

## Fishers Health Dept. improves community risk rating

The Fishers Health Department shared two pieces of news Friday, one on the overall community risk related to COVID-19 and the other on the start of younger people in the community eligible for coronavirus testing.

Director Monica Heltz said in a video posted Friday that the community health risk dashboard is now moving in a downward direction, which is a good measure. The rating is still at Level 3 – Significant, but is moving downward. Heltz says the rating may be down into Level 2 – Moderate - early next week.

The department also announced that Fishers residents as young as five are now eligible for the free COVID-19 test available to anyone living in the City of Fishers. Heltz recommends parents and their children view a video that will soon be available on the health department website before going to a test.

## Hot housing market in Central Indiana continues to set records

The housing market in Central Indiana is setting but hours.

It's a great time to sell, but it can be a difficult time to buy. Across the 16 counties which make up the area tracked by the MIBOR Realtor Association, there is less than one month's inventory, something realtors said has never happened before.

it fell even further to 0.8. He says he believes it's a combination of factors: People living in their homes longer, pent-up demand from the initial pandemic slowdown and low interest rates.

'This is really across all the donut counties," Woerner said. "That market data holds true for each one of those."

Woerner said homes below \$250,000 are the most in demand.

As of Thursday, there were 44 homes listed for sale in Carmel, Fishers, Noblesville and Westfield below that price point, with just 543 for sale regardless of price.

Woerner said to try to seal the deal, buyers are taking extra steps like waiving home inspections, paying closing costs, agreeing to go over appraised values and even writing cover letters to the sellers.



Honda has recalled approximately 12.9 million Honda and Acura vehicles with suspect airbag inflators since 2008. This includes 189,397 vehicles in Indiana. Ruptures of these faulty airbags have resulted in at least 14 deaths and over 200 injuries in the U.S. alone. Honda also delayed in reporting the defects to consumers.



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## Hoosiers give hospitals, providers high marks during pandemic

### 74% concerned about health insurance company profits

A new statewide poll shows Hoosiers give extremely high marks to hospitals and health care providers for their response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Eighty-two percent of Hoosiers said hospitals have responded well during the pandemic and 80 percent applaud the work of health care providers. The poll, conducted by Bellwether Research and Consulting, surveyed 800 Hoosier voters statewide Aug. 13-16.

Hoosiers also trust hospitals and health providers, with 71 percent expressing trust for hospitals and 79 percent for health care providers. Two-thirds of Hoosier voters say they do not "generally trust" health insurance and drug companies.

"Indiana's hospitals sincerely appreciate the trust that Hoosiers have placed in them," said IHA President focus has been on providing of elective procedures, and

# 'Hounds win John Shirley, HSE takes 2nd

One streak that doesn't get as much attention – and probably should – is the Greyhounds' current streak at the prestigious John Shirley Invitational. Hamilton Southeastern, ranked No. 10 in the coaches poll, placed second in the team standings with 27 points. The Royals were led by runner-up finishes from Rohan Golla at No. 2 singles and the No. 2 doubles team of Abhi Chaddha and Brandon Sogocio.

"I thought we played great overall," said Southeastern coach Kirk Webber. "Our goal was to finish in the top three, so obviously really happy with second place. Guys played great. I think this is the best we've ever finished here. We talked about making a statement in this tournament because we knew that the top two or three was possible."

No. 3 singles Andrew Orme and the No. 1 doubles team of Andrew Spirrison and Paul Schneider both took third in their respective flights. No. 1 singles Aiden De Witt finished in fifth place.
