Remember the soldiers who made independence possible

With the celebration of Independence Day, it seems appropriate to remember men who fought in the Revolutionary War to secure our nation's freedom. There were likely no Hamilton County natives fighting in the war since the area was still a vast wilderness in 1776. But, in the years following the war, settlers moved into the area, including at least 13 veterans who lived out their lives here and are buried in the county. None of these men were voung or even middle age by the time they and their families began settling Hamilton County in the early 1820s. These old vets probably came with children and grandchildren to our area. Most were buried in small rural cemeteries. The Daughters of the American Revolution has worked over the years to locate and mark the graves of these American heroes.



These were tough old soldiers. One account tells of George Abney who fought in several engagements in South Carolina. then in later years, came to Hamilton County. He died at the age of 98 while burning stumps to clear his family's homestead. The 13 identified include some with family names still found among the current population. Nancy Massey at the Noblesville library has a file of these veterans. Her list includes the following:



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

• CICERO: The parade will begin at 11 a.m. Lights Over Morse Lake begins at approximately 10 p.m. July 4. The best viewing location is near the intersection of Main and Buckeye streets.

• FISHERS: The City of Fishers canceled the July 4th Geist fireworks show due to coronavirus and public health concerns.

At 5:38 p.m. Wednesday evening, emergency crews were called to the scene of a serious crash on Interstate 69 southbound near 106th Street in Fishers.

Senior Trooper Nick Klingkammer was close by and arrived quickly. He told dispatchers there were two unresponsive victims in one car and he was unable to gain access to render aid to them. The Fishers Fire Department quickly responded to the scene and hastily extricated both crash victims from the car.

Despite lifesaving efforts, both the driver and passenger of the car were pronounced deceased at the scene. There was also a semi-tractor trailer involved in the collision; that driver was transported to the hos- this crash is ongoing.

pital with minor injuries. Preliminarily, investiga-

tors believe the driver of the passenger car swerved to avoid shredded tire debris in the roadway and lost control, then the car spun into the path of the semi and was struck on the driver's side.

Neither alcohol nor any other impairment is suspected as a contributing factor to this crash; however, as state law requires, blood tests for the drivers involved will be part of the investigation.

The driver of the car was Marcus Padgett, 19, Spencer, Ind., and the passenger was Elizabeth Robertson, 17, Pendleton, Ind., both deceased.

The driver of the semi is identified as Anthony Manuel, 52, of Georgia.

Promise Road closing next week

Effective Monday, July 6, Promise Road between State Road 32 and 191st Street will be closed to thru traffic between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. while pipe cuts are made. Motorists are asked to seek a different route during this daytime closure.

Multi-phase closure of 236th Street

Effective on or after Monday, July 13, a three-mile stretch of 236th Street will be closed in two separate phases for road rehabilitation, each for a period not to exceed 150 calendar days.

The first phase is from west of Devaney Road to east of Tollgate Road. This phase is scheduled to close Monday, July 13 through Tuesday, Dec. 1. Motorists will be directed to use the signed detour route of 256th Street and State Road 19 throughout construction, while all affected land owners will continue to have access to their properties.

The second phase is from west of Deming Road to west of Devaney Road. This phase will begin in spring 2021. More information will be forthcoming.

Brooks, Braun, Rice introduce legislation to recruit U.S. military healthcare professionals

Congresswomen Susan W. Brooks (R-Ind.-05) and Kathleen Rice (D-N.Y.-04) on Wednesday introduced H.R. 7441, the Hire Veteran Health Heroes Act of 2020 to ensure the Departments of Defense and Veterans Affairs collaborate to recruit medical personnel leaving the armed services to work for the Veterans Health Administration. Companion legislation has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Mike Braun (R-Ind.).

There are tens of thousands of open positions in the Veterans Health Administration, and in order to fill those slots and provide good jobs to healthcare professionals departing the armed services, our bill seeks to recruit those departing service open healthcare positions at members back into federal service at the VA," Brooks said. "This bipartisan legislation could be the solution to filling open positions and retaining our departing professionals healthcare in the armed forces within Federal healthcare. The medical system that services our nation's veterans needs to have the best and brightest. Recruiting departing DOD medical personnel is the best way to fill these

spots with highly qualified men and women who have already been trained to care for our military family."

"There few individuals as uniquely qualified to fill the open positions in the Veterans Health Administration than military medical personnel," Rice said. "By ensuring the recruit-

Then the service members packet would be forwarded to the gaining facility for credentials check, background check, interviews, etc. before a final offer would be made.


In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his brother, Neil Conover.

Indy Eleven President Stremlaw details 2020 season restart, fans at home matches

Finally, some fútbol.

For the past four months, one voice in Indianapolis worked inside some of the most important meetings in all of sports.

"There were five of us that were appointed from the sport of soccer nationally to a national COVID-19 task force," Indy Eleven President Greg Stremlaw recently told WISH-TV. "[It's been] a lot of interaction and liaisoning with the heads of the other leagues — the NBA, NHL and NFL."

Since the beginning, it has been Stremlaw helping lead the United Soccer League's restart.

The compromise between the league and its players? Cut the regular season by more than half, but keep the championship trophy legitimate.

"The feeling was those 16 matches would get us to that integrity standpoint, which is really important to the clubs around the country," Stremlaw said. "I think [with] 2020, there's overall a proverbial asterisks next to it as a year for everything that has gone on."

With the resumption of USL regular season set for July 11th, the current COVID-19 guidelines in downtown Indianapolis align well with the Indy Eleven's plan to allow fans at home matches this summer.

In fact, the club announced Thursday morning it plans to allow a limited number of supporters to the home opener on July 11 vs. St. Louis FC.

Behind the scenes, Lucas Oil Stadium is currently being outfitted with key changes related to the pandemic.

"Temperature checks going on in the venue, staggered entry and exit times," Stremlaw explained. "Plexiglass and infrastructure improvements throughout Lucas Oil Stadium including touch-less

washrooms and all sorts of things that have been done during COVID-19."

"I actually think Lucas Oil Stadium will be the safest place in Indiana," he said.

The Brickyard Battalion knows this too: the "Boys in Blue" are stacked.

"We only have one objective," Stremlaw said. "There is only one spot we want to be. We have every intention to win it all and we don't plan to stop until we do."

Stremlaw's vision is simple: Stay safe, and give Eleven fans the celebration they need in 2020.
