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\$20.5M in federal COVID-19 aid available across county

Hamilton County and local communities are eligible for more than \$20.5 million to cover COVID-19-related expenses through the federal stimulus package, according to local lawmakers.

Indiana allocated \$300 million in federal funding from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economics Security Act to counties and communities for reimbursement of expenditures related to the pandemic. Indiana House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said the funding, allocated based on population, cannot be used to replace lost tax revenue.

Hamilton County is eligible for \$10,709,238 in reimbursement funding. In addition, these communities are eligible to receive the following amounts:

- Arcadia: \$53,986
- Atlanta: \$24,170
- Carmel: \$3,033,818
- Cicero: \$159,039
- Fishers: \$3,029,016
- Noblesville: \$2,048,273
- Sheridan: \$97,818
- Westfield: \$1,347,325

Grand Park releases findings from COVID-19 impact study

The Grand Park Sports Campus, in partnership with the IUPUI Sports Innovation Institute, last Wednesday released the results of its COVID-19: Return to Youth Sports research study. The scientific survey of more than 10,000 people across 45 states looked at perceptions and expectations of parents, athletes, coaches, officials and administrators in relation to youth sports amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

The data will be an important tool that facilities and event operators can use to ensure athletes and their families feel safe as youth sports resume.

Led by David Pierce, director of the IUPUI Sports

Innovation Institute and an associate professor of sports management in the School of Health and Human Sciences at IUPUI, the study assessed the feelings of parents, athletes, coaches, officials and administrators toward 12 adaptations being considered and implemented by venues for restarting youth sports programs.

Among the findings, participants identified seven critical or expected changes as youth sports emerge amid the pandemic:

- Venues and events should invest heavily and visibly in sanitization of facilities, playing areas, and equipment before, during, and after events.
- Venue operators and event managers can feel

confident that the recommendations provided by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and National Federation of State High School Associations to sanitize playing areas and equipment after each use will be well-received and welcomed by users.

- Promotion and monitoring of social distancing guidelines.
- Limiting personal contact between players.
- Limiting admission to those under age 65 with no underlying conditions.
- Completing a health and contact information questionnaire prior to entering venues by users is expected in order for youth sports to return during the COVID-19 pandemic.

New Fishers Connect app will help residents report issues to relevant city departments

The City of Fishers has launched a new mobile app to provide residents with a one-stop shop for City services. The Fishers Connect app provides an easy way for residents to report non-emergency issues within the community related to City maintained roadways, street signs, storm water, water, sewer, streetlights and park infrastructure elements. The app also provides quick links to City information and forms related to City services.

The free app is now available for download from the App Store and on Google Play.

With the app, residents can take a photo of the is-

sue that needs to be fixed and submit the photo, description of the issue, and GPS location – automatically provided by the app – directly to City departments. From there, residents can track the progress of their reported issue and receive confirmation once the problem is fixed. Residents can also view a map of all reported issues within Fishers and create custom “watch areas” to receive updates on issues in a specific area of their community.

The app also includes links to important information and resources for residents, including:

- The City’s COVID-19 response and community information

- How to sign up for free COVID-19 testing with the Fishers Health Department
- Contact information for City Hall and a list of frequently asked questions
- Forms to report private property issues, such as high grass and weeds
- How to report noise and non-emergency issues to the Fishers Police Department
- Drive Fishers construction and road closure updates
- Stigma Free Fishers mental health resources
- Fishers Parks information
- Sign up for City emails and links to the City of Fishers’ social media accounts

Clerk’s Office releases final primary election results

Official results to be released on June 12 after provisional ballots counted

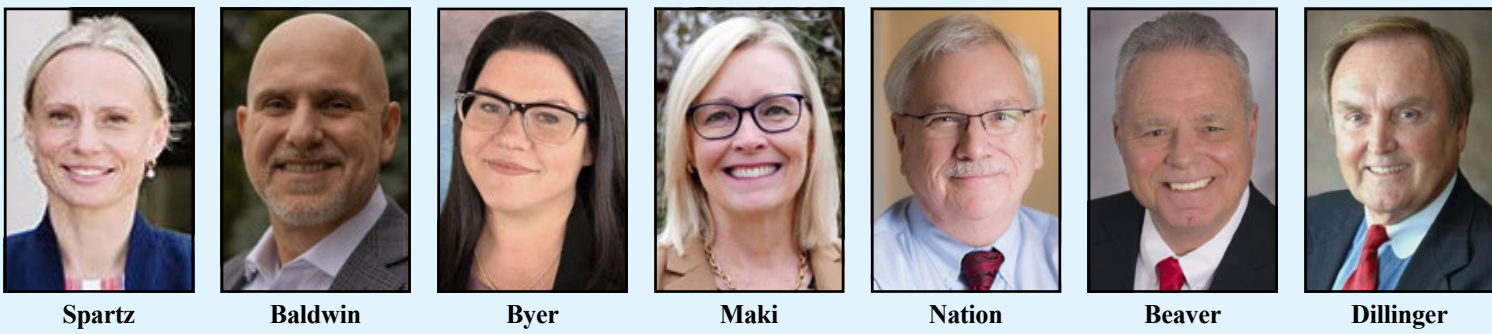

Final figures from last week’s primary election indicated two close races for county council and county treasurer: Steve Nation edged out John Ditslear for one of three at-large seats on the council by 1,055 votes, and Susan Byer bested Kim Good by 1,971 votes.

A total of 72,257 voters cast ballots which is just short of 30 percent of the eligible electorate. And, for the first time ever, slightly more than half voted absentee or in early voting.

Current State Senator Victoria Spartz came out on top in a crowded field in the 5th District Congressional Republican primary with nearly 40 percent of the vote.

Republican Scott Baldwin bested fellow Republican JR

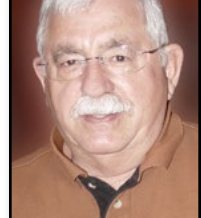
John always had a smile and encouraging word. He loved life, loved people, and loved his Savior.

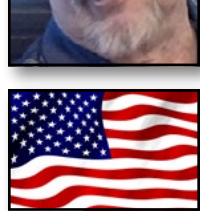

Ashley Jonathan wins Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award

Ashley Jonathan has done many little things to help make the world a better place. All those little things have added up to a big award.

Jonathan, a Guerin Catholic and now Bellarmine University graduate, won the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award for Division II women's tennis. The award has been presented since 1982. According to a story on the Bellarmine University website, the award is given to student-athletes "who have exhibited outstanding sportsmanship and leadership, as well as scholastic, extracurricular and tennis achievements in ways that embody the legacy of tennis icon and humanitarian Arthur Ashe Jr."

"I never expected to win this award," said Jonathan. She has been doing various little acts of charity here and there, usually in creative ways.

"I never thought those would go noticed. I can't even believe it," said Jonathan.

One of Jonathan's charity acts involves something many people take for granted: Soap. Jonathan noticed that whenever the team would travel and stay in hotels, those little bars of soap and shampoo were being wasted. So, she and her teammates began collecting them.

"We took soaps on trips, soaps we didn't use and we asked the front desk for extra soaps," said Jonathan. "Every single year,

we would collect them through our fall and spring season, decorate them in boxes or baskets and deliver them to different homeless shelters each year."

Jonathan and her teammates would do the same thing with their tennis equipment as well, donating used tennis shoes (up to 83 pounds' worth), and donate them locally to those in need in Louisville (the home of Bellarmine University), Indianapolis and to third-world countries. Jonathan is working to make this a tradition for all teams at Bellarmine, "to start providing soaps, extra shoes, or anything else that is right at our hands that could make a huge difference to people who are homeless or in need of help," she said.

The team also donated tennis balls as well, and played tennis with children in need. "Our whole team would play and practice with kids that don't have much wealth and we would practice with them and give them lessons or tips," said Jonathan.

Another good example was during one season, the Knights team made Christmas boxes. The team used old tennis shoes boxes "and decorated them with beautiful wrapping paper," said Jonathan. Then each team member donated \$10, went to Dollar Tree, purchased items such as gloves, water, hand warmers and blankets, put them in the boxes and gave them to homeless shelters.

The Bellarmine team has done other things to help its community, such as trash cleanups

around the Ohio River. Jonathan has also helped out with the Make-a-Wish Foundation and breast cancer organizations. They may be little things, but Jonathan said that the accumulation of all these acts "makes a huge difference."

Jonathan was a star for Guerin Catholic's tennis team, but didn't know if she would be playing at the college level. "I wasn't the fittest and it was kind of terrifying to me at that moment," she said.

But her family members convinced her to play, telling her, "You can't waste God's talent that He gave you. You have to use it and you have to show everyone what you can do with that talent."

So, Jonathan began playing. She soon began to see the benefits of participating in college tennis, which weren't limited to athletics.

"It got me fitter, it gave me an escape from when I was stressed," said Jonathan. "It gave me an immediate group of friends and pushed me to new levels mentally and physically that I never thought I could be pushed to. I would not be where I would be today without having tennis in my life. I've been playing since I was 6 years old. It taught me to be an independent person, it taught me to be a self-driven person."

"I really learned how to micromanage all those parts in my life," said Jonathan. "I realized I can do so much more, too. College is about finding yourself. All of those great ideas I had when I was a kid, college made me find all those resources and start doing it."

Jonathan constructed a motto to her freshman year, which she addressed in her letter for the Ar-

thur Ashe Award: "Being a great leader is using your God-given talents, humbly, and with a ready heart to give to those in need, regardless if you receive any credit."

Jonathan is certainly receiving credit for her actions, on and off the court. She holds a record of 140-61 playing for the Bellarmine Knights. During her senior season, Jonathan played No. 1 singles and was 12-5, with her only losses to Division I players and Division II All-Americans. She also played doubles; Jonathan and her partner Ava Ratcliff compiled a 17-1 record.

"We have a very strong team," said Jonathan. The Knights were 9-0 for the season before it got canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Everyone knew they had to do their business on the court and everyone was there to sup-

port them," said Jonathan. "We always have our families come to our matches."

Bellarmine is a Division II school competing in the Great Lakes Valley Conference, but will soon be transitioning to Division I play, joining the Atlantic Sun Conference. But the Knights have played a tough schedule, so Jonathan is expecting a smooth transition.

"We'll fit in," she said. "There are going to be some schools that are surprised."

Jonathan majored in exercise science with a minor in psychology, and just started her first year of physical therapy school. She also got a chance to play a fifth year of tennis, as many NCAA athletes who lost out on their spring seasons were granted an extra year.

"I feel blessed that I was given an extra year," said Jonathan.

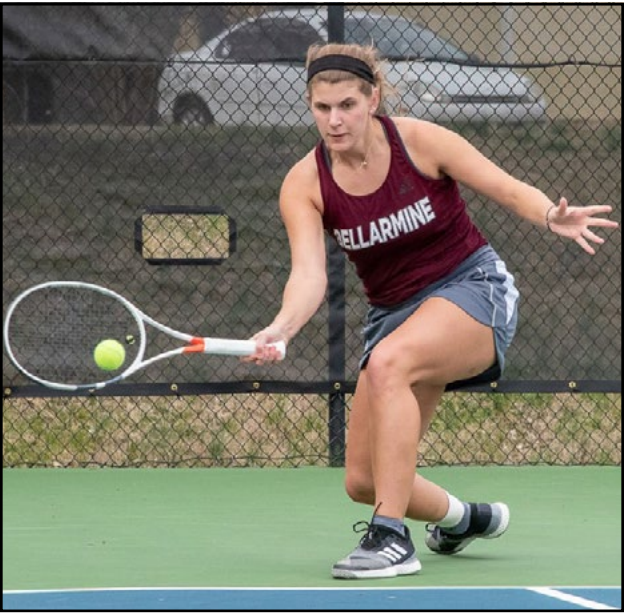
