# Judge rules all ballots postmarked by Election Day must be counted

# Gearing up for mom's apartment



Hoosiers may not know election results until weeks after the Nov. 3 election, now that a federal judge ruled any mail-in absentee ballot postmarked by Election Day must be counted.

The federal judge said close to 2,000 ballots cast in the primary election in Marion and Hamilton counties were thrown out because they arrived after the deadline, even though they were postmarked by the date of the primary. For the Nov. 3 election, any similar ballot must be counted.

Federal judge Sarah Evans Barker's ruling simply states that Election Day is an all-day event. If the voter followed all the rules and mailed their ballot on time then it must count.

Hamilton County has sent out more than 36,000 mail-in absentee ballots, and as of Wednesday more than 9,000 have been returned.

Hamilton County Clerk Kathy Williams said her office is still processing applications for mail-in absentee ballots. Indiana

voters have until Oct. 22 to request a ballot.

Williams says the judge's ruling will most likely delay the election results and could potentially change the outcome in some local races.

"It could, especially our legislative races if they are close we wouldn't know those [results] until the middle of the month and, you know, depending on how many it is," Williams said.

Prior to the judge's ruling, Indiana election law states all mail-in absentee ballots must arrive in the clerk's offices by noon on Election Day. Ballots delivered after noon are supposed to be dismissed, regardless of when they were postmarked.

Hamilton County had 435 of those ballots in the primary. Marion County had

more than 1,500. The federal judge cites COVID-19 and changes at the postal service mean voters likely can’t control when their ballots arrive. So she’s ordered any ballot that is postmarked on or before Election Day and arrives at the clerk’s office by Nov. 13 must be counted.

Hendricks County Clerk

Debbie Hoskins says if voters get their ballots back in the mail early that will speed up the final vote totals.

“Hopefully there wouldn’t be too many people that will get their ballots into us late, I mean it’s doable, I mean it is just prolonging the results,” Hoskins said.

All county clerks will have to keep some election staff longer than expected, which will add to the cost of the election.

There were 550,000 absentee mail-in ballots cast in the primary and Indiana is expected to have double that number for the general election.

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# Coleman named director of Indiana State Parks

Terry Coleman will take over as the new director of Indiana State Parks on Oct. 4, Indiana Department of Natural Resources Director Dan Bortner announced Thursday.

Coleman, who has served as deputy director of state parks since 2014, has been serving as interim state parks director since his predecessor, Bortner, was appointed by Gov. Eric J. Holcomb as DNR director in August.

Coleman has served a variety of roles for state

parks in Indiana for more than four decades and served two years with Ohio State Parks starting in 2012.

His Indiana service started as a seasonal employee at Pokagon State Park, the day after graduating from Northrop High School in Fort Wayne. He served three more summer seasons at the state park near Angola while attending Ball State University,

Coleman has held a number of Indiana State Parks positions including maintenance repair-person, assistant property manager, property manager and north region manager.

The promotion fulfills a lifelong dream for Coleman, he said, after starting his career cleaning park restrooms.

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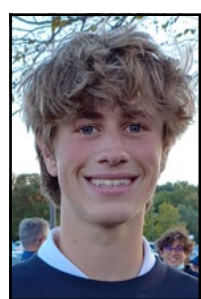

# Carmel, HSE defend sectional titles

The Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern boys tennis teams successfully defended their sectional championships on Thursday.

The top-ranked Greyhounds took the first step in their quest for a fifth consecutive state title by winning their own sectional at the Todd Witsken Tennis Center. Carmel beat No. 12 Guerin Catholic 4-1 for its 11th straight sectional crown and 34th overall.

“As many as we’ve won in the last four years, it’s never been easy,” said Greyhounds coach Bryan Hanan. “We just take it one step at a time. We take it one week at a time. It’s always a battle.

That’s what we expect. We’re just happy to play Tuesday in the regional at Kokomo, so that’s what we’ll worry about next.”

Carmel did get a battle from the Golden Eagles. The Greyhounds got the points they needed from both doubles, with the No. 1 team of Jones McNamar and Srisanth Malpeddi winning 6-0, 6-0. The No. 2 team of Ethan Eckhart and Corbin King were pushed to 7-5 in the first set, then took the second set 6-0.

Eli Mercer won at No. 2 singles 6-1, 6-2. At No. 3 singles, Guerin’s Max Fuller won the first set 6-3 before Carmel’s Jack Jentz came back to win the next two 6-3, 6-1.

“They’re ranked as high as they are for a reason,” Hanan said of the Golden Eagles. “We knew they’re a good team. They came out and competed with us tonight.

“They didn’t just show up tonight,” said Hanan. “They came here to win tonight. That’s why I have a lot of respect for what they do over there.”

The Golden Eagles got their win at No. 1 singles, with Cole Metzger tak-

# The unlikely story behind Frank Reich's face shield

Notable big names across the National Football League are struggling with this mask situation.

There was Chiefs Head Coach Andy Reid, infamously battling a fogged-up face shield on the opening night of the 2020 season.

Classic.

Jon Gruden, Pete Carroll, Kyle Shanahan, Vic Fangio and Sean Payton? Their laissez-faire behavior was downright expensive. Each of the five head coaches were fined \$100,000 by the league for failing to wear face coverings in a proper manner on the sidelines.

Tack on an additional \$250,000 fine to each organization, and after just three weeks, this is already a \$1.7 million chat in the principal's office.

The potential best solution to this mounting issue for head coaches around the NFL? A local painter in Jackson, Miss. believes he has it. And the best part? He already sent you one.

"When I watched Andy Reid of the Kansas City Chiefs, his face shield was fogging up like crazy," Kyoung Lee said. "I know how to take care of that problem. The Sunnie USA is magic!"

Speaking with Lee on Tuesday afternoon via Facetime didn't feel like the first time we had met. Lee's product, a clear, anti-fogging face shield is named the Sunnie USA — a perfect fit for the vibrant, gregarious personality of its pitchman. Originally from Korea, Lee moved to the United States 22 years ago for a "Mississippi girl."

The pair remain married today, and, as the pandemic set in across the South, Lee simply wanted to use his background in art and design "to help society."

At first, there was a grand idea about using his connections in South Korea to send technology to Mississippi. The goal was to create millions of masks in Jackson.

Lee jokes that the government didn't buy his plan, and ultimately watching Reid battle through a comical Thursday evening, huffing and puffing into a blurry face shield on national television, sparked his big idea.

Lee quickly created the anti-fogging face shields, packaged them up and mailed one out to all 32 NFL head coaches.

This past Sunday in Indianapolis, Lee got a nibble.

"He sent it to me a couple weeks ago, and we just kept it there," Colts third-year Head Coach Frank Reich said. "I just kept it there and then I said, 'Alright, I'm going to try it this week.'"

Colts fans quickly noticed the change on the sidelines during the team's rout of the Jets on Sunday.

With the lopsided score in the second half, CBS' play-by-play announcer Kevin Harlan found time to make multiple references to Reich's new-look face shield.

"It's actually easier to breathe. I think we'll stay with the face shield for right now," Reich concluded after the victory.

After the debut, word traveled quickly to Mississippi.

"Monday morning, I got a call from a weird number," Lee said. "I answered, and it was one of the (Colts) assistant coaches. He said, 'I am looking for Sunnie, Sunnie USA, Coach (Reich) wore it last night.' I guess he really loved it."

Lee was thrilled to hear the update and then connected the Colts blowout victory to the addition of the Sunnie USA on the home sidelines.

"I am so happy for Colts fans, you did

wonderful," Lee said. "Your team did a fantastic job against the Jets. Philip Rivers is on fire. Just like my Sunnie (USA) is on fire!"

In a year so murky with bad news, the good hearted nature of complete stranger can clear up just about anything.

"I appreciate it," Reich said during his interview session on Monday. "It was just ironic that we got a package here at the office, looked at it and said, 'Let's just keep this around here. Maybe I will want to try this out one time.' So, thank you to Lee from Sunnie USA."

"Hey Frank, thank you for trying on my Sunnie," Lee said in a message on Tuesday to Reich. "Good luck with your next game, I am rooting for you."

Lee, here in Indianapolis, we are rooting for you, too.
