





New historical museum approved by Clay Township

A new museum, archives and an office building for the Carmel Clay Historical Society will be underway in January along the Monon Trail. The Clay Township Board voted Tuesday to fund construction of the building immediately south of the historical society's 137-year-old Monon Depot, home to the organization since 1976.

Matthew Snyder, member of the Township Board, said the new structure will be located on the site of an outdated frame cottage owned by the historical society and used for archive storage in recent years. The new building, costing about \$4 million, will provide space for exhibits, offices, community events, archive storage and a cafe.

The project is the latest addition to the township's Community Impact program which includes upgrades and additions for the fire department, parks department and Carmel Dads Club.

Fishers earns AAA bond rating

The City of Fishers announced on Tuesday the S&P Global Ratings report qualifying Fishers' credit rating as AAA, the highest possible rating for a municipality.

The AAA rating not only signals to creditors that Fishers' fiscally conservative practices and policies are among the best in the country, but allows the city to benefit from lower interest and insurance rates.

"This rating affirms the direction of our city, intentionally growing at a rate that ensures long term fiscal sustainability," Mayor Scott Fadness said. "By achieving this year over year, we



are able to pass along that savings to the taxpayer and better leverage those dollars to provide the quality of life we pride ourselves for in Fishers."

According to S&P Global Ratings' official report, "The city's economic vitality, sound, and forward-thinking fiscal practices, and very strong reserves should enable Fishers to retain a strong credit profile in the next two years despite the high financial leverage and accelerating costs. We believe that rising revenues will allow the city to invest in infrastructure and new services for its growing population without compromising the budget over the short-to-medium term."

Carmel officials seek public's input on city's growth plan

The City of Carmel's Department of Community Services is launching a new update of the comprehensive plan for the City's growth that will guide city planners and decision makers for the next decade or longer.

The last update took place about 11 years ago, but with recent growth in the central corridor and changes seen in business and residential patterns, the time has come for another update.

The City has engaged the team of Greenstreet and YARD & Company to assist planning staff and leadership in updating the comprehensive plan around growth management, land use, transportation and environment.

The public is also asked to participate. A new survey will be posted online in order to get feedback from local residents about thoughts and ideas they may have about future growth. You can also take the survey at this link.

"In order for a comprehensive plan to be relevant to a community it must remain current," said Adrienne Keeling, AICP, who is managing the update process. "The last major update to Carmel's comprehensive plan was adopted in 2009. Although there have been several minor amendments to the plan over the last decade, much in our community has changed. One of the best ways our city can focus on the future is to regularly evaluate and communicate its vision and goals for the future."

The update process kicked off earlier this month and will continue through the end of the year.

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
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


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Merritt stepping down

AG Hill urges FCC to combat suppression of political speech on digital platforms

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill is urging the Federal Communications Commission to help prevent the suppression of political speech on digital platforms such as Facebook, Twitter and YouTube.

In a letter to the FCC, Hill along with the attorneys general of Texas, Louisiana and Missouri - asks the agency to clarify existing rules to safeguard Americans' freedoms of expressions.

The attorneys general take aim at immunity provisions that seek to enable communications companies to maintain justifiable restrictions on speech. These provisions, the letter states, should assure that "platobjectively obscene, harassing, and harmful material without unduly expanding immunity to conduct that tramples core First Amendment speech."

Too often, the letter states, social media companies have too aggressively regulated speech.

"Unfortunately, examples are legion of online platforms downplaying, ed-

iting, or even suppressing political speech that bears no relationship to the traditionally regulated categories of speech," the letter states. "For instance, Twitter recently 'fact checked' a

tweet by President Trump warning about the risk of election fraud

posed by mail-in ballots. Twitter claimed the tweet was supported by 'no evidence' despite the fact that many experts - including signatories to this letter - can validate that claim. forms may continue to pre- YouTube and Facebook, in serve public spaces free of turn, have removed content - including materials posted by licensed physicians, that, in their view, constitutes 'misinformation' COVID-19."



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

"I thought it was good when I was taking the shot, then knew it was good seeing it get by his arm," said Hyatt.
