

Atlanta town officials have announced the cancelation of the Atlanta New Earth Festival this year.

The small northern Hamilton County town has been conducting the event since 1974. The event is the county's longest running and largest festival, often attracting nearly 600 vendors and 100,000 visitors.

Festival organizers said, "This decision has been difficult but we believe it to be in the best interest of all concerned."

## Carmel shooting leaves two dead, one injured

On the morning of July 27, Carmel police responded to a 911 call at a residence in the 14300 block of Riverrock Court regarding a man threatening suicide.

According to police, the original 911 caller reported the man had a gun, and during the call, dispatchers heard gunshots in the background.

As police arrived, officers found two people had been shot. Taylor Leigh

Cox, 28, Carmel, died as a result of gunshots and a 66-year-old female who was not identified by police was treated at a local hospital for gunshot wounds.

Officers later located the man, identified as Julio Cesar Virula, 26, Carmel. Reports indicate Virula attempted to flee from officers, and during a short foot pursuit, a Carmel police officer shot and killed




preceded in death by his brother, William 'Bill" Etheridge.

His family attested that he was primarily a petroleum engineer, reservoir engineer for underground natural gas storage and involved in pipeline mapping. He wrote scientific computer programs for well performance evaluation using reservoir simulation programs to determine volume versus pressure curves, calculate gas reserves and retrograde condensate recovery. This process would aid in maintaining storage field deliverabilities by stimulation and acid cleanup programs.

Michael also taught computer programming courses and tutored students on programming, operations, as well as accounting courses at the college level. Additionally, he taught them on debugging programs and helped them to achieve an appropriate level of efficiency.

"It's harder than a lot of people think to be a student-athlete. I can't thank everybody enough for giving me this award. Everybody at Heights, all my coaches, all my teachers. I'm just very grateful for it."

In the academic achievement part of the award, a 3.25 grade-point average or better is recommended for a nominee. Pennington went above and beyond that standard, as he finished with a GPA of 4.1.

"I took a lot of hard classes," said Pennington. "That certainly helps the GPA. I took a lot of AP (Advanced Placement) classes. I think out of the seven classes we take, six of them were either AP or college

Those classes were indeed difficult, but Pennington believes they were worth it. "They helped me a lot and challenged me for sure," he said.

Pennington was a four-year player for academics," said Pennington. the Huskies football team. After playing on the freshman team his first year, he was originally told he would play quarterback, even though he said he never played that position in his life.

"Then I got switched to play defense," said Pennington. "I started at safety and wide receiver my sophomore year. From there, it was the same thing my junior and senior year. I loved everything about it."

Heights football coach Jon Kirschner Brent Pennington has been a familiar nominated Pennington for the award, noting that he was the first Huskies player in several years to receive it.

> "I was very honored to have gotten the opportunity to be able to nominate one of my student-athletes for an award that I think embodies all aspects of what it means to be a student-athlete," said Kirchner.

> The coach said that he worked with Pennington in just about every facet of education and sports available.

"I taught Brent in Geography, APC (Advanced Physical Conditioning) and AP Macroeconomics," said Kirschner. "As the junior class sponsor, Brent was my Class President who was in charge of planning and orchestrating several school functions for the greater school community including prom. Finally, I had the opportunity to coach Mr. Pennington all four years of his playing career. In short, for four years Brent lived, ate and breathed Husky football. All he ever wanted was to leave Husky Football better than he found it.

"Brent was a three-year starter for us as a wide receiver and safety. Brent has always been considered a leader by his peers on and off the field. His senior year he was elected as a co-captain by his teammates. Athletic accomplishments aside, he just recently finished in the top 10 percent of class academically. If you were to take an in-depth look at Mr. Pennington's time at Hamilton Heights you would see someone on and off the field who bled orange and white!"

Pennington is soon headed for Purdue University, where he plans to study civil engineering. He also will be playing intermural sports in basketball, football and

Pennington also talked about the value of hard work, both on and off the field, saying "you'll learn a lot of life lessons in both, and don't strictly depend on sports to get you through it. Academics will take you further than you'll ever know."

While all three missed the cut, they improved their scores in the second round, and still had the honor of playing in an event that has been crowning champions since 1899 and counts several legendary names among the winners.

After two rounds, the field was cut to the top 44 golfers and ties; a total of 46 players advanced to today's third and fourth rounds of medal play. The cut was even-par 144. Merchent finished with a 149, scoring 75 in the first round and 74 for the second round.

"I played okay," said Merchent, who was battling back pain during the round. "I kind of scraped around and figured out a way to get the ball in the hole and it just wasn't enough."

The soon-to-be Indiana University freshman made a birdie last Wednesday, giving him five for the tournament.

"I'm not disappointed about it," said Merchent. "I didn't quit. I kept grinding it out, and what happened, happens."

Doty, a Carmel graduate, scored a 150 over the two days. Doty's carded a 77 on the first day and his second round was a 73, including five total birdies.


