A record number of mail-in votes have been received.


Early voting is now being conducted and candidates are turning up the heat with their campaign tactics.

I'll agree with Commissioner Steve Dillinger's comments he made in December after passing the ordinance prohibiting signs on county real estate: "Poorly placed signs increase visual clutter." I'll take it a step further. All campaign signs increase visual clutter.

Folks, it has gotten out of hand. And it is not just the signs.

At Westfield's Public Safety Building, candidate poll workers were camped alongside the drive, complete with lawn chairs, food boxes, drink containers and a patio umbrella.



ed, free COVID-19 testing center for residents 18 and older and traditional health department services to support Fishers residents.

#### COVID-19 Response

A top priority, and the main pillar, of the Fishers Recovery Plan released by Mayor Fadness in April is to provide access to free testing for any resident who desires to be tested. The Fishers Health Department launched its drive-thru testing location in partnership with Mid-America Clinical Laboratories on April 30 and has since tested over 1,800 residents. More than Fishers Health Department 4,000 residents have completed the assessment.

#### Current CDC Guidance

As state and local communities begin recovery, residents should continue to follow CDC guidance. Individuals are encouraged to:

- Wash hands often

- Cover mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others. Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.



# Two Carmel non-profits receive \$5K relief grants

The REPORTER Non-profit organizations that provide public humanities programming to Hoosiers across the state will receive more than \$500,000 in operating support to help with funding relief due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Indiana Humanities awarded CARES Grants to 74 organizations, from Mishawaka to Milan. Awards range from \$1,000 to \$15,000, depending on the size of the organization's budget. Organizations in the 5th Congressional District will receive

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) provided the funding to Indiana Humanities as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act economic stabilization plan appropriated by the U.S. Congress.

"The CARES Act includes provisions to help small businesses and Hoosiers in many industries, including those employed by public humanities such as cultural sites, libraries, and museums. The funds appropriated for Indiana Humanities CARES Grants will help support these programs through this difficult time," said U.S. Senator Mike Braun.

Local Hamilton County CARES Grant recipients from Indiana's 5th Congressional District include:

• Carmel Clay Historical Society and Monon Depot Museum – Carmel (\$5,000)

Museum of Miniature Houses and Other Collections – Carmel (\$5,000)

"When Congress came together to support the CARES Act, which was aimed at providing relief to small businesses and families during this difficult time, we en-

for the Humanities," said Congresswoman Susan W. Brooks. "These cultural institutions provide opportunities for lifelong learning and preserve and provide access to cultural and educational resources for all Hoosiers. The over

\$560,000 funds awarded to Indiana, which specifically included five organizations in the Fifth District, will allow these organizations to maintain local historic and cultural sites, libraries, museums, and others, whose needs are tremendous and whose survival is critical to the economic and cultural lives of our communities."

Requests for the grants exceeded \$1.3 million, and the 186 applicants expressed \$11.7 million in total losses to date, as well as projected losses of \$44.9 million through Sept. 30.

"We are pleased to have awarded grants to groups large and small, carrying out a variety of programming, in each congressional district and in 48 of our 92 counties," said Doran Moreland, Indiana Humanities board chair. "Because of the immense need we had to turn down many organizations that are doing good work, including some of our close partners. The grant committees put great care into the review, weighing a number of factors such as public humanities focus, need, audiences served, and geography.'

The grants do not require a match and will be distributed to the organizations in sured funding for the National Endowment 
June. Organizations with budgets less than

"These CARES grants will help meet immediate needs at cultural institutions around the state, allowing Indiana museums, archives, libraries and historical societies to maintain vital operations," said NEH Chairman Jon Parrish Peede. "Thank you to Indiana Humanities for their swift and judicious distribution of CARES Act funding to the many humanities organizations suffering financial distress during the pandemic."

# Tom Rich: Art is alive in Fishers!

The COVID-19 virus might be playing havoc with our lives, and that is not a good thing. But COVID-19 also has shown us how resilient and adaptable we are, especially when it

comes to art!

One of the major attractions for visual artists and residents in Fishers has been the Fishers Arts Council (FAC) exhibits at The Art Gallery at City and at The Alcove at City Hall. The city just added a sign announcing the art gallery at the Municipal Complex. And then ... the doors shut.

For the past several years, FAC has created a beautiful space at City Hall for local and regional artists to showcase their works. One evening a month, the artists held a reception to talk about their art.

Now what? Road show! You can't come to our house; we will come to your house. The arts council offers a free virtual gallery exhibit every month.

"The Fishers Arts Council can bring a new artist (or artists) and their artwork into our homes each month," said FAC President Tom Rich. "You can sit on your sofa, enjoy the art and hear from the artist."



"And, it is easy," said FAC Treasurer Les Reinhardt. "Just go to Facebook.com/ **FishersArt** and join in on a live interview with the artist or artists of the month. We walk through the gallery with the artist, asking questions, and learning more about them. Plus, since it's live, the audience gets

to interact with the artist."

We also wanted to keep the artists engaged. How do we do that? Laura Villanyi, vice president of the board, came up with Monday-2-Monday, an artist challenge.

Every week she offers a push-pull choice for artists to showcase their work. For example, human or animal; quiet or loud; finished or unfinished – just to name

a few. (This project is now in its seventh week!) Then, the artist submits his or her work on the FAC Facebook page. The artist stays active and has the opportunity to expand his or her following – maybe even sell a painting.

That wasn't enough. Why not do a little bit of teaching? So, FAC created a goal is to showcase some of the classical art and share a "snippet" about the artist. This is just another way for FAC to keep art alive in Fishers – to provide beauty at a bleak time.

The group didn't stop there. You can go on the Fishers Arts Council website (FishersArtsCouncil.org) and sign up for ASSET by clicking the red ASSET button. This is a four-part panelist-style lecture

series first intended to be held at IGNITE Studios. Currently, it is a webinar. The second session: "The Gallery World - Be in the Know," is scheduled for 7 to 8:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 25.

FAC Board member Olivia Holt felt that something was missing in Hamilton County – information for artists to help them become entrepreneurs.

"While we have many established artists in Fishers and Hamilton County, there are always those who want to grow, connect with their community, and share their art," said Holt.

After surveying artists and community members over the course of half a year, she found what they wanted: Marketing help, community connections, getting into galleries and more. With this feedback, Hart developed her program, and that is being made available to the public free with assistance from Hamilton County Tourism, Nickel Plate Arts and Ignite Studios.

Yes, there is still more. FAC is just one group seeking to promote arts and culture in Fishers. The Fishers Arts and Culture Commission oversees Arts and Culture in Fishers with a goal to provide Fishers residents with public art, visual and performing art, and information about where to find it all. This process was just getting started when the virus hit.

However, the effort is moving forward "mini class." Each night FAC offers "Art- as all of the stakeholders - residents, busiwork from the Masters" on Facebook. The nesses and city personnel begin to take the words of the Fishers Master Arts & Culture Plan and turn them into art.


