Hamilton County schools get \$685K in safety grants

The REPORTER

Fourteen local schools have been awarded a total of \$685,842 in matching school safety grants.

The Indiana General Assembly allocated \$19 million statewide for a grant program known as Secured School Safety Grant.

A total of 418 school throughout Indiana received funding.

Local public school districts receiving funding are Carmel Clay, Noblesville, Sheridan, Westfield, Hamilton Heights and Hamilton Southeastern.

How does the City Council approach budgeting and how can residents better understand why decisions are made?

Submitted by **City of Fishers**

Each year, the City Council is charged with the adoption of the following year's municipal budget. That process begins in early summer when department heads meet with Mayor Fadness and the Controller's Office to discuss goals and expenditures for the following year.

From there, the Controller's Office and Mayor Fadness work with City Council members through the Finance Committee and other briefings to review predicted revenues for the City Council leadership, following year and how that that the City of Fishers reweighs against goals and tain a healthy balance in expenditures to bring the cash reserves. State tree nursery will pay for certain tree seeds

Indiana's state tree nursery in Vallonia will pay you to collect certain tree seeds throughout the state if the seeds meet DNR specifica-

Each year the nurseries, part of the DNR Division of seeds to produce tree and shrub seedlings for conservation planting within the state. Each year much of the seed the nurseries use is supplied by collectors from seeds. DNR Forestry, which swamp chestnut oak and

• Always call first to see if the seeds you plan to collect are still needed. Collect only seeds and fruit – no leaves, sticks, or trash.

• Keep species separate - if you're not certain that two (or more) trees are the same species, keep them in separate containers.

• If you are not certain if you have the proper species, email a photo of the seed/ fruit, leaves, bark, and twigs to vallonianursery@dnr. **IN.gov** for identification.

 Most of the listed species are ripe and ready to collect when they fall off

• Healthy acorns (with the exception of bur oak) will fall free of the cap. Keep the seeds/fruit cool until you can deliver it to the office - an air-conditioned basement is good for a short period of time.
