

County sees COVID spike among younger age groups

Hamilton County Health Department's Chris Walker recently provided a video update on where the county stands as a recent uptick in cases have been recorded. "I think there is a couple factors at play," Walker said. "We've been moving to our Back On Track Indiana steps and opening up more and more activities. Also, we recently just came out of a holiday weekend. But when we look at the data, what we see is a pretty

large spike in the 19- to 30-year-old demographic. They account for almost a third of all positive cases in Hamilton County. We suspect they are not wearing masks and not social distancing properly."

When asked if Hamilton County could expect mandatory mask wearing while in public, like Marion County, Walker said, "Last

week the board of health met for their regular quarterly meeting and the message of wearing a mask was brought up. They determined we would strongly recommend to wear a mask. The reason they did not mandate it or require it, is because there is no enforcement arm to making it a requirement. They felt like that was not the proper verbiage to use

for mask use; however, when inside for public settings and when outside and cannot social distance, we still strongly feel that masks should be worn whenever possible." Walker continued, "It is important to remember we don't wear our mask to protect ourselves. We are wearing to keep our germs to ourselves. Please be considerate of others and make sure you are maintaining social distancing and wearing a mask when appropriate, please."

Indiana to extend Stage 4.5 reopening plan through at least end of July

Gov. Eric Holcomb announced most of the state was going to stay with its **Stage 4.5 reopening plan** during the COVID-19 pandemic through at least the end of July.

That means another two-week pause on increasing capacity in restaurant dining rooms, bars and entertainment venues as initially planned to start July 4. Indiana had been set to go to the Stage 5 reopening plan, the final plan, on Friday.

The sole exception: Elkhart County in northern Indiana will remain with the **Stage 4 reopening plan**.

Gov. Holcomb and state health officials explained a change to the Stage 4.5 plan, and the reasons for the decision to keep it active, during a Wednesday afternoon coronavirus briefing.

The Stage 4.5 plan will be changed for the gathering of groups of people. Effective July 23, organizers of group gatherings of up to 250, the maximum allowed in the plan, will be required to develop and submit to the local health department a written plan outlining steps to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus. The change applies to seasonal or special events such as fairs, festivals, parades, graduations, outdoor concerts, outdoor movies (other than

drive-ins), family reunions, conferences or weddings.

The group plans must address capacity limits, guest information, staff and volunteer screening, social distancing measures, increased sanitation, face coverings, and the ways to assure compliance.

Why staying at Stage 4.5?

In short, the answer is a lack of supplies to do testing for the coronavirus and an increase in the state's positivity rate.

Dr. Kristina Box, the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Health, said one issue is a lack of supplies. The state had partnered with Indianapolis-based pharmaceutical maker Eli Lilly & Co. and the Indiana Hospital Association to make a \$66 million order for reagents to perform testing at Indiana labs. The state still awaits that order to be filled, and the federal government has reduced the amount of supplies it's providing.

She noted wait times for coronavirus test results have grown longer, and should be no more than three to five days. The current average is up to seven days for Optum sites. She says Indiana is trying to keep the lab work

- Patrons will be required to sit within the pre-determined socially-distant seating arrangements.

- Hand sanitizer and hand-washing stations will be available throughout the venue.

- Vendor lines will require six feet of spacing between each guest.

for the testing in the state to assure quicker results. She says the lack of supplies is due to “external factors beyond our control.” She says keeping testing supplies available will become important as the state heads toward the flu season, when the flu surges, amid the coronavirus pandemic.

In addition, Box said she remains concerned about the positivity rate. Through July 4, the seven-day average positivity rate was 6.3 percent. It was at 7.1 percent as of Tuesday. The lowest seven-day positivity rate for the state was 4.2 percent as of June 18.

Data from the Regenstrief Institute shows the hospitalization rate remains steady. But, Box said, Indiana continues to see increased hospitalizations for COVID-19. It has risen from a low of 595 people on June 26 to 881 on July 14.

Box says most new COVID-19 cases are appearing in younger people in the 20 to 30 age group. That age group does not tend to get sick from the coronavirus, but does tend to infect the older population, which is more likely to show symptoms. Contact tracing has seen examples of this spread in at least two cases in long-term care facilities.

In relation to the rises in positive cases in the 20 to 30 age group, which generally includes college students, Holcomb says he’s been impressed with colleges that have developed their own plans for reopening. The state must work first to control what it can in the colleges, he said. Box added that she’s seen “remarkable” plans from the colleges.

The governor added that the most new cases being hospitalized, not surprisingly, are happening in the areas with high concentrations of populations. Counties he mentioned include Marion, 86; Elkhart, 78; Lake, 52; Vanderburgh, 48; and St. Joseph, 59.

If you treat yourself with kindness and patience, learn all you can, and talk with a trusted medical professional, you, too, can find relief and get your sleep back!



Holcomb supports local schools' control of classroom versus virtual instruction

Thousands of Hoosier kids are just a few weeks away from heading back to the classroom or perhaps back to their virtual classroom during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Gov. Eric Holcomb said Wednesday he supports local control over the decision to reopen classrooms or stick to virtual learning.

Holcomb and Dr. Kristina Box, the commissioner of the Indiana State Department of Health, took no sides during their coronavirus briefing Wednesday afternoon between IPS, Carmel Clay and other districts that are offering classroom options versus Washington Township Schools and others that are starting the school year virtually only.

"We're there for Washington and we're there for every other school corporation both public and private in Indiana," the governor said.

Box added, "It's also important to have a good option for students to be able to get face-to-face if that's what the families deem is best for their children."

Teachers who test positive during the year will have to isolate for at least 10 days from when their symptoms began.

As for what happens with students in the teachers' classes, it depends. Kindergarten are more likely to need to quarantine if their teachers get the virus, while older students may not need to stay at home.

"It really depends on the specific situations we find at that time, so that's why it's so critical to involve public health in the decision-making process," Box said.

Also on Wednesday, Holcomb was asked if he would freeze funding for school districts at last year's level because so many parents are expected to home-school their children. He replied that it's too early to decide the funding question.

Baseball tournaments ongoing, NXT lacrosse starts tomorrow . . .

Grand Park is busy this weekend with four big tournaments

Baseball fans needing to see some live games have plenty of opportunities to do so at Grand Park this weekend.

Three tournaments are going on at the same time, including two hosted by the same organization. The USSSA Global World Series is running through Sunday; teams from ages 8U to 13U are competing in this tournament. The event has two different divisions, AA and Open. While most of the teams are from Indiana, there are a few coming to Grand Park from neighboring states as well.

Nearly 170 different teams are competing in this event. Pool play continues through today, with some bracket play beginning this afternoon as well. The event will be exclusively into bracket play by Saturday, with winners crowned by Sunday.

USSSA is also hosting the AA World Series, which is exclusively for 14U teams. Ten squads are taking part in this event, including a pair of HSE Royals teams (Blue and White). Pool play wraps up today, with the bracket play to begin this afternoon, with the champion to be determined Sunday afternoon.

Meanwhile, a tournament for slightly older players is also taking place this week. The 15 Amateur Baseball Championships has games going on through Monday.

There are two divisions: 15U and 15U Reserved. Over 350 teams are listed between the two divisions, with a five-game guarantee. Pool play is taking place throughout the weekend, with bracket play beginning on Saturday evening.

Note that while the vast majority of games are taking place at Grand Park, a few of them are scheduled at other sites. Those include Hazel Dell Elementary School, Westfield and Sheridan high schools, as well as Brebeuf Jesuit in Indianapolis and the Kokomo Municipal Stadium. Games will be played at those other sites through Saturday, but all Sunday and Monday games will take place at Grand Park.

Finally this weekend, lacrosse returns to Grand Park with the NXT Grand Prix Tournament. There will be nine boys divisions and six girls divisions at this event, with games taking place Saturday and Sunday.

Around 95 boys teams are scheduled to compete, with age groups ranging from Class of 2021 to a combined Class of 2028/29. On the girls side, 45 teams will be in action, with the age ranges from Class of 2022 to Class of 2026, in addition to a High School Mix Girls division.

Games at the event are mostly scheduled for the morning on Saturday, then during the late morning/early afternoon on Sunday. The NXT website calls it "Family-Friendly Scheduling," allowing players and their families to get off the field and explore Hamilton County and surrounding areas once the games are done. There will also be a Vendor Village and NXTEXperience at the event, which the website said offers food, fun and shopping.


2020 BMW Championship to be held without spectators
