Social distance the 1950s way *Drive-in movies making a comeback*



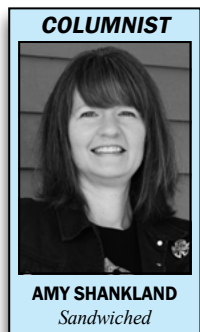

105 small businesses will benefit from county grants

The Hamilton County Stabilization Fund for Small Businesses has selected 105 small businesses to grant funds to in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In total, they will receive \$743,205 in grant money. That money was approved by the Hamilton County Commissioners at their meeting on Tuesday.

"We launched this program to assist small businesses in Hamilton County that were forced to close during the economic shutdown," County Councillor Fred Glynn said. "This program is a lifeline to those businesses. For many, this program was their last attempt to avoid closing permanently."

Each business has been

granted anywhere from \$1,000 to \$10,000 based on their demonstrated need. Grants can be used for payroll, utilities, rent, mortgage, insurance and products directly used in production of a product for sale. Preference was given to

Election Day coming up fast

The primary election, always especially important in Hamilton County, is less than a week away. It's a strange election due to the pandemic shutdown, but it is still an important one.

Important because as we know, winners in the county Republican primary are most likely to be elected in the November

general election.

So far, virtually no Democrats have filed for county office, which is not unusual, although there are candidates for state legislature in local districts.

Without candidates the outcome in November is obvious for offices such as two county commissioner seats, three county council positions, county surveyor, county coroner and a few town council seats at stake this year.

Democrats claim they will file "some candidates" for county office before the general election deadline to fill their ticket.

The only really hot primary race appears to be between Scott Baldwin and J.R. Gaylor for the GOP nomination for State Senate in the local District 20 where Sen. Victoria Spartz decided against re-election in favor of

Noblesville Police to get new safety tech by end of summer

The City of Noblesville is partnering with BodyWorn by Utility to provide the Noblesville Police Department (NPD) with body worn cameras before the end of the summer as part of ongoing commitments to increase transparency and effectiveness of community-based law enforcement and public safety efforts.

Funding for body worn cameras was included in the 2020 police department budget approved by the Common Council last fall. Noblesville leveraged its purchasing power and vendor selection options to obtain active shooter response technology that could be fully integrated into the body camera communication and dispatch platform.

The active shooter response technology

body worn camera. This immediate integration has not been previously deployed anywhere in the nation and saves valuable minutes on time that would otherwise be lost on a 911 call and dispatch.

Gunshot detection devices are also being offered through the City of Noblesville to other public and private entities in the community who are interested. This offering is unique and marks Noblesville as the first in the country to offer gunshot

HSE school board: Decision on starting school in August can't be made now

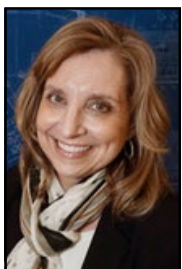

After the submission of two petitions — one with roughly 219 signatures by Board President Michelle Fullhart's count — Hamilton Southeastern Schools assured the public the school district wants to start school as normal in August, but there is no way to make that decision now. Fullhart read a statement from the board assuring the public nothing is being hidden from them, contrary to rumors being circulated within the school district community.

"We are not hiding anything," according to the board statement, read by Fullhart at the May 27 meeting. "We honestly do not know what Hamilton Southeastern Schools will be doing yet because it is too early to make those decisions."

The school corporation has a task

force deliberations.

"Any decision is dependent on the guidance we are given by the state, CDC [Centers for Disease Control] and local health departments," according to the board statement. "We cannot make any promises at this point and no petition or amount of e-mail will cause a decision to be made prematurely."

Carmel Clay Parks finalist for National Gold Medal Award

The American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration (AAPRA), in partnership with the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), announced Wednesday that Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation (CCPR) is a finalist for the 2020 National Gold Medal Award for Excellence in Park and Recreation Management. The Gold Medal Awards program is sponsored by Musco Lighting, LLC.

Founded in 1965, the

Gold Medal Awards program honors communities in the United States that demonstrate excellence in parks and recreation through long-range planning, resource management, volunteerism, environmental stewardship, program development, professional development and agency recognition. Applications are separated into six classes, with five classes based on population and one class for armed forces.

Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation is a finalist in the

Class III category for cities with a population of 75,001 to 150,000. This is the second time CCPR has been named a finalist for the highest honor for a parks and recreation agency, previously winning the National Gold Medal in 2014. After a mandatory sit-out period, 2020 marks the first year the organization is once again eligible to win this prestigious award. CCPR joins three

running for U.S. Congress. There have been extensive and expensive TV ads and mailers accusing each other of unpopular positions and associations. In most cases the ads are sponsored by shadow groups claiming not to be aligned with any candidate. For other offices, there have been a record number of letters to the editor extolling the virtues of a favored candidate. But, be-

cause of the health crisis, there have been almost no public appearances or door-to-door campaigning. Because of the unusual election year, no one knows what to expect on Election Day. The turnout may well be small, although the record amount of absentee voting, now over 40,000, may signal surprising interest. June 2 is Election Day for the postponed primary. Results may not be known

that day because of the record number of absentees that need to be counted, but all results will be found in the Reporter as soon as possible. For the general public interested in viewing election returns on election night, the returns will be posted at the County Fairgrounds Exposition Building after 6 p.m. This is a change in location from the Judicial Center where results were formerly posted.

detection devices to public and private organizations. Any devices deployed in the community will be directly connected to the NPD body camera communication system to facilitate immediate notification and response. Public safety officials are in communication with public and private entities in the community for future deployment of the devices. "This fully integrated system allows our police force to have the quickest reaction times possible," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "We are excited to be leading the nation and be able to offer the gunshot detection devices to community partners. This first-of-its-kind community integration puts our city at the forefront of public safety and we thank the police department for putting in the work and finding the best technology out there." Unlike other body worn camera systems, BodyWorn by Utility has immediate video offload during recording and encrypted cloud-based evidence documentation, which permits immediate evidence review. "Several body worn camera systems were tested by

our officers for more than five months before BodyWorn was selected and backed by the administration," Police Chief John Mann said. "This system includes vital tools we need and cloud-based offload for immediate review in the event of an incident. BodyWorn will allow our officers to be the best at their jobs while strengthening our transparency and accountability." All 95 NPD officers will be equipped with a body worn camera. Future integration of other public safety tools with BodyWorn is currently being examined.

how to handle it all. So, like many people, I had to "wing it." Thank God I'm fairly organized and energetic. Soon I wasn't just working from home with a baby, but a toddler as well, as Jonathan and Jacob are only 16 months apart. Back then working from home was a fairly new concept. I only knew one other mom who did it. I still kept my eye out for tips about how to keep improving the daily juggling act. Then one day, in my typical fashion, I thought, "Hey, I can write about how to do it!" By then I had over three years of experience. So in 2004 I wrote *How to Work at Home With Small Children*. I self-published the little book through lulu.com, a company that is still around today. I probably sold 30 copies, but I was still proud of my first "real" book. It served as a guide to help parents work with a baby, toddler, or small child beside them and still have a good career. It shared tips on how to prepare for a work at home career; ideas on what type of job to either create or look for that is suitable for working at home with little ones; how to plan a workday; and how to overcome problems. It also featured some of my work at home columns. I ran across my copy of *How to Work at Home With Small Children* this week and decided to read through it for fun. It was great to go back in time and remember those crazy but "worth every minute" days. It was also funny to see my tips about how you needed

to have a cable modem vs. dial-up for Internet and how it was vital to get a separate landline for your business. Oh, how times have changed! Working at home is certainly easier for me now, since my baby and toddler are now young men going off to college this fall. In fact, I worry more about the 88-year-old in my life – my mom – while working from home these days. For the fun of it, I looked the book up online and was surprised to see it's still out there on Amazon. If you're struggling like I was years ago while working from home with small children, feel free to reach out to me through this paper. Or, for some good tips and chuckles, pick up a copy of *How to Work at Home With Small Children* online.

businesses that had not received abatements or incentives from the federal government, state government, or any local government entity. 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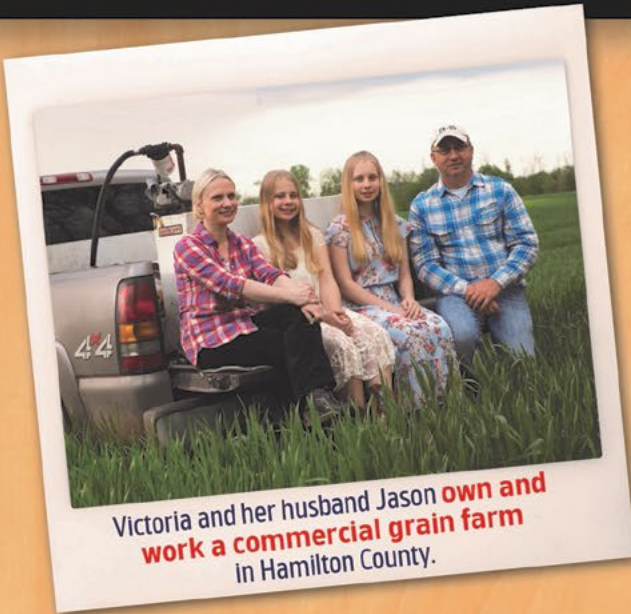

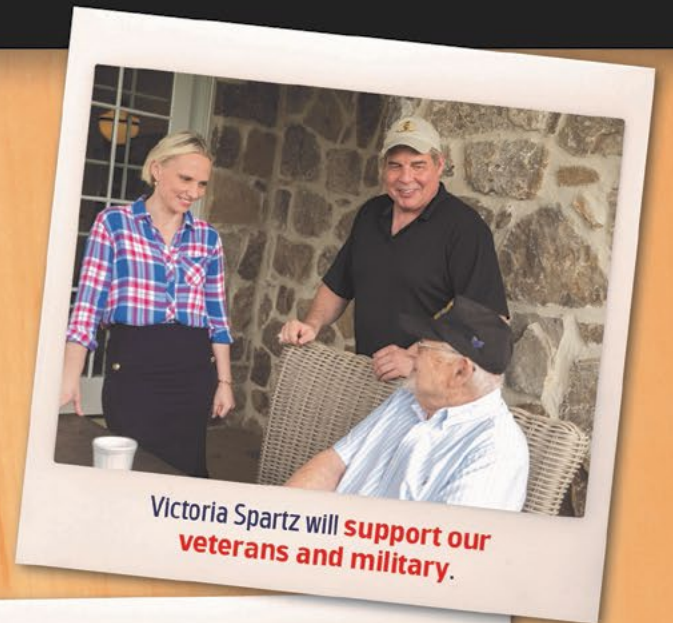

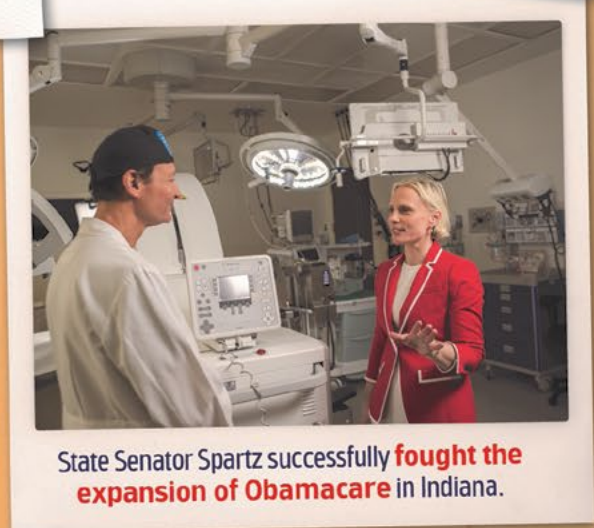

State to investigate pandemic's impact on utilities, customers

State officials will investigate how the pandemic is affecting utilities and their customers. This investigation comes after a petition from consumer advocates and another from utility companies.

One petition was filed by a group of utilities, including IPL and Duke Energy, asking for relief

from lost revenue due to the pandemic. The second was from the office of the utility consumer counselor, asking for extensions on ratepayer protections. The Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission combined those petitions into one case, which the state will investigate in two phases.

The first phase will address disconnections, utility fees and customer payment arrangements. During the

second phase, the utilities will have to show the pandemic has caused them to lose money. But the Indiana Office of Utility Consumer Counselor – which represents customers in these type of cases – says this is beyond normal requests of this kind.

"Utilities have collected bad debt costs through rates for many mean years, so there are some things that are not unprecedented," said OUCS Spokesperson Anthony Swinger. "When you talk about the lost revenue request though, that's really getting into unprecedented ground and it would create a

very high bar that the utilities would have to clear."

Disconnections are banned through the end of June. The IURC wants to have a decision on disconnections, and relief for customers, before then.

- Temp check when entering, hand sanitizers present, distancing – seating spaced out and limited attendance to half as normal

Ball State will start classes Aug. 24, drop fall break, go to online only after Thanksgiving

Ball State University has announced it will begin “face-to-face” instruction for the fall semester as planned on Aug. 24 with new health and safety measures to address the coronavirus pandemic. But, fall break is canceled, classes will be held on Labor Day, and any instruction, exams or projects after Thanksgiving will be online only. The result will be 13 straight weeks of classroom instruction before the Thanksgiving break. On-campus housing will be reorganized to have enough rooms to quarantine and isolate students who may test positive for COVID-19 or be exposed to it. Also, in residence halls, room assignments will be adjusted to reduce the number of students who use the same restroom and other common areas. Ball State also will make COVID-19 testing readily available, support contact tracing, maintain ample supplies of personal protective equipment, and expand the availability of annual influenza vaccinations. In addition, Ball State said in a news release, more online courses will be added. The news release had no information about plans for sports. The board of trustees approved the plan to reopen the campus. President Geoffrey S. Mearns said students wanted a return to “immersive learning projects” and campus experiences.

If the request is approved, the Drainage Board may enter into a License Agreement, which will authorize Beck’s to maintain, construct, and/or reconstruct drainage improvements within the Drain, including a 11,205’ of title of the main Drain; 760’ of title of Arm 1 of the Drain; 1,008’ of title of Arm 2 of the Drain; and 1,165’ of title of Arm 3 of the Drain. The License Agreement will also authorize Beck’s to maintain, repair, and/or construct additional drainage improvements within the right of way of the Drain. Many DNR campgrounds full, but prime options remain

Memorial Day weekend is traditionally one of the busiest of the year, and last weekend was no exception.

But entering the post-holiday weekend, which has traditionally been slower for camping, DNR campgrounds have even more reservations than for Memorial Day weekend. Most camping options at most state park properties are sold out.

“This weekend is a bit unusual,” said Ginger Murphy, deputy director of Indiana State Parks. “More often the first weekend after Memorial Day is a little quieter as people finish school, and have and go to graduation and open houses. But this year is obviously different, and we are off and camping in 2020.”

As far as camping at state parks, online reservations for camping can be made until 2 p.m. the day of camping. Walk-in registration for camping is also allowed on the day of arrival. Right now, O’Bannon Woods State Park is the only park property where there might be electric sites available tomorrow. Camp-

sites for equestrian use are still available at Brown County, Tippecanoe River, and O’Bannon Woods state parks, and at Salamonie Lake and Deam Lake State Recreation Area (SRA).

But other prime DNR campground options remain available, while they last.

First-come, first-served primitive camping sites are available at Greene-Sullivan, Yellowwood and Morgan-Monroe state forests.

First-come, first-served camping is also available at Glendale Fish & Wildlife Area (FWA), as well as at J.E. Roush Lake and Willow Slough FWAs. If considering Glendale FWA, call (812) 644-6107 for information on the campground and site availability before heading there. More information on FWA camping is at on.IN.gov/dfw-properties.

All those camping and considering camping are reminded to practice social distancing, and to choose a different weekend to visit if they are not feeling well or have been in contact with someone with COVID-19.

If going to a DNR property for only day use,

keep in mind that access is managed based on parking availability to help ensure that guests have a positive experience. A good way to avoid waiting in line or being asked to visit elsewhere nearby instead is to keep up with DNR/State Parks on Twitter and follow DNR/State Parks and property pages on Facebook for near-real-time updates regarding access. In addition, Indiana Dunes State Park is a part of a regional beach parking information line, (219) 395-1003, which you can call to hear the status of beaches along the Lake Michigan shoreline in Indiana.

State Park inns have plenty of rooms available in all seven locations and cabins at Brown County, Turkey Run and Pokagon state parks are also available for the weekend. Inn restaurants are open for dining with menu-based meals available. Make reservations at IndianaInns.com or 877-LODGES-1 (877-563-4371).

14-year-old swimmer from Fishers makes waves at national level

JoJo Ramey recalls the weekend trip she took to Georgia this winter for the Short Course Junior Championships, a swim meet that she thought assumed would be similar to the dozens of other races she's competed in throughout her career.

She said, "I was doing homework all the way up until when I left to swim that race."

As a freshman at Fishers High School, her biggest concern was her first round of final exams. So, Ramey was hitting the books in between heats but apparently wasn't too preoccupied to put up a lifetime best performance in the pool.

Ramey said, "I saw my time, and that was what surprised me the most because I dropped almost 2 seconds off my best time before that and I ended up getting the cut by like a second and a half."

She had qualified for the 2020 Olympic Trials in the 200 backstroke event on her very first try. She may act like it's no big deal, but at 14 years old, JoJo became one of the youngest swimmers to punch their ticket to Omaha.

Joe Keller, head swim coach at Fishers, said, "JoJo has brought a culture changing type attitude. I don't know if I've ever been around an athlete like her in over 29 years of coaching. I've been around a lot of athletes but never one that has the type of day-in, day-out, great attitude, one of the hardest-working athletes I've ever coached."

Now that this summer's event has been postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic, Ramey says, she will have more of an edge. Her time will hold, and she will still qualify for the 2021 Olympic Trials come next summer.

"I don't want to just go to the Olympic Trials to go. I mean, the experience will be really cool, but I want to go there and actually do something."

Ramey's main focus for the season ahead is making the U.S. Junior National Team and making additional cuts in other events. She said, "When I'm older, yeah, I want to make it to the Olympics but I need to focus on high school."

So, for now, no plans for Tokyo 2021, but this teenager from Fishers has already caught the attention of the sport's biggest stars.

"I like just got done changing after I got my cut and I was standing there waiting for my coaches and I get a call, and I saw 'Colorado Springs' and was like this might be the Olympic Training Center, I don't even know. And she was like, 'Hi! This is Missy Franklin,' and I was just like, 'Oh, my!'" Ramey said. "She definitely gave me advice. She was just, like, keep on working hard, have dreams."

Ramey's dream is on pause for the time being, but this isn't the last big splash we'll see JoJo make.

Live comprehensive coverage of practice and qualifying June 6 from Texas Motor Speedway will stream on NBC Sports Gold's INDYCAR Pass. Race coverage on NBC streams on NBCSports.com and the NBC Sports app.

The Genesys 300 will be the first race of the 2020 NTT INDYCAR SERIES campaign as the series gets #BackOnTrack. This kicks off NBC Sports' second season as the exclusive home of the NTT INDYCAR SERIES, including the Indianapolis 500 presented by Gainbridge, which will now take place Sunday, Aug. 23 on NBC.

The second race of the NTT INDYCAR SERIES season, the GMR Grand Prix on Saturday, July 4 at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, also will be broadcast to a network audience on NBC. A full-season broadcast schedule will be released at a later date.

Today's news also will be announced on network television, during NBC's four hour "Indy 500 Special: Back Home Again."
