ground on new stadium

Noblesville Schools broke ground last Tuesday on a new community stadium that will host Noblesville High School (NHS) football, band, track and other activities. The facility, located off of Field Drive behind NHS, will provide 50 percent more seating than the current stadium and is expected to open for track in the spring of 2021, and for football and band in the fall of 2022.

"Our current facility was built in 1969 when Noblesville's population was 12 percent of what it is today," said Dr. David Mundy, associate superintendent for Noblesville Schools. "Demand for more space to 50 percent more seating to provide needaccommodate our programs has continued to ed space for fans and visitors, expanded

largest high schools in the state."

A new build was found to be more cost effective than adding on to the existing facility. The district will finance the approximately \$14 million project through a bond (loan), with The Hagerman Group managing construction. Referendum dollars will not be used and the funding will not increase the tax rate. The bond being used to finance the stadium

cannot be used to fund staff, programs or student needs, per state guidelines.

Highlights of the new stadium include: increase as we have grown to be one of the concessions and restrooms, on-site park-

ing, part of high school campus to allow for safe access to the field, redesigned crowd flow to better monitor and manage large student groups, enhanced LED lighting, band director stand, locker rooms for home and away teams, up-to-date broadcast technology capabilities, practice fields, athletic training space, and additional storage.

The current facility, Beaver Materials Field at the Swanson Sports Complex, will remain a district facility to accommodate lacrosse, rugby, band competitions and other uses.

New local income tax numbers bolster Fishers 2021 budget situation

Last week, I sat through my eighth annual media budget briefing from Mayor Scott Fadness. This is the first time the mayor, just a few days away from the public hearing on the budget before the city council on Sept. 21, could not provide an overall budget number for 2021.

"This is, hands down, the most unusual situation we find ourselves – from a budget – that I can recall," Fadness said.

There has been some good news that will ease the financial pressure on the city. The state budget office had forecast a 10 percent decline in income tax revenues available to local governments, but numbers released last Wednesday reveal a 10.8 percent income tax revenue increase in Hamilton County. Fadness said this development changed the city's financial situation "dramatically" literally overnight.

An agreement reached with Carmel dealing with local income tax distribution says any growth in the income tax revenue over 2.5 percent will go to Fishers. The new income tax numbers from the state indicate Fishers will gain an additional \$4 million based on that agreement.

The mayor, who had shaved spending from the 2021 budget plan bracing for lower revenues, now finds the city with a surplus in the coming year of about \$7 million.

When the state warned of lower revenue numbers in the spring, Fadness eliminated

seven full-time positions through attrition, including two deputy mayor jobs (no public safety jobs were impacted). He also eliminat-

ed all travel and training for staff. City Controller Lisa Bradford says the cuts in spending for 2020 totaled at least \$1.2 million.

The mayor also addressed the creation of the Fishers Health Department. The city dipped into

cash reserves to the tune of about \$2 million to create the department and establish a COVID-19 testing program. The city is utilizing federal CARES Act money, which can only be used for certain qualified expenses, such as testing and overtime, to be reimbursed for nearly all the money taken from reserves for testing and the health department.

Beginning in 2021, the 1-cent tax rate used by the county to fund the county health department will, for Fishers residents, go to pay for the city health department.

Fishers remains the only city in Indiana to maintain a AAA Standard & Poor's bond

Before the latest revenue numbers, Fadness planned to present a 2021 spending plan to the council with no additional staff and no additional compensation for city employees, other than longevity raises already embedded in the pay system. It would have allowed for a \$700,000 surplus to help the city deal with any income shortfalls for 2021. With the additional money in the pipeline, Fadness says is required at tinyurl.com/y493ncyk.



from 60,000 to 70,000 mail-in absentee ballots for the general election. Prior to the pandemic, Williams estimated the Nov. 3 election would cost the county \$180,000. Williams said the main cost is manpower, and Hamilton County has added 26 temporary staff members just for early and absentee voting.

"I had to go back and ask for more money, so, no, it was not within the 2020 budget," Williams said. "I went back and asked for an additional \$30,000. I'm keeping a running total as we spend it so I know, so I know if I need to go back and ask for more."

"Some of the people will work the 29 days of early voting, as well as coming in these three weeks earlier. Not everyone is working every day. We do have several that are working between now and Nov. 2," Williams said.

In terms of city building projects, the Geist Waterfront Park and Nickel Plate Trail will continue to move forward with funding in place.

As to funding continuing State Road 37 projects, Fadness says the city has bonds rolling off in 2024, allowing the city to issue new bonds handling any additional money needed for completion of the construction without needing a tax rate increase. The city estimates a need to find an additional \$18 million to fully fund the project, according

The mayor described his 2021 budget plan as tax neutral without any increases in city fees, but he did caution that increases in housing values could increase some property tax bills, but that is outside the power of city government to control.

One capital project Fadness will factor into his budget deliberations is the proposed new fire station on the northeast side of the city. Staffing the station, as well as the building costs, will be a part of that decision.





I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about.
