The City of Fishers announced last Tuesday the S&P Global Ratings report qualifying Fishers' credit rating as AAA, the highest possible rating for a municipality.

The AAA rating not only signals to creditors that Fishers' fiscally conservative practices and policies are among the best in the country, but allows the city to benefit from lower interest and insurance rates.

"This rating affirms the direction of

our city, intentionally growing at a rate that ensures long term fiscal sustainability," Mayor Scott Fadness said. "By achieving this year over year, we are able to pass along that savings to the taxpayer and better leverage those dollars



Fadness to provide the quality of life we pride ourselves for in Fishers."

According to S&P Global Ratings' official report, "The city's economic vitality, sound, and forward-thinking fiscal practices, and very strong reserves should enable Fishers to retain a strong credit profile in the next two years despite the high financial leverage and accelerating costs. We believe that rising revenues will allow the city to invest in infrastructure and new services for its growing population without compromising the budget over the short-to-medium term."

Additionally, the report recognized the city's proactive and measured response to the COVID-19 pandemic. S&P included the following as key financial policies under Mayor Fadness' direction that ensure a strong and sustainable financial situation for Fishers:

- Fishers follows a data-driven decision-making approach in its budgeting.
- Fishers maintains a long-term, comprehensive fiscal plan that serves as the financial forecast.
- The city has a formal five-year capital plan that it updates at least annually.
- Fishers also has formal comprehensive investment and debt management policies, and a formal reserve policy.

Construction begins on Noblesville's Lofts at Tenth development project

The City of Noblesville and PT-17 Development officials broke ground last Friday on the Lofts on Tenth, a public-private partnership on a new downtown redevelopment project.

The \$7.7 million mixed-use project will add 31,700 square feet of mixed-use redevelopment along 10th Street between Clinton and Wayne streets.

"Downtown Noblesville is becoming more of a destination and the best use of this area is to reimagine it into a mixeduse project," developer Darren Peck said. "The Lofts on Tenth will provide more residential and commercial opportunities for those that want to be close to the heart of our city."

The proposed project includes 23 two-bedroom apartment units with a rooftop deck meeting space and seven potential commercial spaces, including unique below street level spaces. The project addresses two of Jensen's administration pillars – economic development and downtown enhancement.

The Hamilton County Parks and Recreation Department, in partnership with Beaver Materials, is exploring the potential expansion of Potter's Bridge Park by 50 or more acres. the park's current 75 acres, resulting in at least 125 acres of park land.

The popular park is best known for its iconic landmark, Potter's Bridge, which is the only remaining historic covered bridge in Hamilton County. The bridge was constructed in 1871 and restored in 1999.

The park's trails are a part of the White River Greenway Trail System. The White River Greenway Trail System spans up to eight miles. From Potter's Bridge Park users can travel the trail system along the river, through Forest Park to downtown Noblesville or Morse Park and Beach, where the new Levee Trail can be accessed. With the

potential expansion, these trails would allow increased connectivity to historic downtown Noblesville, its surrounding neighborhoods and other Hamilton County cities and towns.

The potential expan-The expansion would add to sion would happen in two phases.

Phase 1 entails a 10-acre land donation by Beaver Materials. Phase 2 would be an additional 40-acre land donation by Beaver Materials. Phase 2 would include the creation of a 30-acre lake by Beaver Materials for the use of recreational activities provided by the Hamilton County Parks Department.





A new museum, archives and an office building for the Carmel Clay Historical Society will be underway in January along the Monon Trail. The Clay Township Board voted last Tuesday to fund construction of the building immediately south of the historical society's 137-year-old Monon Depot, home to the organization since 1976.

Matthew Snyder, member of the Township Board, said the new structure will be located on the site of an outdated frame cottage owned by the historical society and used for archive storage in recent years. The new building, costing about \$4 million, will provide space for exhibits, offices, community events, archive storage and a cafe.

The project is the latest addition to the township's Community Impact program which includes upgrades and additions for the fire department, parks department and Carmel Dads Club.
