# Noblesville Schools breaks ground on new stadium

Noblesville Schools broke ground last Tuesday on a new community stadium that will host Noblesville High School (NHS) football, band, track and other activities. The facility, located off of Field Drive behind NHS, will provide 50 percent more seating than the current stadium and is expected to open for track in the spring of 2021, and for football and band in the fall of 2022.

“Our current facility was built in 1969 when Noblesville’s population was 12 percent of what it is today,” said Dr. David Mundy, associate superintendent for Noblesville Schools. “Demand for more space to accommodate our programs has continued to increase as we have grown to be one of the

largest high schools in the state.”

A new build was found to be more cost effective than adding on to the existing facility. The district will finance the approximately \$14 million project through a bond (loan), with The Hagerman Group managing construction. Referendum dollars will not be used and the funding will not increase the tax rate. The bond being used to finance the stadium cannot be used to fund staff, programs or student needs, per state guidelines.

Highlights of the new stadium include: 50 percent more seating to provide needed space for fans and visitors, expanded concessions and restrooms, on-site park-

ing, part of high school campus to allow for safe access to the field, redesigned crowd flow to better monitor and manage large student groups, enhanced LED lighting, band director stand, locker rooms for home and away teams, up-to-date broadcast technology capabilities, practice fields, athletic training space, and additional storage.

The current facility, Beaver Materials Field at the Swanson Sports Complex, will remain a district facility to accommodate lacrosse, rugby, band competitions and other uses.

# New local income tax numbers bolster Fishers 2021 budget situation

Last week, I sat through my eighth annual media budget briefing from Mayor Scott Fadness. This is the first time the mayor, just a few days away from the public hearing on the budget before the city council on Sept. 21, could not provide an overall budget number for 2021.

“This is, hands down, the most unusual situation we find ourselves – from a budget – that I can recall,” Fadness said.

There has been some good news that will ease the financial pressure on the city. The state budget office had forecast a 10 percent decline in income tax revenues available to local governments, but numbers released last Wednesday reveal a 10.8 percent income tax revenue *increase* in Hamilton County. Fadness said this development changed the city’s financial situation “dramatically” literally overnight.

An agreement reached with Carmel dealing with local income tax distribution says any growth in the income tax revenue over 2.5 percent will go to Fishers. The new income tax numbers from the state indicate Fishers will gain an additional \$4 million based on that agreement.

The mayor, who had shaved spending from the 2021 budget plan bracing for lower revenues, now finds the city with a surplus in the coming year of about \$7 million.

When the state warned of lower revenue numbers in the spring, Fadness eliminated

seven full-time positions through attrition, including two deputy mayor jobs (no public safety jobs were impacted). He also eliminated all travel and training for staff.

City Controller Lisa Bradford says the cuts in spending for 2020 totaled at least \$1.2 million.

The mayor also addressed the creation of the Fishers Health Department. The city dipped into cash reserves to the tune of about \$2 million to create the department and establish a COVID-19 testing program. The city is utilizing federal CARES Act money, which can only be used for certain qualified expenses, such as testing and overtime, to be reimbursed for nearly all the money taken from reserves for testing and the health department.

Beginning in 2021, the 1-cent tax rate used by the county to fund the county health department will, for Fishers residents, go to pay for the city health department.

Fishers remains the only city in Indiana to maintain a AAA Standard & Poor’s bond rating.

Before the latest revenue numbers, Fadness planned to present a 2021 spending plan to the council with no additional staff and no additional compensation for city employees, other than longevity raises already embedded in the pay system. It would have allowed for a \$700,000 surplus to help the city deal with any income shortfalls for 2021. With the additional money in the pipeline, Fadness says

he will be cautious on how to handle the additional money.

The mayor said he had recommended a reduction in the amount of money the city council non-profit committee would have to distribute to local organizations, down from \$250,000 to \$100,000. With the latest income figures, Fadness anticipates more than \$100,000 in funds available for nonprofits.

In terms of city building projects, the Geist Waterfront Park and Nickel Plate Trail will continue to move forward with funding in place.

As to funding continuing State Road 37 projects, Fadness says the city has bonds rolling off in 2024, allowing the city to issue new bonds handling any additional money needed for completion of the construction without needing a tax rate increase. The city estimates a need to find an additional \$18 million to fully fund the project, according to Fadness.

The mayor described his 2021 budget plan as tax neutral without any increases in city fees, but he did caution that increases in housing values could increase some property tax bills, but that is outside the power of city government to control.

One capital project Fadness will factor into his budget deliberations is the proposed new fire station on the northeast side of the city. Staffing the station, as well as the building costs, will be a part of that decision.

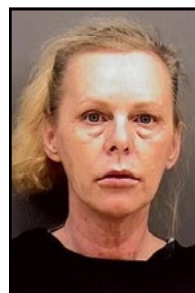
City services remained open throughout Friday, and website operation was restored late Friday evening.

# County feeling strain from cost of mail-in absentee ballots

Across Indiana, nearly 250,000 people have already requested mail-in absentee ballots for the Nov. 3 election.

The printing costs vary from county to county. Hamilton County has received close to 25,000 applications for mail-in absentee ballots.

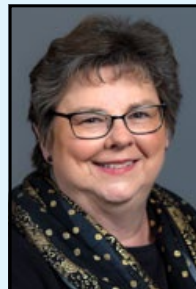
Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams told the Reporter’s newsgathering partner, WISH-TV, that her cost to produce the ballots and get them in the mail is \$2.20 per ballot.

Hamilton County is expecting to send out from 60,000 to 70,000 mail-in absentee ballots for the general election. Prior to the pandemic, Williams estimated the Nov. 3 election would cost the county \$180,000. Williams said the main cost is manpower, and Hamilton County has added 26 temporary staff members just for early and absentee voting.

“I had to go back and ask for more money, so, no, it was not within the 2020 budget,” Williams said. “I went back and asked for an additional \$30,000. I’m keeping a running total as we spend it so I know, so I know if I need to go back and ask for more.”

Hamilton County is paying workers \$100 a day during early and absentee voting.

“Some of the people will work the 29 days of early voting, as well as coming in these three weeks earlier. Not everyone is working every day. We do have several that are working between now and Nov. 2,” Williams said.

# Detention alternatives at work for juveniles

We hear a lot about programs and events designed to keep troubled young people away from crime or deal with them when they first stray.

Indianapolis Mayor Hogsett, for example, rolls out some new program every other month it seems. I always wonder if these efforts are doing any good.

While not getting a lot of publicity, it appears Hamilton County is participating in something that has some success. It's called the Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative. Hamilton is one of 36 Indiana counties that is using this state-sponsored program.

Funding comes from the Annie E. Casey Foundation, something I had never heard of. The idea is to keep low-risk juvenile offenders out of detention, which essentially means jail.

Some juveniles need to be in detention, but to put low-risk kids there can head them toward bigger problems.

Bob Bragg is the county probation officer in charge of the alternatives initiative. He appeared before county commissioners on Monday asking approval for the hiring of a contractual employee to be paid by the Casey Foundation. The request was approved.

Bragg says there are only six juveniles currently in the secure detention center, and one in the non-secured section of the Juvenile Center on Cumberland Road. Sixteen others are under house arrest at home with parents.

When a juvenile is brought in by authorities, he or she is given a risk assessment to determine if detention or some other form of control is needed pending appearance in juvenile court.

Officials feel the program is working to help reduce delinquency. And, if you consider the county's population is over 320,000, having that few juveniles locked up at one time is noteworthy.

# Noblesville’s Ivy Tech will soon be rebranded

Ivy Tech Community College has announced plans to expand its presence and offerings in Hamilton County. The community college’s Noblesville site will be rebranded as Ivy Tech Hamilton County.

Along with a new name, the Hamilton County campus will no longer serve as a satellite location and become Ivy Tech’s 19th campus effective July 1, 2021.

Enrollment at the Ivy Tech Noblesville site has grown rapidly as annually more than 1,200 students attend classes at the location. Ivy Tech began offering classes at the site in 2014.

“Ivy Tech has been valued partner in our community and their willingness to listen to business leaders in our community and adapt to their training and education needs is a great asset,” No-

blesville Mayor Chris Jensen said. “Tomorrow’s workforce will require a new set of skills and Ivy Tech’s Future of Work Lab will give us the environment to explore what those skill set needs are. Streamlining decision making to the local level also gives our business leaders a direct line to innovate and grow a talented workforce right here in our own backyard.”

Ivy Tech has been offering classes in Hamilton County since 1995 – first, at Carmel Junior High School, then moving to the Carmel Learning Center in

2000, now at the Noblesville site since 2014. This will be the first Ivy Tech campus in the county.

“Ivy Tech has been such a blessing to Hamilton County. There is an enormous effort to stimulate work force development efforts in our community,” Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger said. “I believe this move by Ivy Tech will help to develop programs that are tailored to enhance the progression of this program.”

A new set of eight-week courses start at all Ivy Tech locations and online on Oct. 26.

# 'Program win' - Huskies stun unbeaten Western in overtime

**ARCADIA** - Hamilton Heights football coach Jon Kirschner saw this coming three weeks ago.

When the Huskies played physical football against West Lafayette, one of the elite teams in the state, for four quarters, he said, "I thought there was something on the horizon."

Then came a big win Friday, Sept. 11 against Northwestern. The next day, Heights began preparing for its opponent in last Friday's game, undefeated Western.

"Gentlemen, I've watched the film," Kirschner told the Huskies. "If you meet their physicality for four quarters, you can win in the fourth quarter."

It wasn't the fourth quarter when Heights won, but Heights won. An overtime touchdown run by Nate Hulen and extra-point kick by Michael Lecher sent the Huskies to a 19-18 victory

over the now-previously unbeaten Panthers.

"This is a huge program win," said Kirschner after the game. "This is the biggest win of my head coaching career."

Devonte Henson had a huge catch on that fourth-down play that kept that last drive alive and tied it 12-12."

That catch was the only one for Henson in the game, but it happened at the perfect time. It kept the drive going, and eventually the Huskies made their way to the Western 20. With the clocking ticking to under a minute, Guy Griffey sent a pass to

Isaac Tuma, and Tuma made the catch.

Heights' two-point conversion try was stopped, so it was on to overtime. The Panthers got the ball first, and their star runner Jerry Padgett took the ball in from the four-yard line on third down. Western went for two, but the Huskies stopped the Panthers.

Heights then got its offensive turn, and Hulen took over. He scored on a third-and-4 play, tying the game at 18-18. Michael Lecher then came up to try for an extra-point kick, and he sent it perfectly over the uprights.

"Just focus, do what I know how to do best, and that's it, man," said Lecher. "I do this all week. I came out here to get it done. That's all there was in my mind was getting it done."

Both teams got on the board in the second quarter. The Huskies scored first, with Trey Ehman running

the ball in from the two-yard line with 2:58 remaining in the half. Western answered a couple minutes later, as Padgett took the ball in from the three.

The halftime score was 6-6, and the Panthers made it 12-6 after Padgett took the ball in from 17 yards early in the third quarter. Padgett led all runners with 197 yards.

Ehman topped the Heights' rushing list with 131 yards in 25 carries. Quarterback Griffey had an efficient night, going 7-of-13 for 71 yards, including the big fourth-quarter passes to Henson and Tuma.

While the Huskies are enjoying this win, and deservedly so, they are also in a good position: Heights now leads the Hoosier Conference East Division standings at 2-0. The Huskies take a break from division play on Friday to travel to Twin Lakes, for a 7:30 p.m. start. (Both teams are in the

"It was a very defensive-oriented game," said Southeastern coach Michael Kelly. "Both teams had two turnovers. Their defensive line is physical and they did a nice job scheming against us offensively."

Westfield now shares the HCC lead with Brownsburg; both teams are 3-0 in the league. This sets up a big game next week, as the 'Rocks will play at the Bulldogs' field Friday. Fishers is now 1-2 in HCC play and 1-4 overall. The Tigers go on the road Friday to play Avon; this game kicks off at 7:30 p.m.

"We just told our kids that we just got to keep improving each week and building," said Funk. "And our goal is to be peaking at the end of the season. We're going to use this loss as a teaching tool as coaches."

But seconds later, Cooper grabbed a 71-yard pass and took it in to the end zone. Richardson scored late in the quarter on a four-yard run to push LN ahead 34-33, but that set the stage for one last Greyhounds drive and Hanna's game-winning kick.

Hanna was perfect on the night, making five field goals and three extra-point kicks. Luke Conley was Carmel's leading rusher, gaining 121 yards in 16 carries. Osborne finished the game 9-of-22 for 139 yards, with Baron Smith making four receptions.

The Greyhounds are 2-1 in the MIC and 3-2 overall, and play at North Central Friday.
