

Westfield Schools announces return plan

Westfield Washington Schools has announced its plan to open schools on the regularly scheduled start date of Thursday, Aug. 13.

The district will offer in-person, in-school instruction Monday through Friday for students who are able to return to school. They will also provide a virtual e-Learning option for students unable to return to school in person. Late start Wednesday will remain in place for teacher professional development.

As part of the announcement, a statement issued by the school district said, "We are confident our plan meets our mission of maintaining a safe & healthy environment, provide the highest quality of learning experience possible, and stay connected – not isolated and provides the safest possible environment for our students and staff."

Masks will be required for students and staff, when social distancing is not possible. Masks will be required on buses, while entering and exiting the school building, while picking up food in the cafeteria line, and during passing periods. Masks will also be required for classrooms and/or classroom activities when students might not be able to social distance.

- Sept. 26 – The Petty

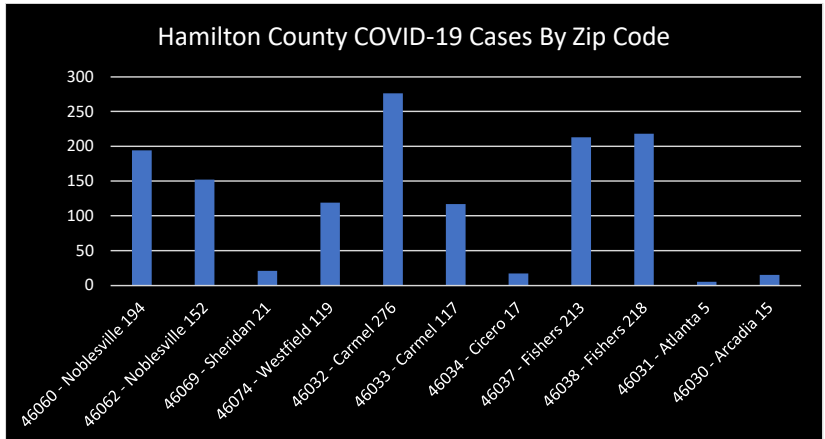
Breakers (Tom Petty Tribute) with opening band, Alan Kaye & The Toons

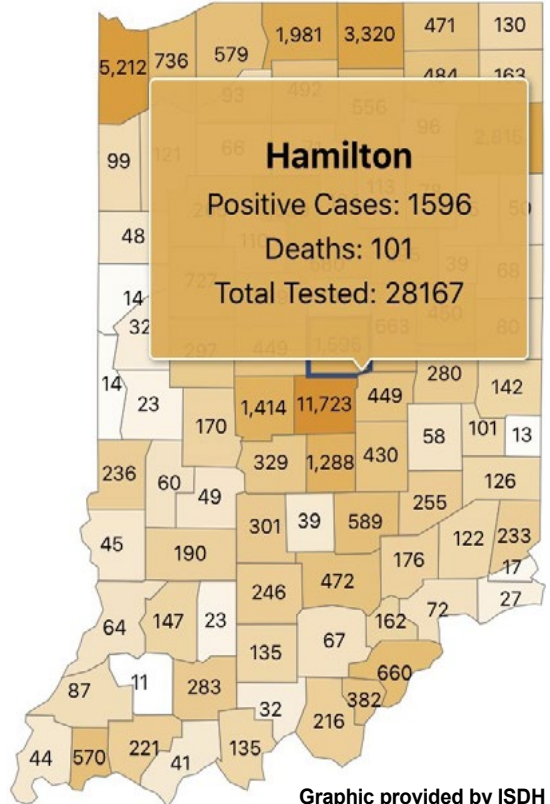

COVID-19 cases continue to rise, deaths top 100 in Hamilton County

As of Wednesday, the Indiana State Department of Health has recorded a total of 48,626 COVID-19 cases statewide. ISDH also reports 2,524 people have died as a result of the virus. A total of 530,075 Hoosiers have been tested for COVID-19, with 9.2 percent testing positive. In Hamilton County a total of 28,167 tests have been performed and 1,596 people have tested positive. ISDH reported 33 new cases in the county on Monday. This is the highest single day of new cases since March 31 with 51 cases. In the county, 101 people have died as a result of COVID-19. According to Johns Hopkins University, as of Sunday, approximately 25 percent of the 10 million confirmed cases in the world are in the United States.

Carmel Clay Public Library secures temporary location

The Carmel Clay Public Library will lease space in the Merchants' Square shopping center while its Main Library facility undergoes a two-year expansion and renovation project. The Merchants' Square site, which was formerly home to Marsh Supermarket, will serve as the library's primary facility while construction is underway at 55 4th Ave. SE. Library service will shift to the temporary location in September.

The Main Library project is the result of nearly three years of planning. Key areas of the Main Library project include the following:

- A parking garage and improved traffic flow on the south side of the facility
- Increased capacity for events and programs
- Expanded space for teens
- Increased seating and meeting space for study and tutoring

Parents will be expected to screen their children before sending them to school each day. If your child is presenting symptoms of COVID-19 or other illness, please contact your healthcare provider and do not send him/her to school. You will need to call the school to report the absence and the reason for the absence.

WWS stated the district must restrict all school visitors to promote health and safety. Virtual meetings will be scheduled for all necessary meetings with staff and teachers.

Students may have assigned seats in the cafeteria and will be spaced as far apart as possible. Masks will be required while picking up food in the cafeteria line. All students will be asked to wash hands prior to entering the cafeteria. All water fountains will be turned off and water bottle

filling stations will be used to provide students with access to water. All students will be allowed to bring their own water bottles to school each day.

Face masks will be required for everyone who enters the health clinic. Students will be evaluated for symptoms of illness. If symptoms are present the student will be removed to a predetermined isolation area until picked up from school. The district requests parents to identify someone to have as a backup for picking students up from school in case parents are not available.

A virtual learning option is available for students who are medically vulnerable or live with someone who is medically vulnerable.

Virtual learning will be facilitated by a digital learning platform supported by a WWS teacher. Families will be asked to

commit to this virtual learning experience for an established period of time (trimester for elementary schools and WHS and nine weeks for WIS and WMS). To manage staffing and scheduling, students must commit to in-person or online learning and will not be permitted to move back and forth during this commitment. A staff member will be assigned to work with students in the virtual setting, but it may not be the same teacher students would have in the face-to-face environment. Families choosing this option will be asked to complete a virtual learning agreement.



- Moving the Digital Media Lab from its current offsite location into the Main Library
- Outdoor spaces for additional program opportunities

Since the opening of the current Main Library in 1999, the library's service population has doubled. Annual library checkouts reached nearly 2.2 million in 2019. CCPL's locations were visited by over 600,000 people last year, and over 72,000 people attended programs and events offered by the library.

Design and construction for the Main Library project are taking place in partnership with RATIO Architects (Architect), Skillman Corporation (Construction Manager), and the Veridus Group (Owner's Representative).

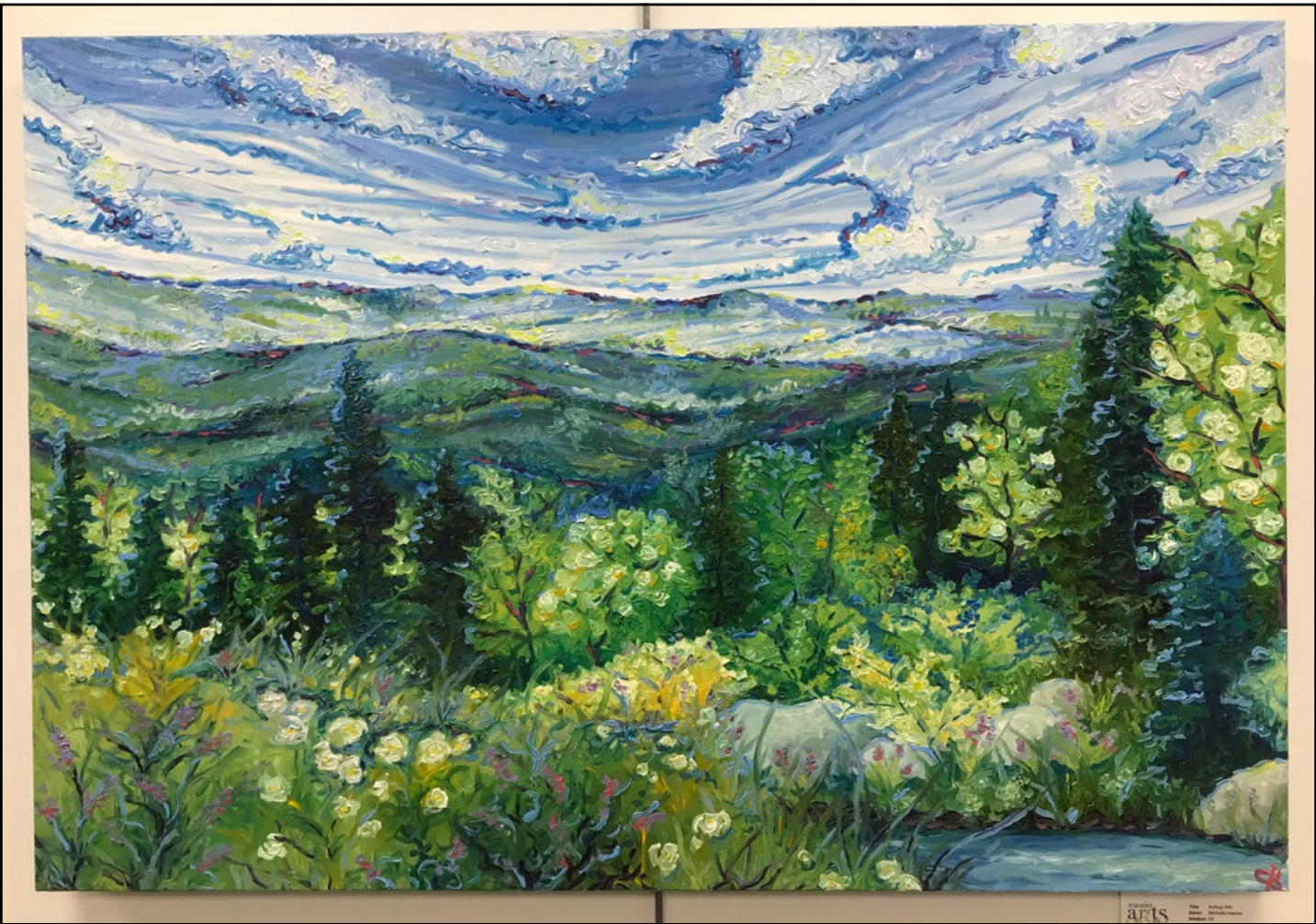

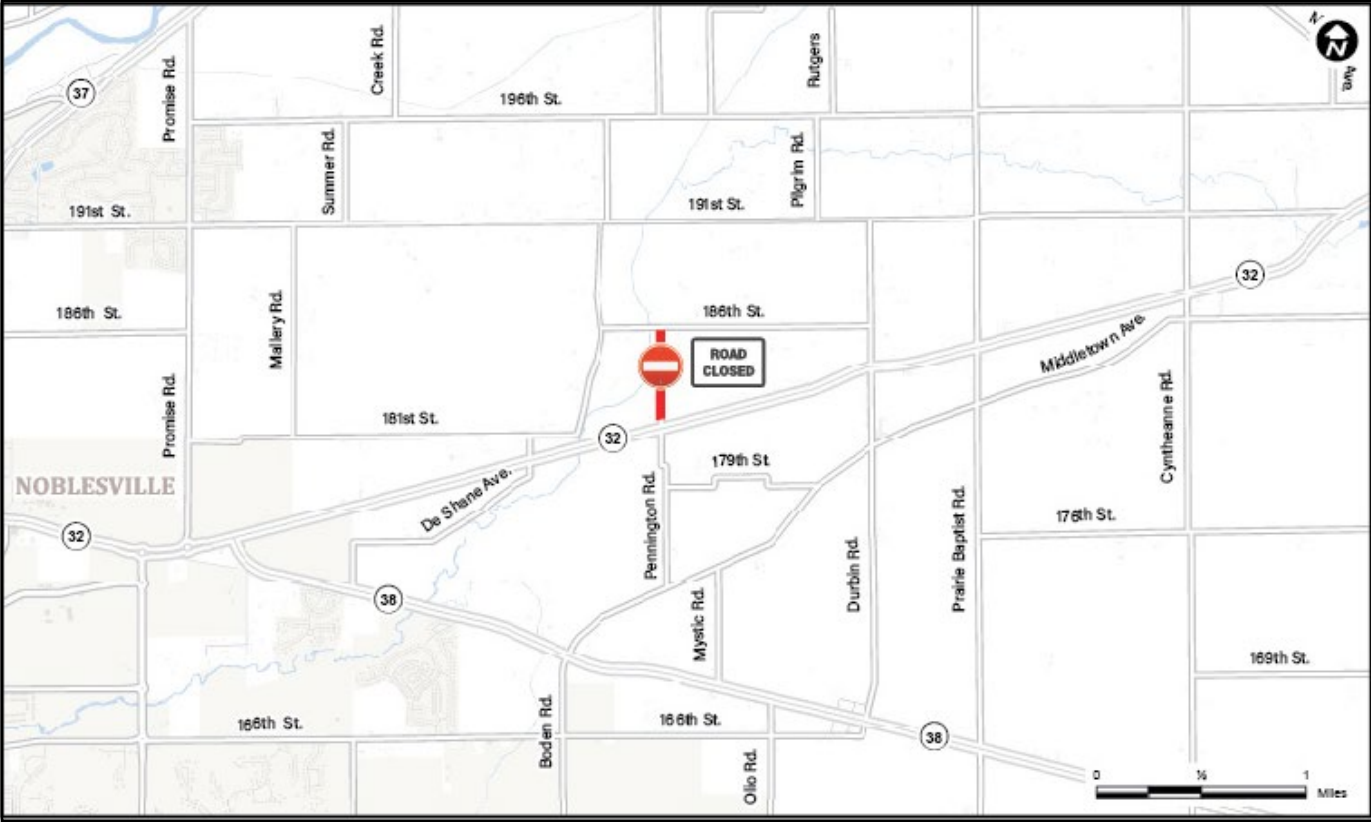

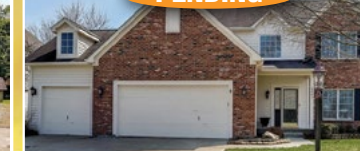

As schools prepare to reopen, football teams are gearing up

With Indiana high schools finally able to open their doors, student-athletes are preparing for their seasons.

That includes football players, who are six weeks away from their first game of the 2020 season. The schedules are ready to go, and five Hamilton County teams have at least one new team on their line-up.

Guerin Catholic has two new teams, which necessitated some changes to the second half of its schedule. The Golden Eagles' regular-season finale with Roncalli is now right in the middle of the season, as Guerin Catholic will play at the Rebels' field on Week 5.

The Golden Eagles had been playing Columbus North in Week 5 for the past two seasons, but the Bull Dogs are now off the schedule, along with Pontiac (Mich.) Notre Dame, GC's Week 7 opponent for the past two years. Guerin Catholic will host Northview during Week 7, and has picked up Culver Academies for the Week 9 game.

Noblesville, with new coach Dave Sharpe, will begin the season with two new opponents. The Millers will host Mount Vernon in their season-opener, ending a two-year series with Cathedral. In Week 2, Noblesville plays at Terre Haute South, finishing a four-year regular-season run with Carmel. The Millers' Hoosier Crossroads Conference schedule remains the same.

As for Carmel, it will renew an old regular-season rivalry. The Greyhounds picked up Cathedral for Week 2, a team they played for their season-opener from

2005-2010. Carmel went 3-3 against the Irish during that series.

Westfield will now host Cathedral in its

season opener. The Shamrocks had been hosting Harrison for their Week 1 game since 2005, but have moved the Raiders back to Week 2, dropping Decatur Central. Westfield also has the same HCC schedule as last season.

Hamilton Heights has a change for its opener, but the remainder of the Huskies' schedule is intact from last year. Heights will begin the season by hosting Monroe Central, ending a five-year series with Mount Vernon.

Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern will have new coaches, with Curt Funk taking over for the Tigers and Michael Kelly

coming on board for the Royals. But neither team will have any new opponents, as both Fishers' and Southeastern's schedules remain the same from last year. The two teams will play the Mudsock game for their Week 4 contests, this year at the Royals' field.

Sheridan also has the same regular season schedule as last year. Coach Larry "Bud" Wright is set to return to mentor the Blackhawks for a 55th season.
