



Carmel priest calls Black Lives Matter, Antifa leaders ‘maggots’ and ‘parasites’

The Rev. Theodore Rothrock, pastor of St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic Church, wrote that leaders of the Black Lives Matter and Antifa are pushing a left-wing socialist agenda and don't care about their supporters.

The statements were published in a weekly newsletter that were removed June 29 from the church website, but not before members of Carmel Against Racial Injustice read the message.

Pictures of the post were sent to News 8. In the newsletter, Rothrock says in reference to leaders of the Black Lives Matter organization, "The only lives that matter are their own and the only power they seek is their own."

"They are wolves in wolves clothing, masked thieves and bandits, seeking only to devour the life of the poor and profit from the fear of others. They are maggots

liberate in his wording. He was deliberate in his statements. 'Maggots' and 'parasites' is a pretty straightforward insult."

No one at noon Mass on Tuesday would speak publicly about the comments.

Carmel Against Racial Injustice planned a daylong protest against Rothrock to start at 6:30 a.m. Sunday at the church.

Rothrock issued the following statement concern-

ing his earlier anti-Black Lives Matter and Antifa comments:

"I am somewhat surprised that my recent article has received such extensive coverage and has aroused such interest and debate. It was not my intention to offend anyone, and I am sorry that my words have caused any hurt to anyone."

Heights to transition to 1-tier transportation plan in Fall 2021

The Hamilton Heights school board unanimously voted to approve a new 1-tier transportation plan beginning the fall of the 2021-22 school year at its June board meeting. The decision to move to a 1-tier bus plan at Hamilton Heights was one that was more than a year in the making. It will be more than a year before it is implemented.

The year leading up to the final vote, various busing plan options, data, district input and school systems where a 1-tier plan was in place were examined. There were Superintendent Advisory Group discussions, Public Work Sessions, presentations and board meetings with opportunities for sharing information, opinions and thoughts ranging from overwhelming support to absolutely not. There was a lot of passion expressed by everyone, no matter where they landed on this topic.

"While we may not always agree on a topic, we do share a common goal – the safety, well-being, and best interests of our students.

While there was a great deal of support for this plan, the negative comments seemed to stem from fears about possible safety issues for our youngest students," Superintendent Dr. Derek Arrowood pointed out. "And, I believe we have solutions which can allay most of these fears."

The plan is being rolled out a year from now due to the uncertainties in the fall opening related to COVID-19, allow for students to move and settle in to their new spaces, including the temporary housing

of the high school in the former middle school for first semester, have all three buildings on the same extended campus, and provide ample time to prepare for a smooth and successful transition.

In terms of the time adjustment, as a former classroom teacher, Julie Davis, a former educator backed by more than four decades in the classroom, said she understands that high school students often have jobs, extracurricular events, and extensive homework assignments that cause them

to keep late night hours.

"I think the passage of the 8 a.m. start time for middle and high schools and the resulting 1-Tier bus system is essential and long overdue. I wholeheartedly believe a later start time will have a positive impact on student learning," Davis said.

Dr. Kevin Cavanaugh, President of the Hamilton Heights School Board, agrees.

"It also seemed important that with so many

Fishers Health Dept. releases city-specific COVID data dashboard

The Fishers Health Department last Thursday released an updated COVID-19 dashboard, inclusive of all test results and deaths for Fishers residents. Residents may access this information at FHD's COVID-19 page at fishers.in.us/coronavirus. Since the beginning of the pandemic, there have been 450 positive cases of COVID-19 and 35 related deaths.

"My hope is that Fishers residents will be able to use this data as a small tool in their toolbox to keeping themselves safe during this pandemic," said Fishers public health director Monica Heltz. "While we have been vigilant as a community to social distance and take necessary precautions, we are starting to see an uptick in COVID-19 cases, nearing our peak in April. As we head into a holiday weekend, I ask that our community remain vigilant."

Since the inception of the Fishers Health Department, Fishers public health officials have worked diligently to develop and confirm a comprehensive analysis of all COVID-19 infections and deaths in the city.

Fishers is the only community in Indiana to provide a comprehensive view of COVID-19 cases and deaths within the community.

"Today's dashboard update is timely given the national trends we are seeing as many communities are seeing an uptick in COVID-19 cases," Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness said. "I believe it is imperative to put accurate and timely information in the hands of our residents to equip them to make informed decisions to mitigate the risk of contracting this disease."

The new dashboard includes a rolling seven-day average of cases to better assist residents in identifying rising trends in COVID-19 cases. Data also show the demographic breakdown for age and sex. The Fishers Health Department continues to maintain the COVID-19 dashboard for the Fishers Testing Site, which provides more granular information such as disposition of symptoms.

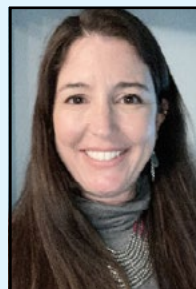
Fishers residents age 12 and over interested in receiving a free COVID-19 test through the Fishers Health Department can visit FishersRecovery.com/Testing to take the assessment and access test scheduling. Residents do not need to be symptomatic to receive testing.

The Fishers Health Department Testing Site has conducted nearly 4,000 tests for Fishers residents. In conjunction with COVID-19 testing, the Fishers Health Department is conducting contact tracing to reduce the unintended spread of the disease.

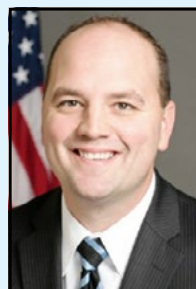
Residents are encouraged to follow the recommended CDC guidelines:

New roundabouts coming to 116th at College, Guilford in Carmel

Construction should begin on or after July 15 on two new roundabouts at 116th Street and College Avenue and 116th Street and Guilford Road. Both projects will be built simultaneously and will require lane restrictions, but not full closures. East-west traffic will be maintained throughout the duration of the projects.

Construction costs will be about \$3.4 million, with 80 percent of that coming from federal funding in the form of a Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement grant. Most of the work will be completed

in 125 days.

Below is the schedule of construction, which could change due to weather or utility relocations.

- **Phase 1 (approximately 4 to 10 days):** Preliminary work will take place within the median of 116th Street to allow traffic shifts in future phases.
- **Phase 2 (approximately 35 days):** The northern portion of both roundabouts will be constructed. There will be full vehicle access to the south, but no vehicle access to the north at Guilford Road or College Avenue. Both east and west traffic will be maintained (one lane

in each direction) on the southern portion of the intersections on 116th Street.- **Phase 3 (approximately 35 days):** The southern portion of both roundabouts will be constructed. East and west vehicular traffic will be maintained on the northern portion of the intersections on 116th Street during this phase. There will be full vehicle access to the north, but no vehicle access to the south at Guilford Road or College Avenue.
- **Phase 4 (approximately 30 days):** During phase four, there will be full access from the north and the south to 116th

Street at both roundabouts but east-west access across the roundabouts will not be available as work in the center of the roundabouts is completed.- **Phase 5 (approximately 15 days):** Both intersections will be substantially complete with finishing work taking place during this time. Temporary lane restrictions are possible during this time in order to complete median work along with final asphalt surface and pavement markings.

HSE graduation plans changed

The decision by Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb not to move to Stage 5 in COVID-19 recovery, but go to what he describes as Stage 4.5, has created changes in the plans for two local high schools, Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern.

HSE Schools announced the changes Thursday. Below is the text of the new guidance for the ceremonies from the HSE School District.

In order to comply with the Indiana Executive Order 20-35, which states Indiana must refrain from fully transitioning to Stage 5 re-opening, we are altering our in-person graduation plans.

The graduation plan as of July 2, 2020 is as follows:

- The previously announced ceremony at the football field has been replaced with a modified ceremony.
- A “graduation walk” will now be held over the course of two days, July 10-11, in the auditorium.
- Graduates will be assigned a day (July 10 or 11) and one-hour time slot (between 8 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.) to receive their diploma. Unfortunately, we are not able to accommodate specific requests for date/time.
- Attire for the event:
 - Graduation gown
 - Mortar board (cap) and tassel (wear on the right side)
 - Class medallion (students will receive upon arrival)
 - School issued honor cords (if applicable)
 - Official HSE face covering (provided upon arrival at “graduation walk”) for graduates only.
- More information:
 - Graduates will be brought into the auditorium, one at a time, in groups of 45 per hour.
 - Specific details of your student’s date and time slot, as well event procedures, will be provided no later than

Monday evening, July 6.

- Immediate family members will be permitted to accompany the graduate when they receive their diploma.
- During the event, graduates and families will stay together until they enter the auditorium. Graduates will then walk to the stage to receive their diploma, will be instructed to change their tassel, and families will view the diploma presentation from a designated area in the auditorium.
- Families will be permitted to take photos and videos of their graduate as they walk across the stage.
- After receiving their diploma, a photographer will be available for a photo with the graduate and their family in a separate area designated for photos.
- A video of the commencement speeches and musical performances will be made available prior to the “graduation walk” for viewing. Students unable to participate in the “graduation walk” event may pick up their diplomas on July 9 from 2 to 5 p.m.
- All graduates and guests will be required to wear face coverings while on school grounds.
- All graduates and guests will be required to complete a health safety waiver. The waiver information will be included in the Monday communication.
- Anyone exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms as described by the Centers for Disease Control will not be permitted to attend the “graduation walk.”

As a reminder, information regarding your student’s assigned date and time as well as the health safety waiver, will be sent to you on Monday, July 6.
