## Carmel International Arts Festival canceled

The Board of Directors of the Carmel International Arts Festival (CIAF) has announced the 2020 Festival scheduled for Sept. 26-27 has been canceled after consulting with the City of Carmel.

The decision was not made lightly and many different scenarios for safe physical-distancing, in-person festival were considered before making this decision. However, the expected attendance, the out-of-state exhibitors and recent surges of COVID-19 around the country were major considerations in the recommendation from the Mayor.

The CIAF Board is already in the planning stages for the 2021 Festival and are looking forward to that date, Sept. 25-26, 2021.

"This festival brings amazingly talented artists and nearly 30,000 people to a two-day event in our wonderful city, I am truly saddened that we have to cancel," said Rachel Ferry, Executive Director of the event. "With the Festival scheduled in late September, we were so hopeful that we could still have an in-person event. But we must take the recommendation of city officials very

## HSE Schools will start year with virtual classes

Hamilton Southeastern Schools will start the coming school year with virtual classes, not in the school buildings. The district says the virtual instruction will continue from the first day of classes Aug. 6 through at least Labor Day.

Athletics and extracurricular activities will remain "status quo," based on the statement from school administrators.

The entire statement from the school corporation is below:

Hamilton Southeastern Schools will adopt a phased in Reopening Plan similar to the one implemented by the Governor for the State of Indiana. Based on our local health indicators that are showing an increase in infections in our community and current staffing projections, the first phase

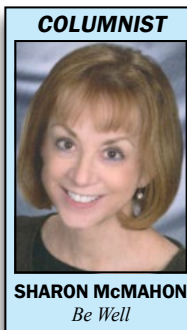
# Finding new ways to stay fit during COVID-19 pandemic

## AG Curtis Hill supports Title IX rule that provides students due process

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill on Friday joined a coalition with 14 other state attorneys general in support of a Title IX rule that protects students from discrimination on the basis of sex and does not infringe on their constitutional rights to free speech and due process.

The U.S. Department of Education's new Final Rule requires educational institutions to investigate and, when proven, punish allegations of sufficiently severe,

pervasive and objectively offensive sexual harassment. The rule affirms a culture of accountability within the contours of constitutional liberty.

"Nothing could better advance the cause of eradicating a culture of sexual harassment than ensuring that those who are punished are truly blameworthy," the coalition wrote in an **amicus brief** filed in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia.

The Final Rule protects both students accused of sexual misconduct and their accusers. It requires live hearings, direct cross-examination and neutral fact-find-

ers as part of investigations into alleged misconduct. These due-process protections are constitutionally necessary and do not subject accusers or witnesses to uncomfortable or

intimidating situations.

Without these safeguards, academic institutions can and have eschewed due process and imposed negative consequences on accused students without affording them a fair opportunity to defend themselves. Those consequences can include expulsion, academic suspension, loss of tuition, loss of scholarships and increased difficulty in finding a job.

"The Department of Education's rule is fundamentally about fairness and protecting the rights of the accused and the accusers. It is axiomatic in our legal system that the accused are presumed innocent; that accusers have some control over the process after filing a complaint; that individuals can have representation. No one denies the urgent need to prevent and punish harassment," Hill said. "But serious accusations deserve serious inquiries, and it is wrong to impose life-altering punishments onto students who are not given a real opportunity to defend themselves against the accusations. This rule ensures fairness for all parties involved in sexual harassment cases at educational institutions."

# Conor Daly gets first career pole, finishes eighth at Race 1 of Iowa 250s

Conor Daly achieved a milestone in his INDYCAR career Friday night, winning his first-ever pole.

The Noblesville native earned the pole position for Race 1 of the INDYCAR Iowa 250s at the Iowa Speedway. Daly qualified for the Race 1 top spot with a run of 175.188 mph. In his second qualifying lap, Daly ran at 174.960 mph; that will start him in the third position for tonight's Race 2, which is set to being at 8:30 p.m. on NBCSN. Daly is now with Carlin Racing, giving it a first-ever pole as well.

Daly led the first 13 laps of the 250-lap race, and would go on to finish in eighth place. Simon Pagenaud, who started last out of 23 cars, was the winner, leading the final 73 laps and 83 in all.

"It was definitely a rollercoaster of a day for us," said Daly. "Obviously, we were so excited to win the pole for tonight's race in the No. 59 Gallagher Carlin Chevrolet. That's just such a major accomplishment for myself and

this team. We've all been working so hard and the guys gave me a great car to qualify, so I was pretty excited that I was able to get that pole. We started the race tonight OK but just really struggled with keeping the rear underneath me and trying to figure it out as we went. It was just tough, and we just didn't have the pace that we needed."

The race had a long caution period, from laps 144 to 169, three cars were involved in various parts of contact.

"The yellow really killed us," said Daly. "Some people just got so lucky with that, but unfortunately it didn't fall our way. We chose to extend the last stint and make the tires last, but it was really tough driving absolutely to the limit on older tires and trying to hold people off there at the end. It was tough end to the day, but it was seriously awesome to get the first INDYCAR pole for both Carlin and myself, and I'm looking forward to tomorrow night's race where we'll start up front again in third."

# Pagenaud drives from last to first, holds off Dixon for stirring Iowa victory

Simon Pagenaud charged from last to first to win Race 1 of the INDYCAR Iowa 250s Friday night, July 17 at Iowa Speedway.

Pagenaud held off Scott Dixon by .4954 of a second for his first win of the NTT INDYCAR SERIES season in the No. 22 Menards Team Penske Chevrolet. Pagenaud started last in the 23-car field after a fuel pressure problem prevented him from making a qualifying attempt earlier in the day.

It's the first time a driver has won from the last starting spot on the grid since March 2017, when Sebastien Bourdais drove from the rear to the front of a 21-car field to win the Firestone Grand Prix of St. Petersburg.

"This place is tough," Pagenaud said after his 15th career win and his first at the 7/8th-mile oval. "What a night. What a day for us. First of all, amazing group effort from the whole Team Penske to recover from Road America. We unloaded really well. This morning was a lot of fun. Qualifying was disheartening, but these guys never give up. That's what this team is all about."

"I can't believe it. I have to rewatch the race. How did I get there? I don't know. But the last 50 laps were certainly a lot of tension. When (Scott) Dixon is chasing you, you better hit your marks."

Pagenaud's win for Team Penske ended Chip Ganassi Racing's dominant start to the season in which Dixon and Felix Rosenqvist in the No. 10 NTT DATA Chip Ganassi Racing Honda won the first four NTT INDYCAR SERIES races. Five-time series champion Dixon opened with three straight wins in the No. 9 PNC Bank Chip Ganassi Racing Honda, with Rosenqvist earning his first career victory last Sunday at Road America.

Rookie Oliver Askew rounded out the Iowa podium Friday night with a third-place finish in the No. 7 Arrow McLaren SP Chevrolet, marking the best-career NTT INDYCAR SERIES finish for the defending Indy Lights champion.

"I wish you could see my smile right now," Askew said. "This Arrow McLaren

SP Chevrolet came alive once the track started to get cooler. We were really good on new tires and when they were very used. If that yellow didn't come out on the restart there (on Lap 156), I think we would have had a really good shot at finishing at least 1-2 with Pato (O'Ward) and I. We'll go get them tomorrow, but I'll sleep really well tonight. Honestly, that's probably one of the funnest races I've ever done in my life."

Askew's teammate Pato O'Ward, the 2018 Indy Lights champion who scored his career-best finish of second last Sunday at Road America, drove his No. 5 Arrow McLaren SP Chevrolet to a fourth-

place finish. Defending series champion Josef Newgarden rounded out the top five in the No. 1 Hitachi Team Penske Chevrolet.

2016 series champion Pagenaud wasted no time making his march through the field. Within the first 10 laps, Pagenaud already had made his way into the top 15. The long green flag runs throughout the 250-lap race opened the field for strategy that helped Pagenaud and other drivers gain ground from the rear.

A caution period on Lap 144 allowed leader Pagenaud to pit for the final time and get fresh tires for the run to the finish. He retook the lead from O'Ward on Lap 178 with his fresher Firestone tires.

As the end of the race neared, Pagenaud's rear-view mirror was filled with Dixon's orange-and-blue Honda. But the Frenchman held off the late charge from the Kiwi and led a race-high 83 laps on

the night, including the final 72. He averaged 132.220 mph.

Askew, who was charging hard on the freshest tires among the leaders, finished 7.2128 seconds back.


Series points leader Dixon also drove through the field from a low starting spot after qualifying 17th.

Pagenaud will look to sweep the weekend in Iowa tomorrow night with the Iowa INDYCAR 250s Race Two (8:30 p.m., NBCSN) from Iowa Speedway. Qualifying for tomorrow's event was also held Friday, and Newgarden will lead the field to green, and he will be joined on the front row by his Team Penske teammate Power.

Both Pagenaud and Dixon will have their work cut out again Saturday. Pagenaud again will start last due to his problem during qualifying, and Dixon will start 18th.
