\$20.5M in federal COVID-19 aid available across county

Hamilton County and local communilion to cover COVID-19-related expenses through the federal stimulus package, according to local lawmakers.

Indiana allocated \$300 million in federal funding from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economics Security Act to counties and communities for reimbursement of expenditures related to the pandemic. Indiana House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said the funding, allocated based on population, can-

not be used to replace lost tax revenue.







With a birdie-eagle finish . . .

Mike O'Toole triumphs at Indiana PGA Senior Open

it is likely there won't be a better finish to a tournament than the one Mike O'Toole had on Thursday.

The Noblesville golfer was down by a couple shots with a few holes to go at the Indiana PGA Senior Open, which finished up Thursday at Purgatory Golf Club. O'Toole then surged to the top of the leaderboard with a birdie on the 17th hole and an eagle on 18, giving him his first-ever Senior Open championship.

O'Toole finished with a two-day score of 71-66=137, seven under par for the event. He estimated it was the first tournament he had won in a few years, and it was certainly a great way to get back in the winner's circle. O'Toole finished three shots ahead of Indianapolis' Michael Williams, who carded a 69-71=140 for the event.

"I hit the ball extremely well off the tees and gave myself a lot of good opportunities," said O'Toole. "I had two three-putts on par fives that ended up being pars. Everything seemed to go my way. I got a couple of good breaks on the bunkers and different things. Just a wonderful day of golf."

O'Toole was three under par after the 16th hole, then made his charge with the birdie on 17, his fourth of the day. He then came to 18 with a plan, and everything came through, as he got on the green in two shots and made a 20-foot putt for

"Everything's playing real fast and firm, so basically, if you can hit the right line with your driver, it'll go forever," said O'Toole. "I was able to do that. I ended up having a nine iron, I was 157 yards from the pin, but even that's still downhill. I was just trying to hit a little nine iron about 144 yards in the front edge, and then release up on the green. I hit it exactly where I wanted to and made about a 20-footer for an eagle.'

O'Toole's eagle was his second of the event; he made one during the first round on the 4th hole. He also totaled eight birdies for the tournament, with four in each round.

Angelica Pfefferkorn remembered her very first high school golf meet, back in 2016 at the Golf Club of Indiana, playing for the Guerin Catholic

girls golf team. She admitted that she was "absolutely terrified" during her first-ever meet. But look at her now: Pfefferkorn graduated Guerin Catholic as a three-time state qualifier and was the pick for the Golden Eagles' Female Athlete of the Year for the 2019-20 school year.

"I was thrilled and I was so honored to receive the award." said Pfefferkorn. "I was super

Guerin Catholic announced the award this week on the school's athletic website. The Athlete of the Year awards are voted on by the Golden Eagles' head coaches. Guerin Catholic coach Mark Mathews said that Pfefferkorn's "team leadership skills and her natural ability as a team captain made it a real joy to be her coach" over the past four years.

"I'm really excited to follow her college golf career as she pursues her medical degree," said Mathews.

Pfefferkorn was a four-year varsity letter winner, and played No. 1 all four years. She had 15 medalist finishes and a four-year scoring average of 74.1, along with leading the Golden Eagles to four straight Circle City Conference championships and a fifth-place finish at the IHSAA state finals in 2018.

"Angelica is a terrific representative of a student-athlete at Guerin Catholic – someone who competes at the highest level and does so with unwavering humility," said GC athletic director Ryan Davis. "Her accomplishments on and off the golf course are amongst the best ever for any student-athlete at Guerin Catholic. We are proud of all she has done and for the mark she has left not only for the girls golf program, but also all of our student-athletes.

Pfefferkorn has been playing golf since she was 6 years old, and still remembers her

first-ever junior tournament.

I torget where it was, but it was somewhere here in Hamilton County and I remember I had to do a putt-off for second place," said Pfefferkorn. "I think I was 11." She did win that puttoff, "and I was thrilled," she

"I've made so many friends playing golf," said Pfefferkorn. I love coming to tournaments and seeing them. We hang out outside of golf and we also prac-

tice together, play together. Among the highlights of Pfefferkorn's career, of course, are the three times that she qualified for the state finals. As a sophomore, she made it to state by playing in a playoff at the re-

"That time I was just scared, and Prairie View was a big, challenging course that seemed impossible," said Pfefferkorn.

But in her junior year, it wasn't so scary. There were two reasons for that: First, Pfefferkorn had the experience of playing there, and second, her entire Golden Eagles team was with her.

My junior year, I had my whole entire team with me, so that was a lot of fun," said Pfefferkorn. "I felt more confident there, being my second time and my team being there to support me and we support each other."

Pfefferkorn went back to state her senior year, where she placed eighth in the state.

"My last year, senior year, radiology.

After the meet, Pfefferkorn was named to the All-State

"I was super excited to finally make the All-State team,' said Pfefferkorn. "That is something I really looked up to my entire high school career, so it meant a lot to me, being able to make it my senior year.

Pfefferkorn is now playing her usual slate of summer tournaments, after which she will be heading to Stillwater, Okla., the home of Oklahoma State University. Pfefferkorn has committed to playing on the women's golf team there.

"When I visited out there, I fell in love with the school and their golf program is amazing along with the school," said Pfefferkorn. "Their facilities are beautiful. It seemed like a great place, great coaches and team-

Pfefferkorn has been a great student at Guerin Catholic, with a 4.188 grade-point average. That includes Advance Placement and International Baccalaureate classes.

'I'm going to major in psychology on a pre-med track," said Pfefferkorn. After that, she plans to go to medical school, and is looking at going into dermatology or interventional

Jeff Dunasky Jr. credits two things for his success in wrestling: Discipline and work ethic.

Both of those traits helped Dunasky to an incredible career for Guerin Catholic. It has led him to many championships and awards, including being named the Guerin Catholic Male Athlete of the Year for the 2019-2020 season.

Dunasky, a three-time semistate qualifier and four-time regional qualifier for the Golden Eagles, is the first wrestler to receive the award.

'Simply put, Jeff is one of the best to ever walk the halls at Guerin Catholic," said GC athletic director Ryan Davis. "In so many ways, he has set the bar for all wrestlers to reach. As great as his wrestling accomplishments were, his time in the classroom, the hallways and interactions with others will always define Jeff. He's a student-athlete full of faith, high character and tons of ability and that's how we will remember him. We will miss Jeff but Guerin Catholic is better be-

cause he was a part of it." Dunasky began has high school wrestling career as a freshman at 132 pounds. He joined the Golden Eagles at the Elwood sectional that year, where he placed fourth to earn a spot at the Pendleton Heights regional.

"It was exciting, exhilarating," said Dunasky. "But also terrifying.

Dunasky was one of three Guerin Catholic wrestlers that vear to advance to the regional. He wound up drawing the eventual state champion in his first regional match. Even though his first regional ended quickly, it began a streak of making it to regional all four years of high school.

"It was scary, as a freshman wrestling varsity," said Dunasky. But it set his successful career in motion, as it proved he could stand up to the older wresters.

"It's something I can remember fondly, wrestling these huge seniors and going out there trying to do my best to score points," said Dunasky.

In his sophomore year, Dunasky moved up to 145 pounds and stayed at that weight class for the next three seasons. He returned to the Elwood sectional and won the championship, getting major decision victories in the semi-finals and

"Seeing your improvement over the year from fourth to first and seeing my record go up is always a confidence boost," said Dunasky.

That was the start of three straight 145-pound sectional championships for Dunasky. He would also qualify for the semistate all three years, culminating with a regional championship win as a 145-pound senior.

Dunasky finished his career for the Golden Eagles with a 122-33 record, the most wins of any GC wrestler in history. He is the all-time leader in takedowns, near falls and winning percentage. In addition to his sectional and regional titles, Dunasky also won Hamilton County and Circle City Conference championships during his career. He also was named Academic All-State during his junior and senior sea-

"It feels like I did something better the program," said Dunasky. "I gave other wrestlers something to aspire to. Set a bar for them to compete at their best ability. The accomplishments that I have I think will help the program set a baseline for how athletes at Guerin can compete."

And there's no secret to how Dunasky achieved those accomplishments.

"It comes down to discipline

have to know that when you come home from school, you don't have time to mess around. You go right to it; you don't lounge around. It's keeping your priorities straight. When you want the results that I wanted, you live a certain lifestyle, no matter the sacrifices.

Dunasky has also traveled around the state and the country in order to find opponents to compete against or new practice partners. He also went to the annual national tournament in Fargo, N.D.

"I've competed with coaches from many different high schools," said Dunasky. It's a matter of putting yourself out there and trying to get results. My coach (Andy Fleenor) and I would always travel to off-season tournaments. He's always been in my corner. He was along for the ride just as much as I was.

"I'm extremely proud of the hard work Jeff put into getting better every day," said Fleenor. 'Whether it was running, lifting or getting into a wrestling room, he was doing something every day to make himself better to reach his goals. He leaves Guerin Catholic as the most decorated wrestler in history, leaving behind a standard of expectations and paving a path for what it takes to be a successful

Ashley Jonathan wins Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award

Ashley Jonathan has done many little things to help make the world a better place.

All those little things have

added up to a big award. Jonathan, a Guerin Catholic and now Bellarmine University graduate, won the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award for Division II women's tennis. The award has been presented since 1982. According to a story on the Bellarmine University website, the award is given to student-athletes "who have exhibited outstanding sportsmanship and leadership, as well as scholastic, extracurricular and tennis achievements in ways that embody the legacy of tennis icon and humanitarian Arthur Ashe

"I never expected to win this award," said Jonathan. She has been doing various little acts of charity here and there, usually in creative ways.

"I never thought those would go noticed. I can't even believe it," said Jonathan.

One of Jonathan's charity acts involves something many people take for granted: Soap. Jonathan noticed that whenever the team would travel and stay in hotels, those little bars of soap and shampoo were being wasted. So, she and her teammates began collecting them.

"We took soaps on trips, soaps we didn't use and we asked the front desk for extra soaps," said Jonathan. "Every single year, our fall and spring season, decorate them in boxes or baskets and deliver them to different homeless shelters each year.'

Jonathan and her teammates would do the same thing with their tennis equipment as well, donating used tennis shoes (up to 83 pounds' worth), and donate them locally to those in need in Louisville (the home of Bellarmine University), Indianapolis and to third-world countries. Jonathan is working to make this a tradition for all teams at Bellarmine, "to start providing soaps, extra shoes, or anything else that is right at our hands that could make a huge difference to people who are homeless or in need of help," she said.

The team also donated tennis balls as well, and played tennis with children in need. "Our whole team would play and practice with kids that don't have much wealth and we would practice with them and give them lessons or tips," said Jonathan.

Another good example was during one season, the Knights team made Christmas boxes. The team used old tennis shoes boxes "and decorated them with beautiful wrapping paper," said Jonathan. Then each team member donated \$10, went to Dollar Tree, purchased items such as gloves, water, hand warmers and blankets, put them in the boxes and gave them to homeless shelters.

The Bellarmine team has done other things to help its community, such as trash cleanups

has also helped out with the Make-a-Wish Foundation and breast cancer organizations. They may be little things, but Jonathan said that the accumulation of all these acts "makes a huge differ-

Jonathan was a star for Guerin Catholic's tennis team, but didn't know if she would be playing at the college level. "I wasn't the fittest and it was kind of terrifying to me at that moment," she

But her family members convinced her to play, telling her, 'You can't waste God's talent that He gave you. You have to use it and you have to show everyone what you can do with that talent."

So, Jonathan began playing. She soon began to see the benefits of participating in college tennis, which weren't limited to

me an escape from when I was stressed." said Jonathan. "It gave me an immediate group of friends and pushed me to new levels mentally and physically that I never thought I could be pushed to. I would not be where I would be today without having tennis in my life. I've been playing since I was 6 years old. It taught me to be an independent person, it taught me to be a self-driven per-

"I really learned how to micromanage all those parts in my life," said Jonathan. "I realized I can do so much more, too. College is about finding yourself. All of those great ideas I had when I was a kid, college made me find all those resources and start doing it.'

Jonathan constructed a motto her freshman year, which she addressed in her letter for the Ar-

leader is using your God-given talents, humbly, and with a ready heart to give to those in need, regardless if you receive any cred-

Jonathan is certainly receiving credit for her actions, on and off the court. She holds a record of 140-61 playing for the Bellarmine Knights. During her senior season, Jonathan played No. 1 singles and was 12-5, with her only losses to Division I players and Division II All-Americans. She also played doubles; Jonathan and her partner Ava Ratcliff compiled a 17-1 record.

'We have a very strong team," said Jonathan. The Knights were 9-0 for the season before it got canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.


"We'll fit in," she said. "There are going to be some schools that are surprised."
