

Fishers Health Department drops Community Risk Rating to Yellow

The Fishers Health Department (FHD) announced on Tuesday a change to the Community Risk Rating to Level 2 – Yellow (Moderate). The Risk Rating was decreased from Orange due to an improvement in both case incidence and percent positivity rates in Fishers.

For Activity Recommendations in the Yellow category, FHD recommends healthy, non-high-risk individuals to consider limiting large gatherings of more than 30 people and following standard prevention measures such as hand washing, distancing and sanitizing. For high-risk

individuals, FHD recommends avoiding gatherings of more than eight people outside your household, using takeout/delivery service in place of in-person dining, and essential shopping only.

Following this change, FHD recommends Fishers-based schools to reinstate or continue full in-person learning for elementary grades. Middle and high school grades may reinstate or continue full in-person learning if able to maintain cohorting. If unable to institute cohorting, the practice of keeping the same students together throughout the school day,

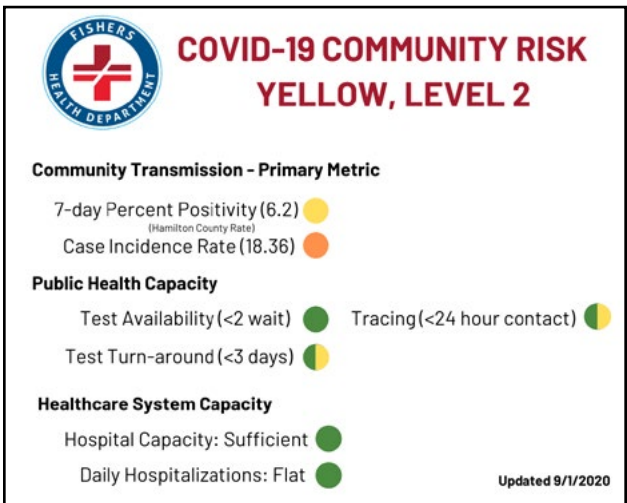
the department advises a hybrid school model in order to decrease spread within schools and to minimize the number of quarantining students and staff that are expected to accompany school reopening. Additionally, schools should allow students with compelling needs to attend full-time in-person learning.

In response to the ISDH metrics distributed last week, FHD considers the ISDH's new metrics as part of several ancillary inputs to determine the targeted Risk Rating for the Fishers community. FHD will continue to monitor the state's metrics as they are released.

FHD continues to recommend the simple measures of masks, distancing and hand washing as the best tools in getting ahead of this virus. In addition, FHD calls on all Fishers residents to support these efforts to continue the downward trend to return to school safely and with a minimum amount of further disruption due to this virus.

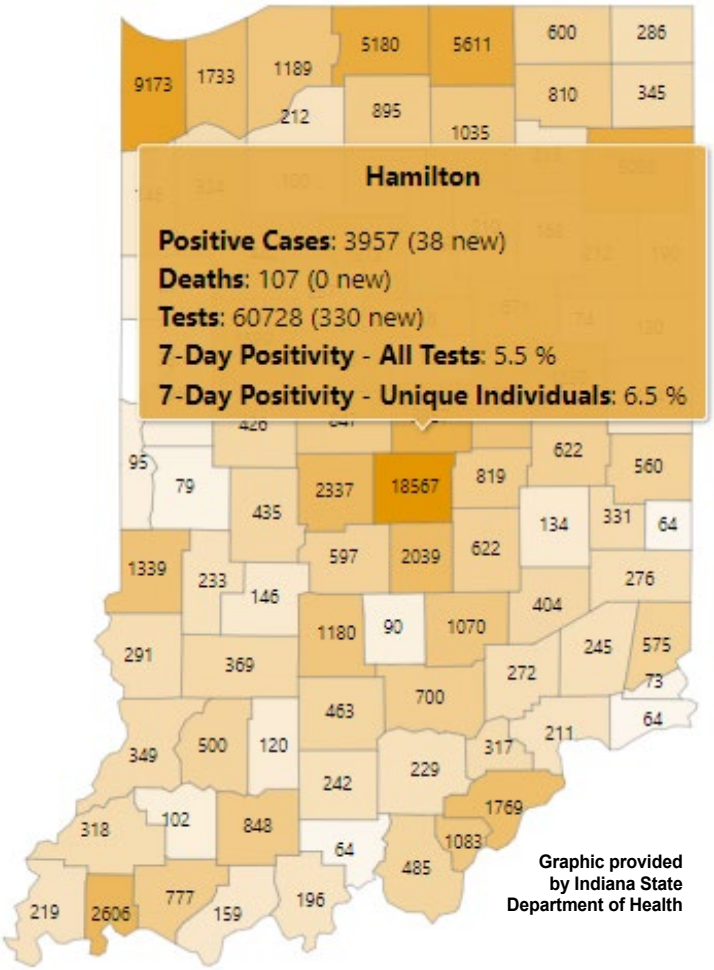
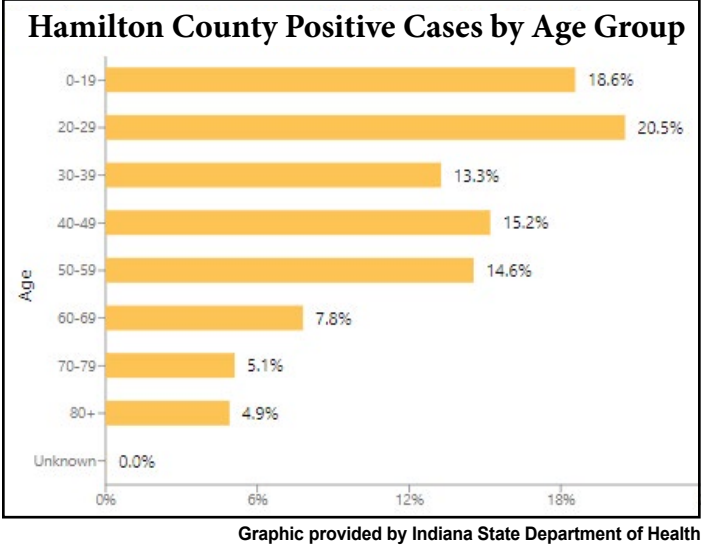
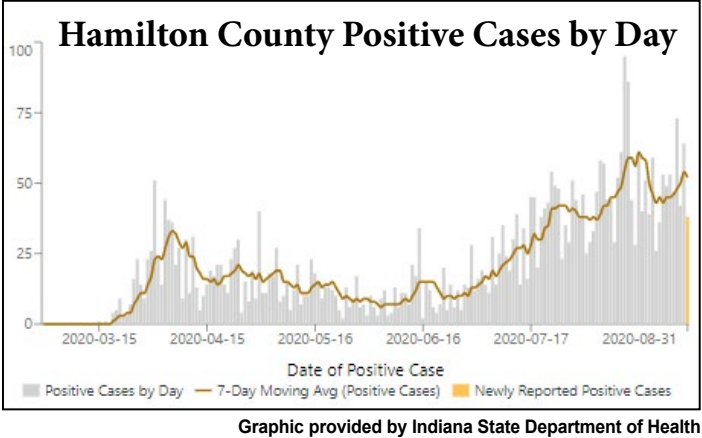
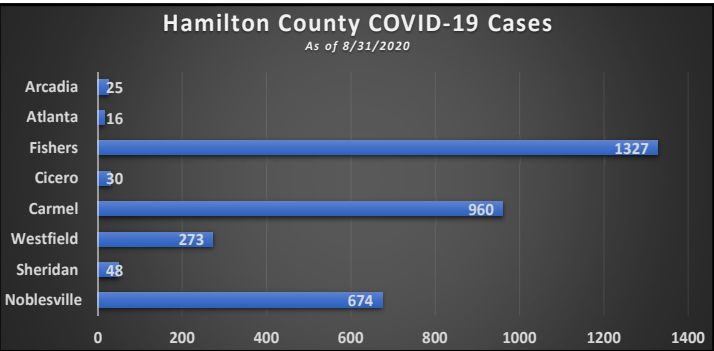
Positive COVID-19 cases in Hamilton County near 4,000

As of Tuesday, the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) has recorded a total of 94,891 positive COVID-19 cases statewide. ISDH also reports 3,093 deaths have occurred as a result of the virus. A total of 1,442,887 COVID-19 tests have been performed throughout the state.

In Hamilton County, 60,728 tests have been performed and 3,957 people have tested positive. A total of 107 deaths related to COVID-19 have occurred in the county.

As of Monday, Fishers continues to outnumber other Hamilton County communities with a total of 1,327 positive cases recorded.

Carmel students say they are facing racism as group pushes for change

A Carmel group is demanding Carmel High School stands up against racism after multiple students of color say they were sent racist videos and messages on social media.

Carmel Against Racial Injustice shared the videos, pictures and voicemails on Facebook on Friday night; one message said a student should be lynched and enslaved.

"We're obviously really concerned about black and brown and marginalized students in Carmel," said Alicia Duffy, information liaison for Carmel Against Racial Injustice. "But also, what does that say to white students if they're able to behave this way?"

Group leaders say since forming back in June, they've had a constant stream of students contacting them about discrimination.

"I'd say hundreds of people," said Carmel Against Racial Injustice CEO Ashten Spilker. "There has not been one person that we have spoken with that doesn't have an experience."

The group says they met with Carmel Clay Schools administrators, asking them to implement an anti-racist policy, make a public statement denouncing racism and

County Health Department launches 'Show Some C.L.A.S.S.' campaign

Families asked to avoid large gatherings to slow spread of COVID-19

The Hamilton County Health Department has partnered with area school districts to launch an educational campaign designed to keep kids in school. Called "Show Some C.L.A.S.S. Keep Kids in School," the campaign outlines five basic rules families should follow to help keep children healthy and in the classroom:

C – Check your child's temperature every morning before sending them to school.

L – Lead by example. Let your child see you wearing a mask and modeling good social distancing.

A – Avoid large gatherings. Slumber parties, carpools and birthday parties are discouraged.

S – Schedule a test if you or someone in your family exhibits signs of COVID-19.

S – Stay home until you receive your test results or if you are not feeling well.

"We are confident with the safety measures the schools have put in place and be-

lieve there are few places, besides home, where a child is safer," said Jim Ginder, Health Education Specialist for the Hamilton County Health Department. "However, there is only so much your school can do to protect your child. The onus is on each and every one of us to keep COVID-19 out of our school buildings."

The health department has been tracking a significant spike in new COVID-19 cases among children – especially teens – since July 4. According to the Indiana State Department of Health, children up to age 19 accounted for just 5 percent of the positive cases on July 4. That percentage has more than tripled to 18.5 percent of new cases this week. The surge is due in large part to what are called "super spreader events" – social gatherings like graduations, weddings, and family reunions.

"It's on all of us to make sure our

schools don't become super spreaders," said Christian Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the health department. "We're encouraging families with students in school to self-isolate as much as possible. Reconsider hosting or attending crowded events. Keep your social circles small and postpone big milestones. Limiting a child's exposure to COVID-19 outside of school will help limit transmission within our school buildings."

The Health Department is working closely with the public and private school systems in Hamilton County to educate K-12 students about the C.L.A.S.S. acronym. The campaign, which launched last week, will enlist the help of student ambassadors, teachers, coaches and parent-teacher organizations. develop an equity committee.

"It only makes sense," Duffy said. "Why wouldn't we want to write this stuff out and do what we can to protect our students?"

So far, the group said they only have a denouncement of racism from Superintendent Michael Beresford and a conversation about those steps possibly happening over time. However, they'd like more from the high school and for action to be taken soon.

"So you have students that are immediately in crisis," Spilker said. "It needs to be addressed. There needs to be something in place immediately, and it's not something that can be waited on because at this point, student dignity and student life is at stake."

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will hold open interviews for over 100 winter seasonal positions on Tuesday, Sept. 15 and Thursday, Oct. 15 at 11 locations around the state. Hiring events will take place from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. (local time).

Locally, a hiring event will be held at the Indy Sub District, 7105 Brookville Road, Indianapolis.

Winter seasonal positions run from November through March at a starting pay of \$16 per hour. INDOT offers \$250 sign on and \$500 retention bonuses for eligible candidates.

Candidates should have a valid driver's license and commercial driver's license (CDL). A high school diploma or GED is preferred but not required.

Registration is not required to attend the event, but INDOT recruiters will contact pre-registered participants directly with additional instructions and details prior to the event. Reserve your spot for ‘put and take’ pheasant hunts

Hunters can purchase a reservation for put and take pheasant hunts online starting at 6 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 5.

Put and take hunts are no longer available on a first-come, first-served basis at fish and wildlife areas (FWAs). To reserve a spot, click “Apply for a reserved hunt” at on.in.gov/reservedhunt.

Hunters do not need to log in to an online account to reserve a spot if they have a valid hunting license. Instead, hunters can access the reserved hunts using only their Customer ID number and date of birth. Use one of the latest versions of Microsoft Edge, Internet Explorer,

Firefox, Safari, or Google Chrome. Other browsers, such as Brave, will not work. Browsers will need to allow the use of cookies.

The cost is \$30 per reservation. Reservation purchases are non-refundable; however, they can be transferred to another person. Upon completion of their reservation, registrants will receive an email notification that includes their hunt registration ID, date reserved and property name. Individuals should keep this confirmation for their records.

FWAs participating in put and take hunts this year are Atterbury, Glendale, J.E. Roush Lake, Pigeon River, Tri-County, Willow Slough

and Winamac.

All hunters are required to have a current Indiana Hunting License and Game-bird Habitat Stamp to participate in this hunt. Hunters must check in between 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. (8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. CT for Willow Slough due to limited daylight hours) on the day of the hunt. Hunting starts at 9 a.m. Hunters should bring their hunt registration paperwork and a valid hunting license on the day of their hunt.

Individuals participating in put and take pheasant hunts at FWAs are prohibited from harvesting game animals other than pheasants on days when pheasants are released and hunted.

Hamilton County cross country meet

Carmel sweeps team, individual titles

Tuesday's Hamilton County cross country meet had a familiar finish: Carmel swept the boys and girls team championships and individual races.

Both Greyhounds squads took different paths to the title. The Carmel girls had five of the top nine finishers on their way to an easy victory at the meet, which took place at the Chinquapin Ridge course at Noblesville's White River Elementary School.

The Greyhound boys, however, were involved in a tight race. Only nine points separated first and third place. Carmel scored 50 points, with the host Millers totaling 56 points and Fishers taking third with 59 points.

The 'Hounds had three finishers in the top 11, which coach Colin Altevogt said "really helped us out." Kole Mathison defended his individual title, finishing the race in 15:25.5. Jacob Fisher placed fifth and Charles Schuman took 11th. Hudson Alden placed 16th and Nathan Seketa finished 17th, which kept Carmel's score low.

"I think our guys did a good job of executing our strategy of trying to move up," said Altevogt. "We really moved up in the second half of the race."

Travis Hickner finished second individually and was one of three Noblesville runners in the top 10. Andrew Anderson was eighth and Asher Propst placed 10th.

Meanwhile, Fishers' Matthew Lepert and Will Clark were third and fourth respectively. The Tigers had all five of their scoring runners place in the top 20.

Hamilton Southeastern was a strong fourth, scoring 74 points. The Royals had two runners finish in the top 10: Jack Patrick took sixth and Nolan Satterfield placed ninth.

Guerin Catholic scored 102 points to take fifth; Austin Callahan finished in seventh place individually. Westfield was sixth as a team; Aiden Wright led the Shamrocks by taking 42nd.

In the girls meet, Annie Christie led Carmel and the field, clocking in at 18:22.1 to win the individual championship. Jasmine Klopstad took third place,

Alivia Romaniuk was fifth, Cara Naas placed seventh and Abby Parker finished in ninth.

Southeastern was the team runner-up with 57 points, and had the individual runner-up as well. Halle Hill took second place, while Maggie Powers finished in eighth.

Noblesville took third as a team; Summer Rempe paced the Millers by taking 13th place. Fishers finished in fourth, with Anna Runion placing 10th. Westfield was fifth as a team; Ashley Baldwin led the Shamrocks by taking 28th.

Hamilton Heights' Maria Mitchell fin-

ished in fourth place individually, while Guerin Catholic's Bridget Gallagher took sixth place.
