This event will be open only to 4-H'ers, their families, staff and volunteers. There will be many individual project changes to ensure a safe experience for our youth, but we know by the outpouring from our 4-H community that we can rise to the occasion

with everyone's help. We WILL be following the Purdue University requirements for having an in-person event and we are currently working through the logistics for implementation. We also have the support of the Hamilton County Health Department and are working closely with them to follow state and local guidelines, including complying with the Indiana's Back on Track plan. Please know that we will be ready to move to a virtual event should a COVID-19 local hotspot develop or should Hamilton County not be at Stage 5 status. The 2020 in-person Hamilton County 4-H Fair Exhibit will go forward if the county continues to progress through the stages outlined by Governor Holcomb. Stage 5

HSE school board issues statement on racism

As the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) school board began its July 8 session, Board President Michelle Fullhart read a statement on behalf of the entire board about racism. She cited an Instragram account, Black at HSE, which features a series of anonymous posts about what the writers describe as racist incidents during their experience as a student at HSE Schools.

"Student voice is a powerful thing," the statement says. "We applaud our students who will not tolerate discrimination of any sort in our schools and are using the platform to advocate for change."

The statement also refers to a petition submitted and signed by over 1,000 local residents asking that school officials "openly address the issue" of racism and "implement real change."

The entire statement read at the school board meeting is below:

On behalf of the board, I would like to

address recent discussions that have taken place nationwide, as well as in our community and on social media concerning racism. An Instagram account was created recently called Black at HSE where current students and alumni are anonymously sharing their experiences of racism they've felt while being in our schools. Student voice is a pow-

erful thing, and we applaud our students must also do our part. who will not tolerate discrimination of any sort in our schools and are using the platform to advocate for change.

We had students speak to the board about racism during the non-discrimination policy discussion last year and have had quite a bit of feedback on the topic, as well A petition signed by over 1,000 people in our community was sent to us last week, advocating to more openly address this issue and take a stance to implement real change. A few weeks ago our principals sent out heartfelt messages to their communities in support of an

anti-racism agenda.

We, as a district have been working on making this a priority over the past few years, beginning with the hiring of a Chief Equity and Inclusion Officer, Dr. Erica Buchanan-Rivera, who has been elevating this discussion and working with staff and students to bring about positive changes.

However, as board members, we

We, as board members, must do everything we can to ensure that our schools have systems in place that promote anti-racism, equity and inclusion, and are welcome and safe places for our students and staff, and to hold those accountable who don't live up to these ideals. It is our hope that we will have measurable goals for our schools on these topics and that they will bring about positive change for the coming school year and beyond.




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Noblesville Lions induct Charlie McMillan Jr.





'Godby Forum' could set template for pandemic sports broadcasting

I had many comments regarding column where I shared memories of growing up in The Homesteads, not-so-facountry suburb of Sheridan; however.

mention of basketball. After all, the Godby name was once prominent in Sheridan basketball during the glorious Hobbs

Well, we played a lot of basketball in The Homesteads. Dad set up a nice little gravel surface basketball court in the driveway. Funny how the iron started out the regulation 10 feet high, but as the years passed, more gravel was added and finally asphalt topped the gravel and I believe the iron is about nine feet high now ... or maybe less.

I still can't touch the rim. Of course, I don't jump as high as I did 40-some years ago either.

Back in the day there were many memorable basketball courts in local barns. Uncle John and Aunt Daisy Bowen had a basketball goal in their barn on the farm we might have been 40-plus in which former Sheridan great and Hamilton County Hall of Famer Bill Bowen honed his skills ... when it wasn't filled with hay. Bob and Marilyn Welch moved from Carmel to Sheridan on We dubbed it The Cow Palace and played some intense ball there.

But some of the most memorable basketball games I recall were played in a two-car garage in a house in The Homesteads: The Godby Forum, we thought of doing this, but called it. We wrote it on top of the backboard, too.

It was either Ben Franklin's or Pickett's Five and Dime on Main Street, Sheridan – I don't remember which – where we purchased a metal Nerf basketball goal and ball set. We secured the goal to a 2-by-3 piece of plywood that had to be lying around somewhere – probably in a house under construction in The Homesteads – and mounted it to the west wall in our garage. Maybe it was six feet high. It couldn't have been much we used the manufactured higher than that. It was originally intended for shooting hoops in an unheated garage during the winter, but it tried once or twice.

A lot of the games were played around the same time as the Indiana high school basketball tourney. It definitely set the mood. We had four-team (player) tournaments with blind draws for first-round pairings.

The basketball was always competitive. Bob Godby, Joe Godby and Mike Shelburne were three of the most competitive people I grew up with. Me? I was less athletic and more interested in other stuff, like game-day preparation.

That's why we all agree years ahead of our time.

Part of playing in The Godby Forum meant being introduced before the game. With no audience per se, we had to create one.

If you are around my set. And those broadcasting stations did not stay on 24 hours. When they would sign off, the television became a sea of static.

I'm not sure how we one night when a station we were watching went off the air and the static came on, we turned up the volume and recorded the static sound with a tape recorder for several minutes.

When it was time to announce the starting lineup of one person, the tape recorder was running and when we introduced the player, we'd increase the volume and it sounded just like a crowd of people erupting in applause.


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
