Arrest made in Sheridan bank robbery

Last Friday, detectives and deputies with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office and Clinton County Regional SWAT Team made an arrest in last Wednesday's bank robbery investigation that occurred at First Farmer's Bank and Trust in Sheridan.

According to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, investigative tips and measures led to the identification of a suspect in this case. Subsequently, Nicholas T. Bales, 35, was arrested in Frankfort. Evidence was recovered linking Bales to the crime.

Bales is currently incarcerated at the Hamilton County Jail and has been charged with robbery (Level 5 felony).

Assisting in the investigation and arrest were: Sheridan Police Department, Clinton County Sheriff's Office, Frankfort Police Department, Boone County Sheriff's Office, Lebanon Police Department, Tippecanoe County Sheriff's Office, Lafayette Police Department, Indiana State Police, FBI, Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office, and Clinton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office.

Hamilton County resumes jury trials

Jury trials have resumed in Hamilton County with a host of new safety measures to ensure the safety of the judges, jurors, attorneys, parties and witnesses. Jury trials were suspended March 18 in the State of Indiana pursuant to the Order of the Indiana Supreme Court.

"Our constitution did not take a holiday during the pandemic," Hamilton Superior Court 6 Judge Gail Bardach said. "People do still have the right to have their cases tried and heard. It is time to resume implementing and honoring those rights."

In order to fill a jury, more jurors have

been and will be summoned than in the past to account for those who request to be excused due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon entering the Judicial Center, potential jurors will have their temperatures taken and will be asked a number of COVID-19 related health questions. All parties involved will be required to wear masks for the entirety of the trial. "Recent times have been difficult,"

On Saturday, Aug. 22, you can see *Toy Story 4* for free at Dolles Park, 130 W. Walton St., Atlanta.

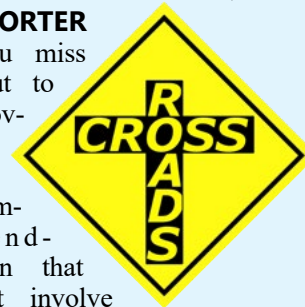
According to Pastor Chris Brooks, there is no cost for this family-friendly event.

HSE Schools hoping to institute Phase 2 of attendance plan sometime after Labor Day

It is not often that Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) school board meetings exceed three hours in length, but that is what happened last Wednesday night.

If you want to review the entire video of the meeting (it is mostly audio), prepare to spend three-and-a-half hours on the project. You can access the meeting video at tinyurl.com/y6smr8to.

The board was briefed on a switch from a four-phase plan to move from virtual to in-person classes to a three-phase plan. See the details at tinyurl.com/y4n6xn7h.

The hope is that HSE Schools will

move from the current Phase 1 to Phase 2 after Labor Day. School officials say families will have at least two weeks' notice before Phase 2 would be effective.

Phase 2 would call for a 50-50 schedule, meaning students would spend half of their time in the school building and half in virtual learning. The current idea would have a student spend three days in class one week and two days in class the other week.

Superintendent Allen Bourff said he must discuss the new plan with the Ham-

ilton Southeastern Education Association (HSEA) for the teachers' perspective, which is a requirement under state law. That meeting was scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 13.

The public is allowed to speak on an agenda item, and discussion of COVID-19 plans was on the Wednesday agenda. A total of 10 speakers voiced their view that in-person classes should start as soon as possible in HSE Schools.

Noblesville makes no increases in 2021 budget

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen's 2021 budget plans, which include no overall budget increase from this year, were presented to the Noblesville Common Council during a public work session last Tuesday.

The proposed budget has four guiding principles: No increase in the overall city budget compared to Revised 2020 city budget, no citywide yearly salary increase, no health insurance premium increases for employees and no new city positions – except the four positions previously created to continue the implementation of NobleAct.

"Given the changing economic stand-

point, we need to maintain our optimism while being cautious with our budget," Jensen said. "The goal is to maintain sufficient cash reserves, while continuing our ability to invest in the city's future. This fiscal plan will set us up for success in the future while keeping appropriate dollars to invest back into our community."

Jensen's guiding principles for the 2021 Civil City Budget are predicated by the cur-

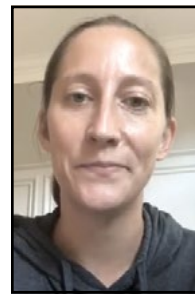

To ensure social distancing, jurors are spaced at least six feet apart in the courtroom. Once the jury and an alternate have been selected, they will be given two jury rooms for breaks and will use the jury assembly room for meals and deliberation to ensure proper social distancing.

In the past three weeks, Judge Campbell has conducted two jury trials and Judge Bardach has conducted one. These were the first jury trials held in Hamilton County since March. Both judges commented that the jurors selected felt comfortable and were appreciative of the safety measures the courts took to keep them safe.

"We expect some will still be uncomfortable with the circumstances," Judge Bardach said. "We understand that, but also want to thank prospective jurors in advance for meeting the special challenges of our world today. It is especially important that they serve to guarantee that anyone on trial is assured their constitutional and personal right to be tried by a jury."

In addition to the precautions listed above, all prospective jurors will be given their own hand sanitizer to use throughout the day. Additional bottles of hand sanitizer will be spread throughout the courtroom, jury rooms, and the jury assembly room. Court staff will use a disinfecting spray to sanitize surfaces in the courtroom throughout jury selection and the trial itself.

"This is absolutely NOT about Mayor Fadness being somehow 'bad,'" White wrote in a Facebook post Thursday night. "I actually think he's a reasonable man. I also think the leadership of the health department is not 'bad.' I think they lack awareness of how the mayor being involved in meetings regularly and introducing a school board meeting and interjecting over and over isn't exactly normal. He did not interfere in developing metrics. He did not tell us explicitly what to say. His presence and his level of involvement in health Dept stuff isn't normal."

White did explain what led to her resignation.

"[Mayor Fadness'] presence and involvement in a school board meeting interferes with independent messaging of the health department," White wrote in the Thursday night Facebook post. "It doesn't allow pub-

In the spring, Jensen directed departments to identify expenditures that could be deferred or decreased so that more money could be reverted to the general fund at the end of the year. This direction will result in more than \$1.3 million in reversions. The city has not had to make any employment cuts due to the fiscal impact of the ongoing pandemic and the proposed 2021 Civil City Budget is intended to maintain that record in the fiscal year to come.

"Noblesville is fortunate to have a healthy Rainy Day Fund and cash reserves, accumulated through many years of growth in assessed valuation and prudent management of public funds," said Deputy Mayor Matt Light. "We believe that with a conservative budgeting strategy for 2021 and continued efforts to right size and realign, we can reach a position in the near future where we can make the bold investments in Noblesville's future in ways we had envisioned before we faced a global pandemic."

The proposed 2021 budget will be presented to the Noblesville Common Council at its next meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 15 for further discussion.

Local non-profits, township trustees help residents avoid COVID-related evictions

Individuals and families who have problems paying their rent or mortgages due to the COVID-19 pandemic can seek assistance through a new program announced Monday by HAND, Inc. and the Hamilton County Township Trustee Association.

“Since March, there has been a pause in any eviction proceedings at both the state and federal level,” said Andrea Davis, executive director of Noblesville-based non-profit HAND Inc. “But individuals and families who have lost their jobs or suffered medically due to COVID are still responsible for full payment of their rent or mortgage. This program will allow us to help those at risk of eviction.”

The federal moratorium on evictions ended in late July, and Gov. Eric Holcomb said last week that he intended to allow the state moratorium

to expire on Friday, Aug. 14.

D a n i e l l e Carey Tolan, president of the Hamilton County Township Trustee Association, encourages all Hamilton County residents to seek assistance before their landlords initiate eviction proceedings.

“Our goal is to keep people in their homes,” Tolan said. “We know that stable housing is critical for a child’s success in school and better health outcomes – both physical and mental – for all family members. This then reduces the burden on our many social services in the county.”

Residents who need as-

sistance should connect with their local township trustee to assess the situation and determine the best sources of help. You can find your trustee at wayo.egis.39dn.com. (Click “accept”, enter your address and click “trustee” on the right). In keeping with COVID safe policies, begin the process by calling your trustee to set a phone appointment time.

T o w n s h i p trustees will assess the needs and coordinate with local non-profits to provide resources. Non-profits participating in this program include: Aspire Indiana, Family Promise of Hamilton County, Good Samaritan Network, HAND Inc., and Shepherd’s Center of Hamilton County. Funding partners include Hamilton County Community Foundation, Hamilton County’s Community Development Block Grant program, and United Way of Central Indiana through its COVID-relief funding from Lilly Endowment.

The state also is providing a total of \$40 million in rental assistance. Applications for those funds are available at indianahousingnow.org.

“By pooling our resources in a coordinated way, we can stretch our funding to reach as many people as possible while providing a variety of services to families in need,” Davis said. “It is the smart way to work as a community to keep our community thriving for all our residents.”

Heights high school student-athlete tests positive for COVID

A student athlete at Hamilton Heights High School has tested positive for COVID-19. The student has not attended school.

The school district contacted the Hamilton County Health Department, and per the health department’s guidance, the student will quarantine at home for 14 days.

Through contact tracing, any player the student touched must be quarantined for 14 days as well.

As a precautionary measure, a staff member and 13 student athletes will also quarantine for the next 14 days.

Heights administrators encourage families to remain diligent, take personal responsibility, and follow the recommendations

by local and state public health partners to mitigate risk of exposure and transmission on and off school grounds.

As a reminder, if you or anyone in your family is experiencing symptoms in line with COVID-19, contact your healthcare provider for further guidance. Families are encouraged to self-monitor for symptoms of the coronavirus virus including fever, dry cough, body aches, and shortness of breath.

A statement issued by the school district said, “We appreciate your continued confidence and support as we prioritize the health and safety of our students and staff while accelerating learning opportunities for all students during this pandemic. Thank you for doing your part to be good neighbors and show kindness and empathy as we move forward through these challenging times together.”

Four Westfield Schools transportation employees contract coronavirus

Westfield Washington Schools announced last Tuesday there were four confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the school system. All four individuals are employees of the transportation department. All are in isolation at home.

A statement issued by the school district said:

“We are working with our local health department to follow the CDC guidelines. The confirmed cases are in self isolation and those who are considered close contacts have been notified and are required to self quarantine at home. Those individuals will not return to work until they’ve met all of the required safety criteria to return, including isolating at home and being symptom free.

“Due to employees being quarantined and in isolation, we are experiencing a bus driver shortage and some routes will be doubled in order to transport all students to school. In other words, drivers will run their assigned routes and after

dropping students at school, will run an additional route. This will result in longer delays than normal because drivers will be disinfecting buses before they run their second route.

“If your bus route will be double routed, you will be notified by our transportation department. Students who are late to school will not be marked as tardy.”

School officials want to remind parents and students that it’s important to remain home if you are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms and keep children who have symptoms or are being tested for COVID-19 at home. Contact the school and report the absence and the reason for the absence.

Students/parents should report a positive case to their school (during the school day), or should use the WWS COVID phone line after hours: (317) 867-8056. This phone line will send an automated notification to the Director of Human Resources and Safety and to the District Head Nurse.

HSEA President Janet Chandler also spoke before the board, saying teachers are working hard under difficult conditions but are doing the best they can under the circumstances.

Although Dr. Bourff voiced hope that the school district could move to Phase 2 instruction after Labor Day, the community COVID-19 data will also impact that decision. As of Thursday afternoon, the Fishers Health Department Risk Rating was at a Level 2 (Moderate) but was moving in the direction of Level 3 (Significant). Bourff indicated the movement of the city health department’s measure needs to be moving in the other direction for Phase 2 to begin.

The board was also told that only immediate family, with few if any exceptions, would be allowed into school events, such as football games. IHSA rules limit spectators up

to 250 with a number of other rules.

The pressure on school board members began to boil over at Wednesday’s meeting. Board President Michelle Fullhart asked board members to take turns reading emails from the public on the COVID-19 issue.

When it was Amanda Shera’s turn, she said, “...I am very uncomfortable that we have hand-picked letters that opposed opening (schools)...”

Fullhart cut Ms. Shera off and said, “I’m going to stop you. Because everybody that emailed me as of Monday – I emailed every one of them and asked – do you want these comments read? So, I’m not going to

put up with this talk right now because that is not true.”

“I’m not one of your second graders,” said Shera. “The parents that were here were limited to two minutes but your letters went on and on. I have about a six-sentence email...”

That received cheers from the audience at the meeting, which led to Fullhart warning the crowd not to do that and doing so would lead to removal from the meeting room.

Shera then voiced an objection to using the names of those writing the emails being read at the meeting, claiming it was a violation of FERPA (Family Educational Rights and

Privacy Act).

Fullhart responded that each email writer consented to using their names, because comments read into the record of a school board meeting must have a name attached to it.

Bottom line: It is still uncertain when HSE Schools will move to Phase 2 under the new plan.

In a personnel matter, it was announced that Assistant Superintendent Jan Combs will be retiring at the end of calendar year 2020 and Matt Kegley has been promoted to Assistant Superintendent, replacing Dr. Combs once her retirement is effective at the end of 2020.

In another note from the board meeting, Fishers Health Department Director Monica Heltz told the board that the testing labs used by the city for COVID-19 testing are caught up and those awaiting test results should have them soon.

Breakfast in Atlanta just got tasty

Titus Bakery partners with Reynolds Farm Equipment

When you want breakfast, going to a farm and lawn equipment dealership may not be your first thought, but in Atlanta it should be.

Titus Bakery and Deli has partnered with Reynold Farm Equipment at 1451 E. 276th St., Atlanta, to fill in the gap left by the closing of the Combine Café, and by all reports it is a very welcome addition to northern Hamilton County. Titus at Reynolds opened Monday, Aug. 10, and both businesses have seen several new customers from this unique partnership.

“I don’t know where all the people have come from, but they are coming!” Titus owner Terry Rake told the Reporter. “I can’t tell you how many people have come in. One family came from Shelbyville. I know some of the people are new to Reynolds, who have not been in there before, and some are their customers. The neighbors who live in the area have been all very nice and I think they are pretty happy we’re there. Somebody even dropped off flowers today [Friday]. It has been very welcoming.”

Rake calls Titus a destination business, and clearly people are coming from all over Central Indiana to visit the new location.

“There have been a lot of people we have never seen here before, but who were familiar with Titus,” Reynolds Farm Equipment Public Relations Director Mike Lawson said. “The Titus name has been a long, strong name in the bakery business—even more so in the last few years with the deli business out of Westfield. Then there were people who were just glad to see there was something up this way rather than having to drive up to Kokomo, down to Westfield, or even take a hop, skip and a jump to Cicero. Right along on U.S. 31 it gives them another opportunity and something a little different.”

Rake told The Reporter the connection is unlike anything she has ever experienced.

“The people there are so nice and it is just a great fit,” Rake said. “Two generations of families have been in these businesses. I’m third generation and Gary Reynolds is second generation. Both companies have similar strong values. Giving back to the community is one of those. The focus on providing a great product. With both companies, we have really earned our reputations here in Central Indiana.”

Lawson said the Reynolds family could not be happier with this new partnership.

“We are super excited,” Lawson said. “Titus started in business 40 years ago themselves as a family-owned business over in

Lebanon. We also have a store over in Lebanon. I have known of them for many, many years. When the opportunity came after we had closed our café due to COVID, it gave us an opportunity to revamp and figure out what we wanted to do next.”

Lawson told the Reporter this partnership reminded him of words of wisdom from his grandfather. “My grandpa Reynolds used to say, ‘Mike, timing is everything,’” Lawson said. “About two days before anybody knew what was going to happen with restaurants due to COVID, our chef and his wife from the Combine Café told us they wanted to put their notice in and do something else.”

Two days later the Gov. Holcomb announced restaurants would need shut down for the pandemic. That gave the Reynolds family time to think about what they wanted to do next with the café space.

“There have been a lot of people we have never seen here before, but who were familiar with Titus,” Reynolds Farm Equipment Public Relations Director Mike Lawson said. “The Titus name has been a long, strong name in the bakery business—even more so in the last few years with the deli business out of Westfield. Then there were people who were just glad to see there was something up this way rather than having to drive up to Kokomo, down to Westfield, or even take a hop, skip and a jump to Cicero. 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An example of how this business is a true partnership comes in the form of sandwiches.

According to Lawson, all the tables in the café have ample space to conform to social distancing guidelines. They also offer outside seating.
