



Westfield mayor initiates city-wide financial review

Westfield Mayor Andy Cook announced last Friday he has initiated a review of all city financial practices and accounts. The financial examination, authorized under Indiana Code 36-4-5-7, is to begin immediately. The results will be delivered to the Mayor's office upon completion.

"The Westfield City Council has talked about an audit of past city actions and operations and has done nothing," said Cook. "Unfortunately, damaging, unfounded accusations have been made and spilled into the public commentary, specifically casting aspersions at the Westfield Redevelopment Commission (RDC) and Grand Park. It is time to end this and I am taking action to authorize a review of the RDC and Grand Park, as well as all City departments and offices."

The appointees for this examination in-

clude individuals from the following organizations:

- BKD CPAs & Advisors;
- Baker Tilly Municipal Advisors, LLC; and
- Taft Stettinius & Hollister, LLP.

Cook says the appointees bring a well-balanced portfolio of experience and qualification to the process, including legal (both municipal and corporate), fraud investigation, forensic accounting services and municipal financing accounting and reporting. Their charge will be to undertake an operational study of the City's processes and procedures as well as a forensic accounting review and data analysis of the City's books and records.

Cook says the examination will be comprehensive and directly address the charges

levied by members of the City Council.

"Westfield is a wonderful community and our residents expect the utmost of professionalism," Cook said. "We owe it to our residents to ensure the utmost professionalism and competence in all matters of how we do business. We also owe it to our families and businesses to ensure our brand is not damaged by the unfounded political commentary of a very small group."

County budget hearings conclude

Hamilton County Councilors wrapped up two days of budget hearings last Wednesday. The hearings finalized a budget of just under \$100 million for county general operations for the 2021 fiscal year.

County Councilor Rick McKinney told the Reporter revenues will meet expenditures and residents will see a 1.27 percent projected decrease in county taxes.

The proposed budget addressed some major projects, including the State Road 37 improvement project, construction of a county-owned parking garage to be located at 8th and Clinton streets in Noblesville, and increased security measures at the historic courthouse, which includes in part the hiring of three additional security personnel.

Additionally, the proposed budget includes the hiring a full-time deputy prosecutor to handle increased domestic violence cases, a part-time staff attorney for county judges will move to full-time, and a parks department position will change from part-time to full-time.

McKinney said the proposed budget halts the county's matching contribution for its employees' deferred compensation program.

Elected officials, other than council members and commissioners, will receive a 1 percent increase in salary. Commissioners and council members will not receive a salary increase. Other county employees will continue to receive salary increases based on the county's salary matrix.

CPD received its initial accreditation through CALEA in 1996 and has been accredited continuously since that time.

Lower local taxes in 2021?

Hamilton County's taxable value jumps \$1.3 billion

Hamilton County's assessed valuation on which next year's property taxes are based has increased by one and one-third billion dollars. That's billion with a B. That is nearly a 6 percent increase in one year.

Some may ask, what does that mean? It means that if the budgets of the units of local government are, on average, held to less than a 6 percent increase there will be a slight decrease in property taxes in 2021.

The figures, supplied by Deputy Auditor Lee Graham, show the net taxable value of the county is \$24.9 billion due to a healthy increase in new construction aided by a trending upward in the value of land in many parts of the county.

Among the units of local government, Carmel had the largest increase in values, soaring by \$320 million. The only decrease was reported in Washington Township, down about \$2 million, likely due to Westfield annexations. All other units experienced increases.

Budgets of the cities, towns, schools, townships, libraries and the overall county general budget will be adopted by October. Assessed values will be applied to the budgets to determine what tax rate is needed in each unit to fund the respective spending plans.

The full list of the new assessed value totals for each of the 29 units of local government units is found on the Hamilton County Auditor's website under the heading Helpful Documents.

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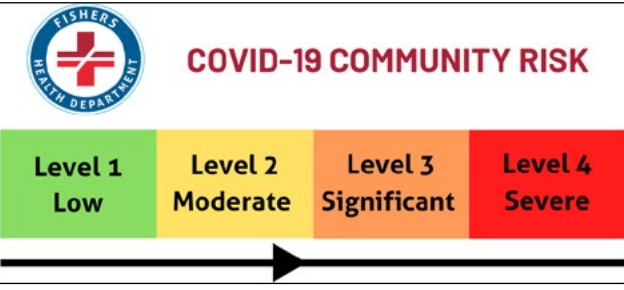

The City of Fishers Health Department has released a community-wide

help mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and better understand or predict our community risk to recommending action. This ultimately gives our residents the power and knowledge to make the best decisions for themselves, based on their own risk factors.”

Dr. Indy Lane, chief medical director, and Monica Heltz, public health director, released the scale last Friday with an initial rating of Level 2 – Moderate Risk (Yellow), which allows for in-person instruction at all Fishers schools provided that appropriate mitigation steps are taken. “The novelty of the COVID-19 virus means we are constantly getting new peer-reviewed studies that can continue to guide our response to this disease,” Dr. Lane said. “We know more about this virus today than in March and with that, I am confident we can manage the spread of the virus in our community through these metrics. By creating a rating scale, we can

The Fishers Health Department presented specific guidance to Hamilton Southeastern Schools’ Board of Trustees last Friday during a work session. The separate School Mitigation and Activity guidance follows a similar rating scale the District may use to communicate to teachers, staff, parents and students for building-specific risk. Fishers-based private schools may choose to follow these metrics to guide their own decision-making.

The rankings for the community can be used to drive decision making for HSE Schools and other

COVID-19 case confirmed at Noblesville High School

Affected individual attended athletic practice

A confirmed case of COVID-19 has been discovered at Noblesville High School. According to district officials, the individual in question has not attended school, but did attend an NHS athletic practice.

The large majority of staff and students were not

directly exposed, do not have an increased risk of COVID, and will not be impacted by this confirmed case.

Noblesville Schools’ health safety protocols were designed to address positive cases when they occur, and officials say they’re working in close partnership with the Hamilton County

Health Department.

All parents and staff members at NHS have been made aware of the confirmed case. Noblesville Schools was able to quickly contact trace, and individuals who have had a direct exposure have already been contacted personally and are isolating at home.

Noblesville Schools says its new procedures (health monitoring, social distancing, assigned seating, cohort groups) are designed to support contact tracing and containment when a confirmed case of COVID occurs, and district officials say those procedures worked as intended.

Can HSE Schools open in-person? Maybe, but with many mitigation strategies

“We had a lot of questions from the community posed to us from a public health perspective – can schools open?”

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness looked at members of the Hamilton Southeastern School Board and administrators as he and officials from the Fishers Health Department

briefed them on recommendations about when and how school buildings may open locally.

City health officials and Mayor Fadness say the current state of the COVID-19 pandemic in Fishers is in the Level 2 Moderate Risk category but moving very

close the Level 3 Significant Risk category.

The decision to open school buildings is dependent on a long list of factors determined by data, not just one piece of data or a small segment, according to city health officials. All must be analyzed

in making such a decision. Fadness emphasized that schools could open, but under what circumstances, when and with which mitigation policies are all decisions to be made by the school district. The city and health department can advise and recommend, but school officials make the final decision. “I shudder at the

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Clay Terrace plans scaled down

The widely-acclaimed Clay Terrace shopping center is facing a redevelopment that includes replacing several retail stores and restaurants with apartments. Eventually, a hotel, office buildings and a parking garage may also be built as part of the outdoor mall's changing landscape.

However, Mike Holibaugh at the Carmel Community Development Department confirmed that in the past week, a scaled-down version of the redevelopment, first

announced in March, was submitted to the department. It calls for demolition of buildings on the eastside of Clay Terrace Boulevard south of the center's midpoint, including the once-popular Mitchell's Fish Market and Biaggi's Italian restaurant, both of which have closed.

Clay Terrace, located just off U.S. 31 south of 146th Street, is owned by Washington Prime of Columbus, Ohio, a subsidiary of Simon Properties. The mall was built about 20 years ago and billed as the latest in fashionable shopping concepts.

The show must go . . . online!

First production in new Westfield Playhouse will stage both in-person and via livestream

If you are planning to stage community theater performance in 2020, you must think about both safety and accessibility. Main Street Productions (MSP) has spent a great deal of time and effort putting safety first as they planned their first show at the new Westfield Playhouse, 220 N. Union St., Westfield.

"The Monologue Show" is going to be a different kind of production than either cast, crew or patrons have experienced before at MSP. Of course, it will be entertaining, but it will also be as safe as possible for everyone involved.

Director Brandi Davis told the Reporter MSP picked this show not only because they were able to license the script for both in-person and livestream performances, but also because the play lends itself to social distancing for the cast.

"It is a series of monologues that a theater class has put together for their annual production," Davis said. "The premise is that the students have created their own monologues. You have the disheartened, underpaid teacher who is just kind of over it and trying to lead them all to put on a production even though some of the students are really into it and some of them are just not."

This is not a traditional show. Patrons will not see a solid beginning, middle and end or a solid plotline because each character is telling their own story.

"You have one student who is talking about how he wants to be a brain surgeon," Davis said. "Another one talks about how he went to an interview at McDonald's and it went horribly wrong. Another student talks about a night of stealing garden gnomes."

From the beginning, this production was planned with a great deal of flexibility built-in because all of the pandemic

variables could – and did – force MSP to make changes along the way.

"When we did auditions, we did them completely virtually with one exception: that was my son, because he lives in my house," Davis said. "All the actors recorded audition videos and emails the videos with their audition forms. I went through all them in my living room. That's how I selected my cast."

Davis was working with her young actors knowing that this play would go forward, but not how it would be presented to the public. MSP was hoping to be able to stage the production entirely in-person, but they also knew they may have had to do the whole show virtually.

One of the variables was whether or not MSP would get the keys to their new playhouse in time for the show. That and the pandemic led to the possibility that each actor would film their final monologue at home and that all of those individual pieces would have been edited together to an online-only production. Another option was having each actor film at the playhouse if they had taken possession of it and it the pandemic had made it impossible to do any kind of in-person production.

In the end, MSP does have possession of their new playhouse in downtown Westfield and the COVID-19 guidelines

from the CDC as well as the state and county health departments do allow for limited seating at live events. MSP is only allowing 25 percent seating capacity and opening night on Friday will be in-person only, but Saturday night and Sunday afternoon's productions will give people the option for in-person or livestream viewing.

Davis explains that the new stage is abundantly large and the play is structured in a way that allows for actors to be safely social distancing during the show.

"The reason I chose this particular script is because the author gives a lot of leeway to theaters," David said. "He allows some of the monologues to be cut if you don't want to use them all. If one of my actors gets ill at the last minute, we

During this closure, library patrons can continue to place holds on items through the online catalog and pick them up using the curbside holds pickup service at the library's Joyce Winner West Branch in the Village of West Clay.

The library's digital col-

lection of titles to download and stream remains open. Patrons will be able to reach library staff by phone (317-814-3900) and online ([carmelclaylibrary.org/ask-a-librarian](#)) during the move.

Library patrons may also take advantage of the countywide borrowing agreement that allows cardholders at any Hamilton County public library to check out materials from the other libraries in the county, including the Hamilton East Public Library locations in Noblesville and Fishers and the Westfield Washington Public Library.

significant challenges that all of you have," Fadness told the school board. The city's role is to explain to school officials where the community stands from a public health standpoint. The mayor emphasized the city is prepared to continue it 15-year record of cooperation with HSE Schools.

As to when school buildings may open again, and under what circumstances, Superintendent Allen Bourff said any change from virtual learning to some form of in-person instruction would only happen with a two-week notice to parents.

The Fishers Health Department explained that mitigation strategies should vary. For example, elementary and intermediate students and staff are at a lower risk of COVID-19 infection, although there remains some risk. Most elementary classes remain together during the school day.

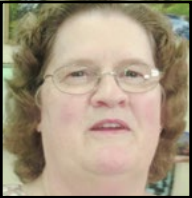

a testament to the support we receive from our City Council and Mayor Brainard, who recognize the importance of public safety in the overall goal of creating a great place to live, work and raise a family.”

The accreditation assessment process consists of a rigorous and extensive self-assessment, annual remote web-based assessments and quadrennial site-based assessments.

The 2020 on-site assessment included 45 interviews with agency members, employees and members of the community. The interviews were conducted to gauge compliance to current policy, gain insight on agency commitments and programs, and areas of deficiency. CPD had no areas of deficiency noted in the 2020 assessment process. Many of CPD’s programs were shown as exemplary on the final report.

The 2020 on-site assessment report noted several areas of achievement for the department:

• **School Resource Unit** – The assessors recognized that Carmel Clay Schools and the School Resource Officers (officers assigned to work in the schools) have a “truly enviable relationship, which can only result in the students’ betterment.”

• **Community Outreach** – The assessors acknowledged the commitment that CPD has to the Carmel community, residents and visitors alike. Programs such as the CPD Citizen Academy, Teen Academy, Police Explorers, National Night Out, Crime

Stoppers, Safety Lane, Vacation Watch Program, Crime Watch, Holidays with Heroes, a Community Health Forum, CarmelFest and Pack the Cruiser were all noted by assessors as “far reaching.”

• **Wellness Program** – Assessors recognized CPD’s programs that attribute to physical and mental health of its employees, specifically Critical Incident Stress Management, Chaplain services, peer support, psychologist and a physical therapist. “There can be no doubt that the agency is fully committed to the health and safety of its employees. Overall, this is an exemplary agency incorporating CALEA into all that they do for their citizens, visitors, and themselves.”

• **Special Events** – Assessors noted the attention to detail in CPD’s planning and approach to special events.

• **Crime Scene and Property and Evidence** – Assessors described CPD’s commitment to the collection and preservation of evidence as “second to none.” Chief Barlow added, “We appreciate being recognized for our efforts to be leaders in law enforcement management and implementation of services. Carmel Police Department employees are among the best in the world and are dedicated to serving and protecting the entire Carmel community.”
