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# Primary Election results could take several days

Public viewing of Primary Election results will be moved from the Hamilton County Government & Judicial Center to the Hamilton County Fairgrounds to ensure better social distancing.

Public viewing will take place in Halls A and B of the Exhibit Building. Doors open at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, June 2. The halls can be accessed through the building's southeast door. Parking lot signage will be in place to help direct the public to the correct entrance. Display screens will be placed at each end of the halls. Several round tables and a sufficient number of chairs that will be available and properly spaced per social separation guidelines.

Due to the large volume of absentee ballots, there is the very real possibility that counting votes could take several days. Workers will count absentee ballots from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Election Day. They will switch gears after that as election inspectors start delivering the tally cards from the polling locations.

"If we still have absentee ballots left to count, we'll complete those Wednesday," County Clerk Kathy Williams said. "We will reopen Halls A and B Wednesday from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. if necessary. If mail-in ballot processing carries over to Thursday, the public watch area will reopen again at 8:30 a.m."

Hamilton County has until noon on June 12 to certify election results.

# Noblesville announces Fireworks Festival details

Noblesville city officials are actively preparing for a spectacular 2020 Noblesville Fireworks Festival, and the City has announced details for the free events taking place on Saturday, July 4.

The event's planning committee is coordinating with the city's leadership and health officials throughout the reopening stages to ensure a safe event for the public. The event is contingent on Governor Eric Holcomb's Back on Track plan,

which may change the city's plans prior to the festival.

"We are optimistically continuing to make preparations for the Noblesville Fourth of July Fireworks Festival and Parade. Our hope is that we can host our annual festival and celebrate together as a community," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "The event's offerings may be a little different this year as we make changes to follow CDC guidelines and best practices from health

# Quick arrest in fatal hit and run accident

*Sheriff credits community members for information leading to arrest*

Last Tuesday, Hamilton County Sheriff's Deputies responded to the area of 226th Street and Anthony Road, just west of Cicero, on a report of a pedestrian struck by a vehicle.

At last Wednesday's press conference, Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush said, "The first deputies to arrive at the scene were directed to where the victim, Alice Chamblin, a 70-year-old female from Cicero, was laying on the side of the road. Bystanders and deputies performed first aid and CPR until paramedics arrived; however, Chamblin died on scene due to her injuries."

Reports filed by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Team indicated Chamblin had been walking on the side of Anthony Road with a family member just before the crash occurred.

The family member and another witness were able to provide a vehicle description of a truck which had crossed from the northbound lane of travel, into the southbound lane of travel and struck Chamblin. The truck then left the scene northbound on Anthony Road.

Evidence left on scene

by the suspect truck was found and collected by accident investigators.

Based on witness information and evidence at the scene, investigators were able to determine the suspect vehicle was a silver/gray 1997-2003 Ford F-150 with a tinted rear window.

"Through the generous help from our social media followers, local news and our local communities, tips and leads began to come into our office. These tips led investigators to Tipton,

# Monon Greenway, Midtown Plaza reopening in Carmel

As part of the gradual Reconnecting Carmel effort, the City of Carmel reopened the Monon Greenway and Midtown Plaza last Friday and will keep it open as long as there is evidence that such measures are not triggering a resurgence in COVID-19 infections that can pose danger to life, health and well-being of residents and visitors to Carmel.

At the same time, the City is unveiling a series of signs to be placed along the Monon Greenway and in Midtown Plaza encouraging everyone to wear a facial covering or mask whenever they are entering a public space or encountering others. Such masks or face coverings, even those that are not rated as protective for medical personnel, can still serve as a preventive measure for the spread of a virus.

"We trust that our residents and visitors will use caution and treat this pandemic situation with the life-or-death seriousness that it demands," Mayor Jim Brainard said. "If you feel sick, stay home. If you live with someone who has tested positive, stay home. If you suspect you may be positive, get tested. Everyone in Carmel needs to have faith that their fellow citizens, neighbors and friends care as much about them as they do about their desire to 'return to normal' in our City."

Mayor Brainard will look at three criteria to determine how long this congested portion of the Monon Greenway and Midtown Plaza will remain open.

Those criteria include: Hospitals under 70 percent of their bed capacity to allow room for a new surge; to determine through testing in the general population that positive COVID-19 cases do not exceed 5 percent; and 14 days of declining COVID-19 hospital patients. These criteria are based on medical advice from both local and national experts.

If the opening of the Monon Greenway and Midtown Plaza proves to be detrimental to these goals, Brainard says he will not hesitate to shut the area down again in order to protect the health and well-being of city residents and visitors.

However, if a gradual return to enjoying the expanded greenway and plaza takes place, the City is poised to bring back a few popular attractions – Monday Movies at Midtown and Tuesday Music at Midtown beginning immediately.

Here is the plan:

**Midtown Plaza** will be "COVID-fitted" to reflect a new respect for physical distancing and other measures taken to reduce the potential spread of the virus. Pool tables and ping pong tables will remain closed to prevent the spread of the virus through pool sticks and ping pong paddles. Outdoor furniture will be separated

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# Carmel to begin testing city employees for COVID-19 antibodies in early June

The city of Carmel will begin testing for COVID-19 antibodies in city employ-

ees beginning on or about June 1.

Unlike the viral tests that have been taking place for

the past several weeks, antibody blood tests check your blood by looking for antibodies, which show if you had a previous infection with the virus. Antibodies are proteins that help fight off infections and they may indicate a certain level of immunity.

Any city employee that tests positive for antibodies will no longer need to be virally tested unless they begin to show symptoms. The City currently has 25 employees who have tested positive for the virus. The sooner employees can be tested for antibodies, the sooner it will

be known whether or not they can be taken out of the rotation. City officials say this will save the city money and reduce the stress for employees being tested on a weekly basis.

The City has spent more than \$350,000 on viral testing of employees. The viral test costs \$135 per employee (down from \$150 per test after a renegotiation between the City and Aria Diagnostics) while the antibody tests will cost \$53 per employee. City officials reviewed five vendors for the antibody testing and selected Ameri-

can Health Network for their competitive pricing, their ability to test large numbers of employees at convenient locations and their staff of experienced phlebotomists.

“Spending money to test employees for the virus helps us save lives, stop the spread of the virus and avoid having to pay the estimated \$100,000 cost of hospitalization for a week for just one employee,” said Mayor Jim Brainard. “It is also important to note that slightly more than four percent of our city work force has tested positive, the majority of

which were asymptomatic. Because we were able to detect the existence of the virus, we could initiate contact tracing, determine others who should be tested, keep our employees safe and cut down the spread of this disease in our community. The addition of the antibody test will allow us to better track those who may not only be immune, but could donate plasma. Employees who have the antibodies may also be able to donate plasma to help people with the most severe cases of COVID-19 recover more quickly.”

## Fishers begins reopening park facilities

Fishers began opening its park facilities with a phased approach last Friday, coinciding with Governor Holcomb's Back on Track Indiana plan. Since the COVID-19 outbreak, parks and trails have remained open for outdoor recreation, but park amenities including athletic courts, shelters and restrooms have been closed.

Effective Friday, May 22, Fishers Parks and Department of Public Works undertook the following:

- All public restroom facilities in parks properties are to be de-winterized and open to the public. Restrooms will be cleaned daily, following CDC cleaning guidelines.
- Playgrounds and drink-

ing fountains will remain closed, per the Governor's order.

- All non-contact athletic courts and fields, including basketball, baseball, tennis and pickleball courts will reopen. Field rentals may resume for practice and conditioning activities only.

- Athletic field rentals for non-contact sports for groups of 250 and more are set to begin June 14.

- Fishers Parks splash pads and Saxony Lake and Beach will remain closed until June 14.

- Shelter and venue rentals will resume for groups of up to 100 individuals beginning June 1.

- Shelter rentals for up to 250 people will reopen

during Stage 4 of the reopening plan, set to begin on June 14.

All park amenities are planned to be fully operational during Stage 5, which is set to begin on July 4. This includes venue rentals for more than 250 individuals.

As Fishers Parks phases toward fully opening, under the guidance of the Fishers Health Department, residents are encouraged to take the necessary precautions to slow the spread of COVID-19:

- Practice social distancing: Stay six feet apart and avoid congregating
- Wash your hands frequently or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer
- Wear a face covering if

you are over the age of 2.

Fishers Parks' reopening schedule is subject to change dependent upon the Governor's Back on Track Indiana plan and subsequent Executive Orders.

Fishers Parks also announced the 2020 Fishers Summer Concert Series will be canceled in addition to all June Summer Camps in consideration of the COVID-19 pandemic.

# No July 4 parade in Carmel this year

For the first time in 44 years, the popular Carmel 4th of July parade will not be held this year due to health concerns. In recent years the parade has attracted huge crowds along its entire two-mile route.

The parade was part of a two-day Carmelfest patriotic celebration that included a festival on Civic Square featuring food, music, commercial and civic organization displays, capped with fireworks.

City officials have yet to decide whether to go ahead with the festival. But, the fireworks will definitely be displayed as usual at 9:45 on July 4, according to city spokesmen.

The big parade began as part of the national Bicentennial celebration in 1976. It grew in size and popularity, eventually involving hundreds of participants and thousands of observers.

Military units, high school bands, floats and celebrities were among the 100 or so units making up the lengthy parade.

A local tradition involved placing lawn chairs, blankets and even small tents along the parade route days before the parade. This resulted in a move last year to

curtail the practice of 'staking out' claims for good locations to see the parade. But, the move was discarded.

Officials said a decision on the festival at Civic Square will be announced in the near future.

Residents and businesses may start using Carmel in their address beginning July 1, 2020. The zip code will remain 46280 and the mail will still be processed

through the Nora post office. "I pursued the change in the address line after hearing from residents and businesses in the Home Place area who wanted to be able to use their city name in their address. This helps them be better identified as Carmel residents and businesses," Brainard said.

where a citizen reported seeing a Ford F-150 that matched the description of the suspect vehicle," Quakenbush said.

Investigators with the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office located the truck and concluded the damage to the truck was consistent with evidence collected at the crash scene. The vehicle was impounded and taken to the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office crime lab where detectives were able

to match evidence found at the scene to the evidence on the suspect’s truck.

"Through exhaustive work of the Hamilton County Crash Team and the help of the citizens of our communities, we were able to arrest Daniel L. Sullivan of Tipton," Quakenbush said.

Sullivan was arrested on the alleged crime of leaving the scene of a crash causing death. Sullivan is currently housed in the Hamilton County Jail.

# Taking control of that weight gain

As promised, I'm going to tackle another subject that many perimenopausal women are facing as they navigate the sandwich generation – weight gain. Many people who aren't in this category are now battling extra weight thanks to being stuck at home due to COVID-19. I understand – having that food around all the time is so tempting if you're not used to it!

I began to notice the perimenopausal weight gain a couple of years ago. One day I stepped on the scale and literally gasped

– an extra five pounds came out of nowhere. I even changed the scale batteries to see if that was the problem. Nope.

I hadn't changed my eating habits, which overall were good. I was still exercising regularly, drinking a lot of water, and doing all the things that help most people keep a healthy weight.

Then it hit me – I was approaching menopause and gaining those pounds I'd heard so much about over the years. And months later the five pounds turned into seven. Then eight.

Then, last December – 10.

I know these are relatively small numbers. But small numbers eventually add up to large ones. I started some research to see what I could do to gain back control.

My husband was also working on his weight and had been doing intermittent fasting and seeing success. I seriously considered this option. If you know me at all, you're probably laughing at this idea. I've always been one of those "hangry" people who became, shall we say, agitated when I didn't eat regularly.

But one intermittent fasting plan appealed to me – eating within an eight-hour window each day

(called 8/16 fasting). I actually ate within a 10-hour window most of the time so I figured it might not be too tough reduce those hours.

On Dec. 26 I started to eat only between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. most days. I also reduced my sugar intake along with items made from white flour. I made certain to not overeat at each meal.

The only time I was hungry was in the morning, but I usually just dove in to work with a cup of herbal tea, got focused on my tasks, and that helped me get through. I took a quick breakfast break at 10:00 and then got right back to work.

By mid-January, I had

lost six pounds. By the end of February, I lost eight. As of today, I've lost all 10 of those perimenopausal pounds! No special diet or super-strict meal plan required.

As always, if this idea sounds appealing to you, please do your research and also chat with your doctor. Dr. H supports what I'm doing and has been happy with my weight.

# Father's influence carries Gus Etchison through junior year, to WMU commitment

There were many reasons why choosing to play basketball at Western Michigan University was an easy decision for Hamilton Heights star Gus Etchison.

It's a Division I school in the competitive Mid-American Conference. It's not too far away from home. The coaches offered Etchison immediate playing time. All of those are valid reasons, but they were overshadowed by the biggest one of all: It had the personal approval of Tony Etchison.

After the Etchison family visited Western Michigan, Tony told his son how much he liked it.

"I had his blessing to go there," said Gus. "That made a big difference."

In October, Tony Etchison lost his life in a farming accident. Tony may not be here physically anymore, but there is no doubt that he is still here. He continues to be an influence on Gus, not just in basketball, but off the court as well.

"I want to be like him and carry myself like he carried himself on and off the court," said Gus Etchison.

Gus made the announcement that he had committed to Western Michigan Friday evening in a Twitter video. In that video, he said he wanted to continue his father's legacy. Tony also played Division I basketball, at Mercer University in Macon, Ga. The video featured a clip of Tony Etchison during one of his college games.

"They incorporated that into a tape of me, which was pretty cool," said Gus Etchison.

Western Michigan made it clear to Gus that he would be welcomed with open arms by the Broncos. The team told Etchison that he was "a No. 1 guy" and would be the point guard once he walked on to the floor.

"It made me feel wanted," said Etchison, who just finished his junior year at Heights.

### TRANSITION PERIOD

Western Michigan is going through a transition period at the moment, as its longtime coach Steve Hawkins was recently let go. Hawkins had coached the Broncos for 17 seasons, including two appearances in the NCAA tournament.

Longtime assistant Clayton Bates is now the head coach for WMU. Etchison pointed out that Bates had been his main recruiter, and was still doing so even after moving into the head coaching position.

"He recruited me pretty much the whole time," said Etchison.

Hamilton Heights coach Chad Ballenger also went up to Western Michigan with Gus and his mother Toby during the season. Ballenger could also tell right away how much the Broncos wanted to up there.

"It was just a really good visit," said Ballenger. "They really showed how much they wanted Gus to be a part of them. With Tony getting to go up there and being high on his list, that meant a lot to Gus."

Ballenger said that WMU's style of play will suit Etchison well, since Bates is going to a four-guard offense.

"He's going to an offense that's going to suit Gus," said Ballenger. "Gus is going to be a point guard in college. That was also appealing that he's going to go into a style that fits him, let Gus play to his strengths."

Pete Smith, the veteran basketball coach, has been a family friend of the Etchisons for many years. In fact, Etchison was the ball boy for the Guerin Catholic team that Smith coached to a state championship in 2012. He also attended the Golden Eagles' summer basketball camps from first through eighth grade, and his grandfather John Stretch was Smith's scorekeeper when Smith was a coach at GC; Smith said Stretch is a "dear friend" of his.

"He's been a family friend for 20 or 30 years," Etchison said of Smith. "I've been around him ever since I was born."

**WHY WAIT?**

Smith also fully encouraged Gus to accept Western Michigan's offer. He told the family, why wait to see if someone else needs a guard like Etchison when there's a school only three and a half hours away that already wants him.

"It's a great situation for Gus to grow as a young man, get a solid education, and also have an opportunity to play basketball on a team due to

Lebanon in its season-opening game. But Etchison, with all eyes on him, channeled that into a remarkable performance by scoring 41 points. The Huskies won the game 71-69 in overtime on a Hudson Hochstedler putback.

"I know before the game I was really upset," said Etchison. "I just wanted to take over and play for him. I just wanted to win that game so badly."

Ballenger said that he watched that season-opening game the other night. "Just from an emotional standpoint, man, it was really hard," he said.

"With Gus' situation, we were more worried about his emotional status and things like that," said Ballenger. "I wanted it for him so bad."

After Hochstedler made the winning shot and were jumping and down celebrating, Ballenger ran on to the court.

"It was this outpouring of emotion and I wanted it for the kids, wanted it for Gus," said Ballenger. He said it was the first time in their young lives that many of those players had lost someone close to them.

"Tony, he coached those kids in junior basketball and was around," said Ballenger.

Gus would go on to average 24.9 points per game during that season. That included a 56-point performance in the Huskies' Dec. 10 game with Mount Vernon, one of the toughest teams on Heights' schedule. Etchison isn't sure where that performance came from, but remembers a feeling of confidence as the game went on.

"Honestly, that game, I felt like my dad was there with me," said Etchison. "It was fun. We lost, which was tough, but Mount Vernon's a really good school and great team."

Heights finished last season 16-9, losing a tough game in the sectional championship to Delta 42-41. It was one of two basketball-related disappoint-

ments for Etchison this spring. The other was when he was left off of the Indiana Junior All-Stars team, a likely shock to anyone who had watched him play this season.

"I'm obviously disappointed I didn't make the team, but it gave me more motivation to come out and work harder," said Etchison, who also said he thinks he got more publicity after not making the team, rather than if he had made it.

"I know I have the abilities to do it," said Etchison.

**LOOKING FORWARD**

Etchison is also looking to lead the Huskies to another winning season. And there's a player Gus is looking forward to playing with next season: Younger brother Tillman Etchison, who will be a freshman for the Huskies.

Gus said his younger brother is 5-10, 5-11 – "I think he's getting my dad's height," he said – and is already a big kid. Gus continued his scouting report by saying Tillman can shoot and handle the ball really well.

"He plays pretty good defense, too," said Gus. "He should help out a lot next year."

Gus also said that there will be other young players coming on to the Huskies team, and that some players in his class will step up as well.

"I think we're going to be really good next year," said Etchison.

Then after that, Etchison will be heading up to Kalamazoo to play for the Broncos. Western Michigan is already a special place to Gus because of the presence of his father. And while they have to wait one more year to have Gus on their court, the Broncos have already made it clear that the Etchisons are part of the family.

"The coaches are really close. They're especially close with my mom. They reach out to her the same as they reach out to me. When I went there, it felt like family to me," said Gus.

Anyone who has watched Abby Haley play basketball for Noblesville is aware that she is generous sharing the ball.

It should come as no surprise that Haley is just as generous off the court. Haley has given back quite a bit for Noblesville High School, serving as class president, playing basketball and participating in fundraisers, including one for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society during her junior year.

Haley jumped right into student government and basketball once she entered NHS. She played basketball as a freshman, then was a varsity sophomore for the next three years. During her senior season, Haley averaged 2.8 assists per game for the Millers, leading the team in that category. Haley also played lacrosse for Noblesville as well.

While she was doing all that and keeping on top of her academics, Haley was getting elected as class president for the Class of 2020 her freshman, sophomore and junior year.

During her senior year, she was the student body president.

It was a lot to do, of course, but Haley said she was able to balance everything through her family and friends, "who helped me get through it all."

"It was a hard balance, especially being in such a demanding sport like basketball," said Haley. "I had a good support team with student government, everyone's been very helpful."

Haley was involved in many different fundraisers through student government. That included canned food drives and a coat drive.

"We've done a fundraiser for the women's shelter," said Haley. "I've done a few things throughout high school, but a lot of it was through the school."

Haley said she has been involved with fundraising since elementary school, and other people have taken notice of that over the years. During her junior year of high school, she was nominated for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Student of the Year fundraising challenge.

On her LLS page, Haley said that she decided to take on the challenge "for one simple reason – because I want to make a difference." She has been personally affected, first when her friend and second-grade classmate Michael was lost to the disease. Haley said she was nominated by the Treinen family; Michael Treinen battled leukemia before passing away in 2008.

Haley said that the Treinens "influenced me to be a part of making a difference" on her LLS page. She also mentioned Megan Broviak, a Noblesville middle school student who is also battling leukemia.

"It is because of all of these strong and impactful people I am here to ask for your help and support," Haley wrote on her LLS page.

And help they did. Haley raised nearly \$80,000 for the society. It was an impressive sum, especially considering the short amount of time during which she raised the money. Haley had seven weeks, between Jan.

24 and March 16, 2019, to raise money.

Haley began to plan for the fundraising challenge in December 2018. "I just drafted a bunch of ideas," she said.

One of the main things she did was publicize her LLS page, emailing out to friends and family. She also put together some fundraisers, such as a Purse Bingo night and a night a Buffalo Wild Wings, where a portion of sales went to the campaign.

"I did another fundraiser at one of the boys basketball games, where I had people donate the money and we had different sorts of food and prizes," said Haley. "We had a jersey that was signed by the boys team, we had a basketball that was signed." She also had cookies and desserts at the game as well, "different desserts that we would give to people," said Haley.

When the fundraiser was over, Haley was shocked by the final total.

"It was so amazing," said Haley, who never thought she would come close to \$80,000.

"There were some people that I wasn't very close with, but they also had a connection with cancer and wanted to do what they could to help me out and everyone that's been affected by it."

"It just makes me feel good to help with others, especially things that my friends and family have gone through," said Haley.

Haley also got support from her basketball teammates as well. They attended the gala event at the end of the fundraiser, where it was revealed that Haley and her fellow Student of the Year nominees raised \$700,000 for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society.

"My team and my coaches were by my side through the en-

tire thing and it was really great to have all those girls with me," said Haley.

In addition to her work for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, Haley also has worked with Peyton Manning Children's Hospital, once receiving an Outstanding Youth Achievement award from him.

Haley has done quite a bit for Noblesville High School and the community over the past four years. Now it's on to college, and she will be going to Ivy Tech for her first year, "then will possibly be looking to transfer out elsewhere," she said.

Haley plans to study construction management, and also is looking to get into coaching basketball.
