



Council considers resolution to admonish Governor Holcomb

Last Tuesday, the Hamilton County Council had a lengthy discussion on the possibility of issuing a resolution admonishing Governor Eric Holcomb if he doesn't move into Stage 5 of Indiana's Back on Track plan.

The discussion started with Hamilton County Council President Rick McKinney stating council members have received emails from constituents asking whether or not the council would support a resolution to admonish, advise or request Governor Holcomb to move the state into Stage 5 of Back on Track.

During the discussion, council members referred to a recent

resolution issued by Wabash County that stated, "Wabash County's economy is highly dependent upon retail, restaurant, tourism, and industry, and such economic restrictions have had a significant negative impact on the citizens and businesses of the area."

The council is the county's financial arm tasked with such

things as adopting and managing a county budget, establishing a tax rate, and making appropriations, re-appropriations and transfers of funds.

Advising or admonishing the Governor on a public health matter is not a task typically performed by a county council.

Overall, council members expressed their frustration with

the lack of a matrix to move the state forward.

"I think the one thing that I struggle with, there haven't been matrix put in place that dictate how we move from stage to stage," said council member Ken Alexander. "Just having some of those identified, whether they are

Fishers Health Department drops Community Risk Rating to Yellow

The Fishers Health Department (FHD) announced last Tuesday a change to the Community Risk Rating to Level 2 – Yellow (Moderate). The Risk Rating was decreased from Orange due to an improvement in both case incidence and percent positivity rates in Fishers.

For Activity Recommendations in the Yellow category, FHD recommends healthy, non-high-risk individuals to

consider limiting large gatherings of more than 30 people and following standard prevention measures such as hand washing, distancing and sanitizing. For high-risk individuals, FHD recommends avoiding gatherings of more than eight people outside your household, using takeout/delivery service in place of in-person dining, and essential shopping only.

Following this change, FHD recommends Fish-

ers-based schools to reinstate or continue full in-person learning for elementary grades. Middle and high school grades may reinstate or continue full in-person learning if able to maintain cohorting. If unable to institute cohorting, the practice of keeping the same students together throughout the school day, the department advises a hybrid school model in order to decrease spread within schools and to minimize the number of

quarantining students and staff that are expected to accompany school reopening. Additionally, schools should allow students with compelling needs to attend full-time in-person learning.

In response to the ISDH metrics distributed last week, FHD considers the ISDH's new metrics as part of several ancillary inputs to determine the targeted Risk Rating for the

Noblesville plans to build residential, office space west of the White River

The City of Noblesville and Cityscape Residential have agreed to partner to bring a multi-million dollar residential investment to the downtown area to the west side of the White River. The location, which is along River Road and State Road 32, contains a vacant Marsh building and parking lot, but the City has plans to make it into a market-rate multifamily living complex.

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen and Cityscape Residential will introduce the agreement to the Noblesville Common Council at its next regularly scheduled common council meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 15.

"Our goal with this project is to drive economic development to our western anchor of the downtown area and bring vibrancy to a currently blighted location," Jensen said. "It's a shame to have an underutilized space so close to the heart of our downtown and we would like to turn that around by investing in quality of life and sense of place. Adding residential development to the west side of the river will

attract a diverse workforce while adding density and energy to that area."

The public-private partnership is projected to be a \$52.8 million investment. Zoning for a potential office building will also be presented to the council as part of this project. Cityscape has developed a number of award-winning community-style neighborhoods throughout

Central Indiana.

"We've had a few proposals that included plans to reuse the current building, but the city felt that those plans weren't the right fit for our community," Jensen said. "This proposal brings us a market-rate mul-

tifamily development that supports businesses by injecting additional energy into the momentum we are already building downtown, which is a key

economic driver."

Jensen added that the project includes luxury apartment amenities like co-working areas, a bike room with maintenance and repair, a salt water pool, pet spa, outdoor living spaces and downtown connectivity with convenient trail access to the White River Greenway, Forest Park and Morse Reservoir.

If approved by council, construction is expected to start in spring 2021 with plans for construction to be completed in 2022.

HSE board votes to begin 50% in-person classes for grades 5-12

The Hamilton Southeastern School Board voted 4-3 last Thursday to move grades 5-12 to a 50 percent hybrid method, which means students will be in the classroom 50 percent of the time over a two-week period. This goes into effect Thursday, Sept. 17.

Sylvia Shepler, Amanda Shera, Brad Boyer and Clint Wilson voted yes. Michelle Fullhart, Janet Pritchett and Julie Chambers voted no.

Board President Michelle Fullhart says she is in favor of moving students back into classrooms, but voted no because she wanted a Sept. 14 start date for the 50 percent hybrid system for in-person classes.

Students up to grade 4 are scheduled to begin a similar program Sept. 8.

An amendment to start school Monday, Sept. 21, was not approved by the board.

Administrators told board members there are 34 permanent substitute teachers on staff. A total of 240 of the 297 regular subs answered a survey, with 56 percent saying they want to wait before returning to the classroom. Some regular substitute teachers told the school district they would work, but no more than one to two days a week during the current pandemic.

The board was told there would be enough bus drivers to transport students, but staffing is very tight.

Carmel Clay Parks acquires land for new park on city's northwest side

Carmel and Clay Township residents will have a new park to explore in northwest Carmel. On Sept. 3, Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation officially acquired and closed on 26.91 acres of land near 146th Street and Shelborne Road.

"This land acquisition is very exciting for Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation and our community," said CCPR Director Michael Klitzing.

Acquiring land for a future park in northwest Carmel was identified as a top priority of CCPR's 2020-2024 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan. Prior to this acquisition, CCPR had only one park west of U.S. 31/Meridian Street in southwest Carmel.

The new park was purchased using revenue generated from Park and Recreation Impact Fees.

Initial park development will likely take place in the next two to five years.

County Health Department launches 'Show Some C.L.A.S.S.' campaign

Families asked to avoid large gatherings to slow spread of COVID-19

The Hamilton County Health Department has partnered with area school districts to launch an educational campaign designed to keep kids in school. Called "Show Some C.L.A.S.S. Keep Kids in School," the campaign outlines five basic rules families should follow to help keep children healthy and in the classroom:

C – Check your child's temperature every morning before sending them to school.

L – Lead by example. Let

your child see you wearing a mask and modeling good social distancing.

A – Avoid large gatherings. Slumber parties, carpools and birthday parties are discouraged.

S – Schedule a test if you or someone in your family exhibits signs of COVID-19.

S – Stay home until you receive your test results or if you are not feeling well.

"We are confident with the safety measures the schools have put into place and believe there are few places, besides home, where a child is safer," said Jim Ginder, Health Education Specialist for the Hamilton County

COVID-19 out of our school buildings."

The health department has been tracking a significant spike in new COVID-19 cases among children – especially teens – since July 4. According to the Indiana State Department of Health, children up to age 19 accounted for just 5 percent of the positive cases on July 4. That percentage has more than tripled to 18.5 percent of new cases this week. The surge is

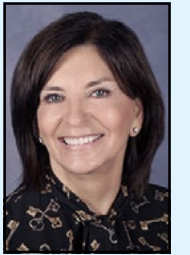

The Hiesers – Robert, Johanna, Phil and Abby – have a total of 75 years in the jewelry business.

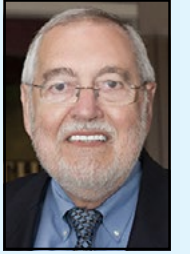
Smith's, located at 9th and Logan streets on Noblesville's downtown square, has served Hamilton County for more than 70 years.

reality, results of a salvage opportunity provided to NPA, and a desperate need to raise funds for Preservation Hall.

NPA purchased Preservation Hall, 1274 Logan

St., last October to serve as agency headquarters and a community event venue. There is now a loan to repay and an exterior renovation to complete. Roundabout construction changes access to Monon Community Center

Beginning Tuesday, Sept. 8, the south entrance to the Monon Community Center (MCC), 111th Street and Lexington Drive, will be closed due to roundabout construction. Additionally, the Central Park internal roundabout at that entrance will also be closed.

A temporary road will be installed prior to the closure which will allow traffic from the College Avenue entrance the ability to access to the MCC west parking lot. Below are alternate routes for accessing the MCC.

Heading westbound to eastbound

Guests can enter the

MCC parking lot via the College Avenue entrance from either 116th Street or 111th Street.

Heading eastbound to westbound

There are three ways to access the MCC's parking lots if you are traveling east to west:

East Parking Lot

1. Take 116th Street to Rangeline Road and enter the MCC east entrance parking lot. Please note the east entrance of the building is currently closed to the public and is only open for staff use due to COVID-19. You will need to park your car in the lot and then walk around the south side of the building

to get to the west entrance.

West Parking Lot

2. Take 116th Street past Guilford Road and turn left on Pennsylvania Street. Take Pennsylvania Street to 111th Street and turn left. Then turn left on College Avenue to get to the entrance. Please note you are currently unable to turn left at Guilford Road off of 116th Street due to an additional construction project.

3. Or, head south on Rangeline Road to 106th Street. Then turn left on College Avenue to get to the entrance.

The closure is scheduled to last through the month of October, weather dependent.

going to do it or we are going to do it, I think is the key thing so that we can let our businesses and people in our public understand how we are going to allow things to move forward.”

“If you go on social media and you look at the people who are loudest, I think the governor, or certain people, might be under the impression that there is wide support for restrictions, and I just don't think that is the case,” said council member Fred Glynn.

Amy Massillamany, District 2 County Council Member, asked, “Has there been any dialogue around the health department perspective on what their thoughts were?” Massillamany continued, “Wabash is the only one I know of that has signed a resolution. They are drasti-

cally different in size and comparison. I'm just curious on the thought process.”

Wabash County does differ greatly compared to Hamilton County, in population and number of COVID-19 cases.

According to the Indiana State Department of Health, as of Wednesday, Wabash County had a seven-day positivity rate of 3.47 percent, a drop in previous numbers reported. A total of 214 COVID-19 cases have been reported in the county.

Hamilton County's seven-day positivity rate is 5.19 percent. Hamilton County has recorded a total of 4,000 COVID-19 cases.

The population of Wabash County is nearly 33,000 people as compared to Hamilton County's population of slightly more than 350,000.

Wabash County is sparse in population as compared to Hamilton County. According to the United States Census Bureau, Wabash County has 79.7 people living per square mile and Hamilton County has approximately 700 people living per square mile.

Glynn and Councilman Steve Schwartz both expressed favor in putting the resolution on an upcoming agenda.

“We have until Sept. 26 for his [Governor Holcomb] thing. If he doesn't move forward with it, we need to have something on the agenda,” said Glynn.

Schwartz said, “I would be in favor of putting it on the agenda. I like that idea.”

The next opportunity for the council to discuss the resolution would be at its Oct. 7 meeting.

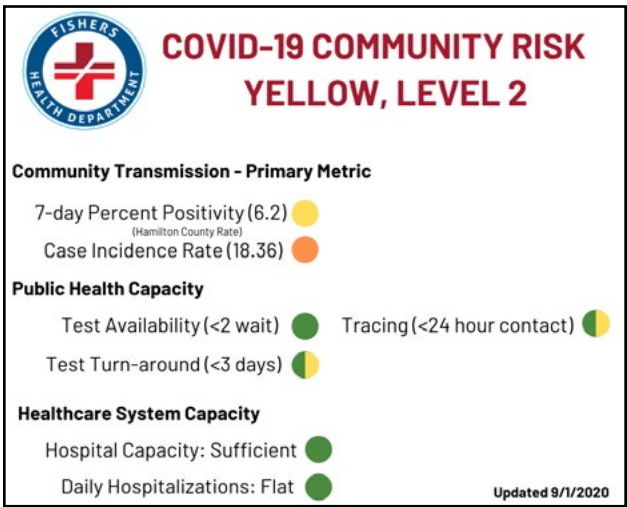

Big plays send Tigers past Millers

FISHERS - Fishers made some big plays last Friday night, and that led to a big win.

The Tigers beat county rival Noblesville 21-0 at Reynolds Tiger Stadium in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener for both teams. It was the first win of the season for Fishers, which makes it the first victory for Curt Funk as the Tigers' coach.

For the most part, the two teams were matched up well against each other, and both played solid football. The difference was two big plays that the Tigers made in the second and third quarter, and then Fishers let its defense do the rest.

Fishers' Caleb VanDer Kamp got the ball as it rolled into the end zone, and the Tigers had their first touchdown of the game.

"That's something we talked about all week is how we haven't had a takeaway all year, we haven't had one takeaway," said Funk. "So we tried to amp that up in practice this week, really preaching and emphasize takeaways, and our defense responded to-

night with a takeaway."

That would be the only score of the second half, as both teams' defenses stiffened, resulting in four consecutive punts. Noblesville made a promising drive at the end of the half, but came away empty after getting down to the Tigers' seven-yard line.

On defense, Billy Reiter totaled 12 tackles, with Curtis Kearschner making eight. Shane Cole and Seth Dunnuck each had seven tackles. Stanley and David Dille both made one sack.

Trey Speek led the way for Noblesville on offense with 85 yards of rushing on 17 carries. Quarterback Conner Meinerding completed 3 of 5 pass attempts for 52 yards. That included two catches for Chance Yeager and a 32-yard re-

The Red Devils beat Heights 49-14. West Lafayette scored its first touchdown late in the first quarter, then poured in 28 points in the second quarter. Max Mullis had two rushing touchdowns, with Sam Schott scoring on a pass play and then on a late 70-yard interception return.

West Lafayette led 35-0 at halftime, then extended the advantage to 42-0 midway through the third period. The Huskies got on the board with 2:40 left in the third when Caleb Schakel took off on a 65-yard run to the end zone.

The Red Devils began the fourth quarter with another touchdown, but Heights kept fighting. Trey Ehman scored on a six-yard rushing touchdown with four minutes left in the game. Michael Lecher kicked both extra points.

Schakel’s 65-yard run was his only rush of the game, but it made him the Huskies’ rushing leader. Ehman totaled 48 yards and also had two catches. Vincent Harley stepped in as quarterback, and completed 5 of 11 passes for 44 yards.

Heights is 0-3 for the season. The Huskies will play their first Hoosier Conference East Division game Friday at Northwestern.

A shorthanded Sheridan team dropped its first game of the season last Friday, falling to Tri-Central 21-0 at Bud Wright Stadium.
