First Class Scott Dykes, a Section Corner Technician in the surveyor's office and a member of the Army National Guard, recently returned from a nine-month deployment.

Williams, Indiana State Chair of the Employer Support of the Guard & Reserve. "A lot of places won't hire you if they find out you're getting deployed," Dykes said. "It felt good knowing I still had a job to go back to when I got called up."

## Noblesville partners with Carmel-based developer to build Village at Federal Hill Council also approves trash, wastewater fee increase

Last Tuesday, Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen asked the council to approve an economic development agreement with a Carmel-based developer for the redevelopment of three acres to residential mixed-use village development to be known as Village at Federal Hill.  
The agreement would form a \$29 million partnership with Old Town Companies to build 160 apartments, 30,000 square feet of office/commercial space, and 400 public spaces, including a 302-space five-story parking garage on Noblesville's west side next to Federal Hill Park.  
Jensen said the development would continue to foster a stronger downtown and an east to west connection on both sides of the river.  
"We are encouraged to have this project move forward at such a quick pace to provide a vibrant, livable, walkable connection between downtown and the west side of the White River," Jensen said.  
What the mayor didn't discuss, and what the council unanimously approved without discussion, was Noblesville borrowing \$14 million to help pay for the project.  
According to the agreement Noblesville would issue Economic Development to Federal Hill Park.

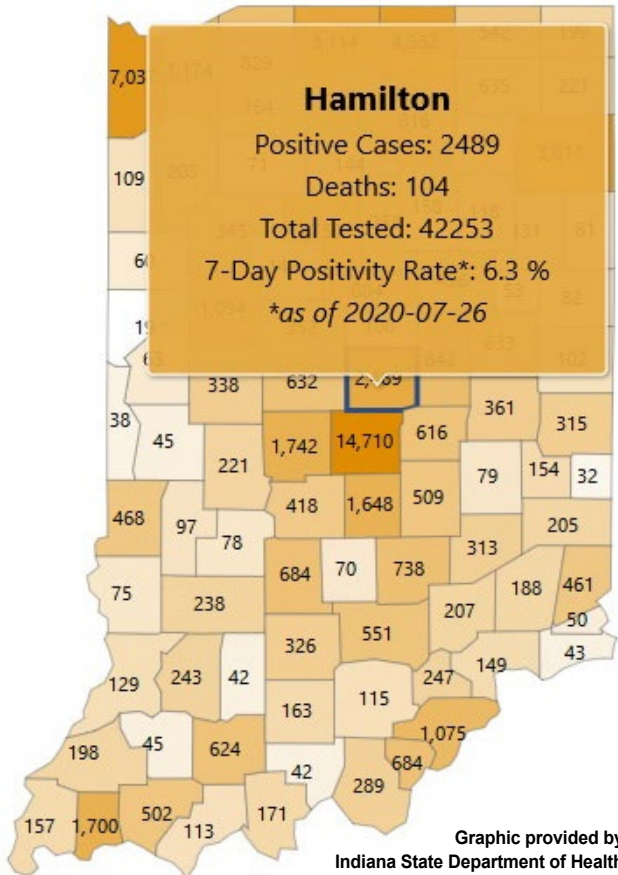
## Riverview Health's Chief Medical Officer supports state mask mandate

Hamilton County recently experienced a spike in COVID-19 cases that resulted in 274 new cases reported by the Indiana State Department of Health.  
A mandatory mask mandate issued by Governor Holcomb began on July 27 and many local health officials are optimistic the mandate will help curb additional new cases.  
Doctor Eric Marcotte, Chief Medical Officer at Riverview Health, supports Holcomb's mandate and says wearing a mask helps protect others.  
"I'm glad to see Governor Holcomb mandate masks," Marcotte said. "Doctors and hospitals have known for a hundred years that wearing masks protect others. It is never optional for a surgeon to wear a mask during surgery. We know how risky that would be for

the patient. Most physicians have no doubt that masks prevent the spread of germs. I'm glad that our state politicians wisely listened to the experts."  
Marcotte believes much of Indiana's increased case counts in the last six weeks is likely due to excellent testing capacity.  
"Thanks to foresight and good communication between Indiana government and healthcare, we are able to test at a much higher rate than many states," Marcotte said. "The goal is to decrease the 'test positivity rate' to under 7 percent. Test positivity means how many of all the tests we do show that someone has COVID-19. Scientists think that the higher this number is, the more people with an infection are being missed. Indiana has been able to bring the positivity rate down, unlike many states in

the south . . . Florida, the Carolinas and Arizona are experiencing a very different sort of surge."  
Although the state and county are experiencing spikes in number of cases, hospitalizations are down.

## Carmel shooting leaves two dead, one injured

On the morning of July 27, Carmel police responded to a 911 call at a residence in the 14300 block of Riverrock Court regarding a man threatening suicide.  
According to police, the original 911 caller reported the man had a gun, and during the call, dispatchers heard gunshots in the backyard.  
As police arrived, officers found two people had been shot. Taylor Leigh Cox, 28, Carmel, died as a result of gunshots and a 66-year-old female who was not identified by police was treated at a local hospital for gunshot wounds.  
Officers later located the man, identified as Julio Cesar Virula, 26, Carmel. Reports indicate Virula attempted to flee from officers, and during a short foot pursuit, a Carmel police officer shot and killed

# Carmel student wins big at Heartland Film Festival

The 2020 Hoosier Heartland Film Festival was not only a huge success, but also brought one grand prize home to Indiana for the first time.

The grand prize for the High School Film Competition Summer White Lynch Memorial Award was awarded Raymond Mo, an incoming senior at Carmel High School. Mo co-directed the winning submission, “Whipped Cream Cake.”

More than 3,000 short films were submitted from all over the world, but only 128 were selected to run in the 18 programs that streamed on-demand and played in select screenings at the Tibbs Drive-In Theatre July 21-26.

Mo told The Reporter his winning film was co-directed with a Detroit area student, Minju Hong, who Mo met at a five-week intensive summer video production camp at Northwestern University called National High School Institute.

“Whipped Cream Cake” is about one Asian-American’s struggles to balance American culture while maintaining her Asian heritage.

“It is a story about a girl who struggles to balance her social life, her extracurriculars, her school life and also her family life,” Mo said.

The short film takes place on the birthday of the main character’s mother.

“Haejin, the lead character, tries to reinforce her ties with her mother on this very special day,” Mo said. It is a story about how she foregoes school activity and hanging out with her friends to spend some time with her mom, even though her mom is overworked and comes home late. It definitely not the perfect family, but they make what they can of it.”

Mo studied film production during his junior year at Carmel High School and will take a second year of the class during his upcoming senior year. He did point out that the class was very helpful, but that his personal experiences with video production long predate his

classroom instruction.

Mo has always had a passion for filmmaking, having started “playing around” with iMovie and special effects on a Mac computer in elementary school.

“As time passed, I realized this is something that I am really interested in,” Mo said. “Videography is something that not only interests me, but so does editing. But making a film is an insightful way to document our lives. While this film is not a documentary, it is a very realistic fiction film. My co-director, Minju Hong, and I really poured our hearts into this film and it reflects how being Asian-American can affect all aspects of your life.”

# Medical software firm moves its HQ to downtown Carmel

A New York-based software provider for medical healthcare businesses has chosen to relocate its corporate headquarters to Carmel, bringing 75 high-paying jobs and an investment of \$10 million. The company, owned by Indiana native Dr. Ryan Hungate, will lease the second floor of the Monon & Main building, located above Anthony’s Chophouse on Main Street at the Monon Greenway.

“We are very excited to welcome another high-tech company to our growing family of more than 125 corporate headquarters,” said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard. “Our economic development team worked hard over the past several months to showcase the benefits of establishing corporate roots in Carmel, especially in our rapidly growing central corridor.”

Simplifeye, founded in New York City in 2014, focuses its work on providing cutting-edge software technology and world-class service to practices across the retail healthcare landscape. Dr. Hungate, an orthodontist, previously worked for Apple Inc. and helped design the customer workflow currently used by Apple’s retail stores globally.

The company, which has grown rapidly during the COVID-19 pandemic, plans to maintain its current office in New York but move its executive staff to Carmel. The average salary for those working here will be about \$100,000.

“Our growth has been phenomenal over the past year as more and more medical professionals begin to rely more heavily on technology to work with their patients,” said Dr. Hungate. “We chose Carmel because

it offers so much for our employees and is situated in the heart of an area with many high-tech and medical and dental firms that we will be working with. We can’t wait to get up and running.”

Brian Bondus, a Carmel native and Director at the ALO Property Group, brokered the deal for the 9,600 square-foot leasing inside the mixed-use building on Main Street.

“Landing an anchor tenant like Simplifeye, especially during a pandemic, is a testament to the fact employers see downtown Carmel as a place they can attract and retain the talent they need to grow their businesses,” Bondus said. “Also, while you’re seeing a lot of uncertainty in the commercial real estate market across the nation, the investments and confidence in Carmel’s assets has re-

mained strong.”

Current plans call for the new headquarters to open by mid-October.

Noblesville residents Mark and Lisa Hall are passionate about their community. They also have a deep concern for food-challenged people in Hamilton County.

“Hamilton County is one of the most affluent counties in Indiana; however, we have people that don’t know where their next meal will come from,” said Mark Hall.

According to Hall, there are approximately 27,000 food-challenged people in the county.

The Halls’ passion for the community and their concern for the hungry led them to the idea of outdoor free food pantries that are able to serve Hamilton County’s hungry 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Hall said the idea came from a program conducted by a Nazarene church in Bullitt County, Ky. He took the idea and gave it a local name: Feeding Families of Hamilton County. With the help of local businesses and community leaders, the Halls’ passion is now serving Hamilton County residents.

many challenges in the beginning: “We had to get them built, placed and stocked.” That’s when Hall turned to Bill Keevern, an instructor for Associated Builders & Contractors Inc. and J.R. Gaylor, president of the organization.

Keevern works with Ivy Tech construction trade students.

“I thought that would be a great community service project that my students could do that would utilize the skills they have learned in the classroom,” said Keevern.

Materials to build the food pantries were provided by TechTrades, Talent-Logistix and PinPoint Resources.

After the pantries were constructed, State Representative and CEO of

Gaylord Electric Chuck Goodrich and employees of Gaylord Electric picked them up, painted, and delivered the first pantries to their locations.

“We weren’t prepared to launch so quickly, but with the looming crisis with COVID, we needed to get the pantries out for a number of reasons,” Hall said. “It was pretty clear that God orchestrated getting the pantries out earlier.”

According to Hall the first pantries were only stocked with Gatorade and popcorn. The program has now grown to a total of eight fully-stocked pantries in Noblesville, Cicero and Arcadia. One recent pantry was placed on the grounds of the Hamilton Heights School Administration

building.

“We are so grateful for our partnership with Hamilton Heights School Corporation, Ms. Davis, Dr. Arrowood, and the entire school board in bringing a Feeding Families Hamilton County pantry to Arcadia,” Hall said. “These are great people that demonstrate serving neighbors every day.”

Goodrich has challenged the community to get involved and donate to help feed the hungry.

“When you go to your local grocery, pick up a few items and on your way home, stop by and put them on the shelf of one of the pantries,” Goodrich said.

“We are so grateful for all the contributions and the community coming together to stock the pantries,” concluded Hall.

Feeding Families of Hamilton County operates under the principals of take what you need, give what you can, and neighbors helping neighbors.

Bonds which would yield \$5.2 million to Old Town Companies to pay part of the project’s cost.

Noblesville will also issue \$9 million in bonds to build the parking garage.

According to project documents, Old Town Companies told the city that without the assistance of the city and the provision of the economic development incentives within the agreement, the project would not move forward.

“Our goal for the Village at Federal Hill and for all our neighborhood developments is to create a ‘sense of place’ for the people living in an Old Town community,” said Justin Moffett, partner at Old Town. “It’s an outstanding location with its proximity to downtown Noblesville, Riverview Health and the park. We are excited to be a part of the City’s plans to create new opportunities for its residents.”

## Trash & wastewater fee increase

During the same meeting, the council approved an increase in wastewater and trash fees.

Noblesville residents will now pay a wastewater fee of \$46.13, a \$4.35 per month increase. Trash service will increase by \$2.91 to \$13.85 per month. The combined utility bill will now be \$59.98.

According to Deputy Mayor Matt Light, the increase will set a four-year rate.

Information provided by Noblesville indicates that using the “Set It & Forget It” approach would avoid having an annual rate/fee increase and provides a savings over the traditional step-up rate over the same time period.

“We worked to try to

keep these costs low while also balancing the critical infrastructure needs identified by Noblesville Utilities Director Ray Thompson and his team,” Light said. “The rate increase allows the necessary cash reserves that keeps the city’s credit rating intact and keeps borrowing costs low, which saves taxpayers money in the long term.”

Noblesville is offering a hardship program that provides for \$250,000 in credits in the wastewater program and another \$115,000 in trash fees, which could benefit up to 2,778 residents if eligible.

To be granted a hardship credit, an owner-occupant must provide documentation to the Noblesville Utilities Department that they have filed for any of the following (and must affirm under penalties of perjury that the filing related to economic conditions caused in part by the public health emergency):

- (a) Unemployment with the state Department of Workforce Development;
- (b) Hardship accommodation with the Indiana Department of Revenue;
- (c) Financial assistance with the township trustee; or
- (d) Energy assistance through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program.

This program runs six months starting with the September utility bill (and would run through the February utility bill).

“It seems most likely that a combination of wise decisions is giving Indiana a temporary lull in our hospitalization rate,” Marcotte said. “The badly hit states with high test positivity rates also have very high hospitalization and intensive care rates. They are also seeing substantial death rates, unfortunately. We know several things now that we didn’t in March that are big help to Indiana in our current stage.”

According to Marcotte, healthcare officials have a better understanding of:

- How to better test and quarantine infected people,

- How to better protect vulnerable seniors in nursing homes and assisted living facilities,

- How to better predict which patients are likely to do badly with COVID-19; and,

- How to treat someone when they are hospitalized so they can go home much sooner.

“With universal masking, I expect our infection rate to drop rapidly,” Marcotte said. “That is also our best hope that we will not have a Florida- or Arizona-like situation develop here in the Hoosier state.”

# Carmel residents express concerns over proposed gas station in Village of West Clay

A proposed gas station in the Village of West Clay neighborhood in Carmel is getting major pushback from people who live there. Neighbors said that kind of development just doesn't belong there.

The Carmel Board of Zoning Appeals received 151 letters on the proposal; only about 10 were in support. In the letters, some neighbors said they would move out of the village, while others were concerned a gas station would bring crime to the area.

Jackie Phillips said those issues are important, but they're on the bottom of

her worry list.

"I think the general consensus that is home values, or crime ... that's the least of our worries. I think what we're worried about is what would happen from an environmental and health aspect," said Phillips.

Phillips is the woman behind the signs now in dozens of yards across the community. They read "No Gas Station." She also created a website to help educate her neighbors: [keep-ourvillageclean.com](http://keep-ourvillageclean.com).

Many of her neighbors already shared similar feelings before she put the information online.

"I have a family member that recently got diagnosed with a very serious

health condition and we live in close proximity to the proposed location and that's not ideal for what we're facing as a family," said Chris Wright.

"Should you be building a gas station next to an old person's home, should you be building it across from

where people live? There's benzine that gets emitted through venting tubes," said Jeff Bladen.

The gas station would

be built on Harleston Street. The proposal will be heard at Carmel's next Board of Zoning Appeals meeting on Aug. 24.

ORDINANCE NO. 16-07-20

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TRAFFIC SCHEDULE IN CHAPTER 78 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE, INDIANA

WITNESS THAT:

WHEREAS, Chapter 78 of the Code of Ordinance of the City of Noblesville, Indiana, contains Schedule III and lists Stop & Yield Streets within the City of Noblesville; and,

WHEREAS, it is desired to create Schedule XII "Alleyway No Vehicular Traffic" to designate those alleys within the City of Noblesville where motorized vehicles will be prohibited from usage.

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Noblesville that Schedule I be amended as set out herein.

If such Deposit is not received by that time, the Library may reject the bid. No interest on the Deposit will accrue to the Purchaser. The Deposit will be applied to the purchase price of the Bonds. In the event the Purchaser fails to honor the accepted bid, the Deposit will be retained by the Library as liquidated damages.

The Purchaser shall make payment for such Bonds and accept delivery thereof within five days after being notified that the Bonds are ready for delivery, at such place in the City of Indianapolis, Indiana, as the Purchaser may designate, or at such other location mutually agreed to by the Library and the Purchaser.
