opening whether I was 13 years old or 20.2

Adams said the biggest differences regarding college swimming come "outside of the pool." She said that while the training changes from high school to college, the added responsibilities of "being a young adult are what make college training more taxing."

Yet she was able to handle those new responsibilities well. Adams was named to the 2016-17 Academic All-Big 12 Rookie Team in her freshman year. She is also a three-time College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) Scholar All-American, receiving that honor during each of her first three years as a Longhorn. (The Scholar All-American list for the


2019-20 season will be announced on June 30.) Then of course.

there is the swimming. Adams is a 24time champion in the Big 12 tournament. That includes going seven for seven in the conference meet for her sophomore,

junior and senior seasons. She also won three events her freshman year, and was the run-

ner-up in three more that season. Adams was part of the winning 200, 400 and 800 freestyle relays during all four years at Texas. During her sophomore, junior and senior seasons, Adams added four more conference championships. She was the winner of the 100 backstroke and 100 freestyle, then participated on the first-place

200 and 400 medley relays. At the NCAA Championships, Adams earned All-American honors 11 times and was honorable mention All-American eight more times. Six of those



Adams her freshman year, when she was part of the fourthplace 800 free relay; Adams then matched that her junior year when she swam on the fourth-place 400 free relay squad.

Unfortunately, Adams didn't get a chance to try to add to her impressive NCAA total, as the national swimming and diving championships were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. But even so, Adams got quite a bit accomplished during the previous three years.

"I am so grateful for the opportunities swimming has provided me over my time as both a club and college swimmer," said

Adams. "I am bummed that my college swimming career ended the way it did but I am grateful to be supported by amazing friends and family, to be staying healthy, and spending time relaxing. I never thought this would be the situation I would find myself in, but I know I poured my heart into the team and gave it all I had.'

Adams graduated from Texas a semester early, in December 2019, with a degree in Youth & Community Studies. With all of the uncertainty surrounding the pandemic, Adams is unsure about continuing her swimming career, which would include attempting to qualify for the Tokyo Olympics, which have been pushed back to 2021.

"I am currently completing a three-semester teacher certification program at Texas," said Adams. "I still have two semesters left. With so many unknowns about school and sports I do not feel that I have all the information I need to be able to decide if I want to continue with swimming.3

Education is important to

Adams. On Friday, she received the Texas Athletics - College Football Playoff Foundation Postgraduate Teacher Certification Scholarship, which, according to a release on the Texas Sports website, is designed to "financially support student-athletes who have exhausted athletic eligibility and completed an undergraduate degree, but want to pursue teacher certification." 'I have known I have a pas-

sion for teaching from a young age," said Adams in the release. "When I earned the opportunity to swim for Texas, I knew I was going to a school that would support my teaching dreams."

Once she is finished with the teacher certification program, Adams will be certified to teach kindergarten through sixth grade.

"For now, I want to get a few years of teaching under my belt and then return to school for a masters in cultural studies in education," said Adams. "Long term, I would like to work in the education system, potentially creating curriculum.
