Arrest made in Sheridan bank robbery

On Friday, detectives and deputies with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office and Clinton County Regional SWAT Team made an arrest in the Wednesday bank robbery investigation that occurred at First Farmer's Bank and Trust in Sheridan.

According to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, investigative tips and measures led to the identification of a suspect in this case. Subsequently, Nicholas T. Bales, 35, was arrested in Frankfort. Evidence was recovered linking Bales to the crime.

Bales is currently incarcerated at the Hamilton County Jail and has been charged with robbery (Level 5 felony).

Epidemiologist quits Fishers Health Dept.





Eileen White has resigned as an epidemiologist at the Fishers Health Department after a little more than two months on the job. After resigning, White posted a video on Facebook, which you can view at [this link](#). Her bottom-line message was this: The health experts are sometimes being overshadowed by politics and the health of the public is being harmed.

She then provided an interview with the *Indianapolis Star*, where the story was framed in a way that made it appear she was blaming Fishers Mayor Scott Fadenness for the political interference in local health matters and said she has never seen a health department run like a business, and insinuated that is what is happening in Fishers.

"This is absolutely NOT about Mayor Fadenness being somehow 'bad'," White wrote in a Facebook post Thursday night.

Teen dies following shooting in Fishers

A teenager has died after being shot outside a basketball fieldhouse in Fishers on Thursday evening.

On Friday, the Marion County Coroner's Office said one of the teenagers, Thomas Pearson Jr., 17, died as a result of gunshot wounds.

The Marion County Coroner's Office is handling the investigation because the teen died in an Indianapolis hospital.

According to Fishers police, Pearson, along with another juvenile, were shot outside Best Choice Fieldhouse, near 116th Street and Interstate 69, just before 10 p.m. Thursday. Police said Pearson and the other minor were getting into a car when they were shot.

The Fishers Police Department is looking for two male suspects in a beige, boxy-style, older-model Toyota.

No other information has been released.

Breakfast in Atlanta just got tasty

When you want breakfast, going to a farm and lawn equipment dealership may not be your first thought, but in Atlanta it should be.

Titus Bakery and Deli has partnered with Reynold Farm Equipment at 1451 E. 276th St., Atlanta, to fill in the gap left by the closing of the Combine Café, and by all reports it is a very welcome addition to northern Hamilton County. Titus at Reynolds opened Monday, Aug. 10, and both businesses have seen several new customers from this unique partnership.

"I don't know where all the people have come from, but they are coming!" Titus owner Terry Rake told the Reporter. "I can't tell you how many people have come in. One family came from Shelbyville. I know some of the people are new to Reynolds, who have not been in there before, and some are their customers. The neighbors who live in the

area have been all very nice and I think they are pretty happy we're there. Somebody even dropped off flowers today [Friday]. It has been very welcoming."

Rake calls Titus a destination business, and clearly people are coming from all over Central Indiana to visit the new location.

"There have been a lot of people we have never seen here before, but who were familiar with Titus," Reynolds Farm Equipment Public Relations Director Mike Lawson said. "The Titus name has been a long, strong name in the bakery business – even more so in the last few years with the deli business out of Westfield. Then there were people who were just glad to see there was something up this way rather than having to drive up to Kokomo, down to Westfield, or even take a hop, skip and a jump to Cicero. Right along on U.S. 31

it gives them another opportunity and something a little different."

Rake told The Reporter the connection is unlike anything she has ever experienced.

"The people there are so nice and it is just a great fit," Rake said. "Two generation of families have been in these businesses. I'm third generation and Gary Reynolds is second generation. Both companies have similar strong values. Giving back to the community is one of those. The focus on providing a great product. With both companies, we have really earned our reputations here in Central Indiana."

Lawson said the Reynolds family could not be happier with this new partnership.

"We are super excited," Lawson said. "Titus started in business 40 years ago

themselves as a family-owned business over in Lebanon. We also have a store over in Lebanon. I have known of them for many, many years. When the opportunity came after we had closed out café due to COVID, it gave us an opportunity to revamp and figure out what we wanted to do next.”

Lawson told The Reporter this partnership reminded him of words of wisdom from his grandfather.

“My grandpa Reynolds used to say, ‘Mike, timing is everything,’” Lawson said. “About two days before anybody knew what was going to happen with restaurants due to COVID, our chef and his wife from the Combine Café told us they wanted to put their notice in and do something else.”

Two days later the Gov. Holcomb announced restaurants would need shut down for the pandemic. That gave the Reynolds family time to think about what they wanted to do next with the café space.

An example of how this business is a true partnership comes in the form of sandwiches.

“When we had our own café, breakfast sandwiches were a big thing, so my uncle stressed that if we opened this, he wanted to see a couple hot breakfast sandwiches,” Lawson said.

Serving hot breakfast sandwiches is unique to this Titus location.

“There are three of them that we are not doing at any other Titus Bakery,” Rake said. “We have developed this for Reynolds and we have some unique names which have been very well-received.”

Lawson told The Reporter he enjoys both the sandwiches and their names.

“One of them – trust me on this, they very effectively named it – is the Hogger,” Lawson said. “It is a hoagie bun with salami, ham and bacon on it plus three eggs and cheese – oh my gosh! It is one of those sandwiches that you either have to come in hungry or want to share it with your spouse or a friend.”

According to Lawson, all the tables in the café have ample space to conform to social distancing guidelines. They also offer outside seating.

Titus Bakery and Deli at Reynolds is open from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Reynold Farm Equipment is open 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and Saturdays until noon or 4 p.m. – depending on the season.

“I actually think he’s a reasonable man. I also think the leadership of the health department is not ‘bad.’ I think they lack awareness of how the mayor being involved in meetings regularly and introducing a school board meeting and interjecting over and over isn’t exactly normal. He did not interfere in developing metrics. He did not tell us explicitly what to say.


His presence and his level of involvement in health Dept stuff isn’t normal.”

White did explain what led to her resignation.

“[Mayor Fadness]’ presence and involvement in a school board meeting interferes with independent messaging of the health department,” White wrote in the Thursday night Facebook post. “It doesn’t allow public health to be trusted and this is the National Issue I wanted to address.”

White adds she will be doing no more interviews. She only consented to the newspaper interview because the reporter told her there would be a story with or without her comments.

Her Facebook page will be her way of communicating her views in the future.

Last Wednesday, Noblesville Lions Club President Julia Kozicki led the meeting activities. Mayor Chris Jensen visited the club and spoke about current city activities. The following are some of the highlights discussed by Mayor Jensen:

- One interesting fact is that the population of Noblesville is now around 65,000.
- The Levinson park-

ing garage and apartments, now under construction, are due for completion around January 2021.

- The Lofts on Tenth and the Village at Federal Hill will be similar to The Levinson in having apartments/townhomes, retail space and the needed additional parking.

- Route 37 Construction update: The city is in discussions with INDOT to extend the roundabout construction a little further

north on 37. No details yet.

- New roundabouts on State Roads 32 and 38 on the west side are on a schedule to be completed in the next couple of years.

- East/west traffic problems and the Pleasant Street construction was discussed. The city is in discussions with the federal government for funds to start the building of a bridge and connection to Hague Road on the west side of town. This project is several years

away from its completion.

- Any public safety issues take a priority of necessary decisions by the city.

- The 2021 city budget will stay the same as the 2020 budget.

- Workforce development is a priority for Noblesville. The city continues to look for companies to locate here with at least mid-level paying jobs.

- The mayor did also comment he is trying to keep the city's taxes low.

AG Curtis Hill calls on Gov. Holcomb, legislative leaders to hold special session focused on COVID

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill on Friday sent a letter to Gov. Eric Holcomb and leaders of the Indiana General Assembly calling for a special legislative session focused on addressing the COVID-19 pandemic.

"In a republican form of government, we do not govern by executive decree," Hill wrote in the letter. "We govern by legislation, enforcement, and adjudication carried out by separately elected (and appointed) officials. The Indiana Constitution so divides government functions to prevent concentration of power and to facilitate public debate."

The emergency used to justify hurried executive actions has now become a long-term issue that deserves the attention of the people's representatives, Hill added.

"To be sure," Hill wrote, "COVID-19 remains a pandemic and a serious public health threat that all should take seriously, including wearing masks and practicing social distancing. But it has been such for nearly six months, which is enough time to re-engage ordinary mechanisms of republican government."

Governance by executive decree has sent inconsistent and confusing messages to Hoosiers statewide, Hill added.

"Candidly," he wrote, "while Hoosiers at first mostly obeyed the Governor's emergency orders, as those orders have endured, overreached, mutated, or proven impracticable, many citizens have begun to lose

respect for them."

Among those deserving clearer guidance, Hill added, are Hoosier parents, teachers and schoolchildren.

"The start of a new school year has crystallized the sense of insecurity and general weariness arising from governance by shifting executive decrees," Hill wrote. "To educate children, our public schools require clarity, consistency and affirmation of a constitutional process governing both finances and operations."

Hill said the state's co-equal branches of government must engage with one another for the sake of all Hoosiers.

"Press conferences from the Governor saying one thing, and letters from law-

makers saying another – neither of which has any legal force – produce only more uncertainty and anxiety for schools, students, parents and citizens about what the consequences might be in a few months of the decisions they make today," Hill wrote.

A special session, Hill added, "is the only way to provide the full measure of constitutional government to which Hoosiers are entitled, ensure consistency in the law governing individual conduct and the operation of public functions, afford certainty in public funding for education and other important government missions, and, critically, restore public confidence in governmental leadership and constitutional governance."

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Hoosier congressional leaders play an important role in preserving jobs for the blind

This past weekend, the president signed the bipartisan bill House Resolution 4920. While the bill received little attention, it will have an enormous impact on Americans who are blind and visually impaired and their ability to gain employment and contribute to society.

I want to personally thank Senator Todd Young, Senator Mike Braun and Representative Susan Brooks for playing instrumental roles in the bill’s passage.

HR 4920 clarifies an unintended conflict created by Congress during its drafting and passage of the *Veterans Benefit Act* (VBA) in 2006. The conflict involved the *Javits-Wagner O’Day Act* (JWOD) – a federal statute now known as the AbilityOne Program – established by Congress decades ago to create jobs for people who are blind or significantly disabled.

The new legislation allows AbilityOne and the VBA to coexist and achieve separate, but complementary service missions.

AbilityOne provides sustainable employment for more than 45,000 people who are blind or severely disabled, including more than 3,000 wounded, ill or

injured veterans. Nationally, people who are blind or visually impaired face a 70 percent unemployment rate – more than 18 times the rate of unemployment for sighted Americans.

Bosma Enterprises is Indiana’s largest employer of Hoosiers who have lost their sight and a leading provider of rehabilitation and training services for people with blindness or visual impairment. Our organization would not exist if not for the AbilityOne program.

For several years, Bosma has contracted with the Veterans Affairs administration to provide medical supplies to its hospitals. We have been operational throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, shipping hundreds of millions of gloves to VA facilities. Our employees are very proud of their contribution to ensuring the safety of health care professionals caring for our nation’s heroes.

Bosma and the AbilityOne Program provide people with more than just jobs. They provide dignity, confidence and the ability to live independently.

Without this long-term solution, the total loss of jobs would have been devastating, both for people who are sighted and those who are blind, visually impaired or have significant disabilities. It would have meant job losses for several veterans as well, many of whom have disabilities.

Worse still, thousands of Americans would have lost access to life-changing rehabilitative and support services provided by Bosma Enterprises and other AbilityOne programs.

Since our founding in

1915, Bosma Enterprises has supported the VA and all veterans. We employ veterans who are blind and visually impaired and provide rehabilitative and training services to help veterans with vision loss gain the life skills they need to live independently and the job skills they need to stay self-sufficient.

I am a veteran myself, serving in the U.S. Army for 21 years, including one combat tour in Afghanistan and three in Iraq. I am also the first CEO of Bosma Enterprises who is blind. While serving in Baghdad in July 2005, a roadside bomb struck the vehicle I was driving. A month later, I woke up in Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C., and learned I would never regain my vision. My experience as someone who is visually impaired uniquely positions me to understand the overwhelming challenge for people with disabilities to secure employment, which is why this legislation is so important.

I also want to offer my sincerest thanks to the National Industries for the Blind, Blinded Veterans Association, National Federation of the Blind and American Council of the Blind for their unwavering support of this bill.

Thank you again to Senator Todd Young, Senator Mike Braun and Representative Susan Brooks for playing an integral role in the passage of HR 4920. Because of your efforts, Americans who are disabled will be able to share the same sense of pride in their work and in themselves.

Andretti blazes top 'Fast Friday' Lap since 1996 as Andretti Autosport flexes muscle

Speeds and Andretti Autosport's expectations for the pole position for the 104th Indianapolis 500 presented by Gainbridge climbed arguably in equal measure Aug. 14, as Marco Andretti posted the fastest lap on "Fast Friday" since 1996.

Andretti led the final practice before Crown Royal Armed Forces Qualifying this weekend at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway with a top lap of 38.5454 seconds, 233.491 mph in the No. 98 U.S. Concrete/Curb Honda. He was one of 23 drivers who posted top speeds of 230 mph or higher, as added turbocharger boost today through Sunday added approximately 50 to 75 more horsepower to the Honda and Chevrolet engines.

That was the top "Fast Friday" speed since Arie Luyendyk ripped off the fastest practice lap in Indy 500 history, 239.260, on May 10, 1996.

"Fast Friday was good, especially

with the top speed of the day," Andretti said. "We seem to be looking good on no-tow speeds, as well. Although I wanted to end the day with runs better than we did, and we have a few things to work out. But we just need to nail tomorrow, and the No. 98 car has enough speed for the Fast Nine."

Conor Daly was second fastest today at 232.337 in the No. 47 United States Air Force Chevrolet. NTT INDYCAR SERIES points leader and 2008 Indy 500 winner Scott Dixon, fastest Thursday, was third at 232.290 in the No. 9 PNC Bank Chip Ganassi Racing Honda.

2014 Indy 500 winner Ryan Hunter-Reay was fourth at 232.124 in the No. 28 DHL Honda, the best lap of the day without an aerodynamic tow under sunny skies and temperatures in the mid-80s on the 2.5-mile oval. Spencer Pigot rounded out the top five at 232.116 in the No. 45 Hy-Vee/Embrace Pittsburgh Honda.

Two-time Formula One World Champion Fernando Alonso returned to the track today after hitting the SAFER Barrier in Turn 4 on Thursday in his No. 66 Ruoff Arrow McLaren SP Chevrolet. He was 25th fastest at 229.788.

The first day of qualifying takes place from 11 a.m. to 4:50 p.m. Saturday. The nine fastest cars will earn a berth in the Fast Nine Shootout from 1:15-2:15 p.m. Sunday, which will determine the pole winner and the starting grid for the first three rows of the race Sunday, Aug. 23.

NBC will air qualifying from 3-5 p.m. Saturday. NBC's NTT INDYCAR SERIES streaming platform, INDYCAR Pass on NBC Sports Gold, will cover qualifying from 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday.

All six Andretti Autosport drivers ended up in the top 15 today, with Andretti first, Hunter-Reay fourth, James Hinchcliffe seventh, 2016 "500" winner Alexander Rossi ninth, Colton Herta 13th

and Zach Veach 15th.

2006 Indy 500 Rookie of the Year Andretti has been one of the three fastest drivers each of the three days of practice as he aims for his first Indy 500 pole and victory. But he will be the 28th of 33 cars to make their first qualifying attempt Saturday, when an earlier spot in the qualifying line should be more advantageous due to cooler air and track temperatures.

The Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing trio of Graham Rahal, Takuma Sato and Pigot benefited most from the qualifying draw Friday evening. Rahal will be first in the qualifying line, followed by teammate Sato in second. Pigot will make the seventh qualifying attempt in his RLL with Citrone/Buhl Autosport entry.

Track activity starts at 8:30 a.m. Saturday with a one-hour pre-qualifying practice split into two 30-minute groups (live, INDYCAR Pass on NBC Sports Gold).

Pacers finish regular season with win over Heat

It wasn't exactly a playoff preview, but the Pacers took care of business against the Heat on Friday afternoon in the final regular season game for both teams.

Both teams rested several key players ahead of Tuesday's series opener, but Indiana (45-28) showcased its depth, as six players scored in double figures in a 109-92 victory over Miami (44-29).

With the win, the Pacers secured the fourth seed in the Eastern Conference, meaning they will be the designated

"home" team when Indiana and Miami open their best-of-seven series next week.

Doug McDermott led Indiana with 23 points in the win, going 8-for-16 from the field and 5-for-11 from 3-point range. Malcolm Brogdon, the only regular Pacers starter in the lineup on Friday, added 16 points in 25 minutes, going 4-for-7 from beyond the arc while also tallying six rebounds and six assists.

Second-year forward Alize Johnson got his first career start on Friday and responded with his first double-double, collecting 11 points and 17 rebounds (seven on the offensive glass) to go along with

four assists.

"He did what he always does," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said of Johnson's career night. "He's been in the G League a lot for us, but he has always been a guy that rebounds the ball. He plays a lot bigger than he is down there and I thought tonight he did a great job of going after the ball."

The Pacers rested starters Victor Oladipo, Myles Turner, and T.J. Warren, while Miami elected to sit Bam Adebayo, Jimmy Butler, Jae Crowder, and Goran Dragic.

After both teams got off to a sluggish start, Indiana used a 15-0 run to surge out to a 21-7 lead. Brogdon got the offense rolling early, tallying five points, three rebounds, and three assists (including two dishes to Justin Holiday for 3-pointers) in his first eight minutes of action.

The Blue & Gold held the Heat to just 5-for-23 shooting in the first quarter as the Pacers took a commanding 28-13 lead after one.

McDermott got it rolling early in the second quarter. The sharpshooter converted layups at 10:51 and 10:21, then buried a 3-pointer off a dish from T.J. McConnell at 9:54 to push Indiana's lead to 19.

The Pacers led by as many as 21

points in the first half. The Heat managed to whittle a few points off that deficit, but still trailed 58-44 at the break.

Brogdon knocked down a three and threw a beautiful full-court dish to Edmond Sumner for a breakaway layup plus a foul as Indiana opened the second half with eight straight points.

Tyler Herro helped the Heat mount a bit of a run, scoring 14 points and hitting three 3-pointers in the third quarter, but the Blue & Gold maintained a double-digit advantage throughout the frame, taking an 84-70 lead into the fourth quarter.

The Heat never mounted a serious charge over the final 12 minutes as the Pacers closed out the regular season with a win.

Justin Holiday finished with 11 points and seven rebounds for Indiana while going 3-for-5 from 3-point range. Younger brother Aaron Holiday also tallied 11 points on 5-of-7 shooting and three steals, while JaKarr Sampson added 10 points and four rebounds.

Kendrick Nunn led the Heat with 23 points, but went just 8-for-26 from the field. Former Pacer Solomon Hill added 21 points, seven rebounds, and three assists off the bench, while Herro finished
