Westfield **Schools** announces return plan

Westfield Washington Schools has announced its plan to open schools on the regularly scheduled start date of Thursday, Aug. 13.

The district will offer in-person, inschool instruction Monday through Friday for students who are able to return to school. They will also provide a virtual e-Learning option for students unable to return to school in person. Late start Wednesday will remain in place for teacher professional development.

As part of the announcement, a statement issued by the school district said, "We are confident our plan meets our mission of maintaining a safe & healthy environment, provide the highest quality of learning experience possible, and stay connected - not isolated and provides the safest possible environment for our students and staff."

Masks will be required for students and staff, when social distancing is not possible. Masks will be required on buses, while entering and exiting the school building, while picking up food in the cafeteria line, and during passing periods. Masks will also be required for classrooms and/or classroom activities when students might not be able to social distance.



COVID-19 cases continue to rise, deaths top 100 in Hamilton County

As of Wednesday, the Indiana State Department of Health has recorded a total of 48,626 COVID-19 cases statewide. ISDH also reports 2,524 people have died as a result of the virus. A total of 530,075 Hoosiers have been tested for COVID-19, with 9.2 percent testing positive. In Hamilton County a total of 28,167 tests have been performed and 1,596 people have tested positive. ISDH reported 33 new cases in the county on Monday. This is the highest single day of new cases since March 31 with 51 cases. In the county, 101 people have died as a result of COVID-19. According to Johns Hopkins University, as of Sunday, approximately 25 percent of the 10 million confirmed cases in the world are in the United States.

Then came he to Derbe and Lystra: and, behold, a certain disciple was there, named Timotheus, the son of a certain woman, which was a Jewess, and believed; but his father was a Greek: Which was well reported of by the brethren that were at Lystra and Iconium. Him would Paul have to go forth with him; and took and circumcised him because of the Jews which were in those quarters: for they knew all that his father was a Greek. And as they went through the cities, they delivered them the decrees for to keep, that were ordained of the apostles and elders which were at Jerusalem. And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in number daily. Now when they had gone throughout Phrygia and the region of Galatia, and were forbidden of the Holy Ghost to preach the word in Asia, After they were come to Mysia, they assayed to go into Bithynia: but the Spirit suffered them not.
